

Three in family die in Colorado crash

A tragic truck accident on the Continental Divide in southwestern Colorado last Wednesday night took the lives of three members of a young area family.

Danny Vaughan, 25, his wife, Sharla, 24, and their four-week-old son, Adam, died when the semi-trailer truck in which they were riding ran off the highway along Wolf Creek Pass and plunged more than 1,000 feet to the valley floor below.

Their 2½-year-old daughter, Amber, was thrown from the truck shortly after it left the highway and escaped with a broken collar bone and abrasions. She was treated at a clinic in nearby Pagosa Springs.

Vaughan's oldest brother, Gene, a realtor at Fort Collins, flew the injured girl home from Pagosa Springs, bringing her to her grandparents, Loyd and Dorothy Vaughan of Dimmitt.

Wolf Creek Pass, with an elevation of 10,850 ft., is on US Highway 160, approximately 25 miles north of Pagosa Springs.

Mineral County Deputy Sheriff Gary Parsons, who investigated the fatal accident, said Vaughan was driving south, along the west side of the pass, when the vehicle went out of control about sundown Wednesday. The truck was carrying a load of rabbit

feed in pellet form, the officer reported.

Parsons said the truck skidded 172 feet, rolled onto its right side, then slid 80 feet through a guard rail and was airborne another 70 feet before it hit a large rock formation below. The tractor and trailer tore apart upon impact and the trailer came to rest at the rock formation, while the tractor careened down the steep embankment all the way to the valley floor, where it came to rest on its wheels, the Colorado officer said.

The Vaughans' infant son was thrown from the cab about halfway down the slope.

Members of Mounted Ranger Troop F — a rescue

and ambulance service made up of Pagosa Springs volunteers — retrieved Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan's bodies about 4:30 a.m. Thursday, then searched the rest of the night before finding the baby's body about 7:30 p.m. They took the bodies to Chambers and Sharp Funeral Home in Monte Vista, 70 miles north of the pass.

The bodies were transported back to Dimmitt, where joint funeral services were held Saturday at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. The largest church in town was filled to capacity, with almost 200 seated in the separate Fellowship Hall. Mem-

