Did You Know That The Oldest Bale Of Cotton In Existence

-was produced in 1862 and is now preserved in a glass case on the floor of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange? A brief historical sketch follows:

John Peden, a rather eccentric farmer of nothern Oktibbeha County, Mississippi, owning a number of slaves, had, about 1860, a disagreeable experience in lending money, and declared his intention not to have any more money to lend. Thereafter he sold such part of each cotton crop as was necessary to buy his yearly supplies. The remainder of the crop was placed on the long and spacious veranda in front of his residence. In the course of time the veranda was fully occupied except an opening for entrance to the house. After Mr. Peden's death the cotton

was gradually sold off, the last of it in the later 1880's. The present bale along with several others came into possession of the First National Bank of West Point, Miss., and was exhibited at the World's Fairs-Chicago in 1893 and St. Louis in 1904. It subsequently came into the possession of Lesser Goldman Cotton Company of St. Louis, who purchased it about that time. It was preserved by the latter in a glass case until 1945, when the case and the bale were donated to the New Orleans Cotton Exchange.

Except that the bale was picked and ginned by slave labor, we have no information in connection with this part of the record. So far as we know the original bagging which is the ordinary type jute bagging, is still on the bale.


