

Local Stockmen Make Good Record At Amarillo Show

When the judging was completed Tuesday, March 3, at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show Castro County had been well represented in most of the livestock divisions.

John Bridges, 18 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Bridges and a Hart 4-H Club member, was the only exhibitor from this county to win grand champion honors. Young Bridges showed a 110 pound Southdown lamb to grand championship over entries from the tri-state area.

Ronnie Nelson and Jimmy Brock also shared in the honors of the sheep show. Brock showed the first place pen of five fine wool lambs, third place milk fed lamb, fifth place Southdown lamb and had lambs in the champion pen of ten lambs shown by Castro County. Nelson showed the second place milk fed lamb, second place group of five fine wool lambs, and 13th place Southdown lamb. He also had animals in the champion pen of ten lambs shown by the county.

John Bridges showed the first and third place Southdown lambs and also assisted in winning the champion pen of ten lambs for 4-H and FFA members of the county.

In the Hereford division of the show C. J. Mapes and son showed the 2nd and 5th place junior yearling Hereford bulls of the show in a class of thirty entries.

George and Elvis Burch showed the second place pen of six Hereford bulls of the show in a field of six entries.

Tom Acker, 4-H member from Nazareth, showed the 10th place calf in a class of 56 entries. Jack Acker, also of Nazareth, showed the 13th place calf in this same large class of excellent calves.

In the swine division Castro County 4-H Club members failed to win a grand champion, however, they were consistently at the very top of their classes.

In the Poland Chima division Alphonse Huseman showed the 2nd place pen of three barrows.

In the Chester White division Tom Acker showed the first place heavy weight barrow and Jack Acker exhibited the 2nd place light and 3rd place heavy weight barrow.

In the cross breed class Joe Venhaus, 10 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Venhaus of Nazareth, showed the 4th and 5th place heavy weight barrow and the 2nd place pen of three. This was the first time for young Venhaus to exhibit animals in a show.

COUNTY SCHOOLS APPORTIONMENT IN STATE AID GIVEN

House Bill Would Increase State Aid to Public Schools

A proposed \$10 million increase in local fund assignment of the Minimum Foundation School Program has been introduced in the State Legislature through House Bill 3.

The bill would raise the minimum local school fund assignment from the present \$45 million to \$55 million for the state during the 1953-54 school year. After that time, according to House Bill 3, the flat \$10 million increase would be replaced by a local total fund assignment of 25 per cent of the total cost of the foundation program for the preceding year.

To gain the minimum local fund assignment from individual school districts in the 1953-54, each school district in the state would have its fund assignment increased in such a way as to increase the total fund assignment to the proposed \$55 million, or a \$10 million increase.

The "25 per cent provision" would cause the districts of the state to assume one-fourth of any increased cost in the total Foundation Program while the state would provide the other 75 per cent of the provision. Although this provision is meant to replace the present assignment of \$45 million per year, it would mean local fund assignments totaling more

than \$55 million. The bill would entitle teachers to a \$240 per year pay increase, but would limit base wages to \$2640 per year. (House Bill 3 is not the teachers' pay raise bill endorsed by the Texas State Teachers Association.)

A comparatively simple calculation determined the local fund assignment for 1953-54 because \$55 million was an established figure, but no effort has been made to estimate what this would be for future years.

Although the state has many sources available to raise the funds, House Bill 3 prescribes that the increases should come from local funds. This would mean heavier taxing of property, the only source of increase available for local school districts.

According to state-wide figures, many smaller school districts could not stand an increase in property taxes. This is especially true in the case of areas suffering from drought, such as West Texas.

The bill would mean that the total local fund for the fifteen counties of Senatorial District 30 would be raised from \$1,266,068.91 to \$1,521,870.98, an increase of \$255,802.07. The increase would be much higher than this after the "25 per cent provision" went into effect.

