John Hanst, senior in Lockney High and star tackle on the Longhorn football team the past three years, has been named to the Texas High School All-Star All-State football team of 1957 by the Texas Sports Roundup Association.

John received notification of the award this week along with an invitation to attend the Honor or Ballot Banquet of the Association on Friday, August 9th in the Shamrock Hilton Hotel in Houston.

The annual Roundup will be held August 8th and 9th with all-star all-state representatives from football, basketball, baseball, track, tennis and golf teams attending. Also attending will be the high school, Southwest and Lone Star Conference coaches of the year, the national college football coach of the year and a host of professional athletes.

Registration is to start at 1 p.m. August 8th in the field house at the Public High School Stadium in Houston. A get-acquainted session will be followed by some competitive golf, distance driving, basketball, free tossing, baseball and football target throwing, punting and place kicking.

John and other boys selected for the honor will be honor guests at the banquet on August 9th at which he will receive recognition for his selection. The TSRA Football Award, and a Distinguished Membership in the Texas Sports Roundup Association.

## Council Grants Telephone Rate Raise Here

The City Council voted to grant the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. their requested rate raise in a regular meeting of the Council last Thursday evening.

The new rate is to be effective with the billing of July 29, 1958. The new rate will be: business telephones, \$10.00 per month; one party residence telephones, \$5.60 per month; two-party telephones, \$4.25 per month. The company will also raise rural business telephones to \$5.50 per month.

The telephone company applied for a raise in rates last year. The Council has had the matter under consideration since and telephone officials met with them in January renewing their request for a raise. District Manager Clay Styles and Local Manager J. C. Oakley again met with the Council Thursday night.

Under the agreement reached with the telephone people, the company will make some extensions of their lines north of Lockney to serve a number of people out of the local exchange who do not now have telephones.

## Lockney Junior Livestock Show Set March 1st

The annual Lockney Junior Livestock Show sponsored by the Lockney Chamber of Commerce will be held on Saturday, March 1st, it was announced this week. The show will be at the fair building in southeast Lockney. Gene Barnett, vocational agricultural instructor at Plainview High School, will again be the judge.

M. L. Brewer, local vocational agricultural teacher, estimated Tuesday that Lockney FFA members and 4-H Club boys and girls of the area would have at least 160 animals in the show here, perhaps more.

R. C. Mitchell and Oscar Golden are working with Mr. Brewer in making plans for the show. Some \$600 in cash prizes are to be offered.

## Farmers Invited To Soil Fertility Day Program

Mr. Sherrill is irrigation agent for extension Districts 1 and 2 in West Texas. He is a 1931 graduate of A. & M. College with a B. S. degree in animal husbandry. He has served as agricultural agent in Coryell County, Hockley County and Lubbock County. He is widely known over West Texas for his leadership in conducting agricultural programs in the area.

Floyd County farmers have a cordial invitation to attend the 10th annual Soil Fertility Day meeting at the Plains Theatre here Friday. A program filled with outstanding speakers and a free barbecue at the noon hour are the attractions.



JACK BARTON Soil and Water Conservation Specialist

Mr. Barton is a specialist in soil and water conservation with the Extension Service. He is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College with a B. S. degree in agronomy. He served as assistant county agent in Bowie County and later in Gregg County. He then went to Lamar College as agricultural agent.

In 1952 he was appointed assistant agronomist working with the Extension Service and the Experiment Station at Weslaco. He conducted demonstrations and research work in the South Texas area with both field crops and grasses. Soil and water conservation were important parts of this work.

In 1955 Barton was transferred to the headquarters staff as specialist in soil and water conservation. He works closely with Soil Conservation Districts and with county agents in conducting soil and water conservation programs.

County Agent Cecil Lewis, program chairman for the day, said this week that everything was in readiness. Opening at 10 a.m. and closing at 3 p.m., the program will feature outstanding agriculturists of the state who will speak on various phases of farming including irrigation, soil preparation, fertilizers, money crops, and even farm financing. A panel of local farmers will conclude the day's program.

Free Barbecue The Chamber of Commerce and the First National Bank are co-operating in serving a free barbecue at the noon hour to those attending the soil day meeting. The barbecue will be served at the American Legion home here and will be prepared by Wendell Hewitt of Plainview, a professional caterer.

Sponsors for the program in addition to the Lockney Chamber of Commerce are the Fort Worth & Denver, the Extension Service and the Floyd County Soil Conservation District.

