Bobcats outlast Wildcats in furious battle, 78-68

The Bobcats had to fight one of their toughest district battles in years before outlasting the ballhawking Littlefield Wildcats, 78-68, in a furious game Tuesday night at Littlefield.

Dimmitt led by only four points with a minute left in the game, but Jeremy Warren sandwiched a pair of clutch free throws and a final basket around a layup by James Alexander in the final 55 seconds to give the Bobcats their 10-point victory margin.

The Wildcats served notice early as they jumped to a 13-6 lead on the hot hands of Richard Cano and Sean Parmer, assisted by the ballstealing prowess of big David Mc-Gehee. Cano finished the first period with 10 points as the Wildcats built a 19-16 lead at the buzzer despite the six - point efforts of Dimmitt's Alexander and Warren McDonald.

Furious full-court defense and sharp shooting characterized the second quarter as the Wildcats struck for 27 and the Bobcats 25, with many of the points coming off of steals and forced errors.

Alexander tied the score for the first time at 21 with a steal and drive early in the second, and Dimmitt got its first lead moments later when McDonald connected to make it 25-23.

The Bobcats extended their lead to seven (35-28), but the Wildcats roared back with free throws by Ellis to put the Maroon out front 57 at the end of the third. Jason again, 36-35. The two teams traded 10 points within a minute in a glitzy streak of run-and-gun, then a basket by Mark Ellis, a steal and layup by Cano and a pair of free throws by Parmer completed an eight - point Wildcat run to give Littlefield a 46-39 lead. Alexander sank a follow shot to cut Littlefield's advantage to 46-41 at half-

McDonald and Alexander for Dimmitt and Cano for Littlefield all finished the first half with 16 points each, while Littlefield's Parmer netted 13. As it turned out, that would be all of Cano's points as the Bobcats successfully shut down the 6-ft. senior guard in the second

The Bobcats opened the second half with a vengeance, scoring 13 straight points in the first two minutes to take a 54-46 lead. Alexander and Mat Bradley opened with the first two baskets, Warren followed with a three-pointer, then McDonald scored three straight baskets in quick succession to force the stunned Wildcats into a timeout to regroup. Dimmitt rebounded three missed Littlefield shots, made a steal and forced a turnover on a charging violation to stifle the Wildcats' offense during the run.

The Bobcats never trailed after that, although Littlefield cut their lead to a point, 58-57, at 1:02 of the third. Alexander scored his 24th Mark Ellis and Mark King, a three-point of the night on a driving hiked Dimmitt's record to 20-5, 4-0 pointer by Parmer and a basket by layup to open Dimmitt's lead to 60- in district play.

Long sank a baseline shot at the buzzer that would have hiked Dimmitt's lead to five but the refs ruled it was put up too late.

With Warren and Jim Nelson both in foul trouble, Coach Ken Cleveland called off the Bobcats' full-court press late in the third in favor of a half-court defense. Meanwhile, the Wildcats continued to press the length of the court with fresh troops from their long bench.

The teams traded baskets early in the fourth before Littlefield's Ellis cut the Bobcat lead to one again at 64-63 on a short jumper. But Warren hit a pair of free throws and followed with a layup, then Bradley sank two charity shots to make it 70-63 at the three-minute mark.

Leading 72-65, the Bobcats started using the clock. But a missed free throw, a Littlefield rebound and a three-pointer by Parmer made it a four-point game (72-68) and led to a rash of missed free shots and some furious board battles.

With 55 seconds remaining, Warren sank two free throws, then rebounded a long-shot rim-out by Littlefield and fed it to Alexander, who drove the baseline for two to put Dimmitt up by 76-68. Later, Nelson collected his final rebound of the night and it led to another Warren basket to give the Bobcats their final victory margin, 78-68.

It was only the second loss of the year for Littlefield. The victory

Early leads, defense lift Naz boys, girls over Happy

One of the evening's highlights was a program by Dale Van Horn of Raleigh, N.C., radio personality, musician and composer.

Most of those in the audience didn't realize until Van Horn was well into his music-and-speaking program that he is functionally blind, and

He explained that his father, a partner in the family construction business, was willing to take a job digging ditches in Raleigh so he could attend the Gov. Moorehead School for the Blind there.

Van Horn became the first student ever to go from the Gov. Moorehead School into public school and graduate-"not because of any special ability on my part but because of the love and concern of a

Van Horn went on to graduate from North Carolina State University, and applied for a broadcasting job at virtually all the stations along the eastern seaboard except Station WKIX in Raleigh-"the big momma of all the rock stations in that part of the country, so big that a fledgling need not apply there." His disability kept him from being hired anywhere, he said, until the president of WKIX called him and said, "If you'll take a chance on us, we'll take a chance on you."

Van Horn has been with Station WKIX ever since, and has also built his own production and recording companies, despite a retinal separation that left him totally blind in one eye and a retinal degeneration that now threatens the other eye.

He told of the depression that followed these setbacks, and the inspiration from his wife, daughter and friends that helped him overcome the periods of depression.

"Each of us comes to the table of life with certain gifts and certain limitations," he said. "As God made every snowflake differently, he made every individual differently. Learn to accept and live with your limitations, but give them no more importance than they're worth, and develop your gifts. I've learned that there are worse forms of blindness than mine—the blindness of bigotry, of hate, of ignorance."

Accompanying himself on the piano, Van Horn performed several of the songs he has written, including the hit, "What a Difference You've Made in My Life," which was made famous by his former classmate, Ronnie Millsap.

I don't know when his papers folded—it's been since I moved back to Texas-but it was inevitable since they were founded mainly for political motives.

My Arizona friends told me last summer that Mecham would not have won the governorship if it weren't for the state's "brother-inlaw" election system, in which a candidate can win office in a threeman race without having to face a runoff election. In this case, an independent candidate jumped into the governor's race and pulled enough votes away from the Democrat nominee for Mecham to slip in. Ever since then he's been an embarrassment to the good people of
