When the Founding Fathers framed the U.S. Constitution, a battle began over the question of ratification by the states. Those who were afraid of too strong a central government wanted a "bill of rights" spelled out in the form of amendments to the original document. Federalists, who were more in favor of a strong central government, did not feel that an amendment was necessary because equality and rights were already included in the constitution itself (that is, of course, if you were not black or female). They felt that the addition of the amendment was not needed. However, the Bill of Rights was eventually added to ensure anti-federalist support and ratification.

Last week, Congress granted supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment of the Constitution three additional years to secure ratification. The Senate voted 60-36 to extend the time limit from March 22, 1979 until June 30, 1982. The House had voted 233-189 to extend the time. The equal rights amendment reads: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any states on account of sex."

The proposed amendment has caused many to fear the abolishment of any allowed sex distinctions which will

result in the fall of the home and the sharing of all public facilities. The cons also fear loss of liberties rather than gains. They argue that equality is already provided and that the amendment is not needed and should be fought because it strikes at the heart of the democratic system.

Others, including President Carter, approve the time extension and the amendment itself. Anti-amendment Phyllis Schaeffly says the extension will be fought in court on constitutional grounds. The question has also caused debate on whether or not states which have ratified should be allowed to rescind.

Thirty-five states have ratified the amendment. Those who have not include Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia.

On the question of rescinding ratification, the Justice Department has said the validity of rescindments should be decided by Congress.

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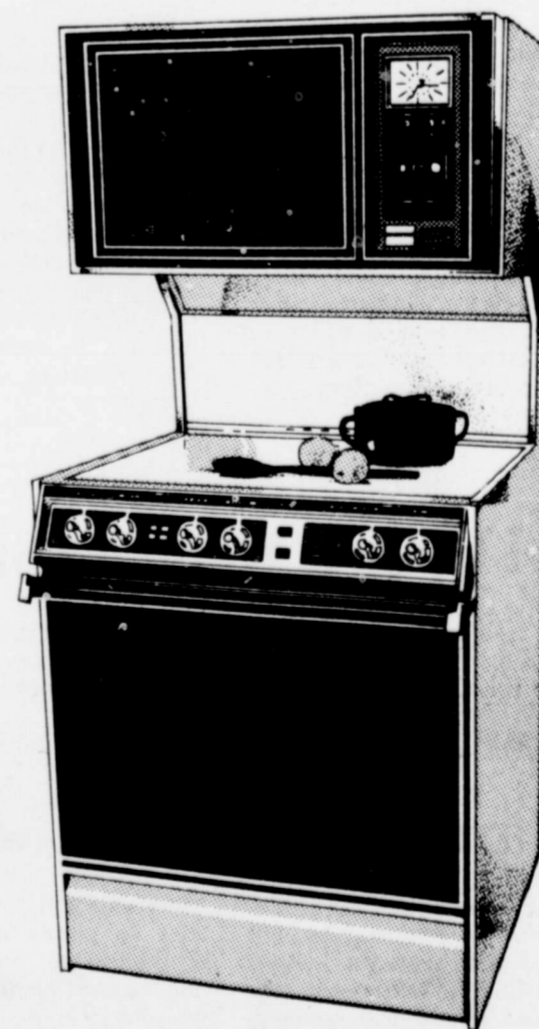

A MHMR bus runs a daily regular route to pick up retarded adults to bring them in to spend certain days working (they are paid for their work and enjoying recreational opportunities at the Center). They look forward eagerly to this opportunity to socialize.

While the Center is largely supported by government funds, each county makes a financial contribution. Also, clients pay sliding scale based on income.

American Agriculture A Year Old

SPRINGFIELD, CO.—A year ago this month, 600 farmers and ranchers met in this southeastern Colorado town of 2,000 and decided to pressure Congress and the Carter administration for legislation mandating 100 per cent of parity for agricultural products.

