Plains Digs Out Of Heavy Snow Storm, More Due

Weather men late Wednesday were predicting a new storm for this area with snow expected to fall Wednesday night and all day Thursday. The storm had already struck the North Panhandle and roads were becoming impas-

sable, reports here said. Late Wednesday a school bus filled with students was reported stuck north of Plainview and efforts were being made to rescue the group. Two trains were reported marooned between Plainview and Dimmitt and a number of cars and two transports were stranded on the Tulia-Silverton highway north of Lockney.

Local schools were dismissed early Wednesday afternoon due to the storm warning and Supt. H. H. Nicholas said that if the storm struck as expected there would be no school here the remainder of the week. Some 250 pupils were absent from school here Tuesday due to difficult travel and illness and about 170 were absent Wednesday.




