

## C. Brown Will Open Dry Goods Store Here Soon

Claude Brown, proprietor of Brown's Cleaners & Clothiers of Lockney, will open a new dry goods department store here in the Spears building, formerly occupied by Lockney Dry Goods, in the near future. It was announced this week.

Mr. Brown has leased the building from Mrs. V. E. Spears, owner and work is already underway remodeling the interior, installing fixtures and repainting the building.

The new store will carry a good line of dry goods, notions, and ready-to-wear for all the family, as well as shoes. Mr. Brown said. He expects to be able to open for business within the next three or four weeks.

Mr. Brown said that he would continue to maintain his men's and boys clothing store and his cleaning shop in the present location and he would continue to devote his full time to that store. Management will be employed for the new dry goods store.

The bankrupt stock of the old Lockney Dry Goods was sold here last Thursday at public auction. The stock and fixtures were sold piece-meal for approximately \$8300. Out-of-town buyers bought all the stock and moved it out.

## C-C Directors Set Membership Campaign Soon

The directors also voted to change their monthly meeting night to the first Tuesday night of the month.

The group talked of the proposed 4-lane highway through this part of the county and the bond issue required to purchase right-of-way. They agreed to meet with the Floydada Chamber of Commerce directors Monday night to hear further discussion on the matter.

A committee to work on the extension of telephone lines in the fringe areas around Lockney was appointed. This was composed of Charles Baxter, chairman, Bill McClaskey and Bob Miller.

Fourteen officers and directors were present for the meeting.

## TWO NEGROES ARE DROWNED IN PIT SOUTHEAST OF TOWN

Two negroes, one a boy of 15 and the other a man of 35, were drowned Sunday afternoon when a small boat in which they were riding capsized. The accident happened in a pit dug out to make a road fill about a mile southeast of Lockney on the city farm.

The dead are Joe Edward Dixon, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Dixon who live on the Fred Dorman farm south of Lockney.

George Wilson, 35, a farm worker employed by W. C. Tims, south of Lockney, and a former employee of Wayne Bybee.

Five negroes were paddling around in the small boat when the accident happened. A sixth negro, Billy E. Hill, had been in the boat with them but asked to be let out because he could not swim. He was standing on the bank and saw the entire happenings.

The committee plans to confer further with Highway Commissioner Marshall Formby and to give more study to the county road problem.

The discussion and committee came out of a joint meeting of the directors of the two Chambers of Commerce to discuss the highway. The State Highway Commission has allotted money to build a 4-lane divided highway from Floydada west to the Hale County line. Their requirement is that the county furnish right-of-way for the road. Two previous bond issues, designed to furnish money to purchase the right-of-way, have been voted down. Mr. Formby informed the Chamber representatives previously that the Commission would have to reallocate the money to another county if this county was unable to furnish right-of-way.

## Cross Home Is Burned Saturday

The farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Oren Cross, two miles north and a mile west of Barwise, was destroyed by fire last Saturday afternoon. Origin of the fire was believed to have been faulty wiring.

All the family, except Mr. Cross' aged father, were out of the house at the time the fire started and the building was ablaze all over the top when they noticed it. They rushed to the house and led the elder Mr. Cross out of the building but were able to save only a television set, a divan, chair and a rug. The house was completely destroyed.

The family lost all their clothing except what they were wearing along with all other household furnishings and utensils.

The Lockney Fire Department sent a truck to the scene, arriving in time to prevent the destruction of a windmill tower and a small outbuilding. The house was too far gone to save when they arrived.

Some 20 to 25 neighbors quickly gathered to do what they could to help in the situation, and a number of Lockney people, in addition to firemen, rushed to the scene.

Owner of the farm is an Amarillo man. He plans to build another house on the farm very soon, reports say. He carried \$3,000 insurance on the house.

The Cross family had no insurance on the contents. A shower is planned for them at the Sandhill school house tonight (Thursday) at 8 p.m. They have one son, Larry Joe, age 12, at home. Another son, Marion Cross, is married and lives at Plainview.





### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



### OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

C. M. Perry, who is a Floyd County Soil Conservation District cooperator west of Floydada, has recently completed shaping and seeding a waterway with the help of Soil Conservation Service technicians. The waterway is 65 feet wide and will take care of a 100 acre watershed. It will intercept water from a diversion terrace, now being constructed and transport it to a lake.

