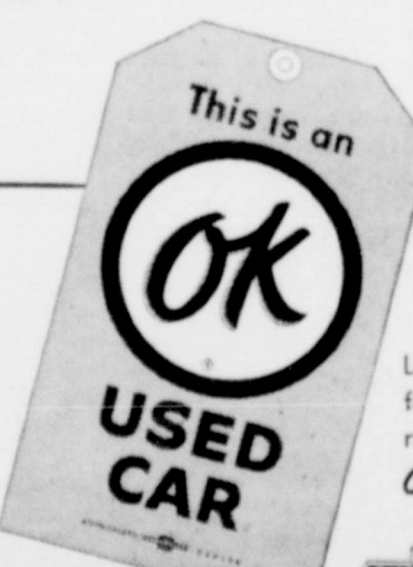

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Farm Bureau Queens Contest To Be Held Again This Year

Waco. — The Texas Farm Bureau will sponsor a state-wide queen contest again this year. J. Walter Hammond, president, announced.

Search for the prettiest farm or ranch girl in the state has attracted wide-spread publicity in the four years that the contest has been held. This year's queen race is expected to be the largest ever, with more than 100 organized county Farm Bureaus planning to enter contestants in the state-wide competition.

Prizes and honors galore are in store for the lucky girl chosen state queen. Her first prize will be \$500 in expenses for a "Cinderella trip" to the American Farm Bureau convention in December in Chicago.

To be eligible to compete in the contest, a girl must be the daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member. She must be at least 16, but not more than 22 years of age by September 1, 1955. Daughters of Farm Bureau state directors, employees, county officers and directors, and previous state winners, are not eligible.

"The contest will be an honest-to-goodness queen contest and not a bathing beauty competition," Hammond said. "The girls are to be judged on all the qualities that go to make up winsome future Texas homemakers."

The three main points on which the girls will be judged are appearance, poise and personality.

District eliminations will be held September 5-17 in all 13 Farm Bureau districts. State finals will be November 7 at the 22nd annual TFB convention in Ft. Worth.

New Spray Prevents Soil Blowing

Austin. — The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research predicts Texas farmers will benefit greatly from a new chemical spray that forms a hard, thin crust from loose soil particles, preventing wind erosion and allowing water to percolate through the crust.

Another year of laboratory work and field testing is planned for the spray, developed by Dowell, Inc., of Tulsa, a subsidiary of Dow Chemical Company. Initial tests in April reveal that a spray job needs a curing period of about three days. A one-and-a-half inch rain that fell 12 hours after one test application did not damage the chemical, and the rain water permeated the crust without difficulty.

Farmers now combat wind erosion by deep-plowing their

land. This costs about \$10 an acre and there is no assurance it will work for more than a month or so, the Bureau points out.

The chemical spray also will cost \$10 an acre, but present indications are that it will be effective at least from one plowing to the next. The spray also could be applied in mixture with fertilizers and weed-killers.

