Game Violators Pay \$9,469.45 In **Fines For Month**

Austin. - Game law violations from automobiles took top billing during the month of November, according to arrests reported by the director of law inforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

Twenty four persons were fined for hunting from automobiles, and another 19 for headlighting game animals, making a total of 43. Hunting without a license brought fines osed season netted 18 fines, and exceeding the bag limit on doves brought 15 fines. Another 15 persons paid fines or hunting with unplugged turs. Shotguns used in hunting migratory birds and game in Texas must be plugged three shots. Many of the repeating shotguns in autonatics carry five shells in the magazine, and must be plug-ted back to hold only two





Home Making Hints

Tests In Cooking Candies Candy thermometers are the best guides for testing a candy mixture. But if you don't have one you can use the cold water Drop a small portion of the

andy mixture into a bowl of cold water and note the kind of ball it forms. Fondants, when done, should form a small soft ball which flattens out when held on the tip of the thumb. A firm ball test for caramels - will hold its shape when lifted on the finger. For divinity and popcorn balls the syrup should form a hard ball which can be manipulated with the fingers. The soft crack stage for butterscotch or taffy means that threads are hard but not brittle. Hard crack threads will snap when tapped against the side of the bowl. Use a fresh towl of cold water each time you make a test.

Candy making can be a fam-ily affair and lots of fun during the holidays.

Buying A Dish Washer?

The idea of having a dish washer has real appeal for many homemakers, Research has proven that dishes washed in washers have fewer germs than those washed in the usual way. If you are planning to buy one, here are a few points to consider:

First - consider your water supply. For satisfactory use you will need an ample supply of hot and cold water. The hot water should be 160 degrees F or more. If the water is very hard, dish washers are not satisfactory unless there some means of softening the

Considering the counter spa ce, do you want a top or front opening? Experimental work at the State College of Washing ton indicates no decided ad vantage of one type over the other. The front opening required fewer body motions for oading and unloading, while the top opening requied fewer arm motions for loading.

Do you want a portable or stationary type? Space available may determine this or you may want to save time and extra handling of dishes by using a portable dish washer The portable can be rolled to the dining area, loaded and rolled to the sink area for washing, then to the storage

area for storing. You will want to check the capacity and inside arrangement, and look for such safety features as: motor overload pro tection, fan screen and ground wire protection.

Consider the reliability the manufacturer, the type of the unit before you make a final decision.

Then, the regular yearly depreciation can be set up for the remaining cost, less salvage value. For example, a tractor bought on December 5 for \$4,200, would be allowed \$840 first year depreciation. In addition, one month's regular depreciation would be allowed. If a salvage value of \$160 is set up, the annual straight line depreciation on an eight-year basis would be \$400. Depreciation for the month of December would be \$33. So the total depreciation allowance on this tractor for 1959 would be \$873 (\$840 plus \$33). In 1960 the depreciation allowance on the straight line method would be \$400.



The legend of Saint Nicholas is, of course, centuries old, and began in Europe. The story had its beginning in the semi-tropical city of Patara, Turkey, where St. Nicholas was born and where he lived and died. Until after his death, when his remains were taken by Italian sailors to Bari, Italy, St. Nicholas traveled little, never venturing more than a few miles from his native region.

It was the goodness and generosity of St. Nicholas which led him to become the patron saint of many countries, of all boys, and of sailors.

Many legends concerning St. Nicholas, with re-telling have become a bit vague and clouded, but some things are certain: he was a man of wealth; he was generous and kind; and he was at one time Bishop of Myra.

Three Dowries

What is generally believed to be St. Nicholas first and best-known act of kindness was the presentation of dowries to the three daughters of a poor nobleman. According to the story, St. Nicholas learned that the poor girls had decided among themselves that one of them would sell herself into slavery in order that the two others could marry in honor. On separate occasions, St. Nicholas tossed three bags of gold into each girl's window, so that all three were married with honor, and in the usual fashion, lived happily ever after.

St. Nicholas died in 342, after being imprisoned by the Roman Emperor Diocletian and released by the first Christian emperor, Constantine.

Fame Spreads

It was not until sometime in the 11th Century that his fame spread beyond the small province where he was born, lived and died. Seafarers picked up many of the legends and carried them with them to the "modern" world. Italian sailors took his bones from the chapel at Myra and carried them to Italy. Because the journey was over unusually calm seas, the sailors adopted St. Nicholas as their patron saint.

The legends of St. Nicholas were then carried to England and eventually to the New World.

How author Washington Irving, song writer Clement Clark Moore, and cartoonist Thomas Nast created our present-day popular image of Santa Claus is quite another story.

Ranchers in Sutton County have found a way to get much needed equipment to fight grassfires which have burned 20,000 acres in the county. The ranchers joined with the Sonora Chamber of Commerce and taxed themselves \$10 per section of rangeland each owned. The money obtained was used to buy a four-wheel drive firetruck and also several two-way radios so that fire fighting can be supervised from the air.

Is Your Home 'Safe' For the Holidays?

Did you ever wonder if the home you have lavishly decorated for the holiday season is anything but "safe"? If your home and decorations are "average," you are most likely surrounded by more fire hazards than the law allows.