Other cooperators who have terraces and waterways planned or under construction are: L. L. Ferguson, Bill Poole, Horton Howell, Wade Deavenport, Lloyd Deavenport and James L. Nichols.

Now is the time of year to shape and establish vegetation in waterways. Waterways are broad shallow, vegetated strips used to transport runoff water from the outlets of terraces to a safe place of disposal, such as a lake or grass area. They are especially valuable in cases where diversion terraces cannot dump water directly on a grass area. In these cases, a vegetated waterway can be designed to safely carry the runoff water across land that has been in cultivation, without causing severe gully erosion. The width of the waterway will depend upon the drainage area contributing runoff water and slope of the waterway.


Vegetation should be established in the waterways before runoff water is turned into it in order to prevent erosion in the waterway channel. Weeping lovegrass is very good and has been used successfully in establishing vegetation in waterways where irrigation water cannot be applied. Alfalfa, clover, perennial ryegrass and Kentucky fescue are a few plants that are good where irrigation water can be applied on flat slopes.

### Farm Records Are Money Savers

College Station.—Farm records have been referred to a farm management specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as the eyes and ears of the farm business. They reflect, said C. H. Bates the specialist, how the business is doing and may prevent many costly management or expensive mistakes.

On the average farm the investment per worker totals about \$15,000. Investments in land, machinery, livestock and other essentials needed for agricultural production makes the present day farmer a capitalist of considerable means. His investments are often larger than those of many urban businesses. Our highly competitive commercial farming, said Bates, makes record keeping mandatory as a protection for our investments.

Too, records make the job of completing the yearly income tax report much simpler and can save money. Expense items which are not recorded often are overlooked or forgotten at tax paying time and for every \$5.00 item missed, the average taxpayer paid \$1.25 in taxes he didn't owe, said Bates. Even the cost of a good farm record book is deductible as a legitimate operating expense.

Farm families, said the specialist, who have improved the efficiency of their farming operations have found records to be the key to their success. They have taken the guess-work out of their business.

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### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



C. M. Perry, who is a Floyd County Soil Conservation District operator west of Floydada, has recently completed shaping and seeding a waterway with the help of Soil Conservation Service technicians. The waterway is 65 feet wide and will take care of a 100 acre watershed. It will intercept water from a diversion terrace, now being constructed and transport it to a lake.

Other cooperators who have terraces and waterways planned or under construction are: L. L. Ferguson, Bill Poole, Horton Howell, Wade Deavenport, Lloyd Deavenport and James L. Nichols.

Now is the time of year to shape and establish vegetation in waterways. Waterways are broad shallow, vegetated strips used to transport runoff water from the outlets of terraces to a safe place of disposal, such as a lake or grass area. They are especially valuable in cases where diversion terraces can not dump water directly on a grass area. In these cases, a vegetated waterway can be designed to safely carry the runoff water across land that has been in cultivation without causing severe gully erosion. The width of the waterway will depend upon the drainage area contributing runoff water and slope of the waterway.

Vegetation should be established in the waterways before runoff water is turned into it in order to prevent erosion in the waterway channel. Weeping lovegrass is very good and has been used successfully in establishing vegetation in waterways where irrigation water cannot be applied. Alfalfa, clover, perennial ryegrass and Kentucky fescue are a few plants that are good where irrigation water can be applied on flat slopes.



Floyd County Commissioners Court.

Mr. Tucker explained that all the money allocated at present was \$530,000 for the road west from Floydada to the Hale County line. He stated that the other roads must come in future programs. He quoted traffic counts on the various roads showing that the heaviest traffic in the county was on Highway 70 around Lockney and Aiken. The road south from Floydada carries the next heaviest traffic load and the road east from Floydada the next.

It was revealed that Highway Department plans call for widening of the road south from Floydada but not making it a four-lane. This will require 30 more feet of right-of-way. Previous plans had been made to lay another road beside the old

road east of Floydada, though not as wide a right-of-way as a regular 4-lane highway. Whether this can be worked out with the Highway Department and the Commissioners Court is still to be determined. Such a program would require an additional 70 feet of right-of-way.

Mr. Tucker said that through Lockney the proposed 4-lane road would remain on the old route though an additional 100 feet of right-of-way would be required. He said that curb and gutter was not required, in response to a question by Mayor J. E. Cox of Lockney.

It was also brought out that the Highway Commission will rebuild and straighten West Hotel Street from the Baker Hotel west and extend it on to an intersection with Highway 70 west of town if the program is adopted.