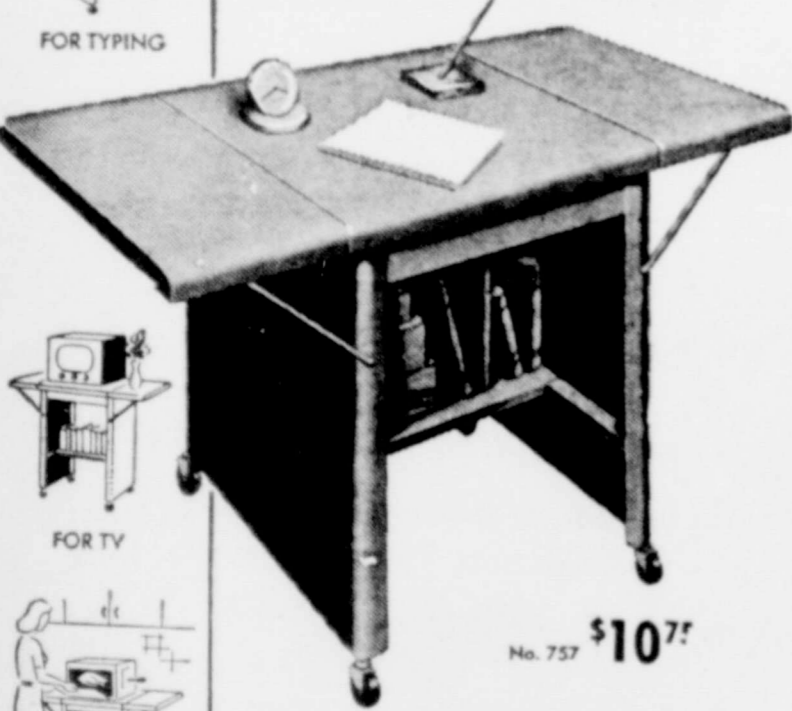

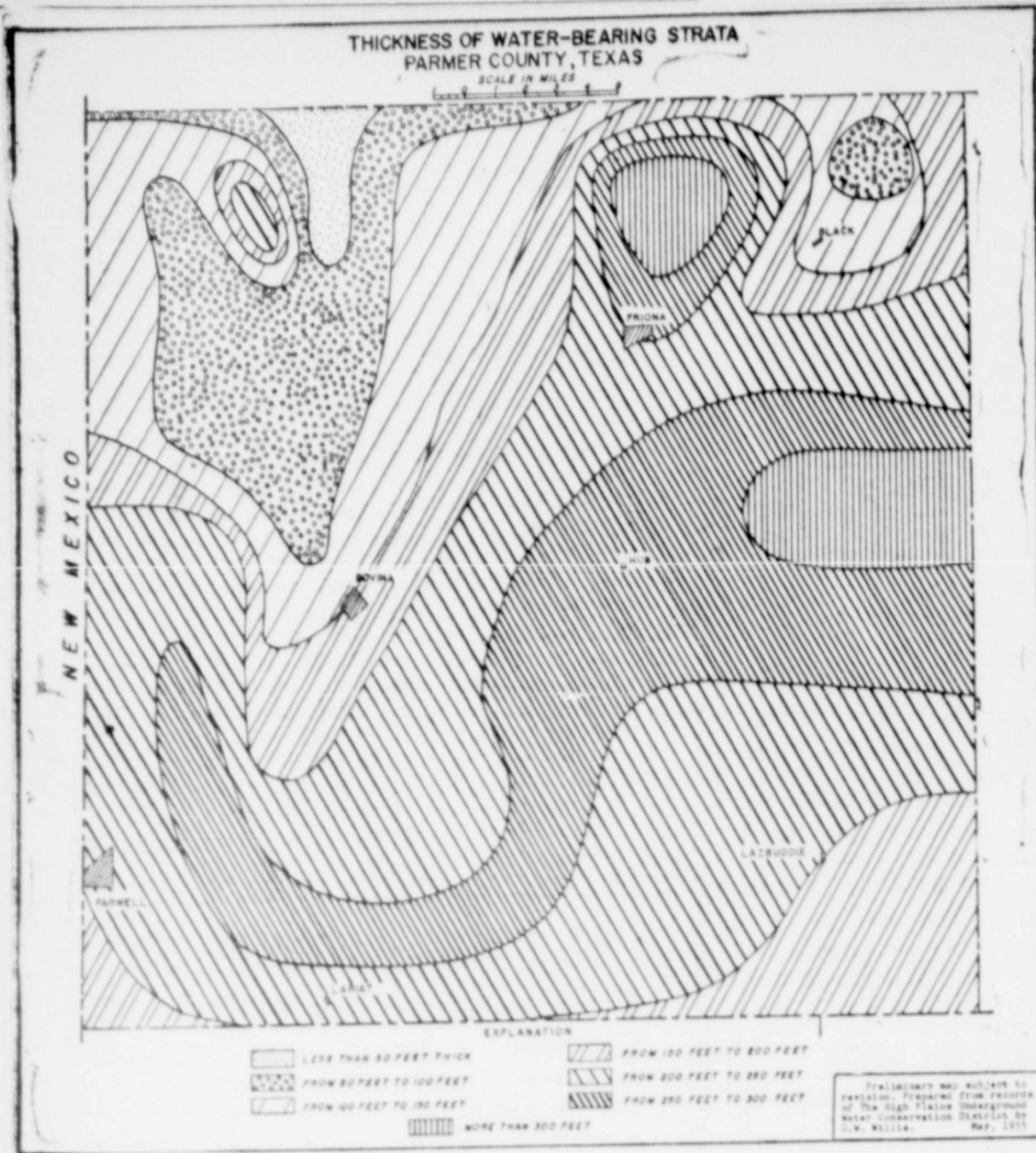

UNDERGROUND WATER STORAGE CAN BE DETERMINED — BOARD

Parmer County contains approximately 16,300,000 acre-feet of underground water in storage available for pumping.

