After a lengthy session Wednesday morning, the trustees of Lockney Independent School District voted 4 to 2 in favor of adding on to the present school plant rather than building on a new site purchased some three years ago in West Lockney.

Building plans have been under consideration by the board for more than a year with the big decision being the location of the new building.

The board plans to construct a one-story homemaking and science building attached to the north side of the present two-story high school building. Sketches of the proposed building have been made and blue prints will be prepared as soon as possible. Supt. H. H. Nicholas said that the board hoped to have the building ready for use by the starting of school in September of 1960. Architects for the school board are Stiles, Roberts and Messersmith of Lubbock. Stiles attended the Wednesday morning board meeting.

The board plans no bond issue, Mr. Nicholas said. They hope to have a \$50,000 surplus from this year's tax money and can borrow another \$50,000 on next year's tax funds. The superintendent said that they did not know they could build what they wanted for \$100,000 but hope to do it for something near that amount. The board has been working on the plan to avoid the issuance of bonds all the year.

The new building will release four class rooms in the present high school building. By utilizing some of those rooms for junior high classes, the room situation can be relieved in all the schools, Mr. Nicholas said. Mr. Nicholas said that percentage of taxes collected stood at a higher point this year than last despite an increase in taxes during the year.

EDITORIAL

This poor man cried and the Lord heard him and saved him out of all his troubles.—Psalm 34:6.

SUNDAY, December 13, has been designated by Governor Price Daniel as "Safety Sunday" in Texas and it signals the opening of the Christmas-New Year holiday traffic safety campaign throughout the state. The Governor urges each citizen to awake to the realization that negligence at the wheel of an automobile is a serious and sometimes tragic matter and that this realization be stamped on the conscience and mind of every driver. "Drive carefully" is a slogan we all could use.

WHILE PRESIDENT Eisenhower is in Spain we wonder if it wouldn't be proper to discuss with Dictator Franco the matter of personal rights and freedom for individuals in the matter of worship. Under a Spanish law passed in 1945 and an agreement between the Vatican and the Spanish government made in 1953, no "public manifestation" of any non-Catholic religion is permitted in Spain and Franco's police, acting in cooperation with the Roman Catholic Church has the power to close any Protestant church without trial.

This they have done on numerous occasions, imprisoning those who attempted to worship and prosecuting them in other ways. Yet this nation has given Spain more than one billion dollars in "foreign aid" during the past several years. Seems to us the "helping" of a nation in some measures approves or condones its practices.

THIS PRACTICE in Spain should serve as a warning to the people of the United States as to the practices and purposes of the Vatican in any country where they get in power. There are those who say "it can't happen in America," but it can and will if indifference continues to grow. "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty."

TELEVISION has cut into the advertising revenue of newspapers generally over the past several years, with some big manufacturers switching most of their advertising from newspapers to TV. Pointing to the fact that newspapers are still the most dependable and effective medium is the experience of American Motors last year. This firm makes the Rambler auto and their sales during 1958 rose 80 percent above the previous year. American Motors spent more than two-thirds of their advertising money with newspapers and not one penny on television during the year. TV nor radio will ever take the place of newspaper advertising because the printed word is always available at your convenience. It may lay around the house three days before you have time to read it but when you want it there it is. Neither can TV or radio give the details of the news as newspapers do. Newspapers are the only medium which can possibly give "complete coverage" as far as news is concerned.

HERE'S HOW the average consumer dollar was spent last year, according to the Department of Commerce: Housing 13 per cent; food, beverages and tobacco 29 per cent; clothing 8 per cent; household operation 6 per cent; furnishings and household equipment 6 per cent; automobiles and parts, gas and oil, 9 per cent; transportation 3 per cent; miscellaneous 26 per cent.

TO COOK OR not to cook smoked ham is a question that has puzzled many a housewife, observes the American Meat Institute. So the Institute urges that packers throughout the nation label their cured and smoked hams in one of two ways either as "fully-cooked" or as "cook-before-eating."

