

Hill Campaigners In Lockney

Gubernatorial candidate John Hill is emphasizing that as Governor he will cut back any State agency's budget that is not spending the taxpayer's dollar in a wise and economical manner. according to a group of Hill supporters taking part in a campaign caravan.

The caravan, one of 10 traveling around the state this week, is headed by Jim Hunter. The caravan stopped in Lockney Tuesday afternoon.

"The Hill Adminstration will be the most fiscally sound of any State government in the United States," the caravan leader said. "John Hill knows that the people of

Texas are tired of wasteful spending, and he will do something to change this

pattern." "One of his first committments as

Governor will be to require state agencies to justify current expenditures. Furthermore, any new expenditures for the next biennium will be closely reviewed to make certain the taxpayer's dollar is spent only when absolutely necessary.

"Hill's goal is a financially responsible government and one that will restore confidence in how our state's business is handled.

"We believe that Texas government can best be run by someone who has worked within the state government structure, by someone who is familiar with the intergovernmental structure in Texas, and not by a displaced federal bureaucrat who has never been in contact with our state government operations.'

McConnell Chief Of Police

Bill McConnell was named chief of police Thursday morning at the Lockney city council's regular monthly meeting. McConnell had been acting chief for several weeks following the resignation of Donnie Ballew. McConnell was officially named police chief after a personnel discussion, which was closed to the public and press.





The equal rights amendment reads: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any states on

account of sex.' The proposed amendment has caused many to fear the abolishment of any allowed sex distinctions which will





SPRINGFIELD, CO .- A year ago this month, 600 farmers and ranchers met in this southeastern Colorado town of 2,000 and decided to pressure Congress and the Carter administration for legislation mandating 100 per cent of parity for agricultural products. They didn't get that in a year's time. But, they did achieve a lot of other things.

Perhaps the most important accomplishment of the American Agriculture Movement, according to a founder, is the fact that it has in such a short time opened the eyes of other farmers and ranchers, farm organizations, the public and politicians to the agricultural situation in this country.

"Politicians are now taking stands on agriculture," said Eugene Schroder, national spokesman for the AAM. "Farm organizations that were supposed to be representing farmers in the first place are now becoming more responsive since the American Agriculture Movement was started a year ago.

Schroder added that the AAM has not only educated the American consumer about the plight of the farmer and rancher, but it has also exposed the fact that Americans are eating chemically contaminated produce imported into this country with misleading