The map of Parmer County shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata between the water table and the top of the red beds. The patterns on the map show the ranges of thickness of water-bearing strata throughout the county. The map and studies of this type are parts of the regular technical work in progress by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District. This information was compiled by G. W. Willis, geologist with the Water District, from records of wells on file in the office of the Water District in Lubbock.

The quantity of water available for pumping was determined by computing the total volume of water-bearing strata in the underground reservoir in Parmer County and multiplying this total by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent. This figure of 15 percent was determined from studies made by the Texas Board of Water Engineers in cooperation with the U. S. Geological Survey. Subsequent studies indicate that this figure is reasonably accurate in the Southern High Plains when applied as an average for all of the water-bearing strata, including the fine-grained clay and sandy clay as well as the coarser-grained sand and gravel.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent. Suppose the farm consists of 320 acres and has 200 feet of water-bearing strata underlying it, then 320 acres x 200 feet x 0.15 equals 9,600 acre-feet of water available for pumping. An acre-foot of water is the quantity required to cover one acre to a depth of one foot, and it is also equal to 43,560 cubic feet or 325,829 gallons.

An individual may use this information to determine, within reasonable limits, how long the quantity of underground water in storage beneath his farm will last. If he knows the thickness of the water-bearing strata and will keep records of the annual withdrawal and annual change of the water table, he can compute the approximate number of years his supply of underground water will last at any annual rate of withdrawal. This assumes, of course, that his neighbors pump a comparable amount of water per acre on their farms.

The map and the information concerning the quantity of water in storage will be revised from time to time as additional information becomes available. Similar maps and information will be prepared, as rapidly as practicable, for all the counties within the Water District.

DON'T SOAK TOO LONG

Studies by the water heater division of the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association show that soaking clothes longer than 10 or 15 minutes permits the water to cool and hinders the cleansing action of soap. Hot water opens the fabric mesh in most materials, permitting soapsuds to circulate and loosen dirt, at the same time helping the soap to emulsify oil and grease.

A broiled sandwich, made of cheese and bacon topped with tomato and quickly placed under the direct heat of the flame makes an easy meal. With the hot tasty sandwich, serve crisp raw vegetables, a glass of cold milk, cookies and ice cream for dessert.

Yellow Clover Aphid Causing Damage In Alfalfa, Clover Fields

A small whitish-yellow insect which slipped almost unnoticed into West Texas last year is causing serious damage to plantings of alfalfa in this area. This pest seriously damaged alfalfa for the first time last year in four western states — New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada and California. Prior to 1954, it caused little economic damage.

This aphid can be controlled by using one pint of a two pound parathion emulsion concentrate per acre or one-half to three-quarters of a pound of a five pound malathion emulsion concentrate to an acre. So far, repeated applications of these insecticides are necessary to prevent reinfestation.

Alfalfa from infested fields is inferior in quality. The insects defoliate the lower plant parts and deposit honeydew in which sooty mold often thrives. Where much honeydew is present, it is impossible to dehydrate the crop and difficult to cut and bale. Crowns blackened by the aphids show up after cutting. Alfalfa should not be cut for hay within 10 days after applying malathion or within 21 days after applying parathion. After alfalfa is cut and watered check for aphids and if necessary spray and this will keep them under control until after another cutting is taken off.

THE LOCKNEY BEACON

Company Has 98 Miles Feeder Lines In County

Naturay Gas Company has laid 98 miles of feeder lines in Floyd County from which irrigation wells operating to figures released by the company this week. The investment in this project is approximately \$780,000, officials said.