"Politicians," is the word political scientists would use to label the change in the farmer/rancher. Farmers and ranchers are now reading papers and magazines more voraciously and more carefully, are watching newscasts and news programs, and have vowed to become a viable political force, not only by demonstrating and lobbying, but by voting as a bloc.

The American Agriculture Movement has formed an informal coalition with the AFL-CIO for the purpose of determining which candidates support agriculture and labor, and to work to defeat those who don't.

"We have demonstrated that the individual can still have a voice in government," Schroder said. For example, Schroder said it was the pressure of the AAM which caused Congress to improve on the 1977 Farm Bill by making \$2 billion more in farm aid available to financially strapped farmers and ranchers. The price of wheat during the last year has risen from approximately \$1.90 a bushel to

labeling so the consumer thinks it is domestically grown. Farmers and ranchers in the AAM also brought to the attention of the USDA the fact that imported meat was being used in the school lunch program, and it has subsequently been withdrawn.

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\$2.75 a bushel, and the price of wheat from \$2.25 a bushel is a direct result of the Agriculture action.

The AAM has also accomplished a great deal to reconsider and change business transactions. Storage payments from the government, and was able to extend the hay and grain market into the grain market.

"We've been involved in other farmers and the multinational corporations, and we've been able to get some of our policies of this country changed," Schroder said.

It's amazing how aggressive we were a year ago. We've come a long way," Schroder commented. "We still want parity. Anything else won't do."

