6. Understand the dangers of drinking and driving.
7. Develop an "on guard" attitude for potential emergencies and mistakes of other drivers and pedestrians while operating a motor vehicle.
8. Be a "contented" driver as traffic increases.
9. Be tolerant of the actions of those who exhibit recklessness in their driving, riding, and walking.
10. Adopt this code and encourage others to abide by its intent.

AMMO NOTES

Every new crop season will usually bring in some new "miracle" product designed to increase crop production. Too often, such "miracle" products have little or no value and are sold by "soil fertility quacks".

Have you been offered such a "miracle" product this year? Usually the salesman is a persuasive talker who makes great claims for his product. Here are some ways to spot the "fertility quack".

1. He claims mysterious benefits by unlocking the nutrients in your soil. The material often comes from some unusual natural deposit or may be a "new strain" of bacteria.

2. He makes no guarantee for nitrogen, phosphorus or potassium and thus does not come under the fertilizer law. An analysis will often show a large number of elements most of which are not even necessary for plant growth.

3. He cannot back up his claims with research from an unbiased source such as the University experiment stations or independent research foundations. He usually has testimonials from farmers in other states.

4. When asked what Count Agent thinks about the product, the quack says, "Don't ask him. He probably wouldn't know the value of our product or recommend it". The quack has the same attitude toward experiment stations increasing and as more attention is given to secondary and minor elements, the quack will surely be around in larger numbers.

Don't hesitate to try new products on a small scale. There have been many advances in fertilizer use and there will be more. But don't invest a lot of money in a new product until you know it will pay or until it has been proven by research either by the experiment stations or reliable, reputable manufacturing concerns.

Texas Patrol Investigates Six Rural Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of May, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for three persons killed and an estimated property damage of \$4,792.00. The rural accident summary for Castro County from January through May of 1964 shows a total of 40 crashes resulting in three persons killed, 14 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$26,381.00.

The Sergeant expressed serious concern over the increase in fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents and deaths throughout the state. "For the first five months of 1964, 1025 persons have died in traffic, compared to 871 for the same period of 1963," the Sergeant stated. "This 18 per cent increase is very alarming and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture. There is an increase in all types of accidents throughout the state and it is something that merits our greatest concern," he said.

"The driving public must assist in the reduction of this trend if we are to turn it downward. Otherwise our death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 2,729 deaths in Texas traffic during 1963. If you are driving, your life literally is in your own hands, so won't you help yourself and others by resolving not to become one of our statistics?" the Sergeant asked.

Poor Quality Cotton Costs Area Farmers

Preserving cotton quality is a job where the farmer can play a key part. Many steps enter in to a well-rounded cotton production program that has quality cotton as the end result. Some are: variety, fertilization, planting dates, irrigation, defoliation and harvesting say County Agent Charles Hottel.

Poor quality cotton can be costly. According to figures compiled by John Seibert, Area Extension Farm Management Specialist, established discounts for cotton with a micronaire (mike) reading of 2.6 or less will be \$15, a bale for this year's crop. This means producers with such cotton will be docked \$15. for each bale marketed. Cotton with "Mike" readings of 2.7 to 2.9 will be docked \$7.50 a bale. Bales with mike readings of 3.0 to 3.2 will be discounted \$2.50.

With proper management, Seibert maintains Plains growers can conservatively gain an additional \$1, 159,000 for their crop in 1964. This can be accomplished by an improvement in "mike" alone. Where grade and staple improves, this added income figure would be greatly increased, Hottel points out.

Seibert developed the chart below to show bales of cotton produced on the Plains that fall within these mike classifications:

2.6 and below	2.7 to 2.9	Percent of Total Crop respectively.
1961, 313,685	704,246	45 percent
1962 128,146	245,904	16 percent
1963, 102,897	309,289	20 percent.