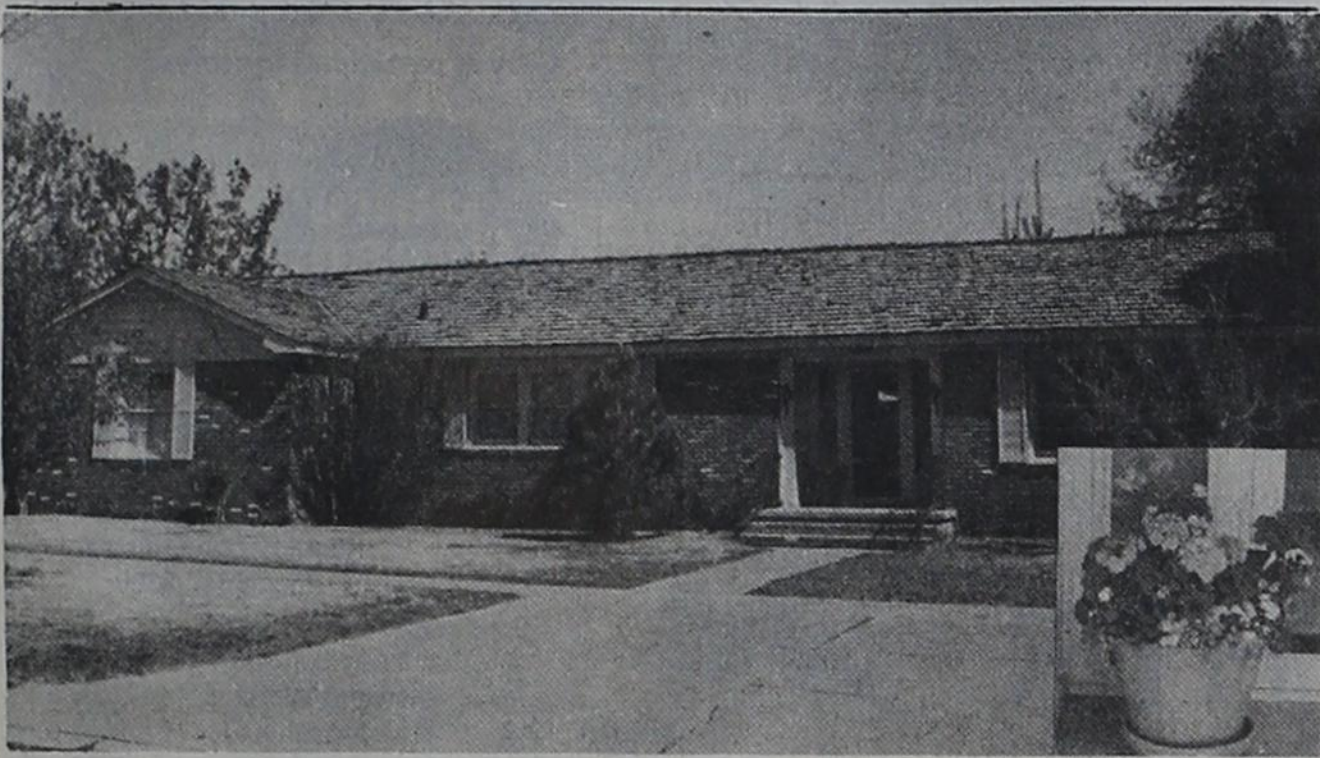

Hightower supports farmers in 'gas war'

Texas farm leaders are "waging a war" against natural gas companies, and State Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower is backing them.

Hightower released a letter Monday stating that he "strongly supports legislation" which would authorize the Texas Railroad Commission to regulate the rates that gas utilities charge to their farm customers and the service they provide.

"Many Texas farmers have seen their gas bills jump by more than 30% in a single year," Hightower said. "Farmers currently have no regulatory body to protect them from arbitrary and unfair rates."

"Opponents of the bill say regulation will cost more than it will save, but the only utilities covered under this bill are ones already subject to the Railroad Commission

regulations and that already report to the commission for all their other customers."

Hightower said the accountability for one more class of customers — farmers — will not create any major cost to anyone.

"The bill specifically does not enlarge on the commission's present safety regulations and would not generate any additional safety related costs," he added.

"Opponents of the bill say competition with other energy sources is sufficient to hold rates down," Hightower said. "Natural gas, where it is available, is the best and lowest-cost energy source for irrigation pumping. Electricity and butane are not competitive, especially if it means running electric lines at \$10,000 per mile to a well."

If competition is so fierce, Hightower asked, "Why are over 90% of the Texas irrigation wells served by only

three companies?"

The bill will require the gas companies to prove their need for higher rates by making their case to a state regulatory body. The commission would not allow utilities to charge farmers a late fee, and it would limit charges for lost

and unaccounted-for gas.

Hightower said, "In a survey performed by the Railroad Commission at our request, they found no consistent treatment of agricultural customers by utilities. Our own calculations indicate farmers may spend as much

as \$300 million annually on natural gas for irrigation.

"If we are paying that much to the utilities, the least we should expect is professional, objective evaluation of the rates charges, and a place to take grievances," he concluded.

Senate committee okays regulation

Texas ag-gas users won a "significant battle" Monday in Austin when the Senate State Affairs Committee passed legislation which would put agriculture gas rates under the regulatory authority of the Railroad Commission.

Several area farm leaders testified before the Senate committee April 18, urging senators to pass the gas-regulation legislation first introduced by Sen. Bill Sarpalis as Senate Bill 936. The same legislation has been added as a substitute amendment to House Bill 593, which addresses several items that come under the Railroad Commission's "Sunset Law" legislation.

Three who testified April 18 were back in Austin Monday lobbying for the passage of the legislation.

Carl King, president of Texas Corn Growers Association, Bill Cleavinger, president of Texas-New Mexico Beet Growers Association, and Wade Mills, president of Plains Gas Users Association, lobbied for votes Monday on the Senate floor.

King, a Dimmitt farmer, said, "At about 4:30 p.m.

Monday we lost the first vote in the Senate committee by 6 to 5, but two senators were absent."

An hour later, King, Sen. Sarpalis and Mills, in conjunction with attorneys, introduced a separate amendment and "it was okayed by committee chairman Sen. Ray Farabee," King said.

"By then, the other two senators were in attendance — they voted and we won 7 to 6," King said.

