The Gulf Service softball team, made up mostly of high school boys, grabbed the lead this week in the Lockney Softball League, by defeating both South Plains and the American Legion team. Silvertown, leader since the league started, dropped into second place by virtue of their loss to the Fire Department Tuesday night.

Playing in the last round of the season, all teams are striving for a place among the top four and entry into the play-offs at the close of the season. Regular season ends on August 13.

Last Thursday night saw the Gulf Service team edge by South Plains 3 to 2 in a well played game. It was a 3-up and 3-down game most of the way. Charles Vaughn pitched for the winners while Wilson pitched for the losing team. In the second game of the night, Lone Star defeated Lone Star Co-op 8 to 3 in another well-played game. Pioneer Floydada Newspaperman Dies

Commerce — Funeral services for Claude V. Hall, pioneer Texas newspaperman and authority on plains lore, were held here Tuesday.

Hall, 80, died Sunday in a Dallas clinic.

A native of Hopkins County in East Texas, Hall moved west in 1890 and founded the Floyd County Hesperian in 1894.

Later, he left the newspaper business and entered the law and teaching professions. A thesis written by Hall at the University of Texas 40 years ago is a widely quoted history of Floyd County and of the lore of the High Plains country.

Until he retired, he served as head of the government department of East Texas State College here.

He is survived by his wife, who lives here; a son, Ford Hall of Dallas, and a daughter, Mrs. Graham Johnston of Denver, Colo.

County Approves Wheat Quotas

Floyd County farmers voted 217 to 20 in favor of wheat acreage quotas for 1955 in voting last Friday. The vote by boxes was:

Lockney, 40 for, 1 against. Floydada, 155 for, 16 against. Cedar Hill, 38 for, 3 against.

Nation-wide the vote was close but was approved by a narrow margin by farmers. North Dakota, voting in favor of the quotas by 96.6 percent pushed the decision in favor of the quotas.

Fire Department Needs More Money For Resuscitator

The Lockney Volunteer Fire Department still needs more than \$300 to purchase the combination resuscitator, aspirator and inhalator needed for emergencies in this community. Total cost of the machine is \$642.50 and contributions totaling approximately \$300 have been received from various civic organizations and individuals.

Contributions toward the purchase of the machine received thus far include these: Lions Club \$50, Joe Handley \$25, Dr. G. A. McClelland \$20, Lockney Rotary Club \$100, American Legion \$50, and the Fire Department \$50.

The machine has been demonstrated at various club meetings and public gatherings. It is used on persons suffering from drowning, electric shock, heart attacks, etc. Plans call for it to be placed in a suitable location where it will be easily accessible for use when needed.

Despite the fact that there were only two candidates in the race for county judge in Floyd county in the first Democratic primary, there will be a run-off in the second primary August 28. This was decided Tuesday morning by the county Democratic executive committee after it was found that G. C. Tubbs led W. E. Grimes by only two votes and there were four write-in votes. The committee, decided that Tubbs had failed to receive a majority of the votes cast because of the four write-in votes and for that reason a run-off was necessary.

County Democratic Chairman Ben Ayres told The Beacon that the law says "a candidate must receive a majority of the votes cast in the first primary" if he is to avoid a run-off campaign. Tubbs received 1398 votes to 1396 for Grimes. Ralph Johnston, present county judge, received three write-in votes and W. F. Daniel, also of Floydada, received one write-in vote.

With 17 out of 21 of the executive committee present, 13 of them voted in favor of the run-off, Mr. Ayres said.

There will be two other run-off races in the county. T. T. Hamilton and C. C. Huckabee will run off the tax assessor-collector's race and J. K. Holmes and C. A. Spence are in the run-off for commissioner, precinct No. 1.

Sheriff Earl Cooper, Mrs. Troye Willis Stansell for county treasurer, and Fay Hart, commissioner of Precinct No. 4, all won their races for nomination.

Cooper polled by far the largest vote of any opposed candidate for office. He received 2081 to 845 for his opponent, A. K. May. Mrs. Stansell was next high with 1689 to 1164 for her opponent, Mrs. Sam A. Spence, the present treasurer.

In Precinct 4 Mr. Hart polled 324 votes to 133 for his opponent, Edell DuBois. Ben Ayres, present county Democratic chairman, polled 1555 votes to 865 for James Ward, seeking the same office.

Shivers Leads
Governor Allan Shivers lead in the county 1431 votes to 1395 for Ralph W. Yarbrough, the other leading candidate for governor. Cyclone Davis received 32 votes in the county and J. J. Holmes 51.

In the race for tax assessor-collector, Mr. Hamilton lead the ticket with 1226 votes. Mr. Huckabee polled 1905 and the third man in the race, J. A. Hutchinson received 654 votes.

