Fireworks Display

A fireworks display will begin at 10 p.m. Tuesday, July 4th, at Mackenzie Lake. Fireworks will be exploded from the island in the middle of the lake.

Admission fee for the fireworks display is the regular fee of \$1 for adults and youth over 13 years old.

Persons planning to boat or fish on the lake soon will be interested to know that repair work has been done on the boat ramp and that launching is now much easier. Lake authorities plan in the latter part of July to extend the concrete ramp over 100 more feet.

This week construction is underway on three new permanent restroom facilities. These are expected to be completed by the first of next week.

The fishing report says that bass fishing is improving with catches of one to two pounds; crappie are starting to bite, and several Amarillo residents caught eight rainbow trout Tuesday with minnows.

The lake has a depth at the dam of 102.2 feet and now has 15,400 acre feet and covers 423 surface acres. The lake is considered to be 33.3% full.

About 25 wind row trees and over 10 shade trees are at the Lake awaiting planting in the new park.

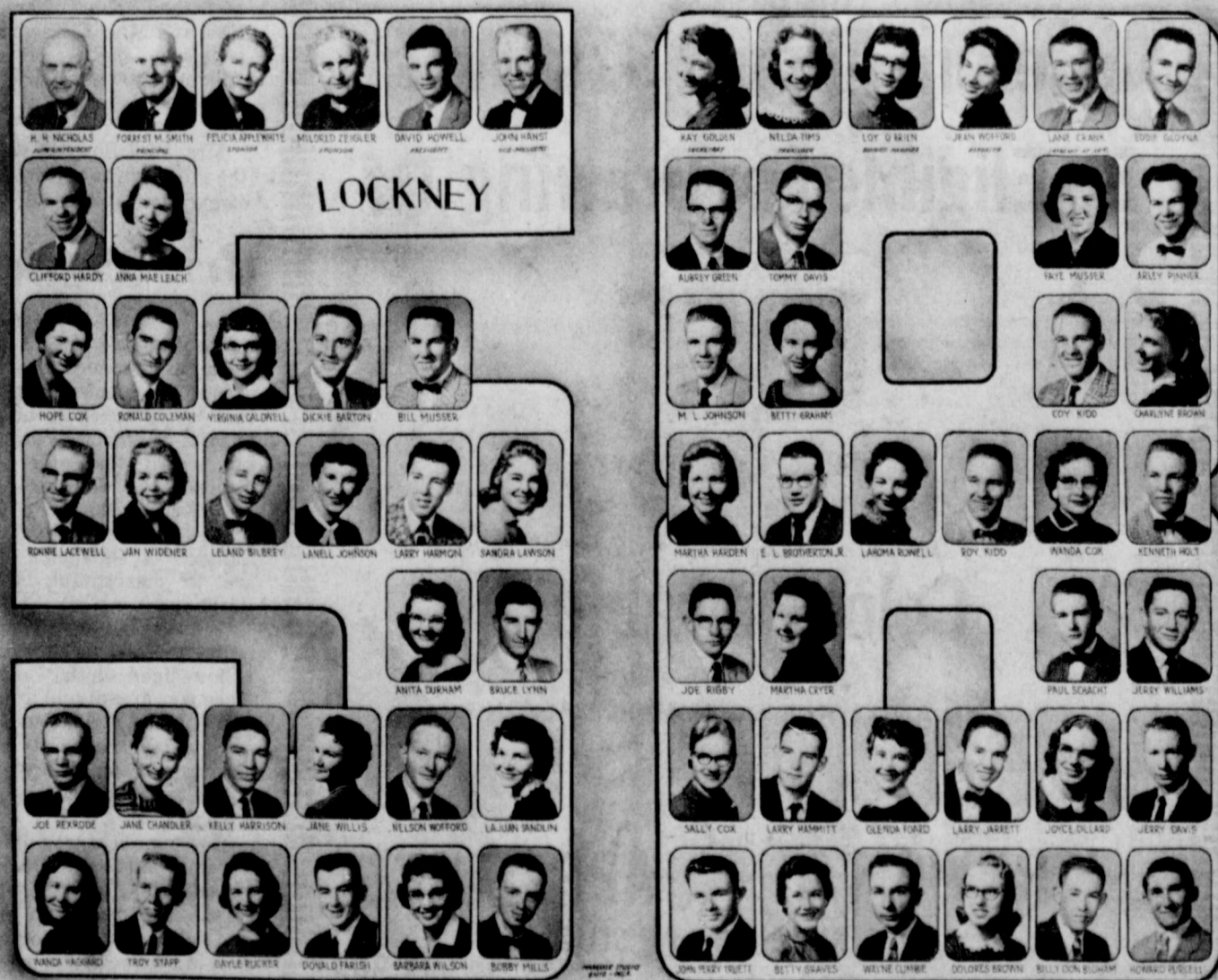

"An individual cannot alter their personal expectations until this admission is made.

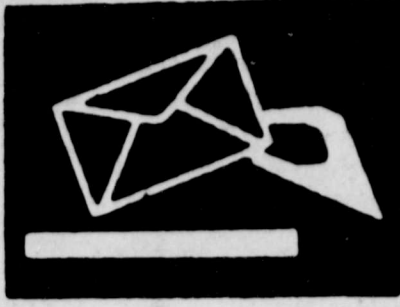
"After this fact is accepted then an older adult can change from tennis to bowling or give up certain yard work," the specialist says. Mrs. Blair is with the

BANANA NUTCRACKER SWEET ICE CREAM

1/2 teaspoon unflavored gelatin
 1/3 cup sugar
 1/3 cup milk
 1 cup medium-ripe mashed bananas
 1 teaspoon lemon juice
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 1-1/2 cups heavy cream

SAFETY SENSE

Mower No Push Over

Making your lawn beautiful is easy with a power mower. But before you get behind one there are some basic tips you should know, say the experts at the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute, for peak efficiency and safety.



ALWAYS STEER THE MOWER across slopes—never up and down.

1. If the grass is wet, wait until later in the day or until the next day. Wet lawns can cause you to slip and can make the blades and discharge chute clog.
2. With walk-behind mowers always mow across slopes—never up and down.
3. Know how to stop in an emergency—that's one advantage of rereading the owner's manual carefully at the beginning of the mowing season.
4. Banish kids and pets from the lawn while you're working. Playing near the lawn mower can be dangerous for them—and you.
