The LISD tax assessor-collector said the school district is operating with about \$36,000,000 on the tax roll, which will be increased to some \$90,000,000 under the new full-market-value appraisal system. "If they (the state legislature) give away a third of that in exemptions and cut us to a \$60,000,000

tax roll, there will have to be a 50-percent increase in the tax rate." Samford said. That's assuming that LISD expenses stay the same.

"Remember," Samford says, "It all hinges on what the legislative does with the power we [Texas voters] gave them



"Throw some at me and let's see."



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

The present 4-H club movement in Texas is an outgrowth of boys' "Corn Clubs" and girls' "Tomato Clubs" dating back more than 70 years, or 6 years before the present Texas Agricultural Extension Service was organized, points out Birch L. Lobban, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The first boys' corn club in Texas was organized in 1908 in Jack County by the late T.M. Marks, then holding a position corresponding to the county agricultural agent of today. The club was started as a result of the failure of an adult corn show held the previous year. The remark, "You can't teach an old dog new tricks,' prompted Marks to say, "Then I'll start with the pups. And that is what he did. He enrolled 25 boys, and by demonstrations, taught them the latest practices in corn production. The corn show held in a caboose of a train in Jacksboro in the fall of 1908 proved Marks' point that farm youth could put into practice better-known methods of production, notes Lobban.
"Beef Calf Clubs" came next, the

first being organized in Coleman County in 1910, largely through the support of the late J.W. "Boog Scott, then a prominent Coleman cattleman. Sam L. Matthews also of Coleman, showed the first club beef calf at the 1910 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth.

The first statewide rally for corn club boys was held at the 1910 State Fair of Texas in Dallas. A feature of the rally was a parade of 1,500 boys through the

downtown section of

carrying a stalk of corn. Girls were enrolled in tomato clubs in 1912 in Milam County with Mrs. Edna Trigg as the first home demonstration agent. Growing tomatoes and canning were the main demonstrations.

With the passage of the Smith-Lever Act by Congress in 1914, funds became available for employing Extension workers for boys' and girls' club work, explains Lobban. The act provided for up to 20 percent of its funds to be used for "movable schools, study clubs, or boys' and girls' clubs.

Enrollment in those early clubs is at best a guess. Accepted figures show the 1914 membership at 116,262 and 1915 membership at 161,518. Few people realize that boys' corn clubs and girls' tomato clubs helped pave the way for cooperative federal-state-county and city support for Extension work and that 4-H has spread to 82 countries around the world.

4-H in Texas expanded rapidly following the creation of the state Agricultural Extension Services in 1914 by the U.S. Congress, says Lobban. In 70 years it has grown from 25 boys who grew an acre of corn to 5.5 million boys and girls with a wide variety of projects.

swath. Space each pie pan or box four feet apart. Next, set the delivery chute on the applicator at the desired fertilizer rate and then determine the speed of travel. Always drive into the wind or with the wind when calibrating the applicator. When the calibration is made, the fertilizer spreader should straddle pan or box number six.

Next, funnel the fertilizer from the pie pans or boxes into the rain gauge tube and record the inches of fertilizer in each tube. The amount of fertilizer in each tube shows the relative distribution pattern at each point within the fertilizer applicator's swath. Accompanying Table 1 is an example of a recorded dry fertilizer applicator pat-

Now look at your data and determine the one-half rate on each end of the fertilizer swath. The distance between the one-half rates will be the fertilizer swath to apply. On this application (Table 1), the swath width will be between pan number two and 10. Since there are four feet between each pan, the fertilizer swath should only be 32 feet wide. This distance allows for a uniform overlap on each swath. EXAMINE DATA

Next, examine the data to see if the applicator swath has points where the fertilizer is being applied at higher rates. In Table 1, notice that between pan numbers six and seven the fertilizer application is higher that at the other points. Also, check to see if the right or left side is receiving more fertilizer. This applicator spreads more fertilizer to the right side.

Here are some tips that will correct the fertilizer pattern on a single spinner. To shift the pattern to the left, make these adjustments.

1. Move chute to the shift point of delivery in a clockwise direction. 2. Move the point of delivery closer

to the center of the spinner. 3. Move blade tips forward in the direction of the spinner rotation so that blades are pitched forward. 4. Increase spinner speed.

To shift a pattern to the right, make the adjustments in the opposite direction. Also, spinner speed can be reduced to correct for a high rate in the center of the swath.

With twin-spinner applicators, the application behind the applicator may be too light. To correct, make these

Move chute to shift the points of delivery in a direction opposite of individual spinner rotation (move for-

ward or nearer the distributor). 2. Shift the points of delivery closer to the outer edges of the spinners. 3. Move blade tips back in a direction opposite to individual spinner rotation.

Increase spinner speed. If the rate behind the applicator is too heavy, make adjustments in the opposite direction.

TO DETERMINE RATE

To determine the fertilizer rate per acre, disengage the spinners and collect the fertilizer in a container. Weigh the fertilizer from the conveyor over a distance of 200 feet. Record weight for determining the rate applied per acre. To calculate the fertilizer rate per acre:

Pounds of fertilizer per acre equals pounds of fertilizer collected divided by 200 feet times swath width feet divided by 43,560 square feet per acre.

Texas Tech Researcher Working For Improved Dryland Sorghule: 2 bedroom

Fitting all the pieces together to come up with a grain sorghum plant with optimum growth for dryland conditions is a tall order, but one researcher is optimistic about the eventual outcome.

Dr. Daniel R. Krieg, jointly employed as a plant physiologist by Texas Tech University and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, said both the sorghum variety and the climate have strong effects on grain sorghum yield. But more important are the rates of leaf area development and photosynthesis because plant moisture is lost through the leaves.

Krieg is trying to identify the exact effect of these factors to help facilitate the future development of a better grain sorghum plant by cooperating plant breeders for marginal production conditions—a plant that responds well under good conditions but remains stable under water stress conditions.

"The problem with several sorghum types capable of tolerating water stress conditions is that they do not respond well to good conditions," Krieg said.

One of the challenges in developing a better hybrid strain is that the hybrid tends to follow characteristics from one parent plant or another and not to combine the influences. Krieg has found that under non-stress conditions the hybrids follow the female parent characteristics in leaf development and the male parent's in photosynthesis. Under water stress in reverse is true-the hybrid follows the female parent in photosynthesis and the male in leaf development.

Krieg said the ultimate goal is to develop a plant with smaller leaves and at the same time to increase the photosynthetic rate. Photosynthesis contributes as much as 95 percent of the dry, solid portion of the plant. Knowing how a parent plant will respond will aid Krieg and his team in identifying superior hybrid crosses.

The researchers are also studying the effect of particular sorghum varieties on grain production. Some sorghum is classified as perennial-under drought conditions these plants will sacrifice grain production in order to maintain vegetative growth. Annually growing sorghum reacts in the reverse. Under drought conditions these plants will contribute the majority of the photosynthesis material to the grain and sacrifice

plant growth. A farmer facing dryland conditions will want to choose a type best suited to his rainfall pattern.

The final contributing factor in breeding the ideal plant is weather, Krieg said. Climatic data need to be gathered for areas where grain sorghum is a major crop. With that data researchers should be able to predict a type of weather distribution pattern which might statistically occur during specific times periods each year—all with about 80 percent accuracy. With a relatively accurate long-term prediction farmers not only will be able to choose a variety more exactly, but plant breeders will also have a better idea of which characteristics to breed into the sor-






