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LOCKNEY'S LAST HALF RALLY SHORT AS 'WINDS WIN, 20-14 After being down 12-0 at halftime the fighting Longhorns came

fighting back in the final two periods and almost caught up with the Floydada Whirlwinds Friday night. The Lockney eleven came within six points of the south Fioyd County boys, but were behind 20-14 as the final whistle blew.

An overflow crowd of some 3,000 watched the two evenlymatched elevens open their District 2-AA campaigns. The attendance was boosted by ex-students and ex-teachers of Lockney High who attended Homecoming activities here Friday.

The turning point in the game came early in the fourth quarter when a Longhorn pitchout went wild and a Floydada lineman covered the free ball in the end zone for Floydada's third touchdown. (3-A). That sent the Floydada boys ahead 20-6. The opening two quarters were dominated by the 'Winds but Lockney's crew held the upper hand in the last half of the tilt.

After a scoreless first guarter, the Whirlwinds took command of the game, scoring on the third play of the second stanza and again The misses were both in 2-AA, with only 1:48 remaining before intermission.

The determined Longhorns kicked off to Floydada to open the last half. Four plays later the 'Winds were forced to punt. Wayne 0 Cooper rusuhed through to block the punt and give the Big Red a first on the Floydada 37. Eleven plays later quarterback Johnnie Belt

raced into the end zone for six points. Belt's kick for PAT was wide. The Longhorns were now within six points of the 'Winds. But disaster struck. Lockneys' spunky defensive held the 'Winds on downs at the Longhorn 1 yard line. Halfback Bill Mangold drove for 2 and 3 yards, then a pitchout went wild and guard Melvin Lloyd fell on the pigskin in the end zone.

Yet the Longhorns were far from finished. Lockney's aggressive defense again took advantage of a break and trounced on a fumble on the Floydada 37. It took the Big Red six plays to move across the double stripe with a perfectly executed screen pass from Belt to Mangold working for 12 yards and the touchdown. The game was a rugged, thrilling skirmish from the opening kickoff until the final whistle. Yet, both teams played exceptionally clean football

in the 1953 fiscal year to \$3,276,-800,000 for the year just closed. the job not only more efficiently but more economically. As I recall it, that was the way President Eisenhower outlined the principal objectives of the Department when Postmaster Gen. Arthur E. Summerfield was being sworn in back in 1953, and that's the way we have been operating

ever since. "We can't deny that we still make mistakes and that the human element still plays a vitally important part in daily operations, but the statistics in the Department's annual report offer positive proof that we are making progress on a nation-wide basis. As an example, while the mail volume showed an increase of 16 billion pieces handled annually, the employment increase during this same period amount-

ed to only 11 per cent. "By way of explanation, it should be mentioned that the employment figures - based on thousands of man-years - are first worked out under two separate headings, city carriers and other', and then combined for the over-all percentage figures just mentioned for fiscal 1960. "It should also be mentioned that there has been a steady and substantial increase in 'city carriers' each year as compared with 1953, ranging from 4.5 per cent in 1954 to 29.2 per cent in the latest estimates. This increase has been essential to keep pace with the ever-expanding growth of established cities as well as the establishment of new ones. City delivery service has been started in 800 communities addition to the extension of literally hundreds of routes which were already in operation. This required the equivalent of 31,000 more letter carriers to serve approximately 9,000,000 more American families and upwards of 700,000 more business concerns. There is perhaps no better way of demonstrating the Department's ever-improving efficiency than by showing just how steadily the annual volume handled per man-year of employment - excluding city carriers - has been increasing since 1953. In that year the total handled by one man was 132,000 pieces of mail. For 1960 the corresponding figure was 157,000.





he gong sounded! I dashed from the office into the crowded street, and hurried on into the fading sunlight. The bell in the familiar old church tower was striking five. I had made it again! I would reach the commuters' train and be in my suburban home at the usual hour.

My place in the little suburban church shall be filled on each Lord's Day."


