

A relief fund of clothing and household goods has been set up for the Elisio Tovar family, whose home at 300 NE Fourth St. was destroyed by fire Monday morning.

The frame house and virtually all the Tovars' belongings were lost in the fire.

At the time the fire occurred Mrs. Tovar said she had put her eight children, who range in age from 1½ to 9, in the car before going to town and was hanging a few items of clothing on the line when she went back into the house for a moment and "heard something pop."

"The fire broke out in the children's room," Mrs. Tovar said, "where they are usually playing."

The Hector Gonzales home at 509 E. Halsell is the donation point for the Tovars, and many Dimmitt residents have already come to the aid of the family.

The family needs "everything," Mrs. Gonzales said, because they were not able to salvage

anything from the fire.

The Dimmitt Noon Lions Club voted Tuesday to donate \$100 to the family, and Dan Nelson donated \$200 for clothing, Mrs. Gonzales said.

The Senior Citizens, Inc., donated a load of clothing for the family. Many church groups have also donated items.

The younger children are still in need of clothing and the family needs bedroom furniture. One family donated furniture for a bedroom and another family has given a mattress.

A temporary home for the family has been provided near the Easter Gin, Mrs. Gonzales said.

Tovar is employed at the Dimmitt Amstar Plant.

The family is still in need of linens, dishes, furniture, a stove and other household items, Mrs. Gonzales added.

## Big voter turnout likely

Contested races for six local governing boards are likely to spur a voter turnout Saturday that could challenge the 1977 record.

Ballots for the Plains Memorial Hospital Board, all three school boards, Hart city commission and the Dimmitt mayor's race will all give voters a choice of candidates.

Only Hart Mayor Frank Barnes, Dimmitt City Judge L. G. Manning and Nazareth City Commissioner Jerry Lange are running unopposed.

In the other races, 27 candidates are seeking 13 available posts.

## Frito-Lay price fails to meet grower demand

Members of the High Plains Farm Bargaining Association learned at their meeting here Friday night that Frito-Lay Inc. of Dallas had not responded to their "final offer" of prices for 1979 food corn contracts.

The growers were told by Weldon Davis of Hart, president, that "the contract has been negotiated with Frito-Lay to the greatest price level we can expect."

The new organization then started its next major bargaining effort with the formation of a negotiating committee to seek hay and silage contracts at prices of at least \$18 a ton.

Members named to the committee from over the entire High Plains corn growing area are Harold Bob Bennett, George Sides, Roger Wagner, Larry Walterscheid, Bill Paetzold, Rober Williams, Dick Fellers, Preston Upshaw, Bill Rich, Jerald Wright, Charles Heck, Harold Joe Wells, L. D. Taylor and Dwayne Loudder.

The association voted approval of a \$1 per acre check-off on silage to benefit the HPFBA, provided it is successful in negotiating workable silage contracts.

Wagner, a Hereford farmer, explained that production of corn silage is unprofitable at prices under \$18 a ton because of higher expenses. Price offers in this area are about \$16.50 a ton, though some contracts are available in Randall County at \$17.50 and \$18, he said.

Farmers in the association, polled before the final offer to Frito-Lay for contract prices of \$6 per hundredweight for yellow corn and \$7 for white corn, voted about 80-20 against accepting any lower prices, Davis said. But there were enough who began signing contracts at the Frito-Lay price of \$5.50 for yellow corn that the bargaining group was not able to secure the higher price, he added.

"If they had held out a little longer we could have been stronger," he said at the meeting here.

## Rhoads Library wins award with \$2,000

The 1979 J. Frank Dobie Award for small libraries in Texas will be presented today (Thursday) to Rhoads Memorial Library of Dimmitt as winner of the prestigious statewide citation and a cash grant of \$2,000.

Librarian Brick Autry and his staff at Rhoads Memorial won the honor for their proposal for a community service project which was judged "outstanding." The proposal was to use the cash grant for items of special interest to Spanish-speaking residents of the county.

Dimmitt's proposal was picked as the winner because it highlighted a community need which the library could meet if it had the \$2,000 grant, Autry said.

The J. Frank Dobie award is granted annually to small libraries which have a proven record of excellence and have planned outstanding services to their community. The

award is eagerly sought after because of the statewide recognition the winning library receives.

It will be presented at the TLA meeting today in San Antonio, and will be accepted for Rhoads Memorial by Jane Ulrich of Amarillo, coordinator of Texas Panhandle Libraries.

## Lunch now served at Senior Center

Meal service began this week in the Castro County Senior Citizens Center, offering a nominally-priced hot lunch at noon each day to county residents over 60 years of age.

