Cardinals Now Top Standings in Little League

Last Wednesday the Dodgers topped the scrappy Red Sox 10-7. Jerry Huley, Dodgers were Jackie Mickey. This contest starting pitchers for Friday but was scheduled to Wednesday and moved up to the swimming pool on Friday.

W. E. Merrell, Briscoe County rancher and farmer, and brother of Walter Merrell of Lockney, died early last Thursday morning at Peoples Hospital in Floydada following a week's illness. A heart ailment was believed the cause of his death.

Funeral services were held at the graveside in Quitaque Cemetery Monday at 4:30 p.m. with Rev. G. A. Elrod, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Silvertown, officiating. Burial was in Quitaque Cemetery. Roberts Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

The services were delayed awaiting the arrival of Mr. Merrell's son, Billy Dale Merrell, who was stationed in England serving with the U. S. Air Force. The airman arrived home Sunday.

Mr. Merrell was born October 5, 1902 in this county and was reared in the Flomont community. He had lived in Briscoe County, between Silvertown and Quitaque, for 25 years.

Survivors include his wife, Vivian; one son, Billy Dale; two daughters, Mrs. Gay McPherson of near Lockney and Mrs. Eula Barnes of Washington; two brothers, Henry of Silvertown and Walter of Lockney; and three grandchildren.

LARGE CROWD AT DEDICATION OF LOCKNEY SWIMMING POOL

A crowd estimated at between 600 and 700 persons crowded around the new swimming pool in East Lockney last Friday evening to witness the dedication ceremonies, the beauty contests and the comedy routines that were all a part of the program. Previously almost 500 people had enjoyed a barbecue supper at the American Legion building, adjoining the swimming pool.

The new pool is located on ground donated by the Lockney American Legion Post No. 141 and the pool will be operated under the supervision of the Post. The pool is 35 feet wide by 75 feet long and construction costs, including the bath houses and pool equipment will run about \$19,000.00. Most of the money has been raised by public subscription and the remainder will be raised the same way. The pool is equipped with diving boards and a slide, bath houses and a concession building. It is being operated under the management of Coaches R. L. Rhoten, Troy Lemley, and Bobby Davis this summer.

Burkhalter - To Europe Fund Needs \$613.02

The Burkhalter - To Europe fund is lacking but \$613.02, according to a report from Lena White, reporter for the Band Boosters Club this week. The money should be on deposit by July 15, she said, so that the band director can make his plans to go.

Wyatt Burkhalter, director of the Lockney Longhorn Band, has been honored with an invitation to take a tour of Europe planned and arranged especially for band directors. Cost of the trip is \$1495.00. The Band Boosters Club, feeling that the invitation was an honor to the local director, has undertaken the job of raising the money to send him on the tour. Lacking of the original goal is \$613.02.

"We want this to be a community-wide project and we trust that everyone who is at all interested in the band and the school will join in to help us reach this goal," club officials said.

Board Will File Suit On Taxes

The Lockney School Board, in regular meeting Tuesday night, voted to file suits in county court for delinquent taxes owed to the school district. Between \$19,000 and \$20,000 in taxes are now delinquent with the district and the Board's action is the first step in an attempt to collect the taxes. The suits will be filed as soon as possible after the selection of an attorney to represent the district, Supt. H. H. Nicholas said. Named as a committee to handle the matter were Owen Thornton and Oscar Golden.

The Board studied the proposed budget for the next school year. The budget will be adopted at the next regular meeting in early August. Those interested will find a copy at the Superintendent's office.

San Angelo Firm Awarded Paving Contract On 62

A contract for 10.8 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 62 in Floyd County has been awarded to a San Angelo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Strain Brothers, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$644,241.00 on the project. Grading, structures, lime stabilizer base, one and three course surface treatment from Crosby County line to U. S. 70 in Floydada is expected to take 300 working days, according to Oscar L. Crain, district highway engineer at Lubbock.