The figures below show the amount of local funds assigned at the present time for the Dimmitt school district of Castro County; then what the local funds would be under House Bill 3:

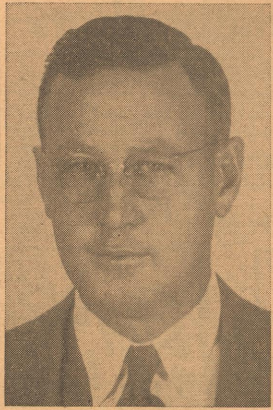
\$25,000 Fire Destroys Barn on Homer Newton Farm Wednesday Morning

Fire of undetermined origin resulted in an estimated loss of \$25,000 when a large barn, and contents, were destroyed on the Homer Newton farm three miles west of Dimmitt Wednesday morning at 10:00 o'clock.

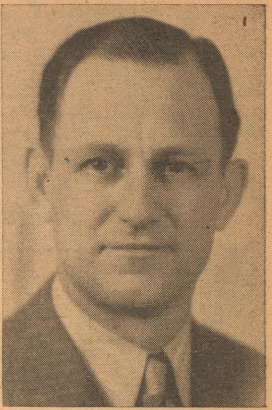
The large 40x70 ft. barn, tractors, farm machinery and miscellaneous items were a complete loss as no insurance was carried on the destroyed property. Included in the fire loss were three tractors, with equipment for one tractor, a quantity of cotton seed and cotton seed cake, 300 to 400 sacks of fertilizer, and a number of miscellaneous items.

Members of the Dimmitt Fire Department, with the aid of others, managed to remove several items from the barn and to salvage a 24x70 ft. shed that was attached to the barn. Items salvaged included a cattle feeder, damaged, a new truck, feed grinder and a 550 gallon gasoline tank, full of gasoline.

Gregory, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Gregory, completed his high school athletic career in the Dimmitt - Denver City game Saturday morning. A senior, Gregory, had been a member of the starting team for the Bobcats for the past three years and had placed on the all-tournament team of practically every tournament, invitational or conference, that he had participated in including the all-state team at Austin last season. He year for the first time seen regular duty on the Bobcat quintet. He invariably turned a brilliant performance at the forward post where he was always a scoring threat and where he gained the reputation of being one of the finest rebounders in the area.

The Bobcats met Throckmorton in their first regional tournament game Friday morning. Starting strong the Bobcats led at the quarter 15 to 9. The strong Throckmorton team cut the lead down during the second quarter and at the half led 24 to 23 and at the end of the third quarter 43 to 36. Trailing until the last minutes of the game the Bobcats moved ahead to win the hotly contested game by the one margin score of 53 to 52. The Bobcats were eliminated from the state race Saturday morning by a strong Denver City team which went on to defeat Alpine for the regional championship.

Andy Rogers Sez!

Less than thirty years ago any man or group who asked the government regulation of their business or someone else's was considered a liberal and often dangerous thinker. Now most of our groups usually considered as conservative light the way for government control and regulation. The argument always is that "We must protect the public" from unethical practices. Folks asking for such laws usually get protected themselves—from competition. The usual method is creating a new regulatory board, another bureau, to require licenses, have the power to withhold and cancel licenses, set examinations, etc. The people who run the board and make the rules are members of the trade or profession being regulated.

The clamor for such regulation grows every time your Legislature meets. It makes one stop and wonder—wonder if folks really mean what they have said about "that mess in Washington." A huge portion of your Legislative time, and your tax money, will be spent this year considering

new proposals to regulate various groups and professions. Much of their time already has been spent for this purpose.

I feel that the general public is not aware of this. I earnestly asked them to offer their opinions.

The growing awareness, on a state level, that Texas' future depends on proper care and use of water made itself felt last week.

Developments include the following:
1. The proposed Canadian River Authority held back for the whole Senate to study and offer strengthening and wholesome new recommendations.
Up for Committee Study
2. A law to cancel all unused surface water permits over 10 years old.
3. To set up a State antipollution committee.
4. To define clearly purposes for which surface water may be used.
5. A constitutional amendment that would ask the State to underwrite part of the bonds need-

ed for local communities to build dams. The State would be repaid by charging industries, cities and other public users for water usage from these projects.

The author of this bill, Senator John Bell, said it would get the Federal government out of the dam building business; that Federal funds would be harder to obtain anyway; and that on Federal projects Federal government rules require a large amount of a lake's capacity be kept back for flood control, etc. and that such rules did not work in West Texas anyway.