Construction crews recently completed the final length of pipe in the natural gas feeder line totaling 787.59 miles in 12 Texas counties. Pioneer's investment in the irrigation line program totaled \$785,000 or approximately \$7.85 a mile.

The utility company's irrigation program was first in 1953. Since that time it has run feeder lines off trunk lines where a sufficient number of wells and users can be obtained. The lines in turn have formed

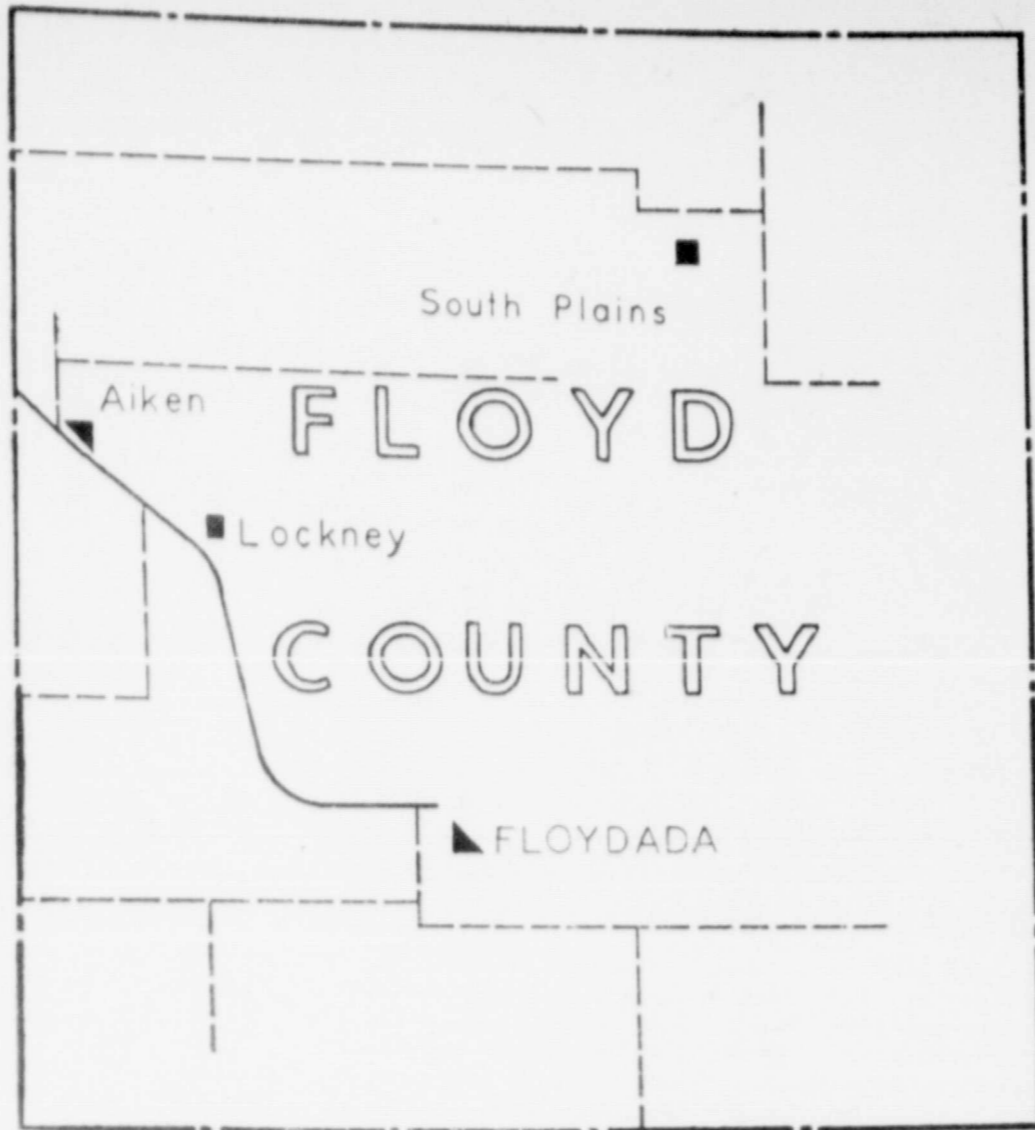
consumer groups and run their lines to connect with Pioneer's feeder lines.