The trend on the Plains in the past few years has been a decline in a staple, grade and gross farm income. The only short lived improvement has been in micronaire readings. In 1959, 33 per cent of the cotton classed by the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office had staple readings of fifteenth sixteenth's. In 1963 nearly 60 percent of the cotton classed by the Lubbock office was fifteen sixteenth's. Cotton with twenty-nine thirty seconds staple rose from 20 percent of the crop in 1959 to 30 per cent in 1963. The other staples—thirty-one thirty seconds and 1"—fell from nearly 35 per cent of the total Plains crop in 1959 to 10 percent in 1963.

Grade—degree of fiber whiteness has declined slightly. In 1959, 52 per cent of the crop was classed as white and 33 per cent as light spotted. But in 1962, just over 29 per cent was classed white, while 50 percent went light spotted.

"Mike readings have shown some improvement in the last two years on the Plains, except from the Lamesa classing office. Of the 1961 crop classed at Lubbock, 64 per cent "miked" below 3.4. In 1963, only 52 per cent of the crop was

below 3.4 in 1961—but 59 per cent below 3.4 in 1963. At Lamesa 28 per cent of the cotton classed was below 3.4 in 1961. It rose to 38 percent of the cotton classed in 1962 and dropped to 19 per cent in 1963.

The responsibility for improving cotton quality rests primarily with the grower. Choosing the best adapted variety, with inherent good "mike" qualities is a first step. There are other key points to a quality cotton program. One is planting a variety that will permit cotton to be fully mature before frost. Another is a fertilization program to produce

Irrigation is considered by authorities at the South Plains Research and Extension Center to be probably the most important step. Getting the water on the crop when needed is, of course, vital. But more essential is sticking to a water cut-off date to permit the cotton plant to mature and produce open, ready-to-harvest bolls.

Two other keys are defoliation and harvesting. Defoliation, emphasizes Shelby Newman, Agronomist at the Center, is just a tool. And it's valuable when really needed. But it's not a tool that can be used successfully every year.

Finally, the actual harvesting process is of importance. Good Ma-

chines in top working condition, along with well-trained operators, can assure success at this stage of production.

To fulfill its function, a sleeping bag must be kept dry. Body moisture will dampen a bag; so, on alternate days if possible, unzip it and hang it where air can circulate.—Sports Afield.

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Summer Fallow Wheat And Feed Grain Substitution Authorized In '65 Program

So that summer fallow operations for next year's crop may take place promptly, USDA announced that substitution between wheat and feed grains would be authorized in 1965 programs.

Especially in much of dry land Great Plains and Pacific Northwest areas, wheat usually planted on land filled in preparation for seeding in autumn for winter wheat crop following year. Summer fallowing takes place extensively in May and June. Agricultural legislation makes provision for this substitution in 1964 and 1965 programs, but it could not be put into effect for 1964 because of time element involved. Reason for substitution of wheat and feed grains for 1965 is to permit greater flexibility in farm operations.

Substitution will apply on individual farms only if farm has both feed grain base and wheat allotment. Producers will need to meet at least minimum diversion for both wheat and feed grains in order to utilize substitution provisions.

Wheat marketing certificates will be issued to program cooperators in a manner similar to this year's crop on the smaller of: (1) normal production of acreage allotment, multiplied by domestic and export allocation percentage to be announced at a later date by Secretary, or (2) wheat acreage planted for

harvest multiplied by normal yield. Number of certificates allocated to a farm will not be increased because of substitution of wheat for feed grains.

For wheat producers in compliance with program requirements, total production of wheat will be eligible for pride support loans even though wheat acreage is in excess of wheat allotment because of substitutions provisions.

Feed grain production of program cooperators will be eligible for price support loans when such crops are grown in place of wheat. If price support payments are authorized as part of 1965 feed grain program and feed grains are substituted for wheat, price support payments will be limited to normal production of the feed grain base less diverted acreage - (not less than required minimum diversion under feed grain program.)