The Governor signed the Act validating the High Plains Underground Water District.

One new bill would permit small counties to pay a constable's auto expenses. Rep. J. O. Gilham was against this bill and said the office of constable should be abolished.

Senator Carlos Ashley's new drunk driving law would not enable anyone to merely pay a fine. He would also have to spend at least 3 days in jail.

Ashley said many offenders didn't mind paying fines but would sober up if held in jail awhile.

Another bill would require all persons convicted of drunk driving to be fingerprinted.

Lots of steam is building up behind a bill to prohibit feeding raw garbage to animals. It would have to be cooked before feeding it. Proponents say that the crippling disease of vesicular exanthema among hogs is spreading toward Texas at alarming speed from our midwestern states. Also that nearly all hoof and mouth disease outbreaks have been traced to raw garbage.

Homemade garbage would not be affected.

Another House member wants the University of Texas Dental School to make false teeth for folks on the old-age pension rolls. Local dentists would take the impressions and fit the teeth.

Negro boxers and wrestlers in the professional game only would be allowed to compete in Texas if one San Antonio Representative has his way. He claims the sport is greatly retarded in Texas at present because Negroes cannot participate.

It looks as though you will not pay State tax when you go to the movies after this year. A new law will likely exempt entertainment taxes on admission prices of \$1.00 or less.

Service station operators from all over Texas poured into Austin last week, over 1200 of them. They were here to give support to a bill which would let them buy all their gasoline from the wholesalers at a corrected temperature of 60 degrees. They claim that at present much of their gasoline is bought at hot temperatures where gasoline expands. When placed in their underground tanks it cools and there aren't as many gallons left to sell as they bought. Also, at present, they pay the State taxes on what they buy rather than the slightly lesser amount they have to sell from the underground storage tanks.

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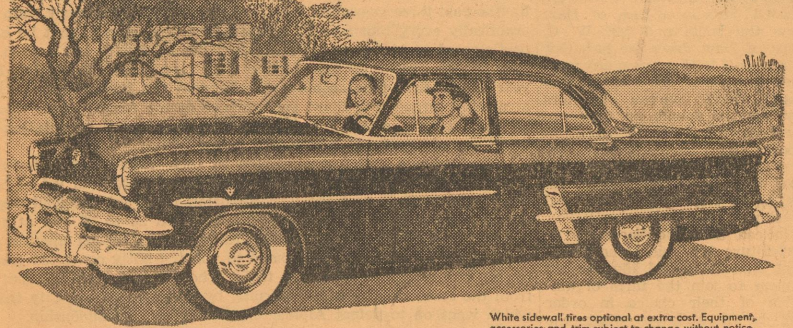