Subjects for the day's talks are designed to be of special interest to Floyd County farmers. Jack Barton, soil and water conservationist with the Texas Extension Service at College Station will discuss "Soil Condition."

One last minute change in the day's program will find W. L. Broadhurst of the High Plains Water Conservation District talking on "Recharge Wells." He replaces Bob Thurmond who was to speak on irrigation.

D. W. Sherrill, irrigation specialist of Lubbock, will talk on "Latest Methods of Irrigation" during the morning session.

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, head of the High Plains Station at Halfway will conclude the morning program with a discussion of Fertilizers.

Vic N. Johnson, vice-president of the Federal Land Bank at Houston, will kick off the afternoon program with a talk on "What To Expect in Agricultural Financing."

Harvey Walker, assistant agronomist at the Lubbock Experiment Station will discuss the Soybean and Castorbean situation.

A panel composed of Jerry Cooper, Eddie Fortenberry and Robert Lee Smith will conclude the program. Cooper will talk on Cotton, probably dealing in some degree with cotton pruning. Fortenberry, chosen the outstanding soil conservation farmer in the county the past year, will talk on grass seed production. Smith will give some facts on the Floyd County Weed Control District. He is president of the district.

Mayor J. E. Cox will welcome the group to start off the morning program. Macy K. Orman, agricultural agent for the Fort Worth & Denver, will give a brief talk on Soil Fertility Day following the welcome.

Earl Edwards Jr. will be the morning chairman for the meeting and R. C. Mitchell will be the afternoon chairman.

## FORDS TO MAKE WASHINGTON TRIP ON FARMERS UNION BUS

Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Ford of Lockney will make the trip to Washington, D. C., along with some 38 other members of the Texas Farmers Union on a bus leaving Wichita Falls, Friday morning at 5 o'clock. The state Farmers Union furnishes the bus and all transportation expense to encourage its members to go to Washington and talk with members of the Congress concerning farm legislation, according to Kenneth Wofford, president of the county organization. The county chapter will pay the expenses of the couple other than transportation, he said.

## INTEREST ON ROAD BONDS AVERAGES LESS THAN 3%

The Floyd County Commissioners Court reached an agreement last Friday with the Municipal Securities Co. of Dallas to sell the \$294,000 Floyd County road bond issue at an average interest rate of slightly less than 3 per cent. The average rate of interest for the issue is 2.98941 per cent. This is considered an excellent transaction since most other bond issues in this area have been selling well above 3 per cent.

The bonds were issued to be retired in 15 years, thus making possible the better rate of interest, Judge J. D. McBrien and Commissioner Hugh Counts told The Beacon that by selling the bonds on a 15 year basis instead of 20 year, the county was saved a total of \$59,144 in interest.

Two other bids were received by the court, one very close to the accepted bid and the other at 3.11 per cent.

The bonds will mature in the following order: first year, \$4,000; second year, \$10,000; third, fourth and fifth years, \$15,000 each; sixth, seventh and eighth years, \$20,000 each; the remaining seven years, \$25,000 each.

**WELCOME** to all the visitors, both far and near, to the Tenth Annual Soil Fertility Day at the Plains Theatre Friday, County Agent Cecil Lewis, representatives of the Fort Worth & Denver, the Extension Service, the Soil Conservation Service and the Chamber of Commerce have all done quite a bit of work to make this program worth while. We hope that you farmers will take time to attend. Seems to us that most all of the talks scheduled will have some information that is worth listening to, we know the barbecue will be good this year, and the association with other farmers will make the day enjoyable. Some of these speakers will have come a long way. Let's make them feel welcome and give them a good hearing.

**WHILE WE'RE** at it, we might say thanks to the FW&D, the Extension Service and the Soil District for their efforts. Also to the Chamber of Commerce representatives for making the arrangements and to the First National Bank for providing the barbecue. This kind of co-operation gets things done.

**THERE'S AN** old saying, "We first abhor, then endure, then embrace," and that's about the situation with the national budget. Last year when the administration presented a budget of some \$71 billion dollars a great cry of protest arose over the country and Congress was flooded with letters. As a result some efforts toward economy were made. But now the administration comes back with an even bigger budget, \$73.4 billion, and we hear no protest whatever. Can a couple of little sputniks make so much difference? Will dollars cure the ills of the nation defense-wise? We are apparently in the enduring stage now. God only knows what will happen to this nation when we reach the embracing stage. To make matters worse Senator Harry Byrd, the champion of economy in government, is retiring. Economic collapse could possibly come to the nation.