5. Never wear sandals or go barefoot when mowing. Wear as sturdy a shoe as you can find.
6. When using an electric mower, follow proper mowing patterns to avoid cutting the power cord.
7. Avoid contact with the rotating blade. Stop the engine before cleaning the discharge chute or removing the grass catcher bag.

Get rid of old medicine by flushing it down the toilet—don't just throw it in a trash container, advises Claudia Kerbel, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Beef Markets To Weaken A Bit

COLLEGE STATION — Texas and the nation's cattlemen are enjoying a bit of prosperity these days due to improved cattle markets. The situation might change

a little, however, during the second half of the year, believes a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Ed Uvacek foresees a weakening in cattle prices in the third quarter of the year (July through September), with some strength returning as the year's end approaches. This improved market could easily carry into the new year.

"Fed cattle prices will probably be at their lowest levels in September or October and then should begin to gather strength once again," he contends. "Prices of feeder cattle will follow the same basic pattern. In fact, the feeder market will remain dependent on the fed cattle market price level."

Weakness in the fed cattle market this fall could easily cause feedlot cattle coming out then to lose money, notes Uvacek. "This could really hurt the feeder market since most cattlemen will be selling their 1978 calves about that time. Fortunately, feeder cattle numbers are down sharply this year, so this should help feeder prices somewhat."

The marketing specialist believes that beef prices will come down somewhat in response to some consumer or retailer resistance. "It is somewhat difficult to justify the present price levels sim-

LUBBOCK—The Statler Brothers, who have racked up more than three dozen major awards since breaking into the country music field in 1964, will be entertaining at the 61st annual Panhandle South Plains Fair here Sept. 23-30.

Fair general manager Steve L. Lewis said the popular group—which is neither Statlers or brothers—will be on stage in Fair Park Coliseum for two performances—5 p.m. and 8 p.m.—on Sept. 25.

They join the Johnny Rodriguez show, also featuring Lindsay Hargrove, which has been signed for one show on Sept. 26, and the Jim Ed Brown Show, featuring Helen Cornelius and Wendy Holcombe, for a single show on Sept. 27.

