Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a rote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of affice than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or lappointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the County of Potter to render financial aid to and participate in the operation of such Hospital District; authorizing the Commissioners Court of

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be

Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:

"Section 5 (a) The Legislature may by law authorise the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may be reafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorised to lavy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (754) on the One Hundred Dollars (8100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (754) per One Hundred Dollars (8100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.