Production of all-cotton stretch fabrics may reach 57 million linear yards in 1964—an increase of more than 300 percent over last year's production, according to a recent market research survey of all major producers of stretch cottons. There may be a boost in this estimate if there is enthusiastic consumer response to the new stretch cotton apparel items now on the market.

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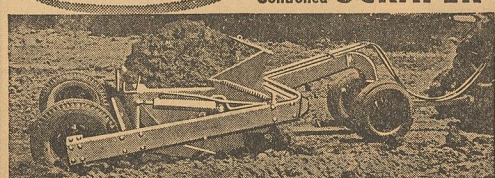

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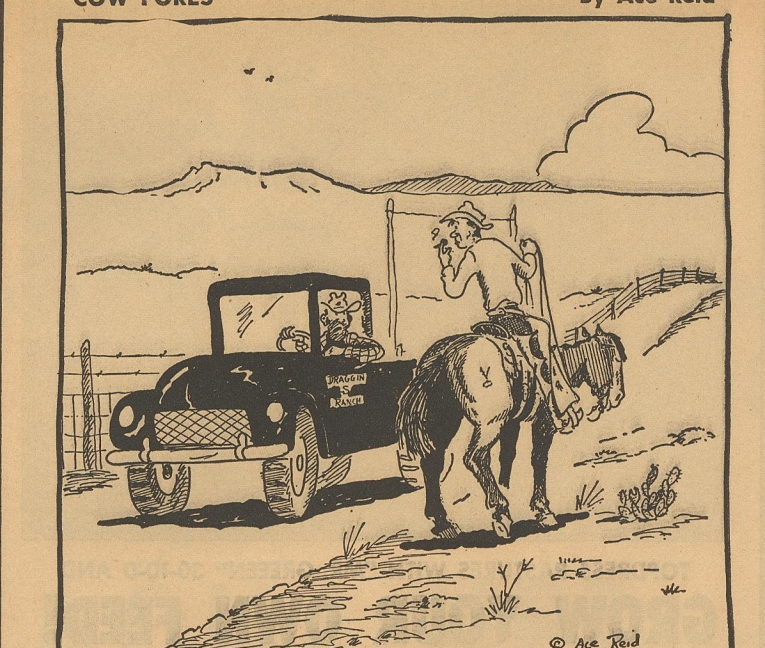

These days, large cabin craft cruise the length of a coast and farther, or explore the entire chain of Great Lakes. Smaller cruisers can be hauled from the Atlantic to the Pacific on an easy-handling trailer, the owner finding new waterways enroute. What additional uses can be found for the cabin cruiser?

This problem worries would-be cruiser owners as they think of stepping up from an open boat to an overnight craft; because, initially, a cruiser large enough for a family represents an investment of some size. Many prospective owners figure that the cost will not wreck the budget if use is constant enough to block off other amusement expenditures.

The fresh-water angler can steal more than one idea from the salt-water man who's learned bigger-boat fishing. First, with a cabin boat he can take a crack at the latter's sport. With new highways, better trailers and more launching spots, it often doesn't require too many hours for inland boatmen to put themselves afloat on a salt-water bay. Check on a run to the nearest seashore, and remember that immersion in salt water won't hurt the modern boat or trailer: A hosing afterward with fresh water is all that's necessary.

"Cruiser fishing" is definitely comfortable fishing," points out Willard Crandall, Boating Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. When wind comes up, or when passing speed-boats cause heavy waves, there is little rolling and pitching. Then, too, there is always room to stretch and move around. And don't forget, a cruiser affords protection from sun or rain, and you have the added convenience of icebox, toilet and bunks. Another advantage is the fact that the cockpit is big enough to allow strenuous casting without danger of upsetting the boat.

A cruiser, certainly, is a family boat. It virtually has to be, to pay its way financially. In searching for fullest use of the cruiser, this means that other activities besides fishing can be considered such as skin diving, picture taking, week-ending and perhaps best of all—just plain enjoying the outdoors!