Three other shows will be announced later, Lewis said. The Statlers are four young men from Virginia,

including Harold Ried and Don Reid (the only two brothers), Lew DeWitt and Phil Balsley. All were reared in the Shenandoah Valley.

Discovered by Johnny Cash while making an appearance in Roanoke, Va., in 1964, they later joined his road show and were signed to a Columbia Records contract by Cash.

Shortley thereafter, the group made its first million-dollar sale, "Flowers on the Wall." In 1965, the Statler Brothers were nominated for four Grammy awards and won two of them. Since then, they've scored consistently, winning many major awards—some more than once.

Appearances have taken them to England, Ireland, Scotland, Italy, Germany, Australia, New Zealand, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Holland, Canada and Hawaii. They've played in the London Palladium, Carnegie Hall, The Astrodome and Hollywood Bowl, to name a few, plus countless television programs, recording dates, etc.

ply on the basis of supply and demand. Supplies are not off that much, and it's difficult to believe that consumer demand has increased that much in such a short period of time."

Beef production should only be down about 2 percent during the July-September period from that same period a year ago. Although fed cattle marketings should be up substantially, the reduction in total beef production will be caused by a decrease in non-fed steer and heifer slaughter and much lower cow slaughter levels. This same quarter, however, will have increased quantities of pork, broilers and turkeys. Overall, total meat supplies could be up 3 percent from a year ago, says Uvacek.

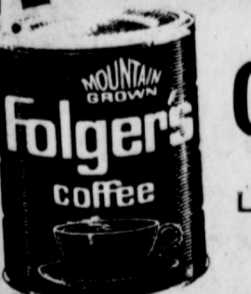

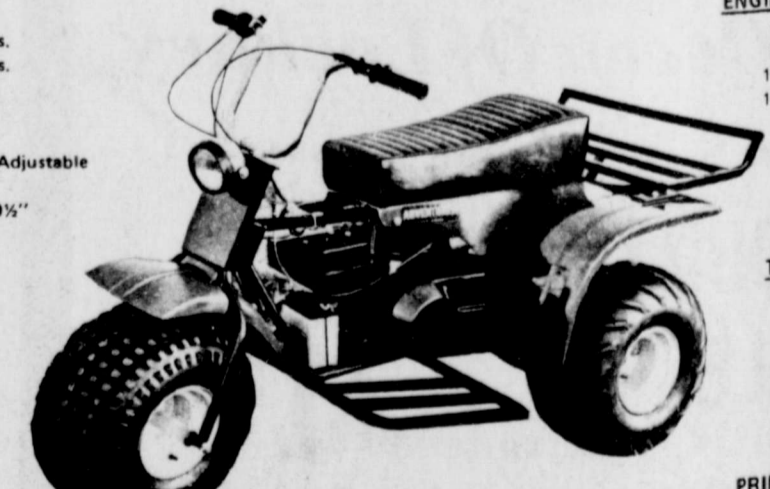

Cattle Raisers Ask For Tax Limitations In Texas

FORT WORTH, TEXAS, JUNE 23, 1978—A constitutional limit on state and local taxes similar to California's Proposition 13 has been called for by the president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, John Armstrong of Kingsville, Texas, representing one of the larger groups of land-owners in Texas.

In a letter to Governor Dolph Briscoe, Armstrong said, "I would like to request that you give serious

thought to calling a special session of the Legislature to consider a constitutional limitation on state and local taxes. This would provide the people of our state with the power of initiative and referendum. In this way, the people of Texas will have the same mechanism to influence a state government on this issue as the people of California."

Armstrong referred to the landslide vote for Proposition 13 in California which has caught the attention of

public officials and private citizens all over the nation. "We must strike while the sentiment is strong to limit taxation, thus slowing down the overdevelopment of bureaucracy. In six or eight more months, this enthusiasm and concern may well have cooled. Meaningful tax limitations put on by the Legislature depend on the backing of an aroused citizenry." Armstrong added that the upward trend of property taxes must be stemmed.

The Texas Constitution provides for regular sessions of the Legislature only in odd numbered years from January to June. Unless called into a special session by the governor, the Legislature will not meet until January, 1979.