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**THIS AREA** has enjoyed a measure of prosperity for several years. Now things are tightening up a little and money is not being spent as freely as it once was. This could be a testing time for business people. Local business houses may be sure that the larger stores in neighboring cities are going after the business. Unless we also go after the business we will lose a good part of it to those who work harder to attract the trade. The Beacon does not solicit out-of-town advertising and carries few advertisements from stores in larger places but most people receive daily newspapers. Local people are constantly reminded of the opportunities for spending their money through advertisements in these daily papers. Unless local merchants counteract the effect of daily newspaper advertising by advertising in their own home town paper then they will soon find some of their customers going elsewhere to buy. To the successful merchant, merchandising and advertising is a never-ending project.

**HOW TO GET WHAT WE NEED**  
(A distinguished Texas judge offers pointers on combating our rapidly increasing juvenile delinquency problem.)

Texans like to brag — and we have much reason to be proud. But we can't brag about our facilities for handling juvenile delinquents. They're inadequate. The state institutions are heavily overcrowded. There are no state parole officers for children released from them. Many counties have neither institutions nor parole officers.

**You Can Get Them**  
There is, however, something that can be done, and it is up to the people to do it.

Public officials respond to what the voters want. On the county level it is the Commissioners Court, and for the state the Legislature has the responsibility. If there is strong enough public opinion favoring adequate facilities and probation officials, our representatives in county and state office will provide them.

**Develop Public Opinion**  
Public opinion is something you can be a force in developing. Talk to your friends, your clubs, your church. Write your legislators, county commissioners, newspapers. And if your county is too small to afford paid probation people, get volunteer ones, ministers, other people with character... yourself!

## With Our EXCHANGES

### DRIVE TROUBLES

Norton Barrett, co-chairman of the Crosbyton area Community Chest Drive, has been somewhat disappointed over the response so far to the 1958 campaign. At last report Monday his committee had secured only \$3100 on a quota of approximately \$5,000 needed to reach the county goal of over \$15,000. It doesn't help the drive any, but it may console workers to know that Crosbyton is not the only community in this area having difficulties with its charitable drives this year. Ralls and Lorenzo are both behind schedule. Floyd County reports its drive has bogged down at the half-way mark. Garza County is having difficulties, and many communities are having a hard time getting their January Police and Cancer drives in high gear. TB Christmas Seal sales were down in Texas. Counties and other taxing agencies say that tax collections are 15 to 20 per cent below last year on January 1. And poll tax payments in practically every county are at a new low mark for a political year. Despite bank statements showing deposits on about a par with last year, these trends indicate a scarcity of money for Mr. Average Citizen or a very cautious approach to the year 1958. — Hubert Curry in Crosbyton Review.

