A Review Of The Water Safety Rules

LUBBOCK-Several citations have already been issued by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens for water safety violations on area lakes this

Among the violations most numerous are no life preservers and improper safety equipment on board. Safety laws are set to protect boaters and other water users from drowning or injuring themselves on Texas' public waters. Even with all the regulations and wardens working throughout the weekends on the busy lakes. approximately 600 persons will lose their lives in 1977 due to carelessness or neg-

Common sense on the water or unloading or loading your boat is still the best prevention. A thorough check of safety equipment to be used on the lake should be completed before leaving home and will insure a safe

When you are checked by a Texas game warden, some of the items he will want to see includes the boat registration and certificates of number issued by the P&WD; life preservers accessible for each person on board and all 12 year old and under persons wearing their life preservers at all times; visible numbers painted, decaled, or otherwise affixed to both sides of the bow of the boat; lights if the boat is to be operated after dark; ventilation ducts and flame arresters in working condition on inboards; mirrors it the boat is towing a person or persons on water skies and located so the boat operator has a full and complete view beyond the rear of his boat.

The law concerning boat titles became effective Jan. 1, 1976 and all new unregistered motorboats in excess of 14 feet in length, and new outboard motors in excess of 12 horsepower must be titled with the P&WD prior to

Fire extinguishers approved for motorboats are hand-portable, of either B-1 or B-II classification. Either fire extinguisher must be full when on board and the number of approved extinguishers required depends upon the class of the motor-

boat. Class A motorboats are less than 16 feet in length and require one B-I fire extinguisher or a fixed extinguisher system in the machinery space of the engine compartment. Class I motorboats are 16 feet to 26 feet in length and require one B-1 extinguisher or a fixed system in the machinery space.

All of these regulations are listed in the Digest of the Texas Water Safety Act available at all P&WD offices across' the Panhandle and South Plains.

Another handy booklet to study is the little Blue Boating Book available by writing the P&WD, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744.



Plant Now For Fall Chrysanthemums

COLLEGE STATION-Chrysanthemums are a fine source of fall flowers all over Texas, and now is the time to start new plants for bloom

this fall. "If you have plants from last year, cuttings taken now can provide transplants in a few short weeks," points out Dr. William C. Welch, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Four-tofive-inch tip cuttings stripped of their lower leaves and placed in sand or a mix of half sand and half peat moss will root quickly.

often helpful but not essential. Keep the cuttings moist during the rooting period and place them in a bright area but not in direct sun. By starting these new plants and destroying the old clumps, disease problems can often be avoided," says

Welch. Mums prefer a sunny site with well-drained soil and plenty water during the summer. Pinching the terminal buds promotes branching, more flowers and sturdier plants. However, buds should not be pinched after August 1 as this will delay flowering.

"Place the rooted cuttings 18 to 24 inches apart and apply small amounts of a complete fertilizer such as 13-13-13 several times during the summer before August 15. Watch for insects, especially aphids which can severely weaken or retard the plants," cautions Welch.

If you have recently received a pot of florist mums, you may be successful in transplanting them to the landscape. Ater the blossoms begin to fade, cut the plants back to 4 or 5 inches in height. Since there are usually three or more plants per pot, Welch advises separating them by cutting the soil ball with a sharp knife, leaving a sizable ball on each plant. If the plants have not been weakened too severely by long periods of exposure to dark areas or too much or too little water, they will usually begin growing quickly and form sizable plants in time for fall blooming, notes the horticulturist.

"Crysanthemums are light sensitive plants and flower when the day length shortens in the fall," says Welch. "Since varieties vary as to when flowering begins, it is possible to have mums

bloom from late September to heavy frost by selecting early, mid-season and late flowering types.

"Chrysanthemums provide a lavish display of color this fall by planting fairly large masses of the same color," adds the horti-



Hal E. Brockmann, vice president of textile research and development at Cotton Incorporated's Raleigh research center, noted that cotton has long been recognized as the world's standard for textile comfort, largely because of the cotton fiber's high affinity for moisture. Cotton Incorporated is the fiber research and marketing company of U.S. cotton producers.

"Moisture is taken inside the cotton fiber," Brock-mann pointed out. "That is one reason why the synthetic fiber producers have never been able to come up with a fiber that could match

the comfort of cotton. "The 'wettable' polyester finish has been represented as a real breakthrough in making a polyester fabric more comfortable," said Brockmann. "That's why we were especially interested in seeing the results of these independent studies."

According to Dr. Norman R. S. Hollies, who directed the comfort tests at the Gillette Research Institute, Rockville, Md., the "wettable" polyester flunked the

The commercial "wettable" finish, he reported, failed to increase the comfort level of the polyester fabric to that of all-cotton 'or even to that present in Natural Blend' shirts of

comparable structure." Dr. Hollies said the comfort tests, based on actual wearing of the shirts by 26 men, showed that the four shirts fell into two groups.