"This doesn't mean we have won the war," King

A Dimmitt seventh grader received a first-place trophy in computer program writing in Amarillo Saturday — in the high school advanced division.

Kitzel Hoover, 12, had entered the Region XVI Educational Service Center's contest in the junior high division, but contest officials mistakenly "programmed" his entry into the high school division.

He won first place, anyway.

Hoover was one of three Dimmitt Middle School students who competed in the regional contest Saturday. He, Doug Collier and Greg Gentry placed third as a team in problem solving in the

junior high division.

All three boys studied computer operation in the sixth grade in Glenda Sim's class for gifted and talented students, and work on their own with a computer this year under the supervision of Carol Schroeder. Mrs. Sims and Mrs. Schroeder assisted Hoover with his entry forms and paperwork for the programming contest. Hoover's father, Doyle, took the boys to the contest Saturday.

Hoover submitted his program a week ahead of the contest for judging. Saturday's competition was all in team problem solving and the awarding of trophies in both contests.

Hoover's program was a maze game which he devised himself. When he sent his program in, he provided judges with a map showing how to solve the maze.

"When they announced the programming winners in the different elementary and junior high divisions, Kitzel was a little disappointed because he thought he hadn't placed at all — they never called his name," his father said.

"But then they announced the winners in the high school division, novice and advanced, and announced him as the winner in the advanced division."