Samuel A. Fowler, resident engineer at Floydada, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Fair Committee Will Seek To Raise \$4,000

A Floyd County Fair Association Finance committee has begun work on raising \$4,000 in the county to be used for fair improvements. The committee met Monday evening at Rogers Restaurant in Floydada and kicked-off the drive. The money will be raised by public donations.

Biggest improvement will be the construction of a pole barn to house the livestock department at the Fair, officials said. This is estimated to cost \$2500. The barn will be 44 feet wide and 125 feet long and will be built just south of the big fair building. It will contain individual stalls, a big show arena in one end with spectator seats.

The remaining \$1500 will be used for other badly needed improvements at the fair grounds, these to be determined as the fair season approaches.

First National Raises Surplus To \$200,000

The surplus account at the First National Bank in Lockney was raised from \$150,000 to \$200,000 effective June 23rd. It was announced this week by bank officials. With the capital stock standing at \$100,000 this gives the local bank a total capital fund of \$300,000.

The increase in the surplus will enhance the bank's ability to make loans, officials said, and give it greater all-round strength.

The statement of condition carried in this issue of The Beacon does not show the increase in surplus since the statement is a report on condition at the close of business June 15th.

The current statement shows a slight drop in demand deposits as well as total deposits from a year ago. Cash on hand is also slightly down, all these figures probably reflecting a difficult crop year.

Demand deposits in the current statement are listed at \$2,836,772.44 compared to \$3,073,800.97 in the statement at the close of business on June 10, 1959. This is a decrease of about a quarter million dollars or \$237,028.53.

The total deposits are listed currently at \$4,074,083.53 compared to \$4,194,880.59 a year ago, a decrease of \$120,797.06.

Cash on hand is listed currently at \$798,385.26 compared to \$819,401.33, a decrease of \$21,016.07 from a year ago.

Loans are also down from last year, the current statement showing loans and discounts of \$1,854,457.26 compared to loans, minus CCC paper, last year of \$1,739,715.93, a decrease of \$114,741.33 for the year.

Undivided profits are currently listed at \$131,867.10 as compared to \$168,237.98 a year ago for a decrease of \$36,370.88.

The current statement lists no Commodity Credit Corporation loans, the first time in many years that this condition has existed.

Young Mexican Boy Dies Friday

A 15-year-old Mexican boy, Juan Gallegos, died last Friday on a farm eight miles northeast of Lockney. He was making his home with his sister, Mrs. Senona Lara, and the family had just moved there to work. The farm house is on the L. M. Honea place.

The boy had been ill some three weeks, members of the family said. He had been under medical treatment for several days but not confined to the hospital. Death was attributed to pneumonia, a report to The Beacon said.

Graveside services were held in Lockney Cemetery Monday afternoon with Rev. Juan Magana, pastor of the Plainview and Lockney Catholic churches, officiating. Carter Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

The boy was born August 5, 1944. Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Joe Martinez of Altus, Okla., his step-father, and the one sister.

Fred Dorman Is Killed In Auto Crash Sunday

Fred Dorman, 52-year-old Lockney farmer, died instantly in a two-car collision at a dirt road intersection, 5 miles southeast of Lockney Sunday just before noon. His wife, Mrs. Margaret Dorman, was painfully but not seriously injured as were two young Spanish-American women riding in the second car.

The accident occurred about one-half mile west of the Dorman residence. Apparently Mr. and Mrs. Dorman had started to Lockney to eat lunch and were traveling west in their 1959 Plymouth. The two women in the other car, Carotta Secca, age 22, the driver, and her sister, Natalia Secca, age 14, were traveling north, also coming to Lockney to attend church. They were driving a 1953 Plymouth. The drivers apparently did not see each other until almost in the intersection. Skid marks of only a few feet were evident. The Secca car struck the Dorman car in the side, almost in the center. Both cars spun around, perhaps left the ground and came to rest in a field northwest of the intersection. The Secca car was 50 feet from the intersection and the Dorman car some 75 feet away, both headed back east. The engine in the lighter car was torn completely from its frame and thrown on the ground.

