# Local Cagers Play Canyon And Silverton

Lockney's Longhorn and Longhornette basketball teams go on the road this week. Friday night they will battle the Canyon teams and next Tuesday they will journey to Silverton.

The local squads play their next home games against Canyon on Tuesday, Dec. 15.

Last Friday night Lockney teams split a doubleheader with Silverton in their home opener. The Longhornettes took a 51-46 win, but the Silverton boys earned a 52-45 victory over the Longhorns.

Terry Clark of the Longhorns and T. D. West of the Owls tied for high point honors with 21 points. Oyama Buchanan netted 13 for the locals. In the girls' contest Lockney had three players hitting in the double figures — Pat Buchanan, 19, Janice Boedecker, 17, Nancy Webster, 15. Colene Lanham and Carolyn Frizzell each sank 16 for the losers.

The Longhorns led 13-6 after one quarter and held a 17-16 halftime margin, but fell behind 36-31 after three periods. In the girls' battle the Longhornettes led at the end of each quarter, 19-17, 28-23, 36-31. Tuesday night Lockney gained twin victories over arch-rival Floydada in the local gym. The Longhorns turned in probably their best performance in downing the Whirlwind quintet, 50-37. The Longhornettes also turned in a good showing in earning a 41-36 win.

Lockney's boys led 10-9 after the first quarter and held a 23-20 halftime margin. In the third stanza the 'Horns really turned on the steam and held a commanding 37-26 edge going into the final period. Oyama Buchanan paced the locals with 16 points and Terry Clark and Doyle Freeman each added 13.

Floydada's girls led 9-7 after the first quarter, but the Longhornettes surged ahead 26-14 at the intermission and upped the count to 39-23 after three quarters. Janice Boedecker sank 29 points for the winners. For Floydada Johnson had 16 points.

Floydada's boys downed the Silverton Owls by several points last week and Silverton won over Lockney. Then the improving 'Horns gained the win over the Whirlwinds. The local teams are developing well and prospects point to a good season.

The Lockney-Floydada contests were scheduled for Tuesday night in Floydada but due to a conflict the games were changed to Lockney on Monday night. The games slated here January 12 will be played in Floydada.

# FFA Team Will Enter Area Contest

The Junior Farm Skill Demonstration team from the Lockney Future Farmers of America chapter will enter the area FFA contests at Plainview Saturday of this week by virtue of having won the district contest conducted two weeks ago. The team is composed of Jerry Vernon, Mike Nance and Paul Ballard. They are coached by Jerry Swartz, assistant agriculture teacher in Lockney High.

Some 25 FFA members accompanied by M. L. Brewer, FFA advisor and Mr. Swartz, attended the district contests. Teams were entered in the Senior Farm Skill Demonstration contest, Junior and Senior Chapter conducting contest, and the FFA Quiz contest.

# County Gets 4% Cut In Cotton Acreage In 1960

Floyd County's 1960 cotton acreage has been cut four per cent, according to information from the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. The 1960 acreage allotment for the county is 91,100 acres compared to 94,896 in 1959.

ASC Office Manager T. J. Hutchins said Wednesday that individual cotton acreage allotments would be mailed from his office Friday of this week. He said that most all farmers would receive a straight four per cent cut in their acreage. Only exceptions are those farmers who farm less than 160 acres of land. The county ASC committee has given them some of the hardship acres assigned to the county thus making their acreage cut run something less than four per cent.

The cause of the cut in acreage came from moving the five year base period to the years 1954 through 1958. Dropping of the 1953 year, when acreage restrictions were not in force, lowered the five year average considerably.

Hale, Floyd and Parmer counties on the High Plains all received 96 per cent of this year's acreage. Other counties received high percentages with Lamb County getting 98.19 per cent of this year's acreage.

The farmer will still have the choice of the "A" or "B" acreage plan in 1960, Mr. Hutchins said. Choice "A" will be the regular cotton allotment with price supports at not less than 75 per cent of parity. Choice "B" will be a 40 per cent larger acreage allotment with price supports at not less than 60 per cent of parity.

Farmers will vote on the 1960 marketing quotas on December 15. The quotas must be approved by two-thirds majority if they are to be in force. Nine voting boxes will be set up in the county for the election. The boxes will be in the following communities: Dougherty, Cedar Hill, Lone Star, South Plains, Aiken, Lockney (Beacon Office), Barwise, McCoy, Floydada (ASC office).