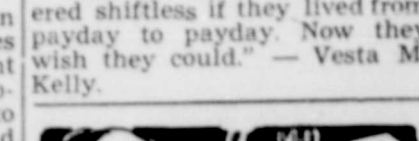
LET THE POLL TAX ALONE

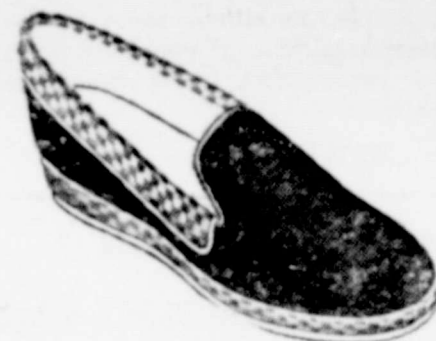

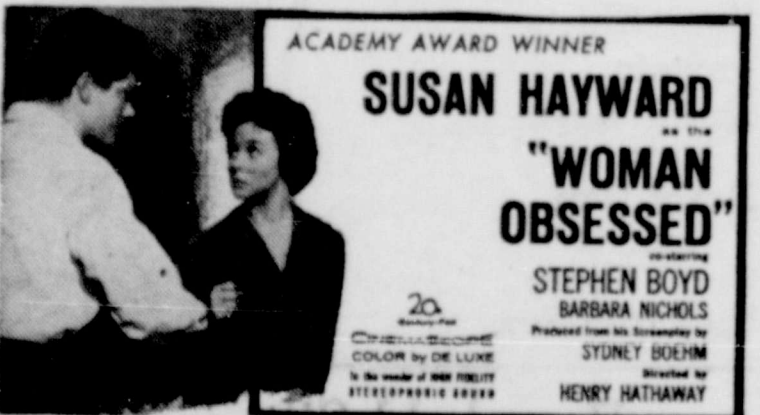

Cotton Burrs And Barnyard Manure

Cotton burrs applied at the rate of 2, 4 and 6 tons per acre has produced lint yield increases of 105, 160, 215 pounds of lint per acre. Thirty to 60 pounds of nitrogen has given good increase applied with cotton burrs and should be used the first 2 years that burrs are applied.

Barnyard manure applied at 6, 11 and 15 tons per acre has produced yield increases of lint 72, 103, and 108 pounds respectively. Manure should be compared with inorganic fertilizers.

These are two practices that will help build the water holding capacity of the soil, prevent soil baking and crusting.

Soybeans

A new variety of soybeans has been released called Hill. This variety recommended for the High Plains. It is a good yielder, early maturing and resistant to lodging and shattering of pods. Yields are comparable with Lee, and is about 2 weeks earlier than Lee. Seed will be available for small acreages in 1960. If you grow soybeans you might be interested in growing some of the Hill variety.

State Collects \$13,155 Fines On Game Laws

Austin — More than 300 Texas hunters paid fines last month for violation of game laws, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. In all 461 persons were arrested for hunting and fishing violations. They paid \$13,115.35 in fines and costs. Four served jail terms.

Despite warnings about hunting with unplugged guns, 49 paid fines for carrying shotguns with more than three-shot capacity. Next on the list 46 paid fines for killing too many doves.

Failure to have hunting and fishing licenses brought fines for 98 persons. There were 39 arrests of automobile hunters and seven for headlighting game animals. Quail shooters also got in too big a hurry and 37 killed them out of season.

There were a number of violators on killing doe deer, selling game animals and killing deer out of season.

And there were seven persons who tried out their luck at "telephoning fish" and got caught.