Friends reported that Mr. Dorman apparently threw his arms around his wife when he saw the collision was inevitable. When the cars stopped both were in the back seat. The Secca women also were still in their car and both cars remained upright.

Mrs. Dorman, being unable to arouse her husband, walked a quarter mile west to the A. M. Hawthorne residence where she asked for help. She was suffering from shock, cuts and bruises. Mrs. Hawthorne immediately called for an ambulance and notified officers of the accident. Meanwhile Mrs. Dorman, being anxious about her husband, walked back to the scene of the wreck with Mr. Hawthorne's assistance.

The Hawthorne's son-in-law, George T. McMahan of Lubbock, drove up at this time and Mrs. Hawthorne sent him to the scene of the wreck where he picked up Mrs. Dorman and carried her to Lockney General Hospital for treatment. The Carter ambulance arrived soon and picked up the Secca women and Mr. Dorman.

Mrs. Dorman is still in Lockney General Hospital Wednesday but the two Secca women were dismissed Wednesday. Neither of them suffered any broken bones but both were suffering from cuts and bruises. The Secca family is employed on the B. J. Wofford farm near Sandhill.

Deputy Sheriff Cap Carthel, State Highway Patrolmen R. C. Dunn and Carl Mullins, investigated the accident.

Funeral services for Mr. Dorman were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Methodist Church here, where he held membership. Rev. Russell McAnally, the pastor, officiated, assisted by Rev. Tommy Ewing, pastor of the Methodist Church at Aiken. A crowd which over-flowed the church came to pay last respects to the deceased.

Burial was in Lockney Cemetery with Carter Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Dorman was born Sept. 1, 1907, in Eastland County, Texas. He spent most of his youth there and the Dorman family moved to this county in 1924. He had lived in the Lockney vicinity since that time, where farming was his occupation.

Survivors include the wife, Margaret; one son, John Alvin Dorman of Lubbock; two grandchildren; five brothers, O. B. Dorman of Aiken, Floyd of Lockney, L. C. of Cotton Center, L. A. of Rush Springs, Okla., W. E. of Bakersfield, Calif.; four sisters, Mrs. Lennie Smith, Pampa, Mrs. Hattie Evans, Rush Springs, Mrs. Nellie Stowe and Mrs. Ethel Marshall, Plainview.