# Gas Explosion Damages Gin

Damages in excess of \$30,000 was the estimate by gin officials as the result of an explosion in one of the Paymaster gin plants at Aiken Tuesday night of last week. One man received painful but not serious injuries in the accident.

The plant has been shut down for the season and will not be repaired until next year, according to Manager John Powell. The other plant at Aiken will finish this year's crop, he said.

An automatic safety valve which failed to shut off the gas in the dryer when the flame went out caused the explosion, Powell said. The explosion ripped the dryer, burr machine and cleaner all, damaged the entire building and other machinery.

Injured in the explosion was William H. Bailey, a ginner at the plant. He suffered three broken bones in his back and a broken right arm. He is under treatment at Plainview Hospital where he is reported to be doing fine now.

# Fire Dept. Elects Officers For 1960

# Dr. Hewitt Is Seriously Ill

Dr. A. E. Hewitt remains seriously ill in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. He underwent surgery again last week and Sunday night his condition was critical for several hours. However he was reported to be resting better Tuesday night.

# School Principal In Local Hospital

C. H. Cheves, junior high school principal, is in Lockney General Hospital where he is being treated for an abscess on his lung and complications. He became ill last Thursday morning and was rushed to the local hospital. His illness was first thought to be a heart attack but physicians have ruled that out. He is not responding to treatment as fast as hoped for, Mrs. Cheves said Wednesday.

# Mitchell Attends Chester White Meet In Chicago

Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Mitchell and son, David, left Saturday by train for Chicago where Mr. Mitchell will attend the annual membership meeting of the Chester White Record Association. He is a director of the association, the only one in the Southwest.

Meetings were scheduled for Monday and Tuesday of this week with the annual banquet set for Monday evening. Mitchell is a Chester White breeder and heads the Chester White organization in Texas.

# Highway Dept. Gives Floyd Road Projects

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$132,300 in Floyd County in its 1959-1960 Farm-to-Market road program, it was announced this week. This will include construction of 4.2 miles of Farm-to-Market road and seal coat on approximately 40 miles of existing paved road.

The new road construction will be in southwest Floyd County, taking off from Farm Road No. 54 at Allman, and going north 4.2 miles to Farm Road 78 in the vicinity of the Harmony Community Center. The cost of this construction will be \$76,000. This north-south construction will connect two existing east-and-west paved roads.

Work will begin on the road as soon as final planning is completed and the right-of-way secured, according to District Engineer O. L. Crain. Resident Engineer Sam Fowler will be in charge of the work.

The improvement program includes a seal coat on five different sections of farm-to-market road and the widening of a short section of road within the Floydada city limits. Following are the roads which will receive a seal coat:

- FM No. 2301, from FM 788 south to U. S. 70 at Aiken, 8.1 miles, cost \$7,000.
- FM 598, from FM 97 at Lockney north to FM 598 spur, 10.3 miles, cost \$9,000.
- FM 598 spur, 10.3 miles north of Lockney, east to Lone Star, 1 mile, \$1,000.
- FM 97, from State Highway 207 east to Cedar Hill, 6.2 miles, \$5,300.
- FM 784, from Harmony school, east, north and east to west city limits of Floydada, 14.1 miles, \$13,000.

In Floydada the Highway Department will widen 3 of a mile of street on FM 784 from the west city limits east to First Street. Cost of this project will be \$21,000.

H. Bruce Bryan, district maintenance engineer, will be in charge of this type of work.

# Occupants Narrowly Escape In Fire

Mr. and Mrs. Camilo Gonzales and three children narrowly escaped injury late last Wednesday night when fire completely destroyed the farm house they occupied on the Leslie Ferguson farm five miles north of Lockney. The Gonzales family was asleep and didn't discover the fire until the house was ablaze. They saved only a very few articles of clothing.

The fire was believed to have started in the bathroom but the origin is unknown. It was discovered about 11:30 p.m. The Lockney Volunteer Fire Department sent a truck to the fire but the house was too far gone to save any part of it. No outbuildings were burned.

The frame house had five rooms and a bath. It was the home place of the "Bud" Cooper family years ago but Ferguson had owned the farm for about 10 years. He had added a big living room to the house only three or four years ago. The loss was only partially covered by insurance.

The Lockney Fire Department has been busy the last week or ten days answering fire alarms to gins or to extinguish grass fires. No losses of any consequence have resulted from any of these fires, according to Fire Chief Audvie Barnett. The Department answered three calls in one day on Monday of this week.

## EDITORIAL

A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you, and I will take the stony heart out of your flesh.—Ezekiel 36:26.