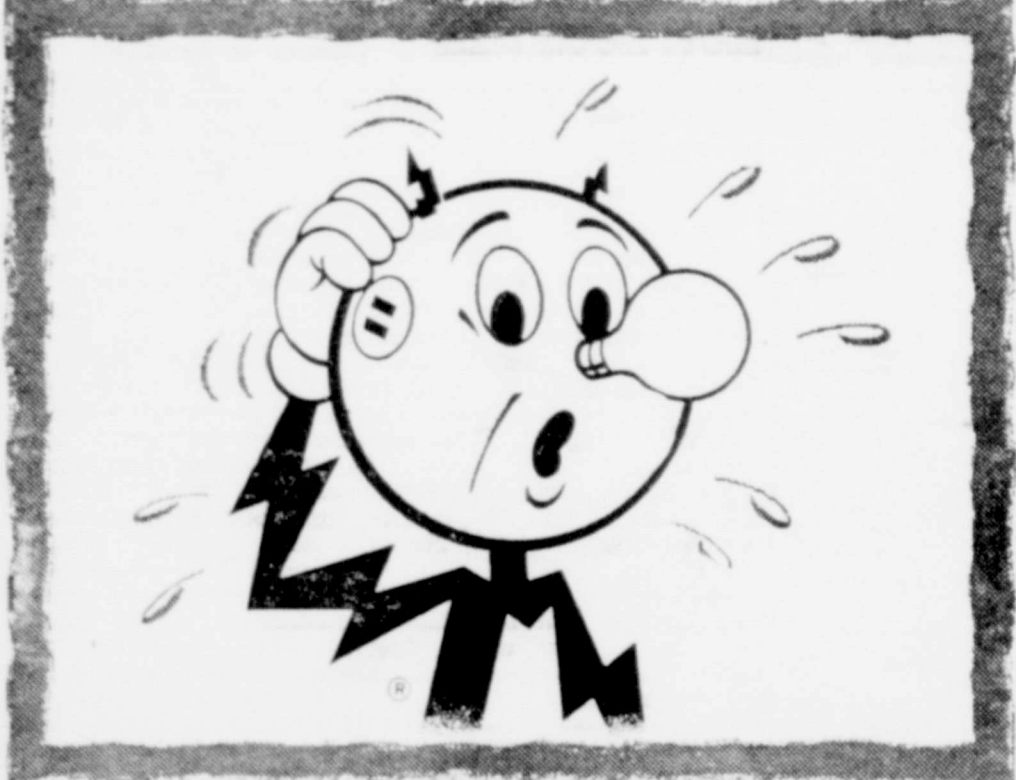

### Plains Cotton Yield Is Down

Lubbock — The U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, recently announced ginnings of the 1957 crop prior to January 16, 1958. Ginnings on that date of Plains Cotton Growers 23-member counties totaled 1,534,094 bales. This compares to approximately 1,650,000 bales harvested on that date a year earlier. Significant are the noticeable decreases from a year ago in Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum counties. Biggest

increases are in Dawson, Garza and Lynn counties, all southern counties with only one-third of the cotton acreage irrigated, as compared with 75 to 90 per cent irrigated in the central and northern sectors.

All noticeable is the fact that even in a poor year such as 1957, the 23-member counties of the PCG produced more cotton than the entire states of California with 1,527,144 bales; Mississippi with 1,032,485; Arkansas with 920,179; Arizona with 718,854; Alabama with 526,182; Louisiana with 342,982; and Oklahoma with 256,100 bales.

Texas has ginned 3,540,304 bales as of January 16. The PCG member counties harvested 42 per cent of the Texas crop in 1957.

Ranges and pastures over much of Texas have a good growth of winter grass and weeds. This feed, plus small grains, stubble fields, cured grass and ample hay reserves should carry stock through the winter in good condition, points out McHaney. All range feed in the state was reported at 80 per cent condition on January 1, 1958. This compares with 51 per cent on January 1, 1957, and 69 per cent for the ten-year average to this date. The improved range conditions have created a good demand for range cattle which should continue in 1958 assuming favorable moisture conditions.

McHaney says that little change is likely in the total meat output in 1958. There will probably be a reduction in the slaughter of cattle and calves, but there will likely be an increase in the slaughter of hogs. Heavy carcass weights for cattle will also help maintain the output. Lower pork prices during the latter part of 1957 will certainly make pork more competitive with beef.

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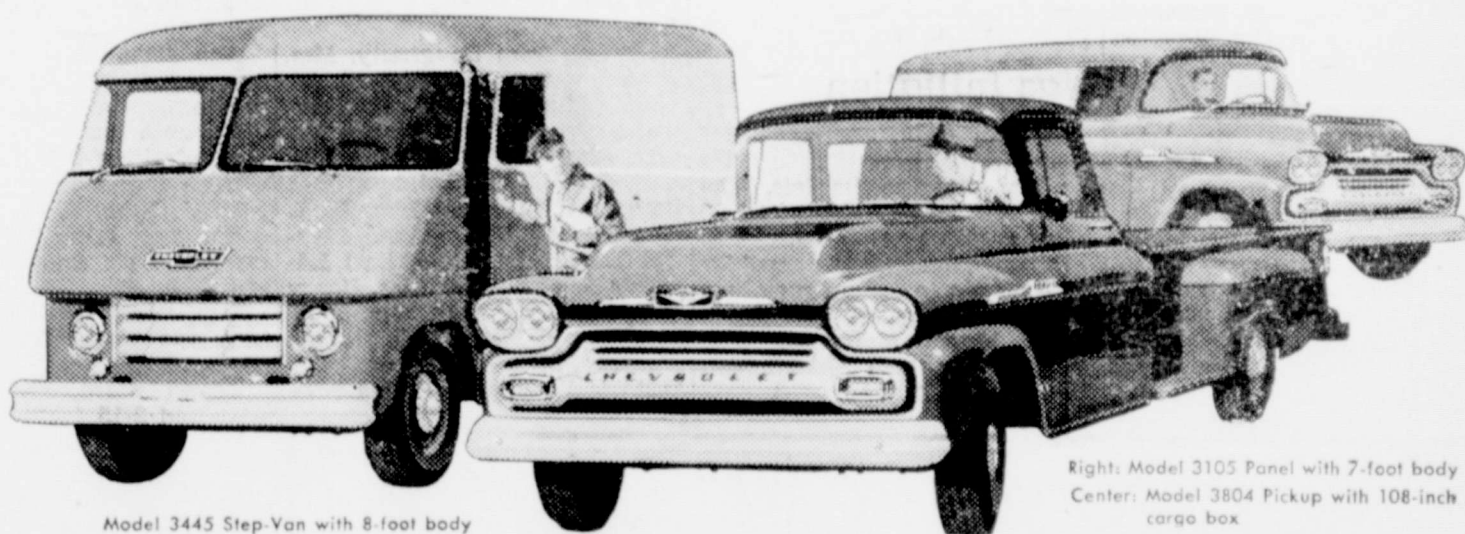