Thus far, feeder lines have been laid in Randall, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Bailey, Lamb, Hockley, Hale, Deaf Smith, Lubbock and Crosby counties in addition to Floyd County. A total of 8,629 irrigation wells are now run by natural gas in this 12 county area.

The farmers in this area have averaged laying approximately eight miles of consumer-owned line to every one mile of feeder line laid by Pioneer. This totals approximately 7,088 miles of natural gas pipeline laid in the 12 county area during the past two years.

This amount of pipeline, if laid end to end, could carry natural gas from Lockney to New York City; New York City to Los Angeles; Los Angeles to Miami, Fla.; and from Miami to Raleigh, North Carolina.

Thirty-nine per cent of the deaths and 35 per cent of the injuries due to motor vehicle accidents last year occurred on Saturdays and Sundays.

These lines, laid by Pioneer Natural Gas Company, tie in with Pioneer's trunk lines which are shown as solid lines. A total of 98 miles of feeder line have been laid by Pioneer in Floyd County during the past two years.

Canadian River Bridge Completed

Austin. — Some of Texas' most legendary "old West" country is now easily accessible to tourists with the completion of the Canadian River Bridge on State Highway 51, between Vega and Channing in Oldham County, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer announced in Austin today.

The new bridge opens a northern and through route to the picturesque old ghost town of Tascosa which in its prime was the "Cowboy Capital of the Plains," one of those rip-roaring towns of the old West where the Colt six shooter and the Winchester rifle were the law. Heretofore, tourists visiting Tascosa had to chance fording the unpredictable Canadian River or backtrack to Vega or Channing. This not only discouraged tourist travel but made through traffic practically an impossibility Greer said. Now this old relic of early Texas, which since 1939 has been the home of the original Boys' Ranch, will be easily accessible from both directions.

State 51 also passes through country that once was part of

the famous XII Ranch, a part of the West Texas land that was traded for the construction of the present capitol building at Austin. This fabulous empire was long ago sold and broken up into smaller ranches and farms.

Another route for the marketing of produce from these ranches and farms has also been made possible with the opening of this bridge. Greer continued. Built at a cost of \$340,005, the bridge is 1,301 feet long and has a 28-foot roadway with two one-foot seven-inch curbs for sidewalks.