**AT THE RISK** of being called a pessimist, among other things, we are wondering if the socialistic trend which has gripped this country for the past 30 years, is not contributing greatly to a moral and spiritual breakdown of the people of our nation. Since socialism rewards laziness, puts a premium on the inability of one to provide for his own needs, and actually encourages lack of initiative, it seems to us that all this business of the government taking care of us from the cradle to the grave takes from those who benefit from it a sense of responsibility not only to themselves, their families, their state and nation but even to God Himself. A lack of a sense of responsibility naturally is followed by a breakdown in moral standards and conduct.

**ONE ATTITUDE** that bothers us is the one that says, "Anything is all right so long as I get my part." In other words some are practicing the principle that any kind of corruption, dishonesty or even abuse of fellowmen is all right so

long as they get their share of the loot, the profit or whatever may come from the practice. Some labor unions, notably the Teamsters Union, live by this principle. Protected by laws that are definitely one-sided in many points, the Unions are able to do just about as they wish with the tremendous funds they accumulate as well as with the lives of their individual members. But labor unions are not the only ones who live by this rule. Some other organizations, businesses, and even people have the same attitude. As one fellow said the other day, their only concern is the immediate dollar. They are not concerned with principles, patriotism, spiritual affairs or anything else of this world. The United States of America was not founded nor was it built on this kind of attitude. Neither can it continue to exist if its citizens adopt the attitude. We need to get back to the principles of conduct and decency that were practiced by our fathers and grandfathers.

**THE LOCKNEY** community has a right to be extra proud of one of its former citizens. This is called to our attention by an article in a recent issue of The New Yorker, a nationally circulated news magazine. The magazine, in its column, The Talk of The Town, mentions the work of Dr. W. Maurice Ewing, who deals in the study of oceanography. In fact Dr. Ewing is among the leading authorities on the oceans, the shape and structure of ocean basins, and the stratigraphy of the deep sea floor. He is now connected with Lamont Geological Observatory. Dr. Ewing graduated from Lockney High School in the early twenties, as we remember our information, and went to Rice Institute. He has several degrees. He is a relative of Mrs. Buck Sams, Miss Juanita Thompson and other Lockney folk.

**TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:** Retired taxpayers have been given a lot of extra tax deductions by Congress. It is very important that taxpayers with retired income read their instructions. Here are some of the benefits:

1. An extra personal exemption for the taxpayer over 65. This can mean two extra exemptions — the husband and the wife.
2. Up to \$240 retirement income credit from the taxpayer. This is a reduction in the amount of taxes you pay. You may be due this credit for both husband and wife. The community property law gives double credit in some cases or it can make you lose your credit in other cases.

### PROGRESS AND CHERRY TREES

Generally the two kinds of freedom are at odds. The more "freedom from" you have the less "freedom to" you have. The more "freedom from" crop failure the less "freedom to" plant what and how much you personally desire to plant. The more "freedom from" what government censors consider obscene literature, the less "freedom to" express one's opinions. The more "freedom from" underprivileged schools the less "freedom to" regulate the school in your district the way you as a taxpayer see fit. The more "freedom from" economic insecurity the less "freedom to" indulge in free enterprise, etc.

When Patrick Henry said, "Give me liberty or give me death," I doubt that he had in mind the guaranteed annual wage.

Colonists made their break for the "freedom to." On the other hand Communism's main selling point is a "freedom from." I think it's about time we decided which way we want to go. If we want the total "freedom from" route, then there's no use trying to out-nassie Russia — we might as well join 'em and forget about the space race, etc. In fact, Karl Marx predicted our "freedom from" advocates would deliver us into Commie hands without a shot being fired.

Now I am aware, as my liberal friends would hasten to point out, that times have changed since George Washington did away with the cherry tree, and there is a need for more government activity

## Long Ago In Lockney

Items of interest from the files of The Lockney Beacon.

### December 5, 1929

E. R. Harris is the first candidate to announce for the office of Commissioner of Precinct Two in Floyd County.





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

**Postmaster Gives Suggestions On Xmas Mailing**

Postmaster Jeffie Griffith this week announced her annual "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, and outlined plans for insuring delivery of all Christmas gifts and cards by Christmas Eve.

"Public cooperation," she said, "has been a key factor in moving Christmas mail on time in recent years, and I am hopeful that it will be even better this year."

The Postmaster urged patrons of the Lockney post office to start mailing Christmas packages now. Packages to distant places especially should be mailed as early as possible. "This is also the week to prepare and mail your out-of-town Christmas cards," she said.

