Discount House and Deception of Buyer Hit

An Appeal To Reason

THIS IS A DEFENSE of the Fundamental Principles that govern an honest and profitable exchange of Goods and Services.

IT IS AN APPEAL TO REASON, and is therefore directed to the attention of Good People from whom all Good Influences must come.

THE THEME of what follows embraces the Idea that the considerations of Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness, cannot be based on the Cheapness of the Goods and Services we are offered, but rather in the Light of what is Best for the Community

AS AMERICANS we fell heir to a system intended to offer more people in more places, an opportunity to participate as INDEPENDENT INDIVIDUALS in the production of goods and services, than has ever been offered under any other system devised by man. We called the system — FREE ENTERPRISE - and the MOTIVE POWER within the system was referred to as the PROFIT MOTIVE. Other terms such as "Freedom of Opportunity," the "Incentive System," the "Initative System" and the "American Way" were proudly proclaimed around the world.

Profits A "Sin"

THE PROFIT MOTIVE, however, is now being publicized as a "SIN" almost as viciously as the whole idea of profits is attacked by the Kremlin. From every direction throughout the land, come "medicine show" appeals and promises to deliver anything from neckties to a house full of furniture at "wholesale" or at "no profit at all," with the inference in almost every case, that legitimate channels of trade are taking an "unrighteous" profit.

WORST OFFENDER in the war against legitimate profit taking by trusted, reputable merchandisers is the so-called "Discount House," which is spreading its operations into every nook and corner of the nation. In one place it is a box car full of refrigerators on a railroad siding. In another it is an old warehouse or deserted factory building, heaped high with goods of all kinds for quick sale. In still other forms it may be a dingy office lined with telephones; a catalogue or flashy circular sent out from the heart of a big city: a "Discount Club" or worse. a slick talking "go-between" who concentrates on labor unions, church organizations, government employees, teachers and other groups, where the words "no profit" can be quickly transmitted to thousands of prospective customers.

Government Employees

LIFE MAGAZINE estimated total volume of the "discounters" amounted to more than \$5,000,000,000 last year, which figure does not take into account the billions of dollars worth of goods that manufacturers sold to employees, who in hundreds of thousands of cases were buying for neighbors and friends. Life's estimate also omits the huge mountains of goods channeled through government commissionaries where the idea of buying at "wholesale" or "government cost" has been planted so deep in the minds of government employees and military personnel, that millions of these people have become masters of dodging legitimate profits on the things they need. Yet, where do the taxes come from to pay their salaries?

IT HAS BEEN ESTIMATED that more than 1,000 "Discount Clubs" have been organized in government agencies. Even the contractors and carpenters and painters BYPASS legitimate dealers to "buy direct." confidentially whispering to prospective tenants, "if you plan on buying a new refrigerator or television set. I can get it for you at cost." In New York City the situation has gotten completely out of control, and is growing worse by the hour in all

major trading centers. IS IT ANY WONDER that the "Profit System" is

wobbling like a wounded duck, dependent more and more on government aid, and losing face all over the world? Is there any valid reason to believe that if the present trends in merchandising are NOT reversed, that our private, competitive, capitalistic free enterprise system will EVER take over the employment burdens now shouldered by government?

The Moral Issue

UNDERNEATH this whole question, we believe. there is a MORAL issue which is almost entirely overlooked. A sort of "Eclipse of Ethics" to which the magazine Manus has attributed the "dark fruits of the past 40 years." I think Dr. Clarence Manion put his finger on the issue too, when he said that, 'man is a divinely created spirit with a special mission on earth." He concludes that Americanism regards "human personality as the central control point of creative purpose" - with everything on earth, especially government, "set up to help him to the final end - eternal happiness.

SINCE GOOD PEOPLE will agree with these conclusions, how can good people tolerate, propagandize and patronize those who degrade human personality and creative opportunity, by disrupting and monopolizing the means of a livlihood from which men derive their dignity, accountability and creative energies?