HOW TO REMOVE CANDLE WAX STAINS

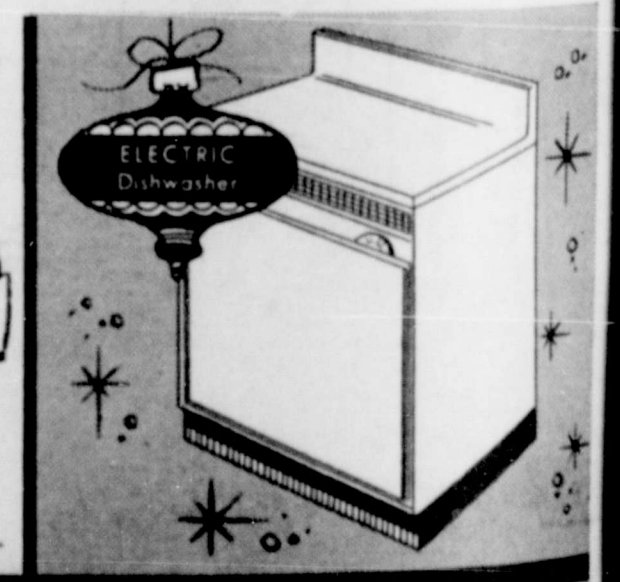

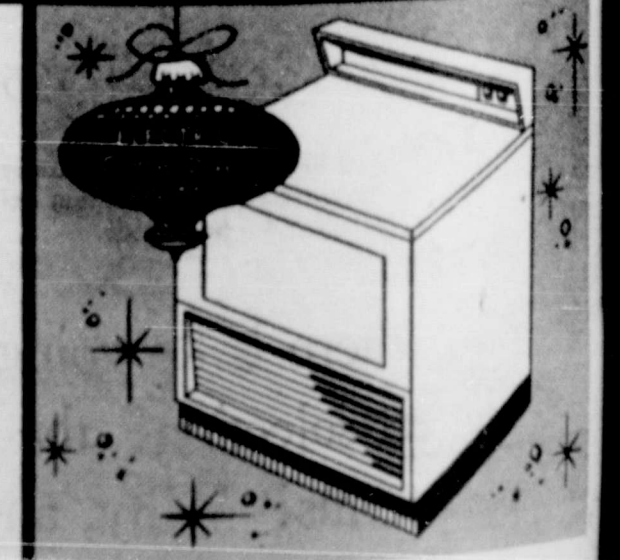

Early May Corn Yields Better

Corn planted early in May, 1959, produced higher yields than later plantings in the date of planting tests at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas.

Three varieties of yellow corn were planted April 17, May 1, May 15 and May 21 in this test. Delbert Langford, Assistant Agronomist at the Foundation, reported this week. Yellow varieties used in the date of planting tests included Northrup King K76, Asgrow 104, and Texas 30. All three varieties had their best yields on the May 1st plantings: Texas 30, 95.7 bu.; Asgrow, 86.4 bu.; and Northrup King K76, 84.9 bu.

Thirty-eight varieties of corn were compared in variety trials at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1959. This test included thirty-one yellow and seven white varieties planted on May 1. The highest yielding yellow hybrids were: Pfister Associated Growers (PAG) 454, 83.5 bu.; Pioneer 30A9, 79.6 bu.; Texas 26, 79.1 bu.; Funks G 711 AA, 79.0 bu.; and Texas 30, 77.4 bu. The leading white varieties were: Asgrow 105W, 86.2 bu.; Texas 17W, 77.0 bu.; and Pfister Associated Growers (PAG) 633 W, 74.6 bu.

Local Farmers Are Escorts For Sen. Humphrey

Two local farmers, members of the Floyd County Farmers Union, were given the honor of escorting Senator Hubert Humphrey from the plane at Love Field, Dallas, to the Texas Hotel, where the state Farmers Union convention was being held Friday of last week.

Humphrey, senator from Minnesota and an outstanding liberal, was the main speaker at the convention.

Escorting the senator were Conrad Henderson and Bob Jarrett, both of whom have been active members of the local Farmers Union since it was organized. Acting upon instructions from State President Alex Dickie, the two Lockney men took the Farmers Union vehicles to Love Field where the Senator and his party were to land and transport them back to the convention headquarters, getting their pictures made with the Senator by local newsmen in the process.