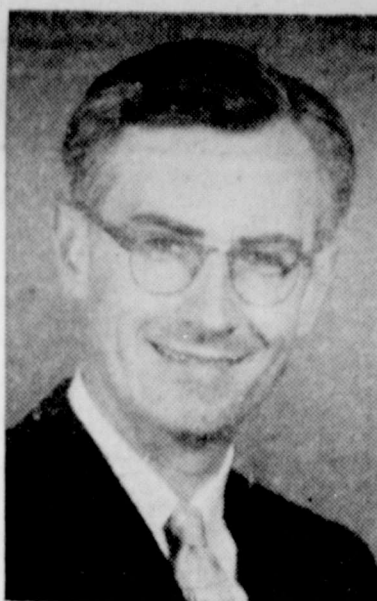

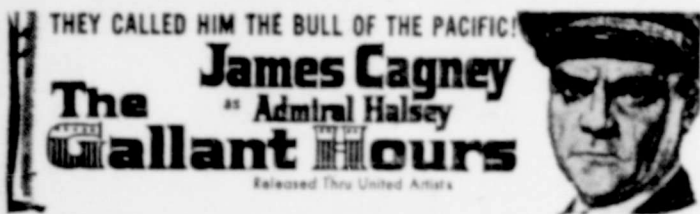

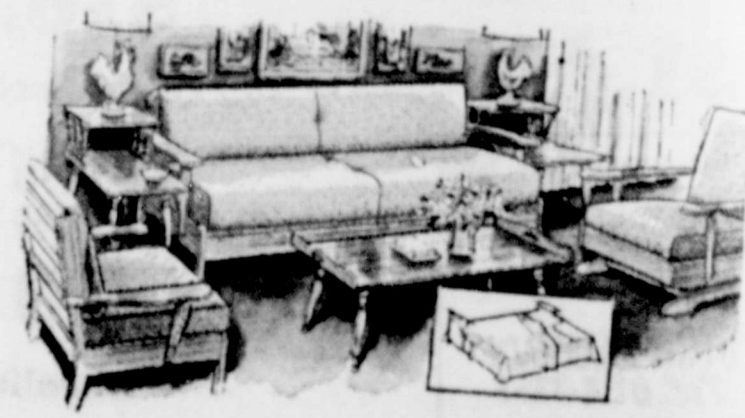

State Department Needs Young For Foreign Service

The art of diplomacy is said to be as old as government itself. In the United States the Department of State was the first executive department of government to be established, and it has grown from a small agency into an intricate organization employing thousands of dedicated Americans.

The Department of State is the headquarters of a vast reporting system which stretches from Washington, D. C., to the far corners of the earth. From its posts abroad members of the United States Foreign Service report to the State Department on foreign developments which have a bearing on the welfare and security of the American people.

From its "home office" in Washington, D. C., members of the Departmental Service are engaged in programs in direct support of the Department's responsibilities in the field of foreign affairs.

Young men and women, if you are interested in using your clerical skills in return for the opportunity to take part in the conduct of foreign relations with other nations, the time to do something about it is now," says Anee N. Taylor, the State Department's Chief of Employment. "The Department is interested in drawing its employees from every one of the 50 States of the Union; from big cities and small towns, from villages and farms."

Persons interested in "home office" employment as stenographers, typists and clerks must be at least 18 years of age, and must qualify by passing a Civil Service examination, a physical examination and a background investigation. Starting salaries range from \$3,255 to \$3,755 per year. Young people interested in "Foreign Service" employment as secretaries, stenographers, communications, mail and pouch clerks must be at least 21; American citizens for at least 5 years; single with no dependents; high school graduates in excellent health; and available to go to any one of 286 Embassies, Legations or Consulates located in 90 countries throughout the world. They must be able to pass performance tests, and meet a minimum work experience requirement of 3 years. College training may be substituted for a maximum of 18 months of experience. Starting salaries range from \$3,730 to \$4,180 plus travel expenses and housing allowances.

Travel, foreign lands, good pay and opportunity for advancement are, of course, important to individuals in considering overseas employment, but the Department is most interested in those candidates who have the concept of service to their country uppermost in mind. Texas Agricultural Income Ranks High

College Station. — Texas far outranked other states in cash receipts from farm marketing of cotton, rice and grain sorghum in 1959, reports John G. McHaney, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Cotton was the leading income source for Texas farmers as it brought in one-third of the total agricultural receipts. Although Texas grain sorghum accounted for over half of the total U. S. production, it accounted for only 10 percent of the State's farm income, McHaney continues.

In other rankings, Texas was second in receipts from cattle and calves, fourth in sheep and lambs and peanuts, and fifth in flaxseed. Even though Texas retained its top spot for number of cattle and calves on hand, Iowa ranked first in total cash receipts, McHaney says.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex. — Amid the summer weather, Texas is putting new emphasis on getting a statewide water plan.

Although Texas is supposed to be in a seven-year wet cycle, unexpected harsh drought settled on parts of South Central Texas last spring and early summer. As one scorching day followed another, crops were killed and pasturage began to deteriorate.

Although conditions were better elsewhere, the difficulties of the farmers in the areas around Austin lent emphasis to Gov. Price Daniel's plea for a "crash program" to develop a water plan. If Texans don't do it, said the governor, the federal government will take over.

Target is to have a complete water plan for development of Texas water ready by May 1. To help meet this deadline, the governor asked representatives of the river authorities and districts to file updated master plans for their areas with the Water Board by Nov. 1. He also asked the river authorities to lend engineers and technical personnel to help prepare the state plan.

