PARTY NAMES

Division among those professing Christian ty is one of the greatest hindrances to the spreading of the gospel Party names are largely responsible for the division. Many are willing to give up their distinctive doctrines for the sake of unity, but they cling tenaciously to denominational names. The religious name a person wears is a true index to what he honors. It might be a person, a form of church government, or a doctrine. The name "Lutheran" honors Martin Luther. "Episcopal" honors a form of church government. "Baptist" honors the act of baptism. Of course "Christian" honors Christ.

Conscientious Bible students have ever been strong in their denunciation of party names. Martin Luther said. "I pray you to leave my name alone, and call not yourselves Lutherans but Christians." John Wesley, the founder of Methodism said: "Would to God that all party names and unscriptural phrases and forms which have divided the Christian world were forget." Charles Spurgeon, the world's greatist Baptist preacher said: "I say of the Baptist name, let it perish, but let Christ's name last forever. I look forward with pleasure to the day when there will not be a Baptist living. I hope they will soon be gone.

But it might be said that these were only men, and that a thing is not wrong simply because men say it is. But these were scholarly men, and knew the Bible teaching on the subject. Inspired men were even stronger in their condemnation of party names. Paul said: "Now this I say that every one of you saith. I am of Paul: and if Apollos; and I of Cephas; and I of Christ. Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you, or were you baptized in the name of Paul? (I Cor. 1:12-13.) He said again: "While one of you saith I am of Paul; and another, I am of Apollos; are ye not carnal? . . . I have planted. Apollos watered: but God gave the increase. (I Cor. 3:4, 6.) These verses teach that it is sinful for Christians to wear the name of any man. even though the man be inspired of God. Peter said: "If any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God in this name." (1 Pet. 4:16, R. V.) The Lord commended the church at Pergamos by saying: "Thou holdest fast my name, and hast not denied my faith." (Rev. 2:13.) The Bible gives a reason for exalting the name of Christ above all others: "There is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." (Acts 4:12.)