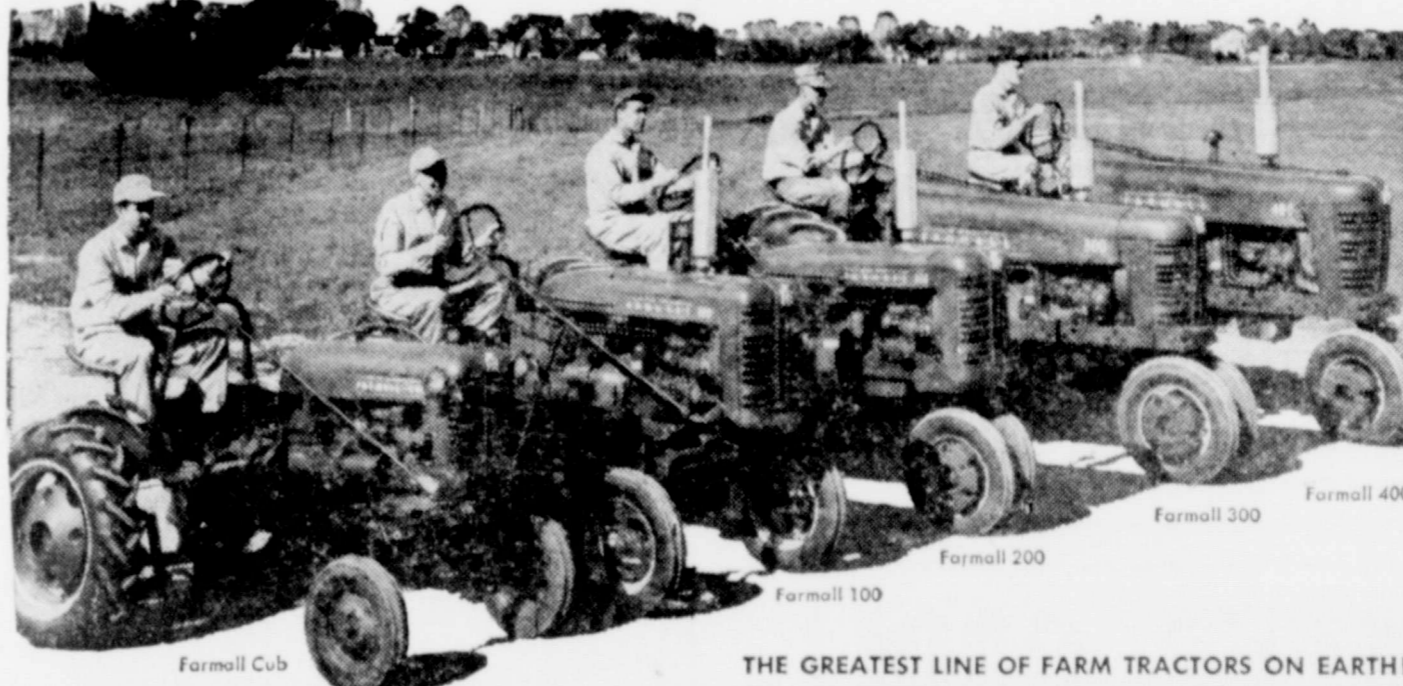

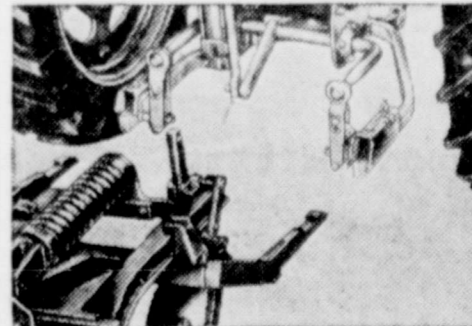

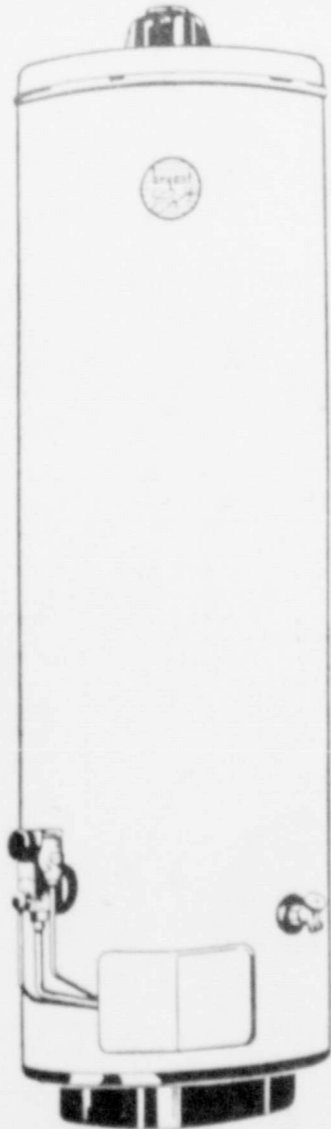

How Is the Spirit Given?

"Hereby know we that dwell in him, and he in us, because he hath given us of his Spirit."—1 John 4:13.

The apostle John directed the above scripture to children of God. The Holy Spirit dwells in the heart of the Christian; the child of God possesses the Spirit. This is taught in our text. It is evident from numerous other passages (Rom. 8:9; Gal. 4:6; Acts 5:32). Most people, who profess to believe the Bible, agree with this: they believe that such is affirmed in the verses before us. But how is the Spirit given to us? Herein is the question to be answered: disagreement and confusion are found here. For the manner in which the Spirit dwells in the Christian, we must resort to other portions of the New Testament.

