



I WAS AN ANTI-

My spiritually blinded eyes opened a few years ago as to the error of anti-ism. I had been brought up to believe Bible classes were wrong. Like all anti folks, I was inconsistent, but blinded to where I couldn't see it. I just took anti-ism for granted. Why shouldn't it be right? Big anti preachers said it was! They would talk about doing like the Bible said, inferring that the Bible gave every detail for carrying out a command and furthermore, that it said do it exactly like they were doing it.

None of the details for a church service are given. yet they could stand and sing an invitation song, pass the emblems, sing three songs, prayer, another song, then have someone preach or teach, and none of these details were in the command: Yet when Bible classes were mentioned, to them, they were foreign to the Bible! They asked for the kind of proof for a Bible class that they did not ask for any other arrangement to teach, such as radio, religious paper, etc. They didn't seem to know that a command authorizes some unspecified things necessary to the carrying out of that command, and that the unspecified things done would be Spiritual.

The anti spirit was always a self righteous attitude. Anti's were quick to point out the error of others in teaching the Bible, but didn't show a better way. Like the one talent man, they were "afraid" to try to do what God said do, because they might do it wrong. They remained in a state of lethargy waiting for a detail on the how! They were not afraid not to try a method. however. The do-nothing plan suited them just fine. Although they could find arrangements for a singing school under the command to sing. Eph. 5:19, but not a teaching school under the command to teach, Matt. 28:20. All they would have had to do was to make the same allowances for the teaching school to carry out Matt. 28:20 that they made for radio preaching and religious periodicals to carry it out, but they couldn't
