A Korean veteran, SSgt. Hollums holds three Purple Heart Medals, the Presidential Unit Citation, the United Nations Service Medal and the Korean Service Medal.

County Gives 216 Pints Of Blood

Floyd County citizens gave 216 pints of blood to the American Red Cross Bloodmobile Monday and Tuesday of this week. Although this was short of the goal of 300 pints Red Cross officials were well pleased with the results.

At Lockney on Monday a total of 94 pints were given from 12 noon to 6 p. m. R. L. Knox Jr., chairman, said that the local organization had secured 179 pledges, had 20 rejections due to one cause or another, 16 persons came in who had not pledged. Some people were away on vacation and unable to report. However, Red Cross officials said that this was good for this size community.

At Floydada on Tuesday 122 pints were donated. Floydada had 180 pledges with 145 people reporting and 23 rejections.

Last year the county gave slightly more than 300 pints with the amount being divided almost equally between Lockney and Floydada.

Mr. Knox expressed his thanks to the various committees and individuals who helped with the drive.

Today Last Day For X-Ray Unit

The State Department of Health's x-ray unit will be here all day today (Thursday) to conclude its two-day stand. It is set up in the Lockney Auto Company show rooms here and ran all day Wednesday.

Business was brisk Wednesday and by mid-afternoon the unit had x-rayed 354 people. All persons 15 years of age or over are being urged to have a chest x-ray. There is no charge and it takes only a minute.

Drilling Rig On Oil Test Site

The drilling rig was being moved on the site Tuesday and it was reported that the J. M. Massie No. 1 oil test, located four miles north of Floydada, would be spudded in about Saturday.

The crew was drilling a water well Tuesday, the slush pit was ready and the equipment was mostly on the site.

Stake for the exact location was driven last week 1980 feet from the north line and 660 feet from the west line of section 7, block T, BS&F survey. The test is for 10,000 feet, production or granite.

Application for the drilling permit was filed in July. Several major companies, including Sinclair, Shell, T. & P. Coal and Oil and Southern Production, are reported to be interested in the venture.

The site is a few hundred yards from a test by Pure Oil that went to 5,600 feet before it was abandoned with a set of tools in the hole 10 years ago.

Spotted Rains In Floyd County

Rains that were very spotted have fallen in Floyd County the past week with some farmers crying "enough" and others still wanting rain. Moisture has fallen in some parts of the county almost every day the past week.

Total moisture here, according to the government gauge kept by Joe Holt at the Lockney General Hospital, is 1.58 inches since last Thursday. Of this .48 of an inch was measured Thursday, .23 of an inch Friday, .87 of an inch Saturday and Sunday. A very light rain fell here Monday afternoon and some mist fell Wednesday.

South of town in the Pleasant Valley community and southwest to Sand Hill the total runs up as high as six inches. There farmers are anxious for skies to clear so that they can get back into the fields.

However north of town rain has been light and some farmers still need moisture.

Bob told the group of the purpose of the meeting and introduced M. W. Wiley, president, who gave a financial report.

It was then decided by the group to select a nominating committee. The next meeting will probably be a watermelon feast and program of some type.

PMA Committees To Be Elected In Friday Vote

The polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. Some farmers have voted by mail.

All farmers whether they be owners, tenants of sharecroppers, who are participating or carrying out practices in accord with the program administered by the county PMA committee are eligible to vote in the elections.

To be elected is a community committee of three and one delegate from each community to the county convention. The delegates will meet in the county convention and elect a county committee and alternates.


YOUTH PLAINS NEWS

Many People Over 65 Eligible For Social Security

There are many self-employed persons between the ages of 65 and 75 who should file an application for social security benefits immediately because net earnings for 1953 have dropped below their earnings for 1951 and 1952, according to John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security office. Even though these people are continuing to operate their businesses and will make over \$1800 in self-employment in 1953, it is still important that an application be filed to establish a retirement benefit based on high net earnings in 1951 and 1952.

It is possible for a self-employed person between these ages to net \$900 annually and still receive his monthly social security check. In the cases of those clearing over \$900, but not more than \$1725 annually, there is still a possibility of one or more monthly payments for the year. Mr. Hutton urged that persons in this group contact the social security office to discuss their individual cases.

All persons who are past seventy-five should file an application whether they are working for wages or are self-employed since these people may draw their social security no matter what their earnings from wages or self-employment.

Mr. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock Social Security office will be at the Post Office in Lockney at 2:00 p. m. on Tuesday, August 25, to assist in all

matters pertaining to social security. Self-employed individuals should bring their copies of their 1951 and 1952 self-employment tax returns when discussing their cases so that more accurate information can be furnished in each case.

Rolling Stock, Intangibles At Higher Figures

Floydada. — As local taxing authorities arranged their budget hearings and made their plans for the tax year of 1954, the final figures were made for county tax roll totals by the state board with the announcement of considerably increased values to be set up for railway rolling stock and intangible values for all types of transportation concerns operating in the county.

There are 22 concerns on the state tax board's list as operating in this county. Of these the Fort Worth & Denver Railway company is far and away the biggest, tax-wise.

County assessor-collector Hamilton's notice from the comptroller last week of the values set for this county for intangibles and rolling stock, upped the Denver's values for rolling stock from last year by \$88,686. This figure was a raise to \$98,970 from \$10,284. The line's intangibles remain listed at \$333,940, the same as last year.

