## 'I Ran My 1928, Red-Wheeled Chevrolet On Kerosene' — John Jenkins

"The beginning of my surrender to the ministry was while I was flying over Berlin, Germany with Berlin as the target in my 10th scheduled combat mission in World War II. That was when I made a new commitment to the Lord. I promised I would do what he wanted me to do," says Lockney First Baptist Church pastor, John Jenkins.

As an aerial engineer Technical Sergeant Jenkins flew 35 combat missions. The flights were made in a B-17 dubbed "the Honey Bee." "She's a Honey Bee" they said. The crew of the Honey Bee was sent back to the U.S. following the 35th mission. They had made enough points gained in service. The amount of time in service, the fighting territory that they were over and the missions that were flown added up to enough points to bring the Honey Bee home.

At the time of his being drafted, he gave his preference as the Air Force and "got it." He asked for radio operator in flying, but aptitude tests showed him better qualified for aerial engineer. Before his time in the service, he had little experience to qualify him for his assignment. He had grown up on a farm that was worked not by machinery, but by "17 horses and one onerous mule."

He was born in Jones County January 10, 1918, at the time of a blinding snowstorm that reached such blizzard proportions that the doctor dared not venture out to answer the call for him. A neighbor served as mid-wife. He weighed 12 pounds at birth. The doctor came the next day. All of this took place five miles east of Hamlin and 40 miles

north-west of Abilene in mesquite country.

"We were renting on a farm until I was about five years old, then moved about a mile and half where we lived until Dad died. My schooling was in Wise Chapel until my last two years in high school in Hamlin where I graduated in 1936.

"My brother and I drove a 1928 red-wheeled Chevrolet in 1935 and '36. We ran it on kerosene. It was a 4-cylinder. It ran pretty good on kerosene. Dad always kept a barrel of it to help build fires in a wood stove."

Jenkins says, with his wife adding that he has always been mechanically minded and "can make things work that other people can't."

During those years of growing up, a favorite pastime was riding horses on Sunday.

"Groups of us would get together and ride horses and calves. We thought we were cowboys. I have been through so many times. One time when I was thrown off a mule, my shoulder blade was broken. I have been thrown off and stomped and run over while roping calves. When we got to where we could ride, we gave it up," he remembers.

One extra-curricular school activity of young Jenkins' interest was football in Hamlin in high school for two years. Once when the team went to Roby in a conference game, he was playing end. He let a guard have his helmet which left him with an unprotected nose that was broken in the game.

"At that time, we played basketball the year around. I had no preference in sports. I liked any of them. We had a

good basketball team in Hamlin. We played 78 games and won 74 of them in two years. We played all schools by counties. Teams qualified for district, regional and state. We won district two years, but lost each time at regional

The Jenkins have a trophy that was won by an independent basketball team. They played several years. Ten boys got together and made up a team sponsored by local merchants who bought their suits.

"There were lots of independent teams then. We had tournaments all around the country. We played the colleges-Hardin Simmons and Abilene Christian College," he says.

After high school graduation, for two years, 1937 and '37, I farmed with Dad."

Then he was with Plastic Gyp Mill making sheet rock. The company is still making sheet rock.

The next job was with the Acme Lumber Company, an oil field lumber yard. To a great extent, this company serviced oil fields.

"We did work on oil rigs. The rig was metal. The flooring and subflooring were wood. We also built company houses."

While working for Acme in 1940, he married his high school sweetheart, Juanita Harbert, who worked for Southwestern Bell at the time. He became assistant manager and bookkeeper when the family moved to Hobbs, N.M.

He was drafted for military service soon after their first son was born. "My brother-in-law and I were the first ones with children to go from Jones County, Texas, where we had lived and where we were registered. We each had a four-months-old son."

Soon the basic training began at Wichita Falls to be followed by gunnery school in Kingman, Arizona, then back to Amarillo for Aviation Mechanic School. In Lincoln, Nebraska, he was assigned to overseas combat. The last training was at Rattlesnake Air Force Base at Pyote, Texas. There, the men flew such high altitudes that they nearly froze to death then back down where an egg could be fried on the ramp.