Barnyard News

By Lanny Pullig, Agronomist, Red Barn Chemicals, Inc.



Some soils in this section of the Plains are deficient in some of the micro-nutrients, mainly iron and zinc. These deficiencies are more prevalent on the light highly calcareous soils. In these soils, the element may be there but may be in an unavailable form. This is where the use of chelate and metals becomes important in the fertility program.

A chelate is a complex chemical compound containing a metal. The chelating agent keeps the material available in the soil. This complex metal compound is soluble in the soil water and the metal is in a form that is available to the growing plant. The chelate may stay in the soil over a long period of time. Micro-nutrients may show up in a soil test and still not be available to the plants.

By using foliar sprays, one can put the materials directly on the plant where it will be absorbed through the above ground portions, the leaves, petioles, stems, etc., and move throughout the plant.

Phos-Fe-Zn is the product that I am recommending to obtain the iron and zinc needed for plants.

Under certain conditions, it will increase the yield of grain sorghum from 500 to 1,500 pounds per acre and lint cotton around 40 pounds per acre. The cost on grain sorghum is only \$1.25 per acre and cotton \$3.75 per acre. The material should be applied to grain sorghum when the plants are eight to ten inches high. On cotton three applications are necessary for maximum results.

Phos-Fe-Zn is especially valuable to plants under stress, such as hail damage and 2-4-D damage on cotton.

Phos-Fe-Zn can be mixed with insecticides and it will have no effect on either the Phos-Fe-Zn or the insecticide.

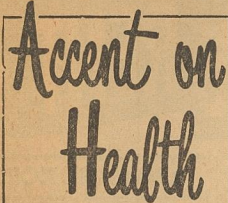

Officially, summer doesn't arrive until the later part of June, but you couldn't tell it by the weather.

Hot weather is here for the summer, but if you follow a few simple health rules your summer can be a bit more bearable.

First of all avoid heavy, fat-load-meal. They are difficult to digest during hot weather. Emphasize fruit and vegetables on your summer menu rather than protein foods - eggs, fish and meat - which your body needs for fuel during winter months.

Perspiration helps cool the body, but at the same time it drains the body of vital fluids. To replace these fluids, drink plenty of water or other liquids. Fruit juices are a pleasant way to make up the loss. But don't gulp down large amounts of ice water when you are overheated.

The body also loses salt through perspiration. Replace your salt loss at meals, or if your work or exercise causes you to sweat profusely, take salt tablets - about one every half hour with a glass of water.

Parents can place extra salt in children's diet with salted nuts or crackers plus a little added salt during meals.

Your clothing plays an important role in keeping cool. Loose, light clothing is highly recommended for summertime wear. Normal body temperatures are dependent on the evaporation of sweat.

Avoid wearing clothes that inhibit evaporation. Also, remember that white or light colors are cooler than dark ones, since they do not absorb hot sun rays so readily.

Exercise is an essential part of a well-rounded, healthy life, but it can easily be overdone in the summer. Use common sense and start gradually if you are initiating a summer exercise program. Also, confine any long periods of hard yard work or active tennis games to the cooler parts of the day.

Swimming is one of the best summer sports, provided the proper safety rules are followed - including not swimming alone, getting chilled, waiting at least an hour after meals and avoiding tiredness.

All in all, summer can be one of the most enjoyable seasons of the year... provided you use your head as well as your body.

