t arm exocus Is Slower

College Station - A Texas A&M agricultural economist has predicted that Texas exodus from the farm to the city will be slower in the future.

Dr. Robert R. Skrabanek says that it is highly probable that the farm population will continue to decline but at a much slower rate than the 26.6 per cent - about 369,000 - who have moved to the city from

In the survey made by Texas A&M, in cooperation with the USDA, Dr. Skrabanek said also that the farm population declined more slowly in Texas than in nearby Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Louisiana where the loss was 30.2 per cent during the same period

However, compared with the nationwide farm to city move ment, Texas 26.6 per cent has been much higher than the national average of 18.6 per cent. The Texas farm population -1.018,000 - made up 11.1 per cent of the state's population in 1957, with five out of every 100 farm residents in the U.S. residing in Texas. There was much migration to