Meanwhile, farmers, watching their corn burn up in the fields, took what comfort they could from the often-repeated statement that "Texas has plenty of water; it's just a matter of distribution."

For the past three years some of the University's Permanent Fund has been invested in corporate securities which has increased its earnings over what it had been from government bonds.

Senators also discussed the possibility of saving through a unified organization for administration and counseling on the four funds.

WARNING FOR DRIVERS — This year's Fourth of July falls on a Monday, making a longer holiday for fun—and accidents. Department of Public Safety has predicted 27 traffic deaths in Texas between 11:15 p.m. July 2 and 11:59 p.m. July 4.

Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, said all available patrolmen, including those from licensing and weights and inspection would be on the road.

"Their purpose is to render a service to the traveling public," said Garrison. "They need the full cooperation of all motorists in driving safely and sanely at all times."

SAUNDERS CASE ARGUED — Court of Criminal Appeals is to rule next fall in a case hinging on whether a witness can be convicted of perjury in connection with testimony before a legislative committee.

Defendant in the case is J. Byron Saunders, former chairman of the State Board of Insurance, who was convicted and sentenced to two years imprisonment for lying to a legislative committee about funds received from ICT Insurance Co. while he was in office. Saunders' attorney contended that perjury is possible only before a judicial body, not before a legislative committee.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE — Texas Republican leaders are saying, in effect, that they won't fight among themselves but will save their strength to fight Democrats in the general election next fall.

Texas' GOP traditionally has been very harmonious, except in 1952 when newcomers supporting Eisenhower wrested control from the Old Guard.

Texas' delegation to the GOP Chicago convention are pledged to support Vice President Nixon for president. Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona for vice president. Early talk of supporting Senator Goldwater or New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller for president ended short of a floor battle.

Most Republican energy at their state convention was used to try to lure Independent and Conservative Democrats to their fold by criticizing Democrats as the party of "give-away programs" and "federal intervention."

MOVING UP — Preliminary 1960 census figures show Texas, with a population of 9,493,895, ranking sixth among the 50 states — behind New York, California, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

Houston apparently will be moved up from 14th largest to sixth largest city in the nation, following New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles and Detroit.

ENLARGED RESERVOIR PLANNED — Governor Daniel and the State Water Board have approved plans to enlarge a proposed salt water barrier and reservoir on the Trinity River near Wallisville to four feet, instead of two feet, above water level.

Applications to build the new Trinity reservoirs were granted last spring after one or the longest, most heated hearings ever held before the Water Board.

WATER DISTRICT'S FIGHT FOR DEPLETION ALLOWANCE TOLD

Lubbock. — In 1954, the High Plains Water District filed with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service a request for a ruling that would establish ground water in the southern High Plains of Texas as a depletable natural resource and allow a deduction on federal income-tax returns for its depletion.

The request for such an administrative ruling has been denied.

A lawsuit is now being planned to establish through litigation the District's contention that underground water in this area is a natural deposit and that it is being depleted; and that individuals and institutions using water to produce income should be allowed a federal income-tax deduction for the depletion of this resource. Such depletion shall be calculated under cost rather than percentage depletion methods.

The District is gathering information that will be used during the trial to establish facts pertaining to the underground water and to the reservoir. The facts will prove that the underground water in the southern High Plains is gradually and surely being depleted and that the use of underground water in the production of crop income has a definite economic value.

An individual irrigation farmer will be selected by the Water District and the Revenue Service for test case purposes. The general understanding of the Water District and the Revenue Service is that the decision of the court will become the rule not only in this case, but that it will apply to all southern High Plains water users who have a like set of circumstances.

To prepare the case, the District has endeavored to obtain the best legal and engineering counsel available. The verdict of the court will be very important to taxpayers in the High Plains of Texas; consequently, no stone will be left unturned in preparing for the case. Individually, the income-tax deduction may not be sufficient to warrant each person filing such a lawsuit in his own behalf; however, as a collective effort through the Water District, a favorable decision by the court would amount to millions of dollars in tax savings for area landowners during

the economic life of the underground water. Furthermore, recognition of ground-water depletion by the United States Courts and then by the Internal Revenue Service should have an important bearing on future ground-water conservation practices. When each land owner and water owner realizes the value of his water, when he computes the profit or loss from the use of his water, he is in the position of being able to use to greater advantage the water remaining in storage beneath his land.