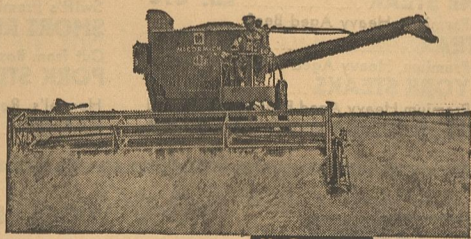

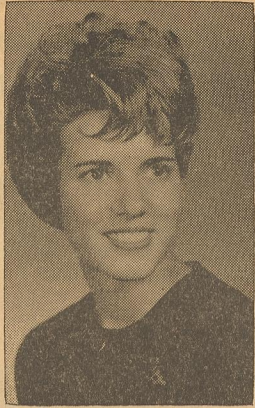

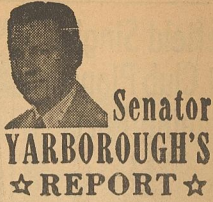

Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Texan:

When the 88th Congress met in January, 1963, Senator Clinton Anderson of New Mexico introduced S. 2, which I co-sponsored. This was a bill to establish water resources research centers at state universities and land grant colleges, to stimulate water research, to set up centers of competence to handle water research problems, and to promote a more adequate national program of water research.

The bill is important to the future of Texas, due to the fact most of our state is a water scarcity area. Estimates are that Texas will have 22 million people by the year 2010, meaning there will be a big increase in water needs.

S. 2 passed the Senate in April, 1963, and went to the House of Representatives where it has lain for more than a year. But this week the House passed it with some changes, sending it back to the Senate. The Senate bill would have appropriated \$88 Million for research. The House cut back the amount of money and limited it to one research institution in each state. It would be spent over a period for 10 years.

Now the bill will go to a joint Senate-House conference and I'm hopeful that the conferees will be able to work out the differences and that the restriction on the number of institutions that can take part will be changed to allow more than one in each state. Three of our fine institutions of higher learning in Texas are already preparing for his research when it is authorized.

Coordination of state and federal water research projects is an important part of the bill, since the federal government already had some research going on under the Army Corps of Engineers, the Agricultural Research Service, the Public Health Service, the Bureau of Reclamation, and the Atomic Energy Commission. S2 would coordinate that research with state programs to find the best method of water utilization to fit each area. The long drought from 1950 to 1957 awakened Texas to the great

need for water conservation, as did the great growth of cities and industries. We need to conserve the underground water supplies of our state and prevent the pollution of our waterways and reservoirs. We need to purify our service water and prevent the evaporation of our stored waters. Evaporation is very high in the Southwestern states. We need to take the salt from sea water and make it table pure. We need further studies on the re-use of water, the reduction of water waste by industry and the reduction of water seepage from irrigation canals.

In short, we need to protect, conserve and properly utilize our water for the millions and millions more people coming to Texas in just a few years.

GASS REGULATION AT THE CROSSROADS

I urged my colleagues in the House and Senate this week to take a fresh look at Government policies regulating the natural gas industry—the Nation's sixth largest and certainly a keystone industry in our Panhandle economy. I addressed myself to the matter because this week marked the tenth anniversary of a decision by the U. S. Supreme Court that independent natural gas producers selling in interstate commerce are subject to the jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission.

For ten years, the Federal Power Commission has engaged in experimental regulatory actions affecting the natural gas industry. The result has been confusion and uncertainty working to the detriment of the industry and to the consuming public.

Government, I reminded my colleagues in an address which appeared in the Congressional Record, cannot play games with business and expect business to survive, to grow, to expand in the future. The situation involving regulation of the natural gas industry today is the condition which destroys public confidence in our governmental process. It gnaws at the very vitals of Government because it demonstrates monstrous inability to govern.

The most significant action of this 88th Congress was enactment of the tax cut, a reaffirmation of the ability of our free enterprise system to provide capital and stimulus needed for economic growth. While Congress took this important step, surely one of the most historic in the field of economic policy since World War II, it continued to neglect steps to correct abuses in the area of regulatory policy.

Natural gas is assuming increased importance both in our daily lives and in our modern technology. Today, there are more than 25,000 industrial uses for natural gas and in many industries it is absolutely essential to operations. New uses are being developed constantly. And yet, the ten years of confusion over regulatory policy af-

fecting natural gas has been accompanied by a decline in the ratio of natural gas reserves to production to its lowest point in history at the end of 1963. The price of natural gas at the well-head has increased markedly under the wavering FPC policies. Consumers are paying the bill, just as they have paid for and are paying the bill for long and costly hearings and litigation which seeks to clarify the matter.