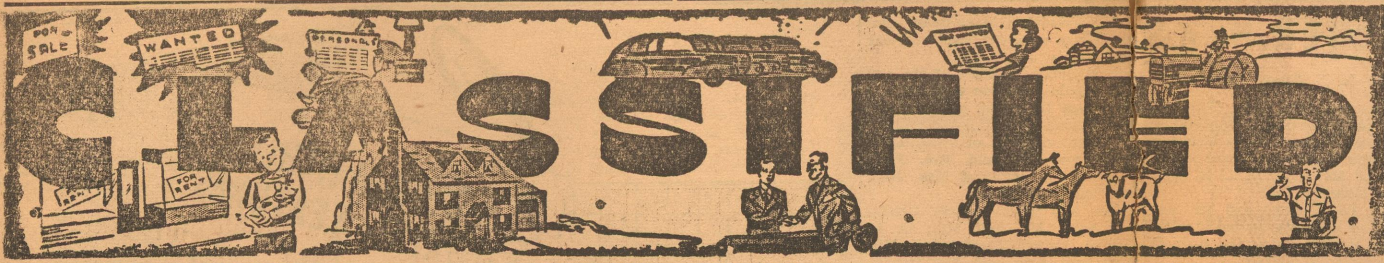

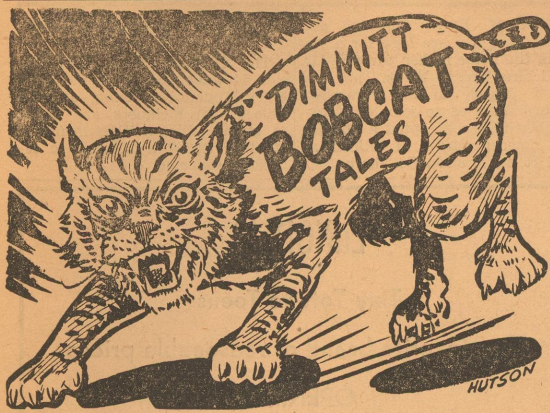

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

by Congressman Walter Rogers

No major break between Eisenhower and the Congress: Despite many predictions to the contrary, I do not look for any major break between the executive and the legislative branches of the government. It is true that there will be many differences in the future, as there have been several already. Those heretofore occurring have been settled without disturbing repercussions. Those occurring in the future can and should be settled in the same manner. There is little doubt that President Eisenhower does not want a running fight with either the House or the Senate. The same is true with a majority of both of the Houses of Congress. The President knows that the Congress will back him all the way in maintaining the defense of this country and in sound economy measures. This is especially true of the Southern bloc. This bloc has not changed its principles in the slightest degree. It makes little difference to the members from the South who or what party might be in control, as this bloc intends to continue in the future, as it has in the past, to vote on the issues as they are presented and to base those votes on sound and basic principles dedicated to the best interests of this nation. President Eisenhower knows this as well as any man who ever served as president.

Restoration of the value of the dollar: Much has been said and written about restoring the value of the dollar. All of this talk sounds good until you begin to analyze the problems involved. Do not expect a speedy increase in the value of the dollar. Such action by any administration under present circumstances could well prove economically disastrous. The major task at the present time is to stabilize the present value of the dollar and prevent it from sinking lower. When this is done, action can then begin for a gradual upward trend in its value. This upward trend must consume several years. An immediate increase of 30 to 40 per cent in the value of money would mean bankruptcy to many small business concerns, municipalities, and individuals, to say nothing of the increase in the already back-breaking burden of the national debt. The debts that are presently owed by business concerns, municipalities, individuals and the Federal Government are fixed amounts that were incurred in dollars of approximately the same value as at present. A drastic and immediate increase in the value of the dollar would simply mean a corresponding increase in

outstanding indebtedness percentage-wise. It would also mean a corresponding decline in the value of goods and of course wages. The president has placed in his Cabinet a number of outstanding business men who have full knowledge and understanding of the problems involved, and I do not think that they are going to take any steps that could result in a major recession and a possible depression.

Statehood for Hawaii: The Interior and Insular Affairs Subcommittee on Territories and Insular Possessions, of which I am a member, is presently studying the Hawaii statehood bill. This will be a hot issue in this Congress. Alaska and Puerto Rico were both disturbed because Hawaii was singled out for statehood in the President's State of the Union message. The hearings on this bill are most interesting and will produce many interesting facts, which I will try to give you from time to time. Statistics as of July 1, 1948, reflect Hawaii's population at 540,500, of which 10,000 are Hawaiian, 70,000 part Hawaiian, 177,000 Caucasian, 144,000 Japanese, 28,000 Chinese, 18,000 Filipino, 9,000 Puerto Rican, 5,000 Korean, and 1,500 others. Alaska's population at that date was 100,000, approximately evenly divided between Caucasians, on the one hand, and Eskimos, Aleuts and Indians, on the other hand. Puerto Rico had 2,113,053, 76.5 per cent being Caucasian and 23.5 per cent being Negro. Space will not permit me to include other interesting facts concerning businesses, health conditions, land uses, labor matters, taxation, and other subjects in this letter.

Receptions in Washington: Washington was a city of receptions during the past several days for the President and his opponent whom he defeated in the November election, Governor Adlai Stevenson. There were several receptions for Governor Stevenson during his short stay in Washington, the highlight of his visit being of course his meeting and conference with the President. The Congressional Club gave a reception on Monday night, February 16th, honoring the President and Mrs. Eisenhower. This club is made up of wives of present and former members of Congress who desire to join. The reception was a formal invitation affair. The invitations were in demand and many government officials did not get to attend because of the space limitations in the Club.