As a result, the Airman John Jenkins had such a serious case of pneumonia that the Red Cross called in all the family, but "the Lord had further use" for him.

After the war was over, the Jenkins went back to Hobbs and the lumber company for a year.

"We had the opportunity then to buy a drug store in the oil field town of Sundown where there were already two other drug stores. We owned and operated the drug store eight years.

"The Lord convicted me in the fifth year of the drug store ownership. I made another commitment. The Lord spoke to me as plain as could be. Through Brotherhood organization, I was given the opportunity to be Brotherhood President and then Brotherhood association president. I served in that capacity for two years. During

that time, I had the opportunity to preach laymen services in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

"I was preaching 40 or 50 miles north of San Francisco when I was convinced to surrender to full time ministry.

"We came back to Texas and made arrangements to sell the business and our home in order to enter the seminary."

"I had been raised in a good, Christian home. My father was a deacon. I was saved when I was nine years old," he says.

Hodges Baptist Church, 12 miles northeast of Levelland, was the first pastorate. He was called there in October, 1954. He was licensed by the home church in Sundown and was ordained in October.

"From there, I started a Seminary Extension course in Lubbock. I started to Wayland and was there from '55 to '61, commuting from church to school. Juanita was enrolled in Wayland one year. My pastoring and taking care of the family at the same time taught our boys to finish education while young before marriage."

All this time, he was pastoring. He was at Hodges three years, at Woodrow Baptist Church for four years before he was called to a mission field.

The mission field was in Flagstaff, Arizona. Here, he pastored First Southern Baptist Church two years. First Southern Baptist was "packed full" of mission activity.

"We sponsored Indian Baptist Mission in Tuba City on the Navajo Reservation. We had Anglo Mission at Fredonia. We started a mission on an Indian reservation not far from Tuba," he states. There was no church secretary.

In August 1963, the Jenkins moved to Spur and the First Baptist Church there. It was a move from the mountains to a "hot climate." They were there three years before a pastorate of eight years at Lorenzo.

"Now here we are in Lockney for the last four and a half years."

He "continues going west for revival work."

One time he got on the plane with his hand bag, but checked his suits through. He arrived at his destination, but his suits didn't. For the week there, he wore a sport coat and pants. The two new suits were never found.

Another time, when he went west in April for a revival, he was stranded at Clines Corners with about 150 other people in a restaurant. They spent the night there.

This was nothing new for the restaurant owner. He merely set soup and chili on the steam table, told the group that there was milk in the refrigerator for the babies and went to bed.

"You may pay by putting your money in this carton," the restaurant owner announced before leaving the room.

That all-night stay in Clines Corners was an excellent opportunity for mission work. There were some impressive results.

"We came to Lockney with the

THE LOCKNEYS — Dennis, Katy, Denny and Donny, from Warrenton, Virginia — were in Lockney Wednesday and Thursday, and the main thing they noticed about our city was the friendliness of the people and the way Lockneyites took time out from a busy holiday schedule to give them information and show them around. They mentioned Dee Copeland, Doug Meriwether, Claude Brown, Mary Bollman, Nancy Marble, Virginia Taylor and Jinna Sue Turner in particular. All those people, they said, were real nice to them. Mr. Copeland showed them around town Wednesday afternoon; Doug saw to it that the Lockney's Christmas cards were postmarked "Lockney, Texas"; Nancy, Virginia and Mary helped out with some historical stuff about Lockney in which the Lockneys were interested; Mayor Brown visited with them Wednesday night; Jinna Sue gave them some souvenirs (matchbooks, candy, pens, etc.) bearing the "Lockney, Texas" inscription from the First National Bank.

THEY MENTIONED IT AGAIN before they left town Thursday — the

main thing they'll remember about Lockney, Texas is the friendliness of the people. That's a pretty good thing to be remembered for, I'd say.