I believe it is essential that Congress take a fresh look at the role of regulation and its effect on the future of natural gas. We must create an effective, stable, sound policy which will serve the overwhelming public interest of adequate supplies at reasonable cost. It is time for new thinking and new action.

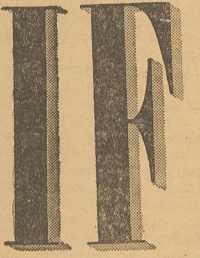
The "Festival of Gas," pavilion at the New York World's Fair is a dramatic example of research progress being made by the natural gas industry. The pavilion is heated, cooled, and electrically-powered by a "total energy package." The gas industry is making it possible for large areas—industrial complexes, shopping centers, apartment houses, airports—to provide in one package all the energy needed for heating, cooling, and electricity. Scientists are now working on a "fuel Cell" in which natural gas is employed in the chemical manufacture of electricity—and this research looks to a day when a householder, with a "fuel cell" in his basement or garage, could provide from that single unit all his power requirements.

Both the electric and gas industries have become so vital to the American economy, and competitive with each other, that we must

seriously question whether policies affecting their future development should be left to the regulatory handling of a single Government agency.

Either the regulatory process must be divided to reflect today's realities, or Congress must spell out in detail a modern concept for natural gas regulation which will acknowledge all factors and pierce the artificial dam of confusion which now exists. I believe the objective of modern regulatory policy can be achieved.

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A study of the recent party primaries and runoff elections reveals that the number of Republican candidates on the upcoming General Election ballot, in the grassroots area, will strengthen the ever-growing trend toward a complete two-party state.

For example, 18 Democratic nominees for sheriff will face Republican opponents in November. Also, the Republican party is engaged in one county judge race (in Lubbock County); seven races for county attorney; two for county clerk; 12 for county tax assessor; two for county superintendent of schools; and 78 for county commissioner.

GOP also has candidates for most top state posts and for more than half of the 150 House of Representatives posts. In addition George Bush will carry the Republican banner in the U. S. Senate race against incumbent Democrat Ralph W. Yarborough.

WATER POLLUTION
Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's opinion committee on the oil-field-waste disposal question may postpone its decision meeting indefinitely now that Superior Oil Company has filed suit against the Texas Water Pollution Control Board, asking for a declaratory judgment against the agency.

A decision by former Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled that the board has jurisdiction over disposal of oilfield wastes under the water Pollution Control Act passed by the 1961 Legislature.

Railroad Commission asked Carr to issue a new opinion after a group of oil companies raised strong objections to the board's regulatory actions. Superior's filing of the suit may change the picture entirely on any new opinion.

CONNALLY HONORED
Gov. John Connally returned from the national Governors Conference in Cleveland, Ohio, with an important new appointment. His selection as first chairman of the Democratic Governors Caucus was a unanimous one by the 50 Democratic state chief executives.

Reportedly, Connally also was given consideration for chairmanship of the 1965 Governors Conference, although he is in his first term. The governors will hold their first major caucus just before the National Democratic Convention in Atlantic City, N. J., during August.

NATIONAL GUARD CONCERN
Texas National Guard Association expressed concern over reports that U. S. Department of Defense would stop logistical support to the so-called "reinforcing reserve."

These units, said NGAT, would provide a mobilization base on which the country would build its force in event of large-scale war. Texas' 49th Armored and 36th Infantry divisions are both part of this "reinforcing reserve," as is the 90th Reserve Division.

MANUFACTURING PLANTS TOTALLED
Texas had a total of 10,325 manufacturing plants which added \$6,400,000,000 of value by processing raw materials into finished goods in 1962, according to the "Annual Survey of Manufacturers", recently released by the Bureau of Census.

