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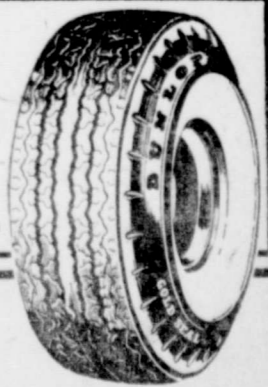

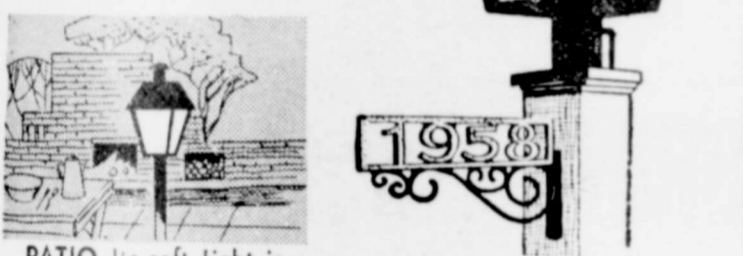

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FROM THE County Agent's Office

COTTON DEFOLIATION
 When applying defoliant be sure that you have enough cotton open so that damage to the fibers and grades will not be hurt. Defoliant when applied too early are just like an early freeze. There are two general types of defoliant, dessicants which kill the plant and 80 to 90 per cent of the cotton should be open when applied. True defoliant cause the leaves to drop and can be applied when 60 per cent of the cotton is open. The best time to apply defoliant is two to three weeks before the average frost which is November 2nd. For cotton defoliation guides contact the County Agent's Office.

4-H CLUB
 South Plains Community is in the process of organizing a community 4-H club. This club will meet outside of school and it is felt that members can develop greater leadership in this type of club. Their next meeting will be Thursday, Sept. 18, at 8:00 at the South Plains schoolhouse.

WHEAT STUBBLE
 One ton of wheat stubble contains the following amount of fertilizer elements: Nitrogen 10 pounds, Phosphorous 5 pounds, and potash 20 pounds. For this plant food to be available the straw has to be decomposed. With this heavy straw residue 30 to 40 pounds of actual nitrogen should be a good practice to insure good yields.

One ton of wheat straw under adequate moisture conditions would be worth 2 to 3 bushels per acre for a period of from 2 to 3 years.

WINTER LEGUMES
 Now is the time to seed winter legumes for soil building crops. Hairy Vetch or Madrid Sweetclover are the most adopted legumes. The seeding rates are 10-15 pounds acre of Hairy Vetch and 4 to 5 pounds acre of Sweetclover. These legumes will obtain their maximum growth by May and can be turned under at that time. All seed should be inoculated before planting.