MADelyn MURRAY O'HAIR does not now and never has had any connections with a petition filed with the FCC to remove religious programming from radio and TV; she has not requested a hearing before the FCC to present 27,000 signatures in support of an alleged bill to stop the religious programming. The petition was one filed in 1974 by two California men requesting the FCC to issue rulings that would freeze the assignment of additional educational television of FM radio licenses to individuals or groups planning to air only religious or quasi-religious programs.

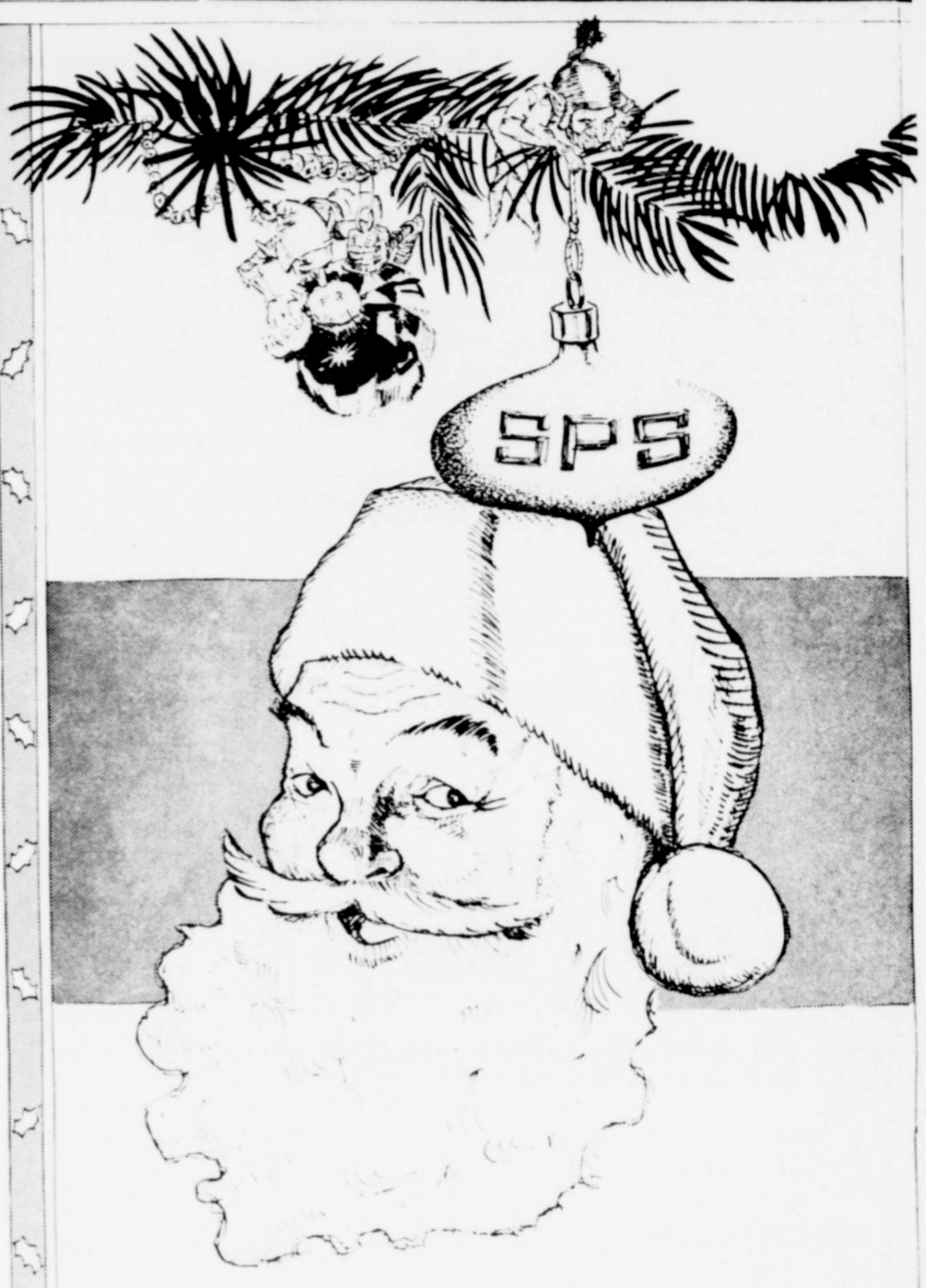

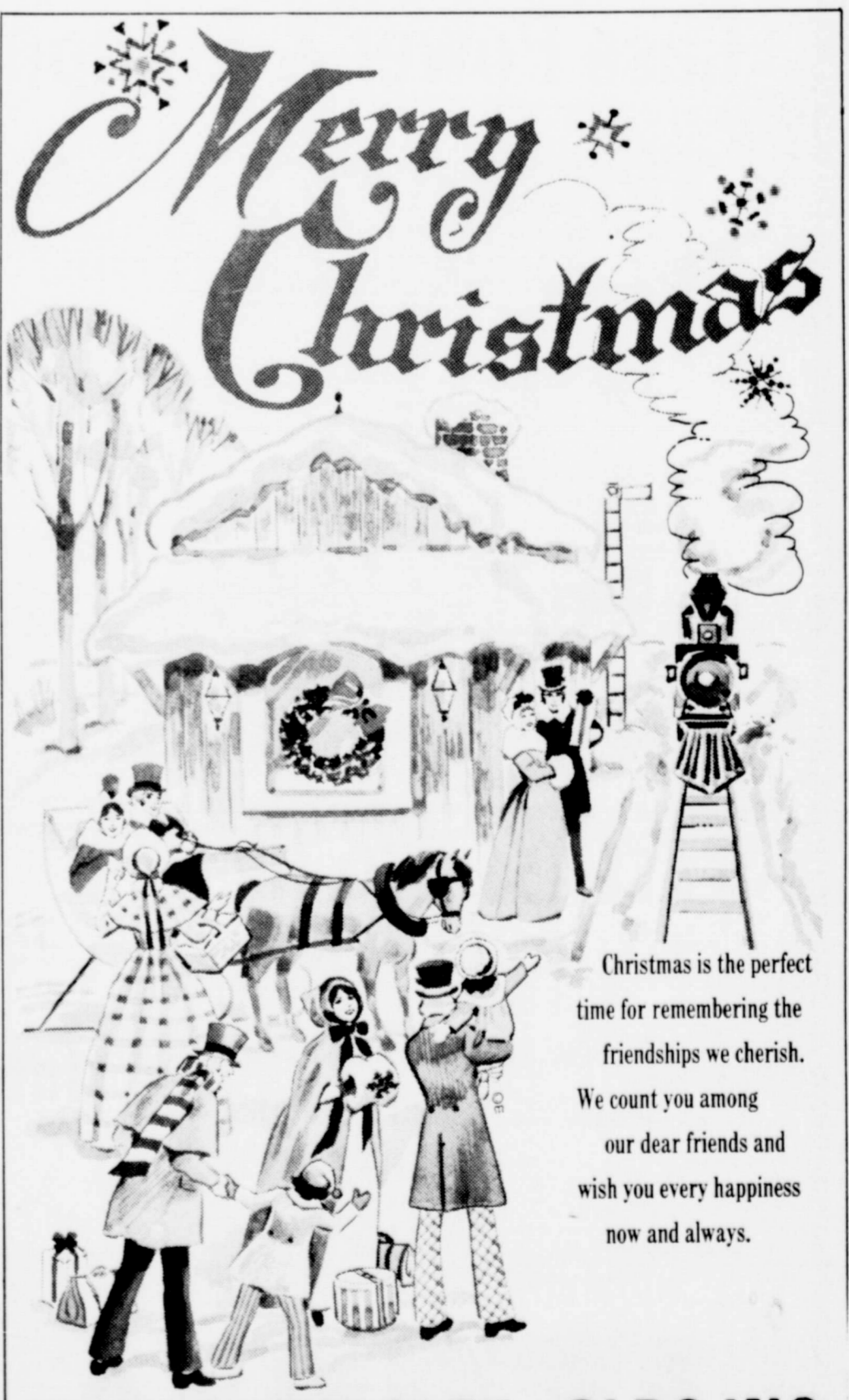

## First Summit: "An Historic First"

College Station, Texas -- "I view this as an historic moment when at long last the major segments of U.S. agriculture have come together to address problems that are common to us all."

Hendricks, a dairy farmer from Bloomfield, Iowa, concluded the first National Farm Summit here at Texas A&M University. Hendricks, who served as Chairman of the Conference, is immediate

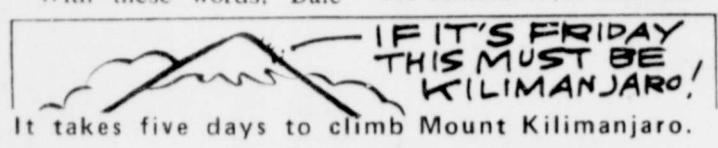
past Chairman of the Agriculture Council of America which co-sponsored the conference with Texas A&M.

More than 800 representatives of all segments of U.S. agriculture attended the three-day gathering which featured task force presentations and findings that were developed by top agricultural leaders during the past six months.

