## 15-Cent Stamps Here

A new postage stamp that bears the letter "A" instead of a denomination has been placed on sale at the Lockney Post Office and all postal branches, Postmaster Douglas Meriwether announced today.

The stamp's value is 15 cents and corresponds with the new 15-cent postage rate for one ounce of first-class domestic mail which went into effect at 12:01 a.m. Monday, May 29.

The new first-class rate was approved Friday, May 19 by the Postal Service Governors.

The stamp design features an eagle with the legend "U.S. Postage" beneath it. The letter "A" appears beside the eagle, on an orange background.

The Postal Service printed the stamps in 1975-76 when similar uncertainty existed regarding its last rate case. At that time, it also printed and put into use two non-denominated 1975 Christmas stamps.

The "A" stamps are available in sheets, coils and booklets, Postmaster Meriwether said. Embossed stamped

envelopes, bearing "A" in lieu of a denomination, also may be purchased.

The "A" stamps and envelopes, along with stamps and postal stationery items already in the Postal Service inventory, are sufficient to meet mailers' needs until deliveries begin of postal items with denominations matching the new rate, Postmaster Meriwether stressed.

In addition to the non-denominated stamps, he said, many mailers will find it convenient to use existing low-value stamps in combination with the 13-cent stamps to meet the new first-class rate for letters weighing an ounce or less.

The charge for each additional ounce or letter mail over one ounce is 13 cents. Therefore, mailers can affix "A" stamps in combination with as many 13-cent stamps as necessary to letters weighing more than an ounce.

A short supply of 2-cent stamps are available for your immediate needs.

Customers are encouraged to revalue their old 13-cent for a future date, Meriwether said.

The surgeon also paid tribute to the late John Reue, for whom Henry worked for when Reue was the J.C. Penny store manager. He said Reue taught him responsibility.

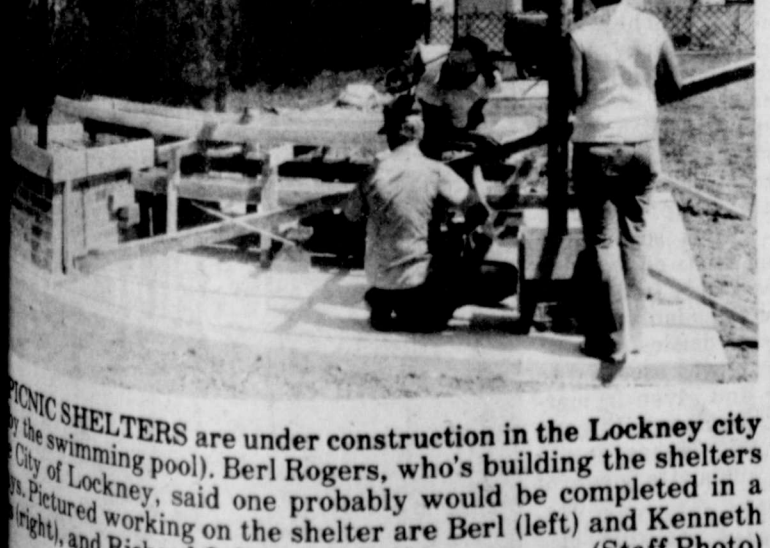

### Plant Mums Now For Fall Color

COLLEGE STATION -- Although the fall season seems far away, it's time to plan for some color for the home landscape this fall. Chrysanthemums can fill the bill.

"Chrysanthemums can provide color and variety in the fall months after many annual flowers have passed their prime," says Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Rooted cuttings of chrysanthemums planted in late May or early June will have a shorter growing season resulting in smaller plants that need little staking if properly pinched."

Plant chrysanthemums in fertile soil in an area that gets plenty of sun. An elevated site is best because it lessens the possibility of harm from frost. Before planting, broadcast 2 to 3 pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 or 12-12-12 per 100 square feet of bed area. Work this into the top 6 inches of soil.

"About six weeks after planting, apply a sidedressing of one-half pound of ammonium sulfate fertilizer per 50 feet of row and water thoroughly. The additional fertilizer will promote vigorous growth during the summer. You may want to reapply fertilizer in mid-August," suggests Janne. Watering is important throughout the growing season to keep plants healthy and growing vigorously.

Use a mulch of sawdust, bark, wood chips or peat moss around the plants to

conserve soil moisture and reduce weeds.

"To produce compact plants with many flowers, pinch out the terminal inch of each new shoot when it is about 3 inches long. This causes the lateral buds to grow, thereby producing short, compact plants that require little or no staking," notes the horticulturist.

Some plants may need to be pinched back as much as three times, but they should not be pinched back after late July.

For large flowers with long stems, Janne suggests removing all side buds from stems in late August. This allows most of the food produced by the plant to go directly to the terminal bud, producing a large flower. The stems usually require staking.