Forty persons came for lunch Monday, the first day of the program, and attendance is expected to increase as residents learn of the new service.

Cost of the meal to eligible persons will be one dollar, and to guests who do not meet the age and residence requirements, \$1.50. Serving time is 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The meals are prepared at Richardson Elementary School cafeteria and taken to the Senior Citizens Center in the old Dimmitt Super Market building at the corner of

Jones and SW Third Sts. Steam tables and other equipment were already available in the center, as well as tables and chairs for the diners.

Loretta Jordan is in charge of the meal service, according to Peggy West, center director.

Reservations for the lunches must be made by calling the day before to 647-2654. Residents who wish to know what food will be served may read the school lunch menus which are published each week in the Castro County News.

The lunch service is being started under the Title 7 Nutrition program, a federally funded program for older citizens.

## Fights erupt involving youth gangs

A series of gangfights with apparent racial overtones broke out among Dimmitt and Hereford youths along Broadway Friday night.

They reportedly stemmed from an incident at Dimmitt High School earlier in the day.

Two youths reported that while they were parked at A&H Supply about 9:30 p.m., two Mexican-American males pulled them out of their pickup and started a fight.

Another youth reportedly was beaten by several others when he became involved. But no complaints were filed and no one was arrested.

There was another reported rumble at 10:40 p.m.—this time near the Circle K convenience store—but it broke up when police arrived.

A pipe recovered from the parking lot of the convenience store was described by police as the handle from a "handyman" jack, approximately three feet long and 1½ inches in diameter.

City police increased their patrol during the weekend, and no other fights were reported.

## Grand Jury indicts pilot and 19 others

William Scott Little, California pilot who has been held in the Castro County jail since his arrest the night of March 14, was indicted by a Castro County Grand Jury last Thursday on a charge of possession of marijuana. Little was identified as the pilot of a marijuana-laden plane that crashed-landed in a lakebed west of Dimmitt.

He was one of 20 persons named in indictments by the Grand Jury.

Little had been held under \$250,000 bond. But after the indictment was returned, the bond was reduced to \$50,000, and it was left at that figure after a hearing before District Judge John T. Boyd Tuesday on a request for bond reduction.

Charges of aggravated assault, robbery, burglary and forgery were included in the Grand Jury's list of indictments, as well as six counts of felony DWI.

## Bandmaster of Year title awarded Smith

Ralph Smith, who directed the Dimmitt High Bobcat Band to 25 UIL sweepstakes awards in his 27 years here, has been named "Bandmaster of the Year," the highest honor available to a high school band director in Texas.

The title was awarded to Dimmitt's veteran band director by the Texas Bandmasters Association. The annual award is made to a bandman picked from schools of all sizes over the state.

After directing the Band at Childress High School from 1949, when he began teaching, Smith came to the Dimmitt school system in 1952 and has been here since.

In addition to winning sweepstakes honors in University Interscholastic League contests 25 times, Smith's Bobcat Band has been chosen as "outstanding" in numerous band festivals and parades. It has been invited as the featured band in annual Battle of Flowers events at San Antonio four times.

Smith has held every office in the Texas Bandmasters Association and served as its president in 1969, also was assistant executive secretary from 1971-77.

He was president of the Texas chapter of Phi Beta Mu, national bandmasters

## Deficiency payments due on 1978 corn, sorghum

Castro County farmers who participated in the voluntary feed grain set-aside program last year will receive deficiency payments on the 1978 crops of corn and sorghum, according to Melvin Barton, chairman of the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee.

Deficiency payments are made when the average price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year for a program crop falls below the government-established target price for that crop.

The per bushel payment rate is the difference between the target price and the higher of the loan rate for the crop or the average price received by farmers.

The 1978 target prices were \$2.10 per bushel for corn, and \$2.28 per bushel for sorghum. The national average loan rates were \$2 for corn, and \$1.90 for sorghum.

According to Barton, the payment rate could range between four and six cents per bushel for corn, and 33 to 35 cents for sorghum.

"Payments for the crops are computed by multiplying the established yield for the farm by the acreage planted for harvest times the payment rate," Barton explained.

He pointed out that the payments may be adjusted downward by an allocation factor which is applied to payments on farms where producers did not reduce their 1978 corn and sorghum acreage by 5 percent from the 1977 acreage. This factor could range between 85 and 90 percent for corn and 87 to 93 percent for sorghum.

Barton said the payment will also be adjusted downward if there was a disaster payment for the crop.