The Christmas tree, in all its shiny splendor, is a potential torch. A "safe" tree is one that is freshly cut, with the base submerged in water or wet sand as long as it remains in the house. It is also located away from all sources of heat.

Safe lights for the tree must be laboratory-approved, and carefully inspected for frayed cords and damaged sockets. It is unwise to "economize" by using old cords to overload electrical circuits with additional lights, toys and

Only nonflammable decorations should be used on the tree. Discarded Christmas package wrappings should never be left scattered under the tree. Turn tree lights off when retiring or leaving the house. Regardless of whether the New Year has arrived or not, throw out the tree once the needles become dry and

The Poinsettia

Here are some fingertip recommendat.ons for proper care of the poinsettia, that popular house plant of the Christmas

1. Keep the plant in a sunny window, avoiding both drafts and heat. A temperature of 70 degrees is best.

2. Examine the soil frequently (at least twice a day) and keep it moist. When the soil begins to dry out, apply enough water to wet it to the bottom.



Fort Worth.—Texas motorists vho have operated their autonobiles in an accident free and lawful manner during the past three years will be rewarded to the extent of \$20 million. Dr. Robert W. Strain, member of the State Board of Insurance told a meeting of the Independent Insurance Agents Association here Monday noon.

Actually, the plan will be a shifting of financial burden rom the careful driver to the shoulders of those who have been involved in accidents or who have compiled a record of moving traffic violations. "This s not an increase in automobile rates - it is a shifting of

costs," Dr. Strain emphasized. Breaking down an intensive survey of driving records of 40,365 Texas motorists, into Dr. Strain revealed that out of 23 insured family automobiles. 13 will receive a discount of 20% on their premium rates and four will receive the same rate they have been paying before. Thus, 17 of 23 will either receive a reduction or no change in the rate they now pay. The remaining six will pay higher rates. Of these, three will pay only 20% increase, one will pay a 40% increase, the remaining two will pay from 60% to 100% increase in

The Safe Driving Insurance Pian is a result of the public demand to reward safe drivers and force those who have had accidents or records of moving traffic violations to share a proportionate cost.


"In addition, we very definit-ely feel that this plan will provide an incentive to reduce he tragic toll on our highways that may not have been present heretofore," he said.

In a lighter tone, Dr. Strain remarked that the Plan had already had one immediate effect. The Governor's committee cited numerous individual problems which contribute to the delinquency of children. Many of these revolved around the ome and the relationship between the child and his parents. The studies showed that a great majority of the Texas public feels that perents today aren't

their children as did parents of yester year. The general opinion was that youth is losing out on the values of family togetherness, the time, attention and personal care of their own Many such problems brought

about by lack of parental guidance have been covered in this series of articles. The specifi quency, although not a major one at this time, can best be oped with on a community basis, the Governor's Committee reported. It was recommended that White House Conference committees be organized and maintained on a continuing basis in every county to spot light community problems and formulate step-by-step plans for the control and prevention of delinquency.

These and other findings of the State Committee were aired at the Governor's Conference in Austin on December 5. Texas delegates will take the complete Committee report with them to the White House Conference in Washington, March. 27-April 2.



Two Men Gave 'Silent Night' To the World

"Silent Night, Holy Night," will the first time.

The background story of this famous song begins on a sad note. Denver for that night of December 23. 1881, Father Joseph Mohr, the parish priest, and his friend Franz Kavier Gruber, schoolmaster and church organist, had made a depressing discovery: that mice had eaten away the bellows of the church organ, and there would be no music for Christmas services.

Storm Lifts

As the two men were making their way through the wind and snow-swept streets of the village. it is said, the storm suddenly lifted and suddenly all was serene. Father Mohr looked up to the snowy peaks and clear skies and muttered to himself, "Silent Night, Holy Night. All is caim, all is bright

Immediately Gruber repeated the words, and both men were struck with the same idea-the beginning of a Christmas carol. The two hurried on to the schoolmaster's house and there, for the rest of night, worked diligently on a melody and suitable verses. Remembering that there would be no organ music, they kept the melody simple, one that could be played easily on a guitar.

Holiday Music

There was music that Christmas in Oberndorf, after all, for Father Mohr and Franz Gruber led the villagers in the first public singing of what has become perhaps the best-loved of all Christmas Carols

The organ that wouldn't play also figured in the popularization of the Oberndorf carol. The song became traditional in the Oberndorf region, but in the year 1830 when an organ builder came to fix the organ he heard the song, memorized it, and carried it across the mountains-and to the world.

One year after the organ builder memorized the song and carried it with him from town to town and village to village, the carol was included in presentation of a musical festival in Leipzig, Germany.

