**Insect Report** 

(Note: Following is a report on a cotton insect survey for the South Plains as released by Walton H, Jones, district extension agent, of Lubbock. The report was compiled by G. T. Davis Jr. and W. L. Owens Jr., both connected with the Extension Serv-

Light to fairly heavy rains greatly improved growing conditions for crops in many localities. Where cotton had been irrigated prior to the recent rains. plants grew rapidly. The rains, added to the irrigations, produced excessive vegetable growth with accompaning shed of some small squares. The cloudy weather, as normally expected, retarded fruit set. This condition should not be confused with in sect damage.

Aphids were present in most fields throughout the area. Most Wadzeck comes to Plainview infestations were light, although damaging populations were reported in some fields in Dawson Floyd, Hale, Lubbock and Lynn counties. The insects were found in heaviest infestation in fields which had earlier aphid control application of insecticides, and on cotton which had suffered earlier hail damage.






