GO TO CHURCH SUNDAY

CALLING ON THE LORD

"Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." (Rom. 10:13). The following verses ask, How can this be "without a preacher?" It is impossible to call on One in Whom one does not believe; and it is also impossible to believe on Him without a preacher. So "a preacher" must figure in every true case of "calling upon the name of the Lord." But what has a preacher to do with the salvation of a sinner who is calling upon the name of the Lord? That, we are told, is the Lord's and the sinner's business. What can a preacher do? Well, let someone tell us why the Lord promptly sent both Saul and Cornelius to a preacher. Did He make a mistake? And He sent both these men thither while yet in their sins. The Scriptural answer to this forever solves the whole matter. Let us secure this answer.

1. The Lord gave this law to every sinner: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." (Mk. 16:16) -"Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ urro the remission of your sins." (Acts 2:38). Every sinner in all the world being placed under this law, how could Christ save or remit any sinner in violation of this law? It could not be done, because that law was sealed with Christ's blood, hence could not be altered in a single case. Nor was it ever altered.

2. After teaching sinners, the preacher was commanded thus to do: "baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Matt. 28:20.) If sinners could enter into fellowship with the Godhead "without a preacher," why was this service put into the preacher's hands? And remember, this law demanded the baptism of every taught sinner among "all the nations"-Jews, Gentiles.

Now, in view of the foregoing universal law of remission, shall we think it strange that the Lord did not pardon Saul and Cornelius when they prayed, but pointedly commanded both of them to hear and obey the law, which has been placed in the hands of the Apostles as the Executors? Saul and Cornelius, like all other seekers of true salvation had to be baptized in obedience to the law of Christ. Accordingly, both were baptized immediately upon coming in contact with the law presented by the preachers to whom the Lord sent them. To Saul, the preacher, Ananias, commanded: "And now why tarriest thou? Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on His name" (Acts 22:16.) At the house of Cornelius, Peter, the preacher, said: "Can any man forbid water, that these should not be baptized, who have received the Holy Spirit as well as we? And he commanded them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ." (Acts 10:47, 48). In both cases baptism was commanded, which fixes it as part of the law of Christ - which all must obey. (Heb. 5:9.)

But those who call on the name of the Lord "shall be saved." Well, were not Saul and Cornelius saved? Were they not saved when they called on His name? "No," some one may say, "you have shown that it was when they obeyed the truth taught them by the preachers - when they were baptized — that they were saved." But was not this obedience the act of calling on His name? Read again Acts 22:16. When Ananias came to Saul he said (read carefully): "And now why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on His name." This, then, is how Saul called upon the name of the Lord. It is the New Testament way for all to call upon it. All who thus call upon the Name "shall be saved."
