



College Station - Prices of ettle should rise some further 1958, according to John Me-Haney, extension economist However, he adds that prices after 1958 will depend to a great extent on the general level of business activity.

The inventory of cattle and calves on January 1, 1957, showed a decrease in numbers for the first time since 1949, says McHaney. There was a further reduction in 1957 and on January 1, 1958, numbers were probably down to about two million head from the 95.2 million head on Jan. 1, 1957. Less cows will probably be slaughtered in 1958, says the economist. Cattle produccers did not withhold many cows from slaughter until the last part of 1957, but more are likely to be withheld in 1958. However, this may not reverse the cattle cycle in 1958, because last year's reduction will mean a smaller 1958 calf crop. But it will reduce total cattle slaughter and total beef output in 1958.