Great orchestras and great singers "discovered" the song and in the ensuing years it has become a part of our Christmas heritage. Father Mohr never lived to see the greatness the song would achieve. He died in 1848 and his parishoners had to pay for the burial of the poor, but dedicated priest. Gruber, the schoolmaster, lived 15 years longer, but also died poor and obscure, perhaps-per-



be the first card specifically designed as a Christmas greetingthe card designed in England by J. Horsley for Sir Henry Cole (in 1843)-did not meet with an enthusiastic reception. Sent to his personal friends, Cole's card had side panels which depicted the feeding of the hungry and the clothing of the naked. This was well and good. The objections to the card arose from the illustration in the central panel-a scene in which a middle-class English family raised their wine glasses to toast an absent friend (obviously the recipient of the card). The scene so aroused temperance zealots that Cole never authored an-

Still Looking

Actually the search for the "first" Christmas card is still going on. Although it bore no specific greeting, the New York Historical Society, some 30 years before the Horsley-Cole card, sent to members and friends of the society a woodcut of St. Nicholas, which bore a Christmas poem in both Dutch and English.

In 1932, Carl W. Drepperd discovered in a Pennsylvania attic a "broadsheet" issued about 1842 by John M. Wolff, Philadelphia printer. The sheet, 10 inches by 15 inches, featured a reproduction of C. Preparation Is Important for Perfect Turkey

Turkey and all the trimmings that's what makes a Christmas feast fit for a king.

The turkey, of course, is the most important item so great care and consideration must be given to the selection and preparation of this native American fowl.

Age, sex, and tenderness of the meat determine the market class of the bird. The youngest turkeys, by far the most popular with American families today, weigh from 4 to 6 pounds.

The next class, popular with larger families weigh in from 6 to 25 pounds and is composed of toms and hens over eight months of age. These older toms tend to be stronger in taste and for that reason the hens are more

Top Birds

A top quality bird should have a well-developed, moderately broad breast, well fleshed through its entire width and length. The breastbone should not protrude.

Preparing your fowl is important also. Be sure that all wingtip feathers have been removed. Any remaining ones can be pulled out by pressing the skin around the feathers down to the tips of the quills with the forefinger and thumb of one hand and pulling the feathers straight out with the other hand.

Helps Taste

By using a pair of pliers you can remove many of the heavy tendons of the legs. This greatly improves the cooking and taste of the drumsticks.

Stuff your turkey just before putting it into the oven. Use three skewers before closing the cavity. Tie a square knot after each skewer so the lacing won't tighten. This allows steam to escape and prevents soggy dressing.

And last, but important, give your turkey a chance to cool before serving. It will carve much better if you do.





If there's a traditional reason, we don't know about it, but any youngster (or grownup) who hangs his stocking from the mantle shouldn't be surprised to find an apple there come Christmas morn. This isn't because Santa raises apples during his "off" season, but it does indicate the status of the apple as the "all-American" fruit.

Apples are grown in every State of the Union. More apples -and more apple pies-are produced in the United States than in any other country. In a good year about two-thirds of a bushel is grown for every man, woman

The apple's ancestry is traced to immigrants. Plant students believe the progenitor of the modern apple appeared first in southwest Asia, between the Caspian and Black Seas.

Apples do not grow true from seed and for this reason most seedling apple trees are worthless. Occasionally, however, one is found with highly desirable characteristics. Such a tree can be propagated endlessly by graft-

Discovery of a fine new apple is the plant world's equivalent of striking gold or oil. And, to our knowledge, no one has ever comlained about finding a bright red apple in a Christmas stocking.

Christmas Holiday Was Once Forbidden

Christmas has not always been "legal" holiday in this country. In 1659, the general court of Massachusetts Bay colony passed this

"Whosoever shall be found observing any such day as Christmas or the like, either by forebearing labor, feasting, or any other way, as a festival, shall be fined five shillings."

The first "legal" observance in this country is believed to have taken place in Boston in 1686 when Governor Andros conducted services in the town hall. And it was still many years later, in 1856, that the State of Massachusetts officially passed laws which permitted the observance of Christ-

Christmas Tree **Needs Care**

your Christmas tree home, keep it moist if you wish to insure safety, beauty and fragrance. Of course, you have to start with a fresh tree-one that won't drop its needles when you move or

The first step is to throw cold water all over it as soon as you get it home. Then recut the stem with a new diagonal cut at least an inch above the old cut to open pores for drawing up water.

Keep Cool

Set the tree in water and keep it in a cool shady place until it is brought indoors for trimming. The first day a 5 to 6-foot tree is placed in water, it may take up a quart. After that, the water needs replenishing daily because the tree may take up a cup of water every day in a warm room.

Many chemicals have been tried for fire-proofing trees. Even substances like sugar, aspirin, or truit acids have been used. None however, has proved as effective as plain water which keeps the tree naturally moist.

Good location for a Christmas tree is in the cool part of the room, away from radiators, fireplace, radio, TV set, or other sources of heat. They should not be placed in doorways or locations that could block exit if fire should occur. Plan the location before voti





Honey Gingerbread (Makes 1 loaf)

1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup honey

2 eggs, beaten 21/2 cups sifted flour I teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon ginger 1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon cloves 1 cup boiling water

Cream shortening and blend in sugar. Beat in honey and eggs until mixture is light. Mix and sift iry ingredients and add to honey nixture alternately with hot water. Turn into a greased 9nch loaf pan and bake at moderate (375°F.) temperature for 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 350°F. and bake 10 to 15 minutes longer.
