WHOSE BUSINESS IS IT? The recent conviction in a nearby county of a former county judge on a charge of theft from independent school funds points up the importance of bringing out into the open every financial transaction made by a commissioners' court, a school board or a city governing group. Fortunately, such cases as the one involving the county judge are rare. But they would be rarer still if commissioners' courts and other governing bodies were required to publish monthly statements showing where, how and why every penny of the people's money was spent.

Evidence in the former judge's case tends to show that he acted "on his own hook" in the case of the school funds, but he might not have done so had he known that full and complete reports of county expenditures were to be made public at regular intervals. County commissioners, city commissioners and school board members will tell you that records of their proceedings are open to the public. True enough, but how many citizens are going to do their own checking up? These records, particularly those involving expenditures, should be made readily available to the public. We think it should be the duty of public officials to make this information available in the most minute detail. They're the ones entrusted with public funds, and a tax paying citizen wanting to know how and where his money is being spent shouldn't have to go "look up" the information.

We're not implying that public officials who do not release such detailed information are misusing public funds, nor are we trying to drum up business through paid publication of detailed financial statements. But we are stating that the public has a perfect right to know where, why and how every penny of its money is spent. — Post Dispatch

DON'T SUPPORT THEM Transient businesses which move from town to town, following good business conditions, taking toll but contributing nothing do not help a community's growth. Often they are a positive detriment. They pay no taxes as is well known, the rest of us do. They take business from established businesses. Often they force the local fellow to the wall, closing his doors. When the business cycle is in reverse the public then has to suffer the lack of service the transient rendered temporarily, because there is nobody left to render it. A resident should remember that the welfare of the businesses in his town in turn affects his own welfare. The permanent advantages of trading with an established concern are worth more than the advantages of trading with the temporary neighbor. The latter vanishes overnight when the community ceases to be a flush field for picking. The apathy of residents of small communities to this threat to their welfare is a puzzle. In larger cities an arm of protection is thrown around established business. They thus grow bigger and better while the small town resident helps by his foolishness to kill his town. It is not a matter of big-hearted kindness to your neighbor, it is a matter of intelligent selfishness to support the institutions which support you. — Floyd County Hesperian

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THIS IS IT!

This is it! The completion of right-of-way procurement for the widening and improvement of Highway 82 across the western half of Crosby County. The last easement was filed for record Tuesday morning. The State Highway Department had taken the formal resolutions of the Crosby County Commissioners' Court for full value and advertised for bids for construction of the four-lane divided highway, and letting is to be done this week—Wednesday, in fact. For almost two years the Court has been concerned with this problem. Dozens of called meetings have been held, perhaps a hundred conferences with land owners whose first duty was to protect their own rights, while the Court was concerned with the financial affairs of all the taxpayers of Crosby County — You Be The Judge in Crosbytown Review

A contract has been signed by railroad officials binding the system to build a line through Floyd County, the first train to run within 18 months of the date building operations begin. "This is the greatest thing ever to happen to Lockney and Floyd County," A. B. Brown, president of the First National, Lockney, said.

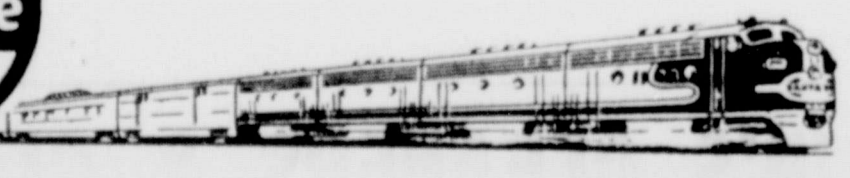