Auto Industry Example

CONSIDER, please, the end results of total absence of moral laws (or ethics) which is directly responsible for the chaos in the automobile industry, where thousands of dealers were closed out. Where independent manufacturers were all forced into merger as a last resort, and where in a few months, untold investments and jobs have been liquidated, with millions in needed revenue cut from city, county, state and federal tax agencies - plus enormous losses to salesmen, advertising agencies, newspapers and countless other institutions and in-

IT HAS BEEN ARGUED that "cheap" cars found their way into the hands of the buying public, but if cheapness is to be our goal and god, then General Motors and Ford should WAREHOUSE their cars from assembly line to purchaser, eliminating the sales cost of dealers, salesmen, rentals, taxes, bookkeepers and other overhead which is added to the price the customer must pay. This procedure would put ALL the smaller car manufacturers out of business at once, or in other words, why cut the dog's tail off an inch at a time?

GE And Westinghouse

GENERAL ELECTRIC. Westinghouse and many other giant corporations could establish a similar short-cut from factory to consumer, which would not only wipe out the old-line distributors and retailers and all their employees and investments, but the discounter as well. Are not such companies moving in that direction through the sale of billions of dollars worth of goods to employees, discount houses and other people who claim to sell "at wholesale" or "at cost"? Are not all of us just as guilty when we seek to buy everything we can by BYPASSING legitimate dealers in favor of those who leave a community when their ballyhoo dies out? Who never get their "roots" into the community, and who prosper only on the disruption and decay of community values.

MORE PEOPLE every day, are heard to slyly remark, "I can get it for you wholesale" . . . I've a friend who works for" . . . "Show this card to Joe down at . . . " . . . Or, "Don't buy until you see the catalogue I've got," et cetra, et cetra, until our whole economic outlook is becoming cheap and ruthless to the nth degree.

Power Of Profit Motive GOOD PEOPLE, please remember, that it is

PROFITS alone that enables the shoe shine boy or newsboy to move off the street into a little stand of his own. It is PROFITS that cause businessmen to spend money for fixtures, a new sign or other improvement, and it is the PROFIT MOTIVE that induces a farmer to protect his soil, buy a new tractor or television set, and it is PROFITS on wages and investments and services that build churches, better homes and higher education.

FURTHERMORE, did you ever hear of a business that could pay FAIR WAGES out of anything but FAIR PRICES and FAIR PROFITS? Don't you believe that merchandising methods such as our system of producer, processor, manufacturer, wholesaler, broker, salesman, retailer and clerk way of moving goods . . . is better than the Russian way which counts out most of these people? According to the professional bait artists, discounters and "efficiency" experts, the "middlemen" are "parasites" . . . and ought to be "counted out." 'The discounter says he is doing this. He brags about it.

Stephen And Rufus

IN HER LATEST BOOK, "Never Defeated, Never Victorious," Taylor Caldwell relates a conversation held between two of her characters, which I think fits into this part of our story:

STEPHEN: "There is such a thing as principles.

RUFUS: "In business? What are you talking about Steve? Why, where would anyone get if one thought about principles? Nowhere, except to the poor farm. One must be progressive and expand."

Stephen: "But can't there be progress without miserly, cutthroat competition, despair, bankruptcy and betrayal? Look here, Rufus, this country is big enough for all of us, without cutting throats. It might take a little longer, but there would be real prosperity, peace, cooperation and confidence, and far more certainty in human lives. A man wouldn't need to be suspicious all the time, afraid of his neighbors and competitors, and distrustful of his friends. Honest competition, not cutthroat competition, represents the ONLY true progress."

Senator Taft And FTC

IF STEPHEN IS RIGHT, and we believe he is. and if the American Goal is the greatest good for the greatest number, then we've got to FIGHT for the idealism of Stephen, or we'll perish in the dogeat-dogism of the Rufus school. Senator Taft saw this truth, I am sure, when he defended the Robinson-Patman Act as a "bulwark against discriminatory practices between big manufacturers and big distributors." The Federal Trade Commission certainly recognized present dangerous trends, when in a recent reversal of its past position, the Commission urged an extension of the Fair Trade Act to the District of Columbia where cut-throat competition has been on a rampage.