Featured speakers included U.S. Senator Bob Dole (R-Kan.), former Texas Governor John Connally, and Lynn Daft, a top advisor to President Carter.

Among major recommendations made at the Summit was a proposal for the development of a Washington D.C. based forum which would serve to bring together all of the major farm and commodity groups and other groups within the food system to discuss policy issues on a continuing basis. This recommendation came from a task force report on "Agriculture's Role in Government Decisions" chaired by Dr. John Kramer, Associate Dean of the Georgetown University Law Center.

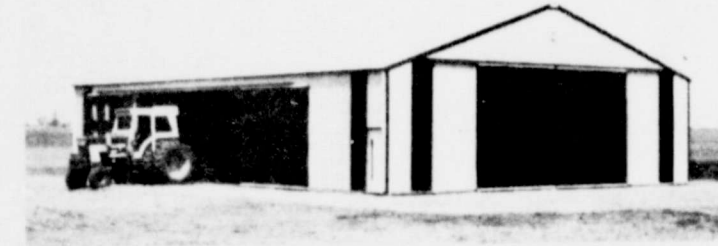
The packed sessions included lively give and take discussion among a diverse group which has never assembled for these purposes. Participation ranged from individuals farmers to top officials of major agribusiness companies, economists and university administrators, farm and commodity organizations, and banking community, major U.S. trading partners, and spokesmen for Congress, the White House and U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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The year 1979 will see substantial changes in the internal workings of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., thanks to by-laws amendments recently adopted by unanimous vote of the organization's Board of Directors.

The Board has expressed its expectation that the changes will help to assure a continuation of a strong, effective organization keenly sensitive to the needs of its members.

The High Plains cotton producers and cotton-related businessmen who make up the PCG membership, according to the Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, will feel the first effects of the new by-laws as counties begin holding meetings to elect PCG Directors.

PCG has two directors from each of its 25 High Plains counties, one a cotton producer and the other an agribusinessman who may be, and often is, a cotton producer as well. Directors are elected on alternate years in individual county meetings. Most counties in 1979 will be electing producer directors.

Since 1956 when PCG was organized all producers and businessmen present at a county meeting could take part in the election process. All were eligible to vote and all were eligible for election as a director. But such will not be the case at election meetings to be held in early 1979.

Under the new by-laws only producers and businessmen who are current dues-paying PCG members will be eligible to vote or serve as directors.

