The City of Houston recorded the biggest percentage increase in sales tax collections among the state's larger cities, with revenues up 18 percent for

Houston's total for the year was \$49.3 million.

Dallas recorded a 9 percent increase for the year, with collections of \$27.7 million. San Antonio received \$13.6 million, a 10 percent hike, and revenues for Fort Worth totaled \$9.8 million up 13 percent.

Lockney's 1978 payments to date totalled \$20,803.37, up six percent from

the \$19,488.36 paid in the 1977 fiscal year. Lockney's August check was for \$1,291.03, compared to \$1,136.12 last

Floydada showed a 19 percent increase for the year, collecting \$48,946.-14 this year compared to \$40,946.66 in 1977. Floydada's August 1978 payment was \$3,228.52, and that city received \$3,008.35 in August of last year.

Depends On Commissioners Recently this newspaper reported that government funding has ceased for the Floyd County Probation Office and at the request of the editor, Choise Smith presents the following review of

"The Floyd County Probation Office opened September 1, 1975 with Choise Smith being the probation officer. The first four months that the office was open it received thirty-four referrals with four juveniles being placed on official probation and forty-six receiving informal adjustment.

In 1977 the office expanded to serve all the 110th Judicial District which includes Briscoe, Motley, Dickens and Floyd County. Two hundred and fortyone juveniles referrals were received with nine cases being placed on official probation and forty-eight on informal adjustment.

In 1978 two hundred and sixty-one referrals were received. Fifty juveniles were on informal adjustment and three juveniles on official probation. The number of referrals received by the Probation Officer are from sheriffs office, city police, school officials, concerned parents and juveniles themselves. Mr. Smith likes working with youth and feels that the method of informal adjustment is the most effective with juveniles. They report to the Floyd County office twice a month and a home visit is made once a month. The juveniles from other counties report by mail. They write twice a month and a personal visit by the officer is made in their homes once a month. Informal adjustment also indicates progress since it is necessary for the juvenile and his parents to cooperate. Some juveniles are placed on informal adjust-

ment on their first offense. The three years that the office has been operating in Floyd County the office has handled one hundred and nine adult misdemeanor probationers. Placement on probation makes the offender more aware of the crime that has been committed and is less likely to committ the same offense again.

The Probation Office has been in operation for the last three years from a 100% grant from the Criminal Justice Division. This grant ended July 31, 1978. The month of August the office is being operated by adult probation fees.

Funding will have to be made by the counties of the District and the commissioners court's of the district. Both the counties of the district and the commissioners court's are aware that the program ends unless funding is made available from the counties.



Mr. Thacker owned and operated Thacker Supply Company for 55 years Jeff Thacker.


Thacker founded his business on faith in human nature, and devoted a lifetime to his community. His store became a third generation business with son, Buzz Thacker and grandson,

## Body Scanner Installed At Methodist Hospit

LUBBOCK--Methodist Hospital's total body scanner system has been installed, and patients are being examined on both inpatient and outpatient schedules.

"Images from the body scanner permit physicians to study any portion of the head and body with unparalleled detail and accuracy. The certainty of diagnosis of many illnesses has been tremendously improved with the addition of the total body scanner, a sophisticated X-ray system combined with advanced electronic data processing, known as computerized tomography," George M. Brewer, hospital president, an nounces

Located in the lower level of the east building, the scanner is adjacent to the EMI brain scanner, nuclear medicine diagnostic area and the Harlan Hodges Regional Cancer Treatment Center. The hospital's scanning system was manufactured by General Electric's Medical Systems Division.

Any physician may order a scan for the patient on an outpatient basis. The scan images will be interpreted by a radiologist on the medical staff of Methodist Hospital, and a report will be given to the patient's attending physician.

Patients may check their insurance programs for coverage for body scans. Medicare provisions include costs of scans of the brain, but do not cover costs of scans made of other areas of the body, at this time. Plans are pending for coverage by Medicare of body scans.