Mrs. Griffith gave these pointers on the proper mailing of packages. "Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy crown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with a strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents.

"If your article is of unusual size or bulk, check with the post office because there are restrictions on size and weight.

"It is also important to make sure that your package bears the correct mailing address and your return address. If you are sending your package to a large city be sure to include the addressee's zone number. Including the zone number in the address always will facilitate delivery in larger cities. Zone numbers also should be used on Christmas cards and other mail to cities with postal zones.

"The address should be on the top of the package, and it should be carefully written or lettered. A piece of transparent cellophane tape placed over the address will usually prevent defacing in transit. It is also a good idea," Mrs. Griffith said, "to include the address inside the package in case the outside address should become defaced.

"If you use Christmas stickers or seals, place them where they will not conflict with the address. Then, before you drop the package in the mail, be sure you have firmly affixed the proper postage."

The Postmaster reminded that the entire Christmas mailing period is primarily a battle against time. A delay now will contribute to a serious pile-up, particularly in the larger post offices, as the holiday approaches.

All packages going to distant cities should be in the post office by December 10. Other mail should be sent on its way as soon as possible, and all local mail should be in the post office no more than a week or ten days later. This kind of cooperation would mean that all Christmas mail would be delivered on or before Christmas Eve, the Postmaster explained.

**TURKEY GRAVY**  
Some homemakers have problems when it comes to making creamy, smooth, turkey gravy. To make good gravy, be careful not to use too much fat.

Begin the process by skimming the fat from the roasting drippings. Put 1 tablespoon of turkey fat in a pan. Blend in 1 1/2 tablespoons flour and add 1 cup liquid (juice from pan, broth, water). Cook gently until thickened. Season to taste and add about 2 tablespoons chopped cooked giblets.

**GOOD STUDY LAMPS AID TO HOMEWORK**  
Youngsters need a well lighted, cheerful place to study and read. A good desk lamp, properly placed, goes far in preventing eye strain and reducing fatigue.

A table lamp, wall lamp, or pair of wall lamps can do the job. The important thing is to be sure the lamp is equipped with a glass or plastic reflector bowl under the shade, or with a wide harp to accommodate an indirect type bulb. Both these types of under-shade construction give a combination of upward and downward light that reduces the eye irritating difference in brightness between the desk top and the rest of the room. For long periods of desk work, it is more desirable to have a lamp with glass or plastic reflector or diffusing bowl.

Height of the lamp from the desk is very important, too. A lamp that is too short gives such a small spread of light that part of the desk is left in dark. A lamp that is too tall places the bottom of the shade above eye level with a resulting brightness that is uncomfortable. Most people find that a height of about 15 inches between the desk top and bottom of the lamp shade is about right.

The third important factor is placement of the lamp on the desk. It should be placed on the side of the desk opposite the writing hand. If twin lamps are used, such as two wall lamps, mount them with the center of the shades about 30 inches apart.

As for the amount of light, 150 watts is the minimum recommended for a wall or table lamp. A pair of wall lamps should have a minimum of 100 watts each.

Lastly, a light colored desk with a dull finish is the most comfortable when working under a lamp. If such a surface is not available a light colored desk blotter will help in eliminating reflections.

## Home Making Hints

### SWEET POTATOES

There are plenty of nice sweet potatoes on the market. Use them often for they add color, distinctive flavor, and nutrition to your meals.

Sweet potatoes of the soft fleshed orange-yellow varieties have an exceptionally high vitamin A value. An average size sweet potato supplies more than twice the amount of vitamin A an adult needs daily. They are also a good source of vitamin C.

Sweet potatoes are delicious baked whole in the oven, mashed in the peeling by squeezing, or served with butter. Or you may like to try a casserole or sugared sweet potato recipe. Here is a little different recipe you may like:

**Sweet Potato Banana Balls**  
Cook 2 pounds sweet potatoes

until soft. Remove skins and mash. Add 1 tablespoon oil, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 beaten egg. Mix well. Shape into eight balls and mash around 1/4" chunks of banana (takes 2 bananas). Roll in cups crushed cornflakes. Bake on lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for minutes. Serves eight.

### Sen. Humphrey Will Speak At Farmers Meeting

Denton. — Senator Hubert H. Humphrey, the most outspoken exponent of higher incomes for family farmers in the United States Senate is expected to vigorously attack the legislation proposed this week by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson which he will present to the next session of the Congress.

Senator Humphrey will attract many hundreds of listeners when he makes the principal address at the 56th Annual Texas Farmers Union Convention in Fort Worth, Texas, on December 4th.