Humphrey has been among the leaders in the national Senate in seeking beneficial

farm legislation and was the author of a bill which passed the Congress last year but was vetoed by the President. Humphrey, in speaking to the Farmers Union members, said that the American farmer is "today's forgotten man," and laid out a "charter of hope for agriculture," consisting of four points as follows:

1. Determination of a fair price for farm commodities and a fair income standard for farmers.

2. Production to be determined by what is needed to satisfy the true needs for the American people, the commercial export market necessary reserves, and foreign policy purposes.

3. An agricultural resources conservation program.

4. Employment goals which would envisage a farm population, and especially farm families, which have adequate opportunity to be fully and usefully employed, along with proper credit facilities.

CARTHELS TELL OF ENJOYABLE TRIP TO GERMANY, ENGLAND

(Editor's note: Mr. and Mrs. John T. Carthel and daughter, Jenis, returned on November 29th from a months trip to Germany and other points in Europe. In Germany they visited their daughter and her family, Lt. and Mrs. Charles E. Wilson and the three-year-old daughter, Lesa. At the request of The Beacon editor, Mrs. Carthel has written here a brief account of the trip, telling of some of the most interesting places visited.)

Our trip to Europe was a rich experience for each of us. The man idea behind our decision to go and the best part of the trip was our visit with our daughter and son-in-law and granddaughter, who are with the air force in Germany. It was our first trip by commercial

airliner, our first jet plane ride, and our first journey abroad. The Jet Clipper we boarded at New York gave us and about two hundred other passengers a "smooth as silk" ride to London in five and one half hours, at an altitude of 29,000 feet. There were eleven babies and several other children among the passengers.

We made two trips with the Wilsons in their new Mercedes car, the first north from Hahn A.F.B. thru western Germany and Holland, and back thru Belgium and Luxembourg, traveling in four countries the day we returned to Hahn. Some highlights of that trip were: an open market in Bonn where many things were sold, such as cheese, fish, clothing and flowers; a cathedral and immense

Bahnhof (railway station) at Dusseldorf, the city where we spent our first night in a German hotel; the cheese market in Gouda where many kinds of cheese, fruits, vegetables, clothing, flowers and souvenirs were sold; The Hague, where we stayed in a comfortable motel, one of very few in Europe, and the neat homes there, always with lace trimmed curtains and flowers in the windows; the many people of all ages riding bicycles in Holland; our guided tour of canals in Amsterdam in a glassed in boat; the houseboats and big ocean going vessels and floating dry docks; the colorful costumes of the natives of Bolendam along the Zuider Zee; our visit in the cheese factory at Edam; the Delft china place at Delft; the Maas Tunnel which carries traffic under the largest canal in Rotterdam, and their spectacular lighted street decorations; our visit in a Dutch home in a Dutch windmill at Kinderdijk; the "Grosse" (big) market and famous buildings and statues at Antwerp; the Atomium and Brussels Lace Manufactory in Brussels; the Black Gate in Trier.

We rested a few days and went on another trip, south thru Bavaria, Austria, Switzerland and back thru western Germany to Hahn. Cities we visited on that trip were: Frankfurt, Nuremberg, Rothenberg, (an old walled city) Munich, Oberammergau, Salzburg, Berchtesgaden, Garmisch, St. Moritz, Chur, Zurich, and Basel in Switzerland; Freiburg, Baden Baden, Karlsruhe, and Heidelberg in Germany. Many important things in history took place in some of these cities.

On our return home from Germany, we spent two days in Paris. The Carons who visited our farm in October entertained us royally in Paris, taking us out to dinner at Elysees Matignon helping us with our shopping, and escorting us to see the sights in the city. We also made a scheduled guided tour out to Versailles Palace and a tour of modern Paris.