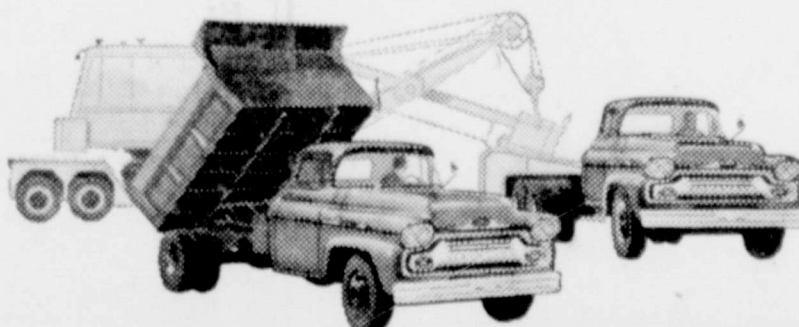

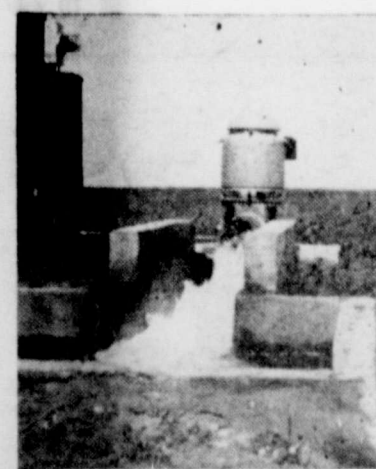

### March 1-4 Is National 4-H Club Week

College Station — The nation's 4-H club members, more than 2,000,000, will observe National 4-H Club Week from March 1 to 4. They will not only salute their parents but all parents and will recognize the important part that parents play in guiding and influencing youth.

The 22,335 Texas 4-H club members were recognized by Governor Price Daniel in his greeting to them when he said, "As 4-H members you have contributed much to the national wealth of Texas and the nation in raising the quality of agricultural production. As you yourselves are an chief resource. May you continue to build yourselves, your homes and communities during the coming year, and thus help build a greater America." The Governor also saluted the parents of 4-H for the contribution they have made to the 4-H program in Texas.

The Texas 4-H members last year completed more than 100,000 demonstrations involving practically every phase of farming, gardening and home-making. They are members of 6,277 local 4-H clubs and received assistance from 10,088 local adult leaders and 320 county leaders. Local county extension agents provide the leadership for 4-H club programs in the counties.

Members of 4-H clubs, individually and as a group, participate in community service activities. Any boy or girl between the ages of 8-21 years of age may become a member by agreeing to follow 4-H aims and standards. The chief re-

quirement is a willingness to "learn to do by doing" which is the club slogan, and "to make the best better" which is the club motto. Character development and good citizenship are long-time goals.

Observance of the special week are being planned in many counties in Texas. The general public is invited to participate in the local observances and to learn more about the great rural youth organization which over the past half century has helped 22,000,000 youth develop into useful citizens.

### Secret Official Tells Of Growth

Dr. E. Davis Armstrong, president of the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America, who is a 20-county area surrounding Lubbock, announced today that the 1952-53 membership at the close of 1952 totaled 10,422 members. Of this number, 7,723 are registered in clubs, Scouts and Explorers and 2,699 registered adults. This shows a gain of 10% over 1951.

This gain over the 1951-52 Plains Council 7th place in Region 3 membership ranking out of 36 councils in the Region composed of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. This is the largest gain in membership in the history of the South Plains Council, Armstrong emphasized.