The case will be filed in Federal Court by the Water District probably this fall and it is anticipated that it will be scheduled for trial in the spring of 1961.

Floydada Boy Electrocuted

A 13-year-old Floydada boy showing young friends around his father's recently bought butane company, was electrocuted Wednesday when he touched high-tension wires to show they were harmless.

Police used a resuscitator for 30 minutes after the charge ran through the boy's body. But the victim, Mike Crawford, showed no indication of life.

His father, Clifford L. Crawford, had applied mouth-to-mouth respiration in the meantime. The boy apparently was killed instantly, about 8:15 p.m.

Young Crawford was leading four friends on a steel catwalk between two huge storage tanks at the company. The catwalk was about 20 feet high. Bare highline wires were just within reach.

"Better not touch those," one of the boys warned. Crawford replied, "It won't hurt," and to show his friends he grasped a wire. He collapsed on the dry catwalk. The others were not harmed.

The boy's father, formerly a tool pusher, bought the Foote Butane Co. plant, when the family moved to Floydada two months ago. The boy was the only child.

Funeral services for the boy were held Saturday at 10 a.m. at the First Methodist Church in Lamesa. Burial was in Lamesa Memorial Park.

Cabbage Rolls An Assyrian Dish

Remove cabbage leaves, wilt in boiling water until pliable.

Mix together 1-3 lb. of hamburger meat, 1 cup rice (equal parts of meat and rice), 1 can tomato sauce, salt and pepper to taste, a pinch of cinnamon and 1-2 stick of melted oleo. Place a serving of the above mixture in a wilted cabbage leaf and roll. Place in pan, if more than one layer is used, put one layer lengthwise and the other layer crosswise. Add another can of tomato sauce to the cabbage rolls. If boiled on top of the stove, cover with water and cook at medium heat 30 or 40 minutes until done. If baked in oven, add less water, cover with aluminum foil and bake at 325 degrees for one hour.

UNION OF CHURCH AND STATE

"For over eleven centuries, from 755 to 1871, the Popes of Rome had direct control of several provinces and cities, including Rome, in the central part of Italy. This section was known as the Papal States, and the authority of the Popes over these Church States was the visible sign of their temporal power. Charlemagne confirmed and enlarged this territory and was in turn crowned in spectacular magnificence in Rome by Pope Leo III and given support of the Roman Church in his campaign for power in Western Europe. After the Protestant Reformation the political power of the Pope gradually declined, and in 1860 the Papal States, with the exception of the land immediately about Rome, became subject to Victor Emmanuel II, King of Italy. The king retained these states by popular vote. Pope Pius IX shut himself up in the Vatican and thenceforth regarded himself as a prisoner. The Popes who followed pursued this policy, until the agreement between Pius XI and Mussolini brought about the organization of an independent Papal State."

"The temporal power of the Popes was restored after being lost for nearly sixty years, by the Treaty of Lateran in 1929. The first official visit made upon the Pope by Mussolini occurred in February, 1932."

"The Pope is sovereign of Vatican City, an area of 108.7 acres, with more than 1,000 inhabitants. It has its own flag, coinage, stamps and railroad station. The Pope has a definite diplomatic status. His right to send diplomats to foreign countries and receive foreign representatives is recognized."

Significance Of The Papal Crown
The "Papal Tiara" (triple crown) worn by the Popes on special occasions is made of cloth of gold and comprises: 3 crowns with 252 pearls, 229 diamonds, 32 rubies, 19 emeralds and 11 sapphires. The three divisions of the Tiara signify the following God-given rights as claimed by the Popes: 1. Father of Kings and Princes. 2. Ruler of the World. 3. Vicar of Jesus Christ.