In the race for commissioner, precinct 1, Mr. Holmes lead the race with 415 votes. Mr. Spence received 302 votes and the third man, Bob Bartlen received 237 votes.

Ben Ramsey for lieutenant governor, easily carried the county, getting 1994 votes compared to 403 for C. T. Johnson and 182 for George Hinson.

For Attorney General John Ben Shepherd received 2133 votes to 490 for his opponent, Doug Crouch.

For United States Senator Lydon B. Johnson received 2059 votes to 616 for his opponent, Dudley Dougherty.

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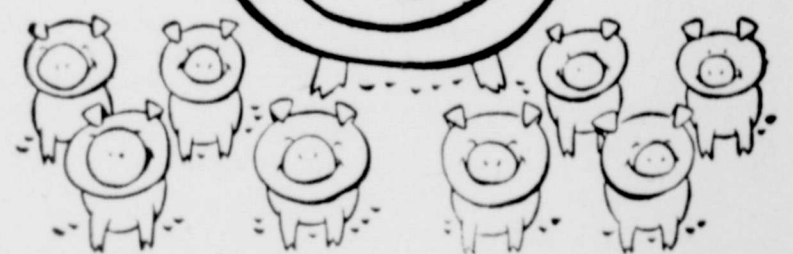
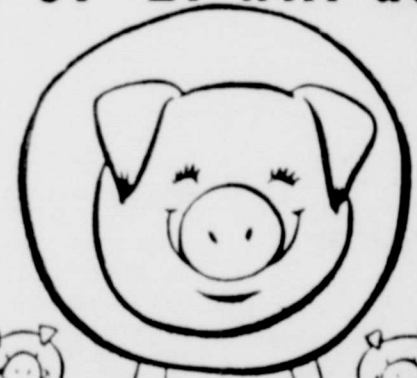

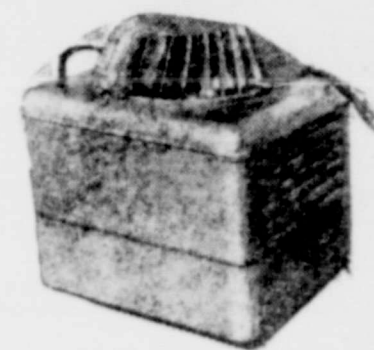

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated Section 51g; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

