Grassed Waterways

Do you have a gully on your farm: If so you may need a grassed waterway or other conservation practices installed on your farm, according to Joe Platt, Soil Conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service in Floydada.

A grassed waterway usually has a flat bottom with borders on each side of it to take runoff water where it will be disposed with out causing erosion. Other types of waterways may also be built. Most of the time grass will need to be seeded in the waterway to prevent gullies from being cut in it. The grass must also be taken care of to prevent erosion. However, there are times on flat land

that a waterway may not need to be seeded to grass if, for example, the slope is of less than 1 foot of fall in 100 feet, there is only a few acres that drain into the waterway, and the farmer plants it to wheat, grazing sorghum or other drilled crops and uses sweep plow-ing to leave crop stubble on the surface.

For Pullman clay loam and most other soils in Floyd County western wheatgrass (at 14 lbs. PLS per acre) and tall fescue (at 10 lbs. PLS per acre) can be mixed and planted with a wheat drill. These grasses should be planted into a dead litter crop, or into cotton burrs or irrigated to a stand or by other means to protect the seedlings. Planting dates are August 15th thru Oct. 15th or Feb. 1st thru March 15th in the spring. Other grasses such as sideoats grama or blue grama may be from

In the late sixties, however, the trading stamp business became so widespread it lost its uniqueness--and effectiveness. Also, the fuel shortage and other economic factors tended to work against the system.

But trading stamps are staging a comeback. Officials of all the trading stamp companies agree that the turnaround came in 1977 and that 1976 was the low point. It's estimated that the number of grocery stores using stamps sunk to only a few hundred in 1976.

In 1978 up to 18,000 stores will either try games or stamps for a minimum thirteen week period or use them fulltime, according to Robert Herron, an official of the nation's largest game business company.

While it may be true that in most cases the buyer pays for the freebies, stamps, etc., millions of Americans enjoy the game. in most of the rest of the world, where competition is more restricted and merchants don't have to compete actively, the shopping atmosphere is grim. It's a sellers' rather than a buyers' market, in comparison with the free competition, adequate supply, fun and games of American shopping. One likes it that way in this country.

WILL POWER is having the same ailment a friend has and not mentioning it.


