(Note: Following is a report on a cotton insect survey for the South Plains as released by Walton H. Jones, district extension agent, of Lubbock. The report was compiled by G. T. Davis Jr., and W. L. Owens Jr., both connected with the Extension Serv-

Local heavy rains fell over the area during the past week. Hail destroyed many thousands of acres of crops in many sections. The rainfall was generally heaviest in localized areas which had received earlier effective precipitation. Some localities still need rain to bring up stands of

Aphid infestations have continued light to medium in a number of fields, with occasional heavy spotted populations. In many fields infestations have been reduced by beneficial insects or heavy rains. Insecticides have been used for control in a few fields.

Thrips infestations have been light in most fields during the past week. In occasional fields populations have been somewhat heavier. Control applications of insecticides have been started or continued in scattered fields. The heavy rains and high winds have reduced populations of the insects. As the weather clears. cotton should be checked frequently so that timely control of WARM WEATHER MEALS any rapidly increasing infestations may be effective. Such frequent checks are especially im. ant for your family's health in portant in late planted or hail lamaged fields.

Light fleahopper intestations have been reported on cotton in scattered fields over the area. The insects were found on the earlier planted cotton. As plants reach the fruiting stage, fields should be checked frequently to insure the most effective control should damaging infestations develop.

False wireworms damaged stands of cotton in Borden, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Castro, Garza and Howard Counties. Such damage was spotted and has decreased somewhat in Garza County over the previous week.

Grasshoppers continued to cause damage to cotton in some fields in Randall, Swisher and Yoakum counties. Infestations were generally confined to parts of fields near pastures or grass-

Spotted light cutworm damage to cotton was reported from Mitchell County.