"The shirts containing cotton gave the higher comfort distinguishable from one another at the 90 per cent confidence level in only one case. The allpolyester shirts gave lower ratings not distinguishable from one another at the 90 per cent confidence level. The cotton containing shirts were more comfortable than the polyester shirts at the 99 per cent confidence levels in all but two instances, but still significant at the 90 per cent confidence level."

"In every instance, he added, "the cotton-containing fabrics were rated significantly higher than the polyester fabrics....'

Each of the 26 men participating in the tests was given one of each of the four shirts to wear under controlled conditions of varying combinations of tempera-

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco released the following statement on the federal farm bill which has recently been reported out of the agricultural committees of both houses of Congress:

'Despite reports from Washington that members of the House Agriculture Committee congratulated themselves with applause on the voting out of the four-year approved bills as a dismal display of irresponsible action that will condemn agriculture to four more years of tottering on the brink of economic ruin.

"A recent Department of Agriculture survey shows that Texas is one of the nine states surveyed by the Federal Reserve Bank indicating that 'the financial condition of the farmers has deteriorated.' The report pointed out that one-third of the farmers in these states are having difficulty getting re-financed and one-fourth of the bank borrowers in these states will be forced to re-finance their loans or dispose of their farm assets, if price improvements are not imminent. It showed that 11,300 Texas family farmers are in extreme eco-

nomic difficulty. 'With the exception of the dairy section of the farm program, in itself not good enough, both the Senate and the House versions of the farm bill are totally inadequate to meet the needs of a financially strong agriculture. Prices on all the basic commodities are set at or below the cost of production. Among the worst sections of the farm bill are those which pertain to cotton, peanuts, and rice, but when a farmer asks himself what commodity he might produce and be better off, it becomes a question of whether he is shot or hung.'

"When we say all-cotton or mostly cotton knit dress shirts are more comfortable, we are supported by the documented data provided by people who actually wore the shirts and made their own comfort

evaluations." Brockmann said the recent comfort tests were similar to a series of investigations conducted by the Gillete Institute in the past that compared different blend levels in men's woven

shirts and knit sport shirts. "Those tests established that the 'Natural Blend' shirts were more comfortable than the high synthetics and were just as good in durable press performance,"

Zinc Iron Deficiencies In Corn And Sorghum

ty corn and sorghum growers encountering zinc or iron deficiency in their crops will need to be cautious in their diagnosis. Although the symptoms of deficiency are not that similar, it is easy for persons to be confused about the two disorders which could prove to be costly.

In the West Texas area, zinc and iron are the only two micro-nutrient deficiencies of significance in corn and sorghum.

Contributing to the increased incidence of these deficiencies are excessive use of phospates, high calcium-high pH levels and decreasing organic matter content in the soils.

The first step in correcting a nutritional disorder is a correct diagnosis, therefore, recognizing the symptoms is crucial.

Zinc deficiency is more likely to be seen in corn than in sorghum or any other field crop. A pale streak of light yellow will generally occur near the base of the leaf blade. This discoloration including the leaf veins may be wide as a pencil or as wide as the thumb, and will often gradually disappear about the middle of the leaf's length. But it may extend any length, 'though rarely to the tip. Discoloration may be apparent on only one side of the leaf midrib, and frequently will not be observed on all leaves of a single plant. Such symptoms are rarely observed in sorghum except in extreme

sorghum due to shortening of the internodes is common. If these symptoms are

the next crop, get a good composite soil sample for analysis by the Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock. They will suggest rates of zinc for soil application for the next crop. Soil applications of three to ten pounds of actual zinc per acre are highly effective when worked into the root zone preplant. Indiscriminate use of such rates is definitely not recommended. Spraying until foliage is wet with a solution containing 15 to 20 pounds of iron sulfate per 100 gallons of water plus wetting agent or spreader sticker is a long standing recommendation. Several. applications may be required for sorghum.

Individual plants within a row are more uniformly affected by iron deficiency than by zinc. With both elements, the most severe visual symptoms are likely to occur on shallow high lime soil. The pattern of occurrence can be highly irregu-

Concentrations given for foliar applications are for use in ground rigs and should not be exceeded. Other additives such as copper, manganese, sulfur, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, etc. will not increase the effectiveness of the zinc or iron and could easily cause foliage damage. If both iron and zinc are included in a single application, the concentrations of each material should be reduced by one-half.

Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027, a referendum election on July 29, 1977, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not corn producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 1/2 cent per bushel on all corn sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 6-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control. promotion, and education designed to encourage production, marketing, and use of Texas corn.

Counties included in the referendum are: Area I -Deaf Smith, Palmer, Castro, Bailey, and Lamb. Area II -Randall, Swisher, Briscoe, Hale, and Floyd. Area III -Dallas Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county courthouse in the referendum area. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, or the Texas Corn Growers Association. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at 105 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced corn for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.