Waste Of Words

"IT IS A WASTE OF WORDS," I am told, to appeal for Fair Play in the marketing of goods and services. That ethics and competition will not mix: that even the mothers of America will close their eyes to anything that threatens the future of their children, if at the same time it threatens a nickel savings on a basket of groceries. Some critics even go so far as to say that putting a spotlight on evil practices actually helps the evildoer, which if true. makes every sermon against sin an advertisement

ONE BUSINESSMAN whom we contacted for support, said: "You've got to blind 'em with baits. Make the biggest noise. Put on a circus. Flood 'em with gimmicks. BURY THEM IN COUPONS . . . and then take 'em. If I could be a monopolist I would: ethics be damned."

President Eisenhower

CONTRAST this view with the statement I heard President Eisenhower make at a prayer breakfast in Washington. The President said:

"If this country isn't founded on faith, then nothing makes any sense. We must accept the worth of the individual as above everything else, and we must accept God as a fulltime Partner in all our aflairs - or suffer the consequences.

I BELIEVE that millions of Americans in all walks of life, are convinced of this truth, and all of those people who support this program believe too. that a proper and profitable exchange of goods and services has a Godly purpose, and must be built on faith in the fundamental principles governing a truly

free enterprise system. Man is acquisitive in all things. He is particularly acquisitive in a society like our own which produces so many material things he would like to acquire, but if the acquisitive spirit of man is not properly guided and controlled, either by himself or his government, it can wreck the whole fabric of society.

Target For Communists

A PROFIT SYSTEM, properly managed, would win the plaudits of thinking people the world over, but when it is run through with monopoly power in industry, labor, finance and government, and when the motive power of the profit system is held up to scorn, the whole profit, private enterprise idea becomes a perfect target for the communist propagan-

A Simple Transaction

FOR THIS REASON we maintain that a deep moral issue is involved in a simple transaction such as a man and wife visiting a local ieighborhood store to determine what model refrigerator they ought to have, and then, with a lie on their lips, leave the store to make their purchase from a "discounter." There were moral laws broken when the big motor car companies dumped unwanted cars into dealers hands, which were run around the block and sold as used cars by unlicensed new car deal-

A MORAL LAW is an issue when a big manufacturer wrings his own price from suppliers: open a commissary which undercuts prices of his dealers; sells to discount houses; gives special deals to big chains, or opens retail stores in competition to his own dealers. There is a moral law at issue when a labor union misuses its power and teaches workers to get by with the least work for the most pay -and to the devil with small employer problems or increased costs which must be passed on to the unorganized.

Who Will Pay?

TAXES NOW REPRESENT about 35 cents of the dollar. There are \$500 in taxes in the price of an average automobile, and the costs of government at every level are going up. In the days and years to come we shall be called upon to make great sacrifices for other countries, particularly Asia. It costs us six billion dollars to service our lederal debt, and we have total private and public obligations of nearly \$600 billion. There will be huge veteran benefits. Subsidies and increased social security costs, housing and public expenditures, and I ask you. CAN WE MEET THIS CHALLENGE BY MAKING A WAR ON ALL THOSE PEOPLE WHO ARE ENGAGED IN MAKING, SELLING AND SERV-THROUGH LEGITIMATE CHANNELS AT LEGITIM-

CAN WE MEET It with more mergers, more liquidations of small businesses? More destruction of investments and jobs? Can we meet it with more gimmicks? More coupons? More discount houses?

American Way Is Right Way

IF ALL KNOWLEDGE comes from the time we spend in reading, listening and discussion. If our main source of happiness is in the time we take to play, laugh, make friends and dream, and if the power for good follows correct thinking and correct action, then how we serve each other in the world of buying and selling is as important as life itself.

IN THIS THOUGHT we defend the American Way as the Right Way, for it offers men of Goodwill an economic and political atmosphere in which they can satisfy their material and spiritual needs, and on this basis alone we seek your support. As time goes on there will be many new theories and problems to cope with, but if land, labor and capital are working in proper relationship, there will be enough of the good things of life to fulfill the desires of average men and women.

Mr. C. Wilson Harder, President of our organization, and Mr. George Burger, Vice President in charge of legislation, and our membership and great field force, are pledged to uphold the principles laid down in this article.