Nationally, the Boy Scouts of America reached its highest membership point on December 31, 1952 with 4,761,486 boys and adults enrolled.

Dr. Arthur A. Schuch, Chief Scout Executive, announced that the organization recorded a gain of 220,872 members in 1952, or a 4.8% gain.

The boy membership shows 3,480,272 enrolled, a gain of 241,239 or 7.2% during the year. Girl Scouts, a program for boys eight, nine and ten years of age, number 1,281,214, a gain of 221,019 or 17.6%. There are 1,271,223 Boy Scouts eleven, twelve and thirteen years of age, a gain of 16,380 or 1.3%. Explorers, age fourteen and older, total 481,772, a gain of 4%.

Dr. Schuch also announced that there are now 1,290,524 adult leaders in the movement, a gain of 4%.

On December 31 there were 127,184 units, a gain of 4,331 over the previous year or 3.7%. There are now 42,749 Cub Scout Packs, 17,214 Boy Scout Troops and 18,801 Explorer units.

Since its founding forty-eight years ago the Boy Scouts of America has ended each year with a gain in membership. Since 1910 there have been over

### Soybeans Needed Late Watering, Tests Show

The need for an irrigation in late September to mature the seed of soybeans was apparent from the yields obtained in a variety test at the High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation in 1957. Due to the inability to acquire aluminum transport pipe, it was nearly impossible to get water to this test in late September. It appears that this late irrigation was necessary for maximum yields. However, recognizing the fact that the earlier types were favored by this lack of a September irrigation, data obtained are presented.

The ten varieties were planted on June 17 at the rate of sixty pounds of seed per acre in two row plots 100 feet long. There were three replications of each variety randomly placed in the field to eliminate the effects of soil and water differences on yield. Thirty-six pounds of nitrogen and forty-five pounds of P2O5 were applied at planting. The plots received a preplant irrigation and three subsequent waterings to make a total of 15 inches of applied water. There were 17.4 inches of natural rainfall during the period of April 1 to October 1 making a total of 32.4 inches of water which could be considered available for plant growth.

In this test a difference of less than 2.66 bushels per acre between any two varieties might be due to chance and in another test under similar conditions, the ranking might change. For example: No variety made over two bushels more than Dortchcov No. 2. Therefore, this variety can be considered as high yielding under these conditions as any of the others.

The poor showing of Lee and other similar later maturing varieties in this test is explained by the fact that failure to receive a late September irrigation favored the earlier maturing types such as Volstate and S-100.

**FROM THE County Agent's Office**

Stock Show season is just around the corner. Catalogues are now available for exhibitors and those interested in the Stock Show at the County Agent's Office.

The Catalogue contains some new features this year. All of the buyers of stock at the 1957 show are listed. Some new awards have been added as well. The Swine Association have all been contacted and they are giving awards to the Grand Champion barrows.

To the 4-H and FFA members entries have to be in the County Agent's Office by Monday, March 3, 1958. See your Agricultural teacher or County Agent for entry forms.

You might drop by and look at the Grand Champion and Showmanship Trophies. These trophies will be in other stores in both Floydada and Lockney later on.

The use of 2-4-D on wheat to control weeds can be a valuable tool if used properly. 1/2 pound of actual 2-4-D per acre is recommended for the control of broadleaf weeds. A faster and higher kill can be expected when the weeds are growing fast. Be sure your wheat is fully tillered (suckers) before applying 2-4-D.

Be sure and check germination on your cottonseed before its delinted. The seed may not have a high enough germination to be delinted and would be a waste of money.

All of your cottonseed should be checked for germination. This will help you decide on planting rate. If you are used to planting a bushel of cottonseed to the acre with a germination of 85% and you plant seed with 60% germination you will not get the stand of cotton you want. It will take more than a bushel of seed per acre to get the desired stand.

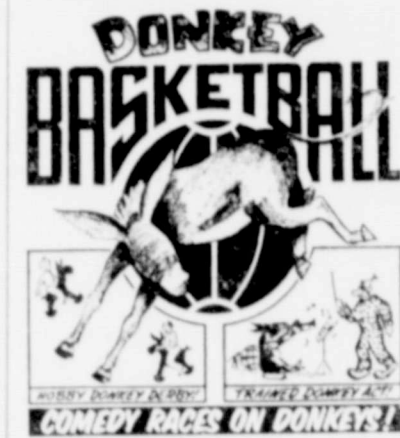