Figures represent an addition of \$589,000,000 capital expenditure for new plants during a single year. Some 500,000 plant workers earned a total of \$2,700,000,000 for the year, while 350,000 production workers earned \$1,500,000,000.

Food processing was the largest employer with 80,239 employees. Biggest investment was made by the chemical industry, with \$167,000,000 in new capital expenditures, the petroleum refining industry spent \$155,000,000 for plant construction and improvement.

RAILWAY AUTHORITY
U. S. Representative Henry B. Gonzales has asked support from Governor Connally, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell on his recently introduced bill which aims at creating a multi-state railway authority for Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Gonzales told them, "This is truly a states' rights program. States involved would jointly investigate and determine their own needs in the area of passenger rail transportation. He further stated that "In my judgement, passenger rail transportation has not been adequately developed and is not presently competitive with other modes of transportation—particularly in the Southwest."

FIRE INSURANCE
After July 1, it will be illegal for an insurance company to charge less than 6 percent interest per year on delayed premium payments for fire insurance, a new State Board of Insurance ruling decrees.

Several years ago, the board issued this same rule, but withdrew it when an objection was made by a company which charged no interest at all for deferred payments. An attorney general has held on two previous occasions that the board has no authority to set minimum interest rates on delayed payments, but Attorney General Carr has advised the board to take a new tack.

However, litigation is entirely possible on the part of insurers who would prefer to deviate from the ruling by charging less than the new minimum.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED
Governor Connally named Tom Pergues of Mineola and Charles T. Wickersham of Orange to the board of directors of the Sabine River Authority. He reappointed Gus Orsborn Jr. of Emory. Appointments extend until July 6, 1969.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. has chosen Norman V. Suarez of Austin

as legal counselor for the Texas Department of Public Safety. He succeeds the late Bill Kavanaugh of Round Rock.

TRIAL PUBLICITY EXPLORED
Representatives of Texas' four major press associations met here with State Bar officials for the first of a series of discussions about news coverage of trials.

Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Texas Associated Press Managing Editors Association, and United Press International Managing Editors, Association participated.

Talbot Rain of Dallas served as chairman of the panel.

Future conferences on the subject will be conducted for radio and television broadcasters and law enforcement officials.

COURT CASE ARGUED
The State of Texas has asked the Texas Supreme Court to reconsider its decision that the Sunday closing law does not prevent customers buying any article of merchandise on Sunday if they sign emergency certificates.

EMPLOYMENT PICTURE
Texas Employment Commission reports that in April total unemployment declined for the third straight month some 39,300 jobholders increased the employment total to 3,590,700.

Farm employment rose 17,800 to reach 300,700 by mid-April as seasonal workers were hired to plant a variety of row crops. This brought the total of seasonal workers to 105,800, or 3,500 more than at this time in 1963.

SHORT SNORTS
The State Board of Education voted to extend to one year the State's 6-month program to combat school dropouts—Twenty-one of the 2,500 elderly persons who have signed up for "Texas 65" health insurance coverage so far this month are over age 90—Texas Good Roads Association announced David D. Ford of Austin is its new manager. He succeeds Callan Graham, who was TGRA executive vice president.

Clint C. Small Jr. of Austin is the newly-elected president-elect of the State Bar Association. Vice President will be W. O. Shafer of Odessa—A voter in a party primary is ineligible to sign the application of an independent candidate for an office for which nominations are made in the primary. Atty. Gen. Carr held in an opinion—Measles cases are four times more numerous than last year, State Health Department reported.

Bob Shepard of Harlingen was elected governor of Boys State during activities here. Bill Storms of La Feria was chosen lieutenant governor and Bill Birdwell of Hearne attorney general—A 25-member Texas AFL-CIO Committee on Job Safety, Compensation and Liability has held its first meeting.