The Santa Fe's rolling stock this year goes on the rendition rolls at \$18,640, an increase of \$13,370 from \$5,270, the values set up on last years rolls. Santa Fe's intangibles are put at \$9,590.

For the Quanah, Acme & Pacific, the rolling stock values remain about the same, a change of \$20 from \$2,010 last year to \$1,890 this year, but the company's intangibles were upped \$31,290 from \$14,420 to \$46,610.

Two other more important taxpayers in the county, engaged in the transportation business are Service Pipe Lines, with a \$28,700 rendition and Texas, New Mexico Coaches with a \$38,570 rendition. The figures for these also are set by the state tax board.

This board is composed of the state comptroller, the attorney general and the secretary of state.

Two new names appearing on the intangibles list reported by the state board to Hamilton this year are Bonanza, incorporated, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and Panhandle Film service of Oklahoma City.

County Census Of Scholastics Is Completed

Scholastic figures for Floyd county, released recently by County Superintendent Clarence A. Guffee, show a total of 2,459 persons in school ages.

The figures made allow for all known errors in census taking and enumerating, it was said at the superintendent's office.

After transfers Floydada district is given 1,257 scholastics, Lockney district 949 scholastics, South Plains 51, Sand Hill 50, Lakeview 44, Lone Star 36, Dougherty 41, and Providence 31.

One hundred forty-nine transfers were given approval by the county board. Of these 88 were into Floydada, 51 into Lockney from other districts.

The enumeration in this county does not include the Edgin area attached to Quitaque for school purposes, the Allmon area attached to Petersburg, nor an area on the county line west of Lockney that is attached to Plainview.

The superintendent's records disclose that one pupil was transferred from a Floyd county district to Crosbyton, three to Petersburg, one to Plainview, two to McAdoo, and one to Quitaque.

Small Claims Court Effective August 26

Effective August 26 a Claims Court will be established with the Justices of the various counties as judges. This court, provided in House Bill No. 405 passed by the Legislature in recent session, is limited to amounts not exceed \$50 except in cases where the money is for labor and then the Court is limited to amounts not in excess of \$100.

However the law provides the Court may not take from lending agencies or insurance companies.

Persons filing suit in the court must live in the precinct where the money is for labor and then the Court must perform an obligation in the precinct.

Provisions are for trial unless either party in requests a trial by jury one calendar day before of suit. Appeal may be to the County Court if the in controversy exceeds \$50.

The former Mayor of New York and former ambassador to Mexico under the Truman administration, said it would be useless to try and clear his name before a Congressional Investigating committee, implying that all a committee would do would be raised to make up the loss. After the appointment, O'Dwyer ignored all

hints, suggestions, demands and even loud screams for him to come home and answer questions.

Yes, O'Dwyer has reason to dislike the information-hungry gentlemen of Congress, not to mention inquisitive grand juries which are interested in influence of gangsters, gamblers, vice lords and their like on the city government while O'Dwyer was mayor of New York City.

O'Dwyer, apparently, prefers virtual exile to facing an inquiry in his home-land. His decision to remain in Mexico can be easily understood. It is a wise decision—from the former mayor's point of view. —Lubbock Avalanche.





Huntin' AND Fishin'

By Harve Pennington

Books have been written on how to take bass with the bass plug, however a little can be written to make bugging seem very simple. The methods of fishing these lures with both the spinning rod and the fly rod are the same. It is the methods of casting that are different. Bass bug casting with the fly rod is similar to dry fly casting for trout, for the routine in the casts is identical. The bugging fly rod used for bass fishing is the most important item to be considered. The rod should be stiff enough to handle both a long length line and a bulky deer hair bug. Soft rods will not do the job at all, for the line will not shoot out on the forward cast, but will wrap itself around your neck.

A nine foot rod is the most practical rod to consider. It should weigh about 6 ounces and have fairly large guides to allow the line to travel freely. A longer or shorter rod can be used, however, for the average bass fishing on large streams or lakes, although the nine foot rod has proven the most practical. If an eight foot rod is used, lighter bugs must be used, and the distance that can be cast is greatly reduced.

The recent development of the 5 strip rod has brought forth what we believe is the best bass bug rod that can be had today. This 9 foot rod weighs exactly 6 ounces, and can cast a properly fitted line up to 100 feet with little effort. The bass bugging reel is not as important as the rod. It should be large enough to have some backing under the fly line, and rugged enough in construction to stand a great deal of rough use. Selection of the proper fly line is almost as important as selection of the fly rod. The line should be heavy enough to get the best performance out of the fly rod.

While a level line will work fairly well, the double taper line is better, and the torpedo taper is the best for long and accurate casts with bass bugs. Nylon lines are very light and float well, yet they will not last as long as a silk line. One of the properties of nylon is its stretch which causes the surface finish of the line to crack, shortening its life. Silk lines, moreover, will float just as well if they are properly dressed with a silicone line dressing.

A good buy taper for a stiff 9-foot fly rod is a GAF in silk. It will work well even with a heavy bug, and casts up to 75 feet with a large deer hair bug can easily be accomplished.

Legion Team In Floydada Tourney



Tell Wesley he had better stay in shape because I have high hopes of getting back there in time to watch him play football this season. Boy that would be nice, wouldn't it? Do you think you all will go see Mom this summer? Have you still got your Studebaker? What kind of car does L. V. have? Well Sis, there isn't too much to write about. All I can say is keep the letters coming and hope all of you stay in the best of health. Tell everyone hello and don't worry about me. Lots of love,