We saw many things of interest during our two days stopover in London. Among them were the crown jewels including "The Sun of India," a 430 carat diamond set in the handle of a sword, many jeweled crowns, rings, etc., which we saw in the Tower of London. There we saw the block and sword used for beheading prisoners, coats of armor for men and for horses, and many weapons of war, in the museum in the Tower of London. On our tour, we also visited Dickens' Old Curiosity Shop and saw many antiques in the quaint old shop. On a morning tour, we visited Victoria and Albert Museum and Westminster Abbey and witnessed the Changing of the Guards cere-

mony at Buckingham Palace. The afternoon of our last day in London we spent making a visit to an English girls high school out in Croydon, where Linda Jefferies, Janis' pen pal, goes to school. Linda showed us their buildings, the grounds, their new library, new chemistry labs. Then we were guests of her House Mistress (superintendent) at a real English Tea in her office. They were very cordial, allowed us to take pictures, and Linda walked with us to the station where we took the electric train back to London. We were there in seventeen minutes. We had spent one and one-half hours riding out there in the top of a two story bus, to view the scenery.

During our one day stopover in Ireland we took a tour by private car around Limerick, visited a hydro-electric plant and watched a barge loaded with beer come down the canal thru the locks. We learned a little about life in Ireland from our jovial and interesting guide who also drove the car. Ireland is a beautiful little country.

We were glad it was time to go home, tho we had enjoyed many interesting and educational features of our trip. Our plane took off from Shannon Airport at 6 a.m. Shannon time, or 1 a.m. Eastern Standard Time, and landed in Boston at 2 p.m. a little late because of stiff headwinds, then on to New York, landing at 4 p.m., fifteen hours after leaving Shannon. It was dark by the time we rode in a taxi thru heavy traffic from Idlewild Airport to our hotel downtown.

We made two interesting tours in New York the one whole day we were there. At one stop, we walked down thru China Town, visited a Chinese Temple and bought a few souvenirs. The tours were just a quick look around the city, with no time to stop for visits in museums and other places of interest. We stopped at one place on the afternoon tour — the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, which is unbelievably large, and has a beautiful rose window of immense size and many other stained glass windows. After our return to the downtown area, we visited several of the large department stores. That night we went on a conducted tour of radio and television facilities at Radio City.

The trip home on Sunday afternoon was quite delightful and we were excited as we came in sight of the lights of Amarillo about 11 p.m., and when our plane landed, we found kinsmen and friends there to meet us, the Leonards thru to meet us, the Leonards of Midland, the John Lee Carthels of Lockney and the Kenneth Schultzs of Amarillo. We found people everywhere we went were friendly and helpful, as one of our New York guides told us, "If you want to know how to go somewhere, just ask anyone. If he doesn't know, he will tell you wrong, rather than tell you he does not know." There were very few times we were given misleading directions.

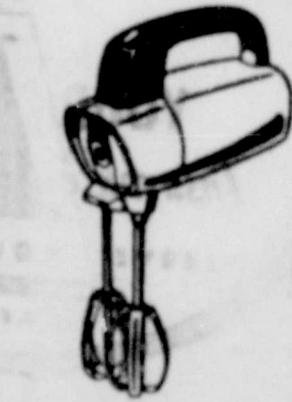

Postmaster Urges Christmas Mail Be Sent Immediately

"The time has passed to talk about 'Mailing Early for Christmas,'" Postmaster Jeffrie Griffith said this week, "but our patrons can still help the Postal Service avoid a tremendous last-minute pile-up of Christmas mail by sending all packages and cards right now!"

To the inevitable last-minute mailers she suggests that Air Mail postage be used on all gifts and cards going to distant cities.

The Postmaster said that Regional Postal officials were expecting the Christmas mail volume this year to break all previous records. And this mail load is expected to hit its peak next week.

She cautioned local post office patrons to make sure that all packages are addressed carefully and that zone numbers are included on mail going to large cities with zoned delivery.

"There is still time to mail cards for local delivery," Mrs. Griffith said, "but they should all be in the mail by the end of next week."

She recommended that cards going out of town be sent by first class mail (4c postage) in order that they may be returned or forwarded in case the addressee has moved. And she pointed out that it is quite proper to affix your return address on Christmas cards.

The Lockney Post Office offers window service from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m.