Producer dues to PCG are 15 cents per bale, with collections made at participating gins. There is also an established dues schedule for gins, oil mills, compresses and banks. Other businessmen pay dues based on the size of their respective operations. Business dues are paid direct to the PCG office in Lubbock.

"By making dues payment a prerequisite to helping elect directors or serving as directors," Johnson explains, "the Board intends to assure that PCG policy and especially the disposition of PCG funds will be determined by the members who provide those funds."

Another result of the amended by-laws will be a change in the makeup and size of the Board's Executive Committee.

## Cotton Prices Steady To Lower

High Plains cotton prices were steady to \$1.50 per bale lower the week ending December 14, 1978 according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director at USDA's Marketing Services Office in Lubbock.

Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 33, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 around \$8.30 cents per pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 43 and 53, staples 30 and 31, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 brought about \$2.95

cents Dickson said.

Gins paid growers \$115 to \$130 per ton for cottonseed.

High Plains marketing Services Offices graded 285,000 samples this week, bringing this season's total to 683,000. This compares to 2,368,000 graded by December 15 last year.

Predominant High Plains grades this week were 41 at 25 percent, grade 51 accounted for 15 percent, grade 42

amounted to 35 percent and grade 52 was 12 percent.

Fifteen percent were reduced one grade because of barm, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Staple lengths were mostly in the desirable 3.5 - 4.9 range at 76 percent of the total. Twenty-three percent was lower.

Breaking strength averaged 86,000 pounds per square inch.

## Thank Goodness For Snakes, They Are Friend Of Man

Thank goodness for snakes. Those who suffer from herpetophobia—the fear of snakes—will be dubious, but the truth is that snakes are very helpful creatures, according to the current issue of Ranger Rick's Nature Magazine.

Because they eat rodents, insects, and other pests, both

poisonous and harmless snakes are a special friend of the farmer, says the children's monthly published by the National Wildlife Federation.

All snake venoms are comprised of enzymes that attack a bitten victim's nerves, blood, or muscles. Scientists are now able to isolate some

Previously all PCG past presidents automatically became members of this committee. There was no limitation on their terms or on the number that might serve on the committee at any one time.

The new by-laws specify that only the two immediate past presidents shall automatically hold Executive Committee membership. PCG presidents are limited to two consecutive one-year terms, thus the new provision means each past president will serve on the committee only four years after retirement unless re-elected a director from his county and re-elected to the committee by the Board.

The remainder of the Executive Committee, as before, will be made up of the three current elected PCG officers (President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer) plus six others elected by and from the Board.