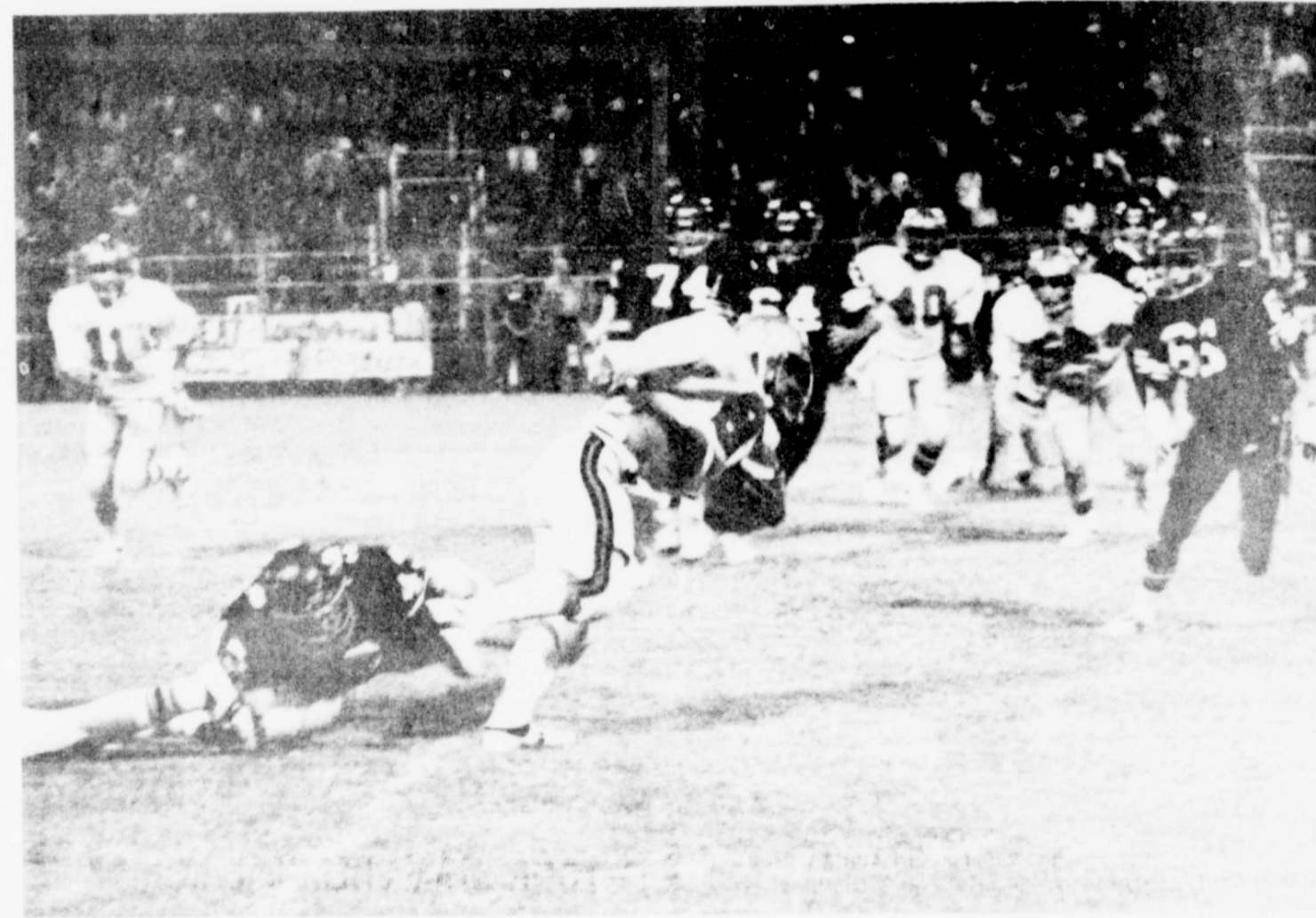

DIRECT DEPOSIT PROGRAM CHANGE
Several inquiries have been received regarding receipt of benefit payments by payees at their home address, even though direct deposit had been requested and properly processed.

When a VA is suspended and resumed during the same month, but the resume action is input after the computer update cycle, the Treasury Department has been issuing a check for the irregular payment to the payee's home address for that month. Direct deposit has been resumed the following month. This procedure has recently been changed. Treasury should now issue the irregular payment to the bank.

CLAIMS FOR DEFOLIANT EXPOSURE
Claims for service-connected disability benefits are being received from veterans who claim disability incurred through or aggravated by exposure to defoliants used during the Vietnam War. Except for a skin condition known as chloracne, there is presently no firm data to incriminate the herbicides as causa aene, there is presently no firm data to incriminate the herbicides as causa active agents of any other known category of disease or chronic symptom. 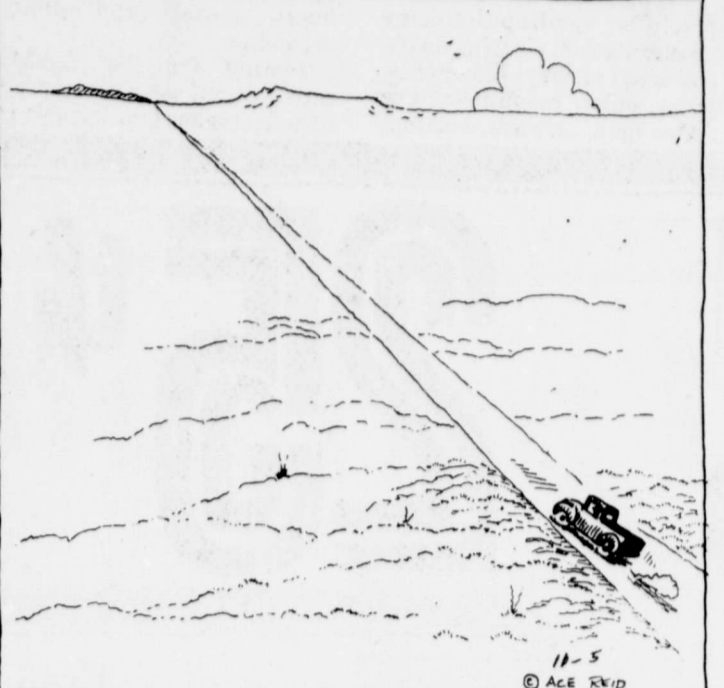