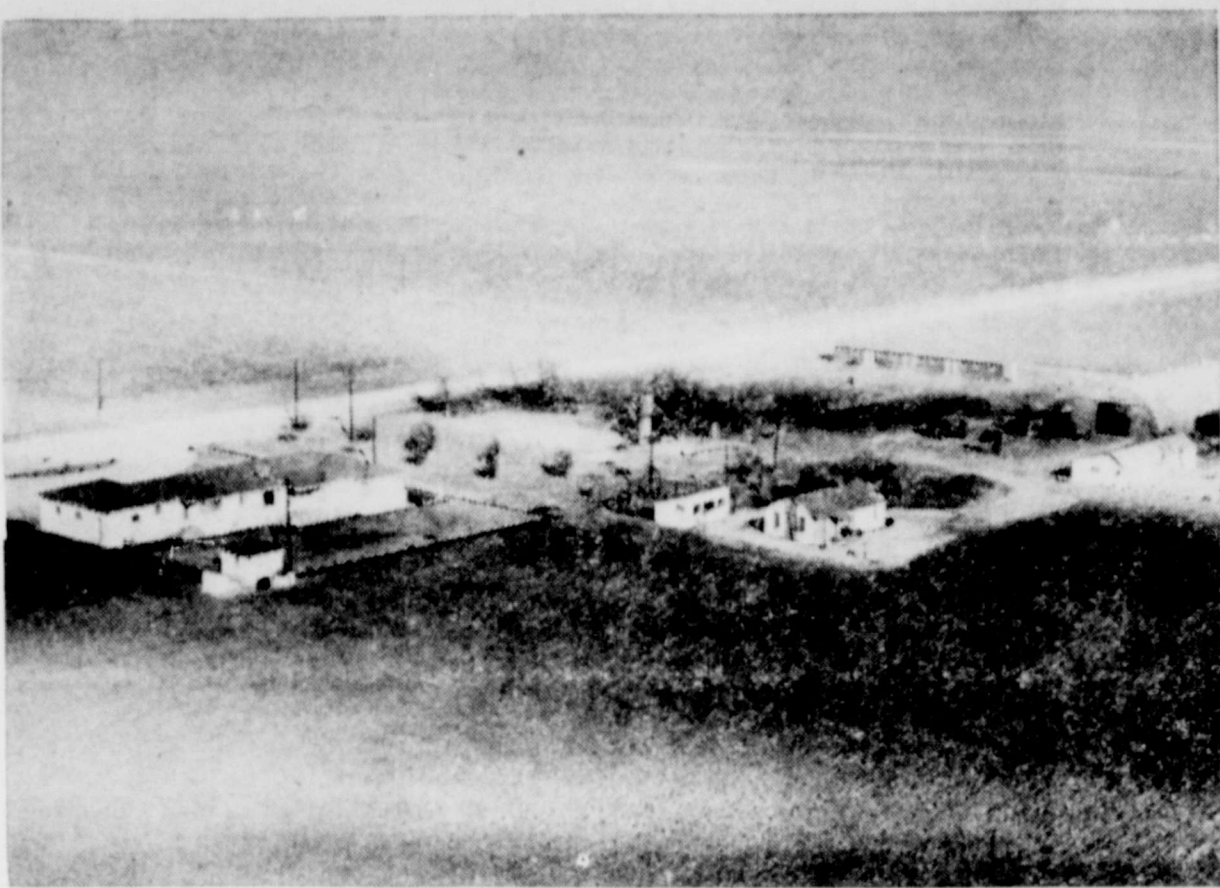

1955 Agriculture Conservation Meet At Lubbock

College Station. — The first four in a series of 12 district meetings have been scheduled to commence work on the 1955 Agricultural Conservation Program. According to Lester Young of the Texas ASC office, meetings are set for the Amarillo Hotel on August 2; District Court Room, Lubbock on August 3; Texas Electric Auditorium, Wichita Falls on August 4 and Hotel Brownwood, Brownwood, August 5. Each meeting will begin at 9:30 a. m.

County ASC committeemen and representatives of state and federal agencies are expected to attend the meetings. Young will head the representatives from the State ASC office. One or more members of the Texas ASC committee are also planning to be present.

Young says the purpose of the meetings is to get from the county committee suggestions on the practices which should be included in the 1955 program. From the district meetings will then come the recommended practices and practice specifications which later in the month will be considered for inclusion in the state program.

Final recommendations from Texas will come jointly from the State ASC committee, state conservationist, S. C. S. and state forecaster of the U. S. Forest Service. Representatives from the teaching, research and extension parts of the Texas A. and M. College System and many other state and federal agencies meet while the final plans are being made, says Young.

Young also says the latest in-

formation on acreage controls and related subjects connected with ACP and ASC programs will be discussed. However, he adds, the big job will be the outlining of conservation and soil building practices which producers can carry out on their farms and ranches during 1955 and thus earn conservation payments.

Minute Editorials

CONTRARY TO PREDICTIONS
The first Democratic primary found most Texas voters going to the polls and expressing their convictions via the ballot. It's a healthy sign for people to get stirred up over an election and vote, even though some people don't inform themselves on the various candidates and vote more or less haphazardly.

OF COURSE WE'RE SORRY
Governor Shivers didn't get a majority in the first primary. For two reasons we're sorry. The first of course is that we wanted him to win anyway. But the

second is that it won't be good for the state, the candidates, the party or the people to have another month of mud slinging, name calling, dirty campaigning that has been prevalent in the past month. People generally don't appreciate that type campaign. Neither candidate is as dirty, low down or crooked as some of the opposition would have you believe. Our prediction is that the candidate who does the most mud slinging will get fewer votes. We hope that is true.

AN UNUSUAL SITUATION is the county judge's race in this county. When there are only two candidates in the race and one receives two more votes than the other but several write in votes prevent him from having a majority of the votes cast for the office, what then? As this is written Monday that is the situation. We look to the County Democratic Committee to clear the air Tuesday morning when they meet, but this is one of the most unusual situations we have ever seen in an election.

FLOYD COUNTY almost voted its full strength in the primary Saturday. As we remember County Tax Collector T. T. Hamilton's report the county's voting strength was 3067, including exemptions. In the race for sheriff both candidates polled 2926 votes. Considering that a few people, as usual, cast their ballot without voting for either candidate for sheriff we figure maybe 2950 people voted.

DESPITE THE FACT that Governor Shivers carried the county by a small margin the Yarbrough forces will be in charge of the county Democratic Convention at Floydada Saturday. Reports say that the Yarbrough men controlled every box in Floydada, which is enough to control the county convention since many small voting precincts failed to hold a precinct convention. West Lockney held a convention and went 100% for the Shivers administration, but they'll be outnumbered when voting time comes at the county convention. That's what happens when people are too indifferent to attend their precinct conventions.

DO YOU APPRECIATE West Texas and particularly the High Plains? If not, take a trip down to Dallas, Wichita Falls, Abilene, Midland, San Antonio or any point in south of east Texas. The extremely hot weather at those points will make you glad you live on the High Plains of Texas. On Saturday night our bedroom located on the southwest corner of the house, became cool enough that we spread a blanket over our feet because they were cold. And we had no air conditioner of any kind running. Any of you East Texas people want to move to a cool country?