Of the Galatian Christians Paul inquired: "This only would I learn of you, received ye the Spirit by the works of the law, or by hearing of faith?" (Gal. 3:2). The Galatians had not received the Spirit through the provisions of the law of Moses, but "by the hearing of faith." The marginal reading of the American Standard Version says "by the message of faith." But how does faith come? "So then faith (belief) cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God." (Rom. 10:17). To the Galatians, Paul wrote a fundamental truth that many religionists had never learned. He affirmed that the Galatian Christians had received the Holy Spirit through hearing the word or message of faith—the gospel of Jesus Christ. 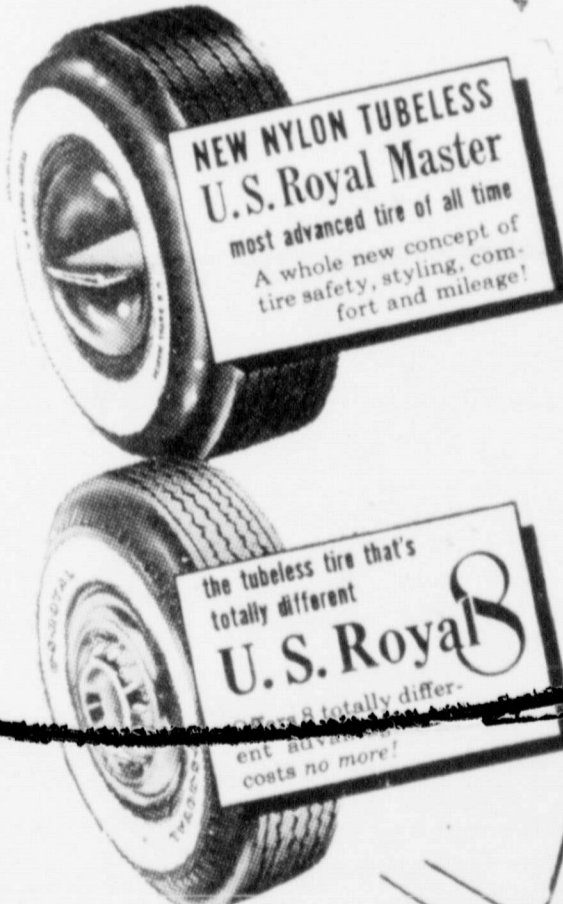

Quite a bit of the allotted acres of cotton is up but many more acres will have to be replanted and some that is planted will have to be "scratched up" if it comes up. If rains hold off this week the tale will be told as far as the cotton crop goes. Let us hope the rain clouds dump their loads elsewhere this week and next. The Floyd County cotton crop is hanging in the balance.

A CHANGE in the electoral college is being proposed and if it passes the congress will give Texas and other Southern states more influence when the vote getting time comes. Under the proposed new system, a candidate for president would receive the proportionate part of the electoral vote as he did the popular vote in a nation election. This would prevent a candidate from getting all the electoral votes of any state when he has just a bare majority of the popular vote. The new system would prevent any political party from appealing to minority and pressure groups in order to gain advantage in doubtful states. Senator Price Daniel of Texas introduced the bill into the senate and is an active supporter of it.

GOVERNOR ALLAN SHIVERS has vetoed a bill raising speed limits on all highways from 60 to 65 miles an hour and to 70 miles per hour on four-lane divided highways. It would increase traffic deaths and accidents, he said.

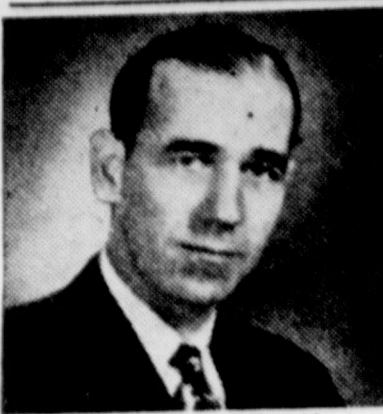
**Soldier's Wife Writes

(Note: Following is a letter written by Mrs. Francis Howard, the former Billie Rene Carthel, to her mother-in-law, Mrs. Nola Howard of Lockney. S-Sgt. Howard is stationed in Germany and his family left here in December to be with him.)
Thursday 6:30 p. m.

Dear Ma,
I guess you think we have forgotten you. Its been so long since I wrote. I just don't get everyone written very often. I have to write so many. But I'll get around to everyone sometime.
We got back from Holland last nite at 11:30. We really had a nice trip. Left here Monday morning. We went up thru Belgium and Luxumburg. I'll try to tell you a little about the country.