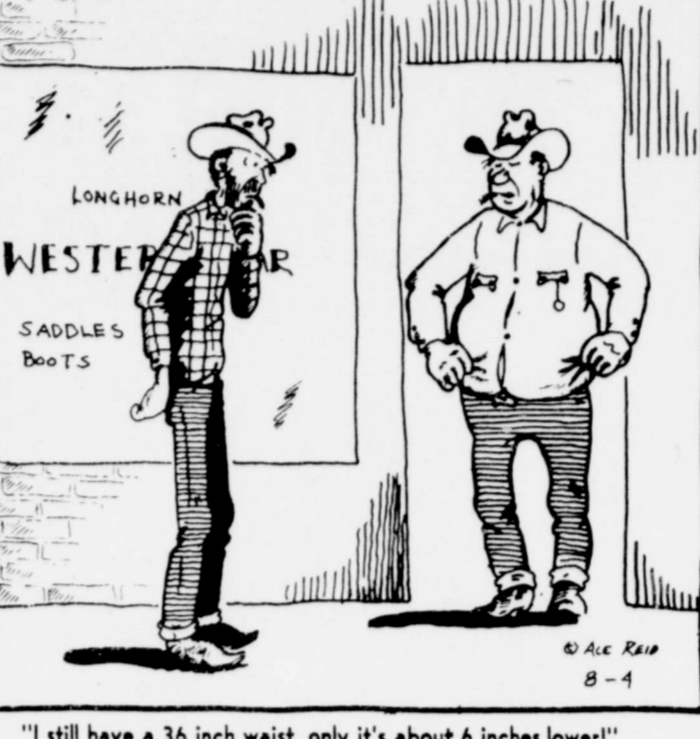

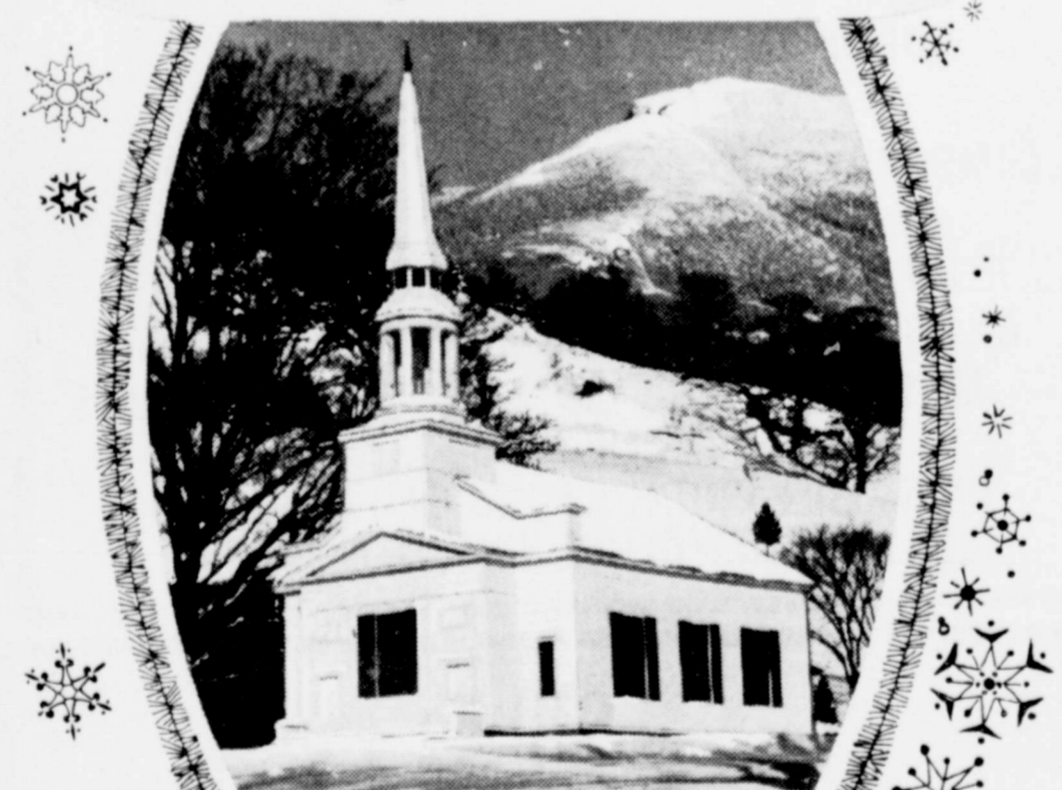

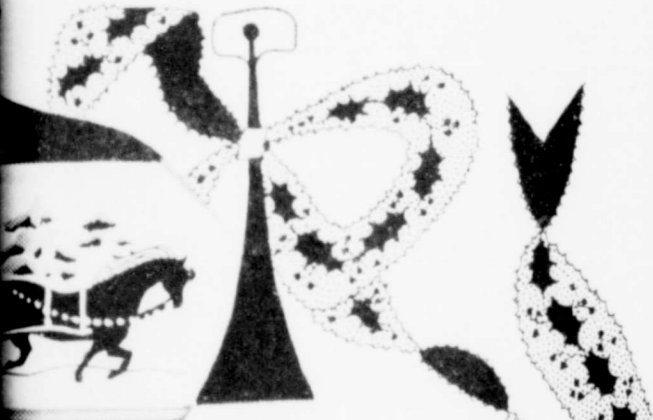