In addition to literally tearing to shreds the program advocated by Ezra Benson, Senator Humphrey is expected to give his own proposals for a farm program which was introduced in the last session of the Congress and which was vetoed by President Eisenhower. Humphrey will unveil his program for Texas Farmers Union members and others attending the convention. His farm program proposal will include a national marketing quota program for all commodities with such quotas to be voted upon by all farmers in a nationwide referendum. If two-thirds of the farmers vote "yes" on a marketing quota, the program will be presented to the next Congress and if the Congress does not reject the plan within sixty days, the marketing quota becomes law.

In Senator Humphrey's words, "This places the responsibilities for program planning right on the people who are best able to know what is needed — the farmers themselves." According to Senator Humphrey, such a program would give the Secretary of Agriculture a group "tool kit" of programs to choose from, including equalization payments to farmers, marketing orders and agreements, marketing loans and direct purchases, diversion programs, incentive payment programs, marketing premium payments (singly or in combination) with the only limitation on the Secretary of Agriculture being that direct payments to individual farmers would be limited to \$5,000 a year and crop loan would be limited to \$25,000.

Humphrey has further stated that every constructive program proposal made to Congress for the past six years has faced the opposition of Mr. Benson or has been vetoed by the President. "This farm proposal offers hope as well as give a blueprint for immediate and long-term solution," he said.

### VEGETABLE TRANSPLANTS OF BEST QUALITY RECOMMENDED

College Station. — Better quality transplants could increase the income of Texas vegetable growers by thousands of dollars each year. Healthy, stocky, disease-free transplants are essential for maximum yield and quality of certain crops.

Growing good transplants is an art, requiring special skills and knowledge. An adequate plant-growing structure is considered one of the most essential items for successful transplants, according to Clyde Singletery, extension horticulturist.


The low-cost plastic greenhouse is superior in many respects to hundreds of cold frames since the temperature and ventilation can be controlled more easily, accurately and economically. Also, caring for transplants is much easier for the grower when he uses a plastic greenhouse.

"Growing Vegetable Transplants" is the title of a new extension leaflet which discusses the many phases of growing good transplants. Soils, selecting the seed, planting and caring for transplants, are a few of the many topics covered in this leaflet.

Another interesting feature is a list of 10 pointers for growing healthy, stocky plants. Among the pointers are: purchase the best seed possible as cheap seed are expensive in the long run; maintain proper soil moisture and temperature while plants are growing; and grow a third more plants than you will need and select only the best plants for field setting.

Your local county agent has copies of this leaflet. Also, he has MP-341, "Plastic Greenhouses for Growing Vegetables," which gives instructions for building a plastic greenhouse.

### 1954 Farm Census Figures Given

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, now under way in Floyd County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following facts:

The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$28,357,872.

The value of all crops sold was \$26,855,446 and included \$26,754,867 for field crops, \$64,420 for vegetables, \$659 for fruits and nuts, and \$35,500 for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,502,426 and included \$74,510 for dairy products, \$70,653 for poultry and poultry products and \$1,357,263 for livestock and livestock products.



## Boats Must Be Registered By March 1, 1960

Details of the requirements for motorboat owners to register their boats and have a registration number have been received by County Assessor-Collector T. T. Hamilton from the State Highway Department.

In addition to the safety requirements the motor boat owner must attach the registration number of his boat to each side of the bow of his boat. The deadline for meeting the requirements of this new statute is March 1, 1960, but the highway department is anxious to register as many motorboats as possible at an early date so as to avoid a backlog of applications and possible delay immediately before the deadline.

Motorboats of 10 horsepower and less are not required to display a number; however, it is pointed out in the communication from Highway Engineer D. C. Greer that if the small boat owner desires a number he may have it but will be required to pay a fee depending on the class of motorboat involved. The minimum fee is \$1 for three years. This is for Class A boats less than 16 feet in length.

Class (1) boats 16 feet but less than 26 feet will pay a fee of \$5 for three years;

Class (2) boats, 26 feet but less than 40 feet will pay a fee of \$10 for three years, and

Class (3) boats, 40 feet and over will be charged a fee of \$12.50 for three years.

The assessor-collector was forwarded a small supply of applications for motorboat registration and more are avail-

able from the highway department. Hamilton said he would pass the information along to motorboat owners with whom he comes in contact.

The boat owner fills out the blank and sends it along with the proper fee to the Texas Highway Department, Austin, Texas.

When the new law goes into effect title to motorboats will be transferred by registration number in similar manner to automobiles.