As you would guess the people there are real clean. Their houses may not be at all fancy, but they are surely well scrubbed. You see the women out scrubbing the outside of the houses with a brush. They are all real friendly and polite. The people over in Belgium are French and we didn't fall for them at all. They are all independent and won't even wait on you in a restaurant unless they have too. We found some one that could speak English everywhere we went. Our biggest trouble was trying to keep up with the money. A guy from the base went with us and had a little book that had all of the value of different kind of money in it. So everytime we paid for something we got the little book out to see how much it was in American Dollars.

Ma, you were asking about a 400 day clock. I sure wish we had known you wanted one. We would have sent it for Mother's Day. We sent my mother one but thought you would not want it since you had the cuckoo clock. I paid \$8.50 for mothers. They are from \$8.50 on up to \$20.00. Maybe Santa Claus will bring you one.

We got a few tulip bulbs. I will set them out in a window box and try to get them to bloom. Then by the time we come home I'll dig up the bulbs and maybe we can get them to grow there.
Well, I better stop. I'll try not to wait so long again. Bye now.

**Plainview To
Choose Highway
87 Location**

Austin. — The City of Plainview was given an opportunity to choose the location of U. S. Highway 87 in that vicinity today as the State Highway Commission took action to insure protection of acquisition of right of way necessary for the development of U. S. 87 as a four-lane facility at Plainview.

Two additional lanes north and south of the city have already been authorized by a previous action. The inadequacy of the existing facility for future traffic volume on the section through the adjacent to Plainview indicates the need for immediate advance planning in order that improvements may be started as soon as funds are available. The Commission pointed out. Expected future development and expansion of the area also makes it desirable that action be taken for the protection of acquisition of required right of way if it is to be obtained economically.

In today's action, the State Highway Engineer was directed to proceed with location surveys and furnish the local authorities with deeds for a minimum of 300-foot right of way, with additional width required at interchanges and for unusual design requirements on U. S. 87 generally along the present route or El Paso Street through and adjacent to the city for the ultimate construction of the four-lane highway with controlled access, including frontage road.

An alternate location west of Plainview was outlined by the Commission in the event of development of this expressway facility along or near the present route is not acceptable to local authorities. If the alternate route is agreed upon, construction will begin after all right of way has been acquired, the Commission explained, with the present road being retained on the State Highway System for service to local traffic.

The purpose of the action today was to reach an agreement with local authorities as to the route and to provide advance planning. Funds are not now available for construction, but it is anticipated they will be allocated from future programs of work.

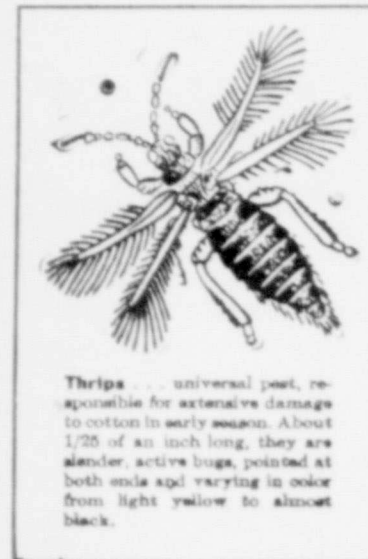

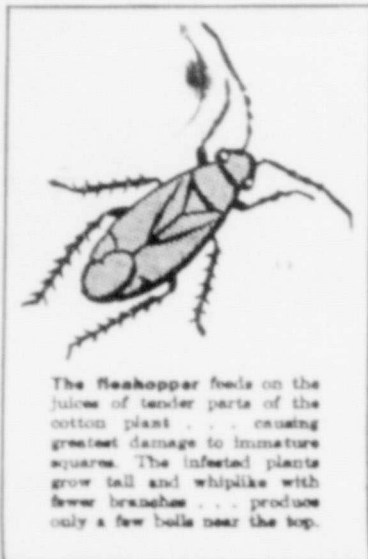

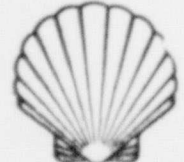