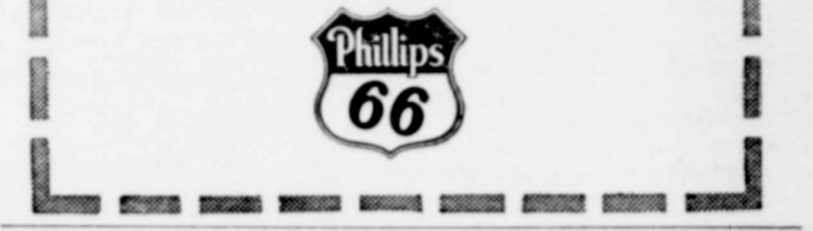
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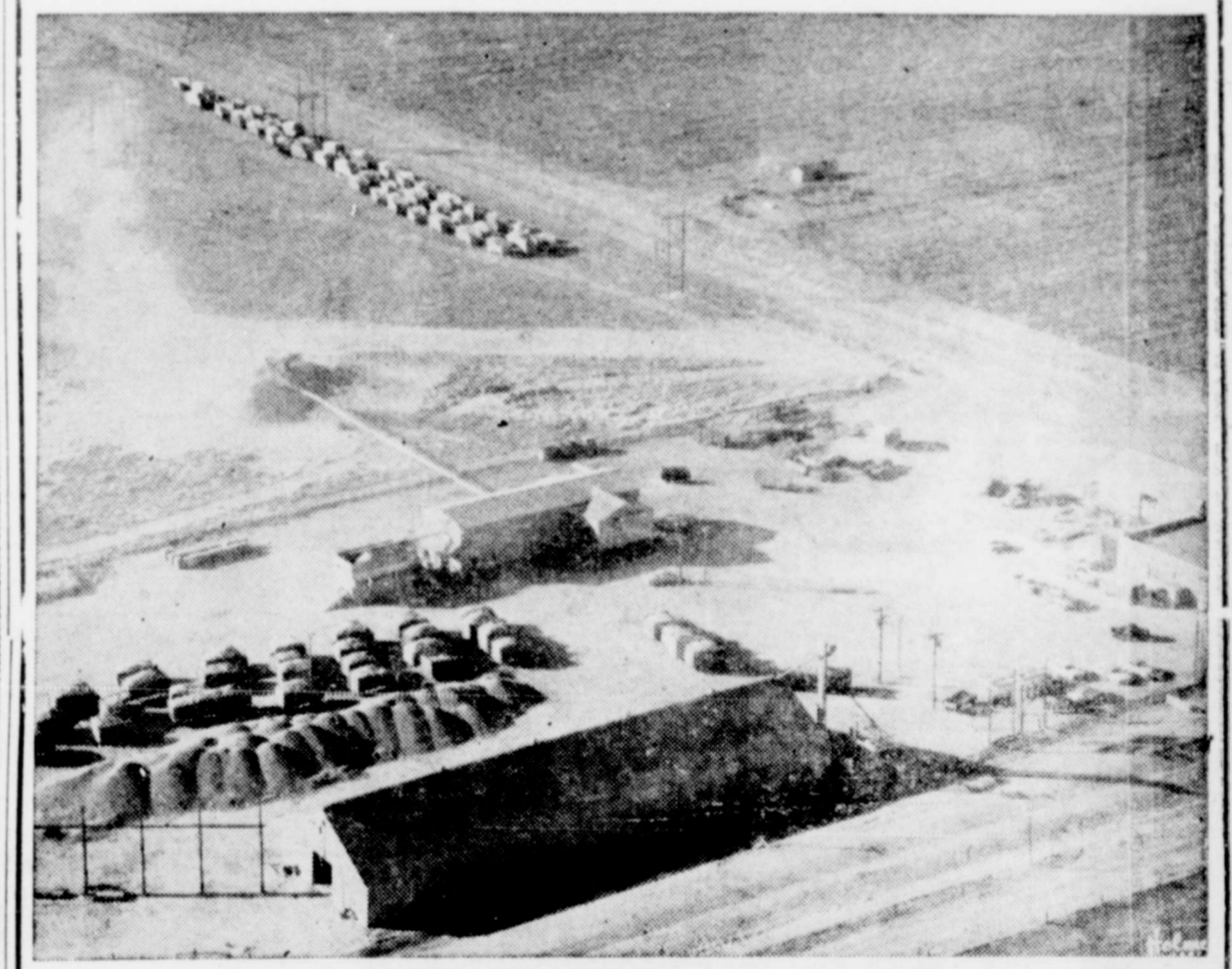


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Golden's Black Angus Sweep Prizes At Floyd County Fair

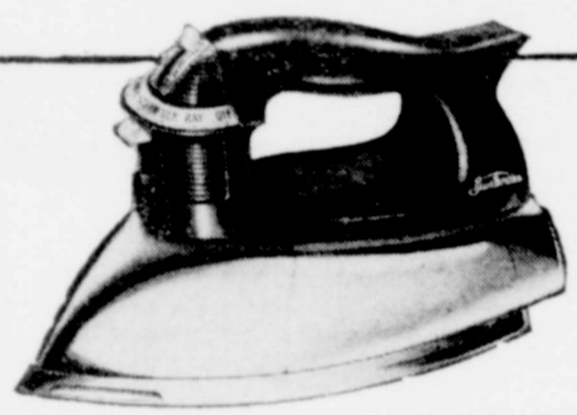