Methodist Hospital received approval to install the \$700,000 system in October of 1977. Approval was granted by the Texas Health Facilities Commission in Austin. The Northwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church filed the application for certificate of need, and approval of the application was recommended by the South Plains Health Systems Agency.

"Physicians can evaluate the extent of many diseases as well as the patient's response to treatment such as surgery, radiation therapy or chemotherapy by studying scan images be fore, during and after a series of treatments," Dr. Votava adds.

The high speed of scanner operation produces a clear picture, because it eliminates blurr caused by natural biological movements such as breathing, heart beat and functions of the digestive system. If necessary, even very sick or very young patients can be still or hold their breath for these fast

To obtain a cross-sectional view of the inside of the body in one thin "slice" approximately one-half inch thick, multiple X-ray absorption measurements, requiring a very low amount of radiation, are made around the body. For a typical veniently located examination, the patient is sicians to study in positioned on an examinadoughnut-like opening in the scanner's gantry unit. On one side, concealed within the machine, is the X-ray tube. Directly opposite are the detectors, also hidden from view.

During the scan, both the X-ray tube and detectors rotate simultaneously in a complete circle about the patient. As it turns, the X-ray tube emits a tiny stream of radiation which is collected by the detectors. One rotation is completed within a few seconds.

The enormous quantity of date required to produce pictures of body tissue is the reason a computer is required to process the information and reconstruct it into a useful image. The picture is a highly detailed view of a portion of the body with white representing bone, black for air and shades of gray for tissue density between these two extremes.

The image produced by the scanner can be compared to viewing a single slice of bread without removing it from the loaf. A complete scanning examination might include from 6 to 10 individual slices to cover all of the area the physician wants to study.

During a scan, pictures are reconstructed within seconds and can be displayed on a television-like monitoring screen for the physician to see. Images with patient identification are stored on

## Around the County

County Agent's Column

WHY TREE DECLINE

We have been receiving many calls the last two weeks regarding the decline in health and vigor of shade trees. Although many tree problems can be directly attributed to insects, diseases, or recordbreaking weather conditions, the problem of tree decline usually lies below the ground in some form of root stress. Often this hidden stress exists for years, and it is not until symptoms manifest themselves in the above-ground portion of the tree, i.e. leaves curling and dying; bare branches; smaller than

normal foliage with varying shades of red, yellow, and green, that concern is realized. Soil compaction is probably the number one cause of root stress. It is essential that air (oxygen) enter through the soil so that it can be taken in by the roots, and that carbon dioxide. when given off, can readily move up from the root zone and escape into the atmosphere. Where soil compaction exists, this process cannot occur normally and results in the death of many roots. Other causes of root stress are poor soil drainage, surfacing materials, i.e. concrete or black top, installation of below-ground service lines, or any alteration of the soil levels (either the addition or removal of soil).

Girdling roots are another very real cause of shade tree decline. If trees are improperly planted or located in areas where normal root development isn't possible, their roots may eventually grow around the base of the tree, either just above or below the soil surface and gradually strangle the tree to death. If you are unable to see any girdling roots and see no evidence of normal outward flaring of the trunk

as it goes into the ground, beware! Carefully dig just below the surface (2"-4") and you will probably find one or more roots growing around the trunk or other primary roots. If girdling roots are involved, cut the troublesome root or root

with a sharp chisel. If this is not the problem, try to improve whatever the condition is that is causing the stress. Although each cause must be dealt with differently, it would be helpful to reduce the plant's demand on root system by carefully pruning back the top of the tree and removing any unwanted branches early in the spring.



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

Additionally, the Association reports that in 1970 when the retail price of white bread averaged 24.2 cents per pound, 2.6 cents was attributable to the cost of the wheat required to create that pound of bread. In 1977, the retail price had risen to 35.5 cents per pound, but the cost of the wheat remained at 2.6