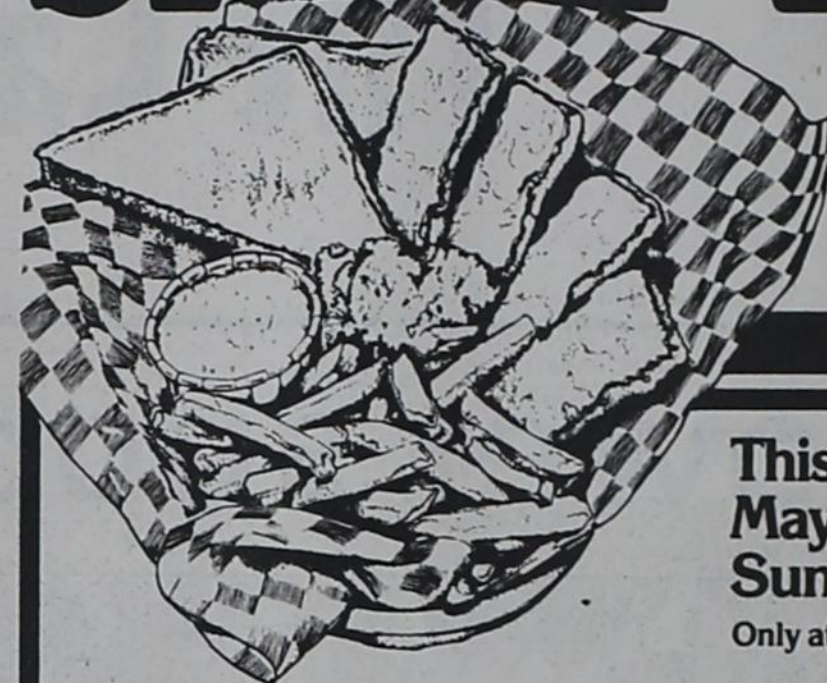

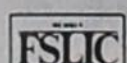

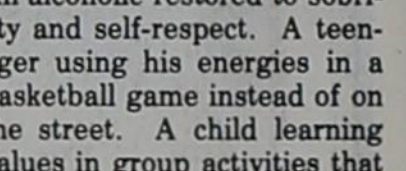
SA Week is declared

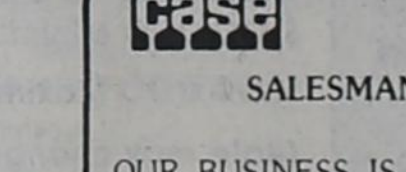

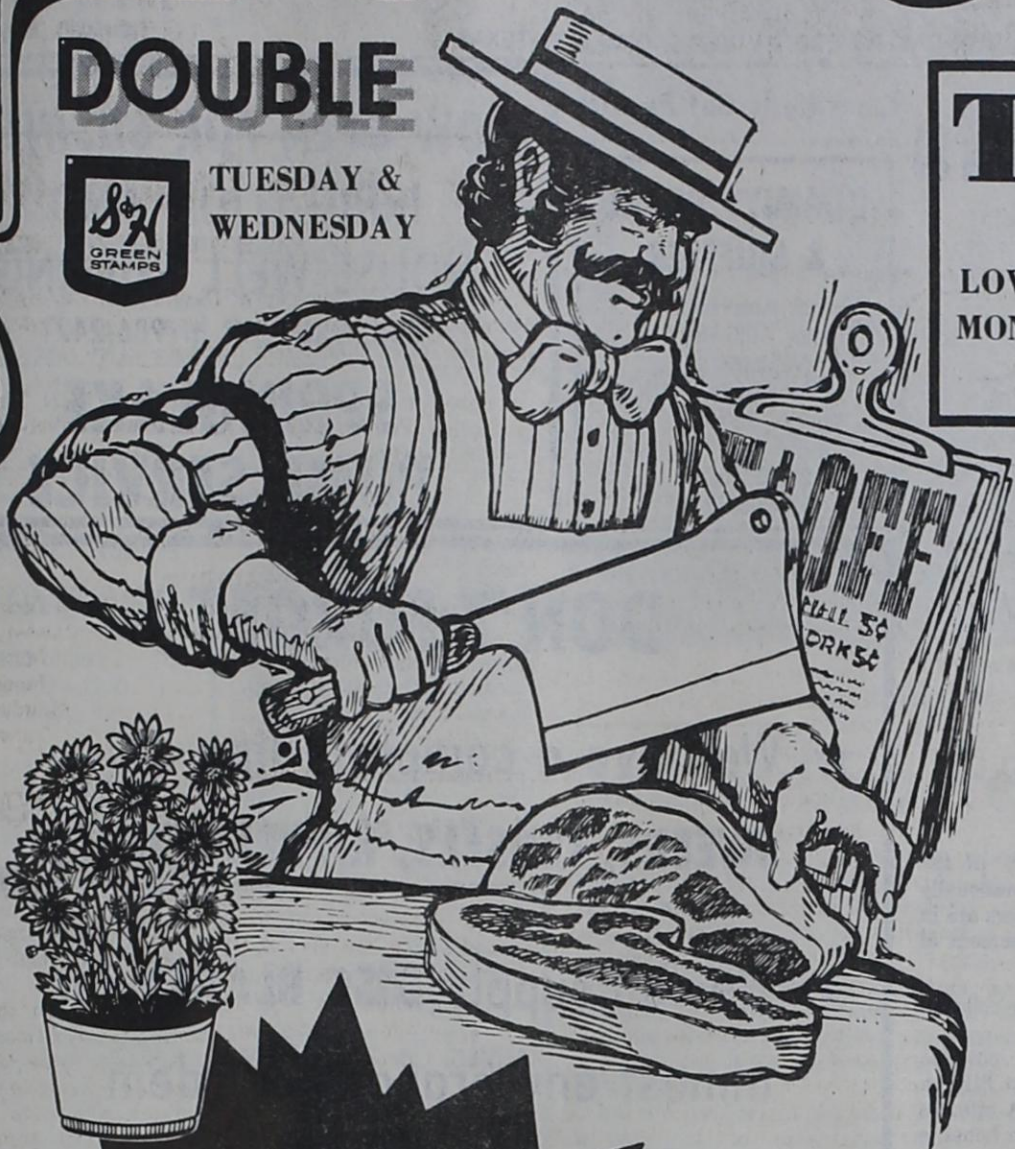

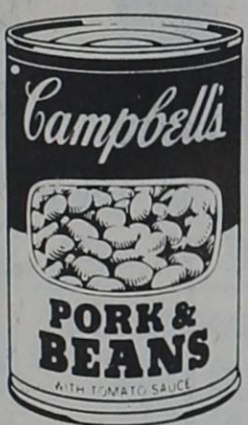

PIK lessens farm inputs

The high level of farmer participation in the PIK (payment-in-kind) program will have a marked impact on agricultural production expenses, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Overall demand for farm production inputs should decline due to the high unanticipated levels of PIK participation," says Dr. Forrest Stegelin. "This will affect nearly all expenses associated with crop production, but especially fertilizer, seed, pesticides, fuels and energy, and operating credit."

Initial forecasts are that expenditures for farm inputs will decline 12 to 15%, notes the economist.

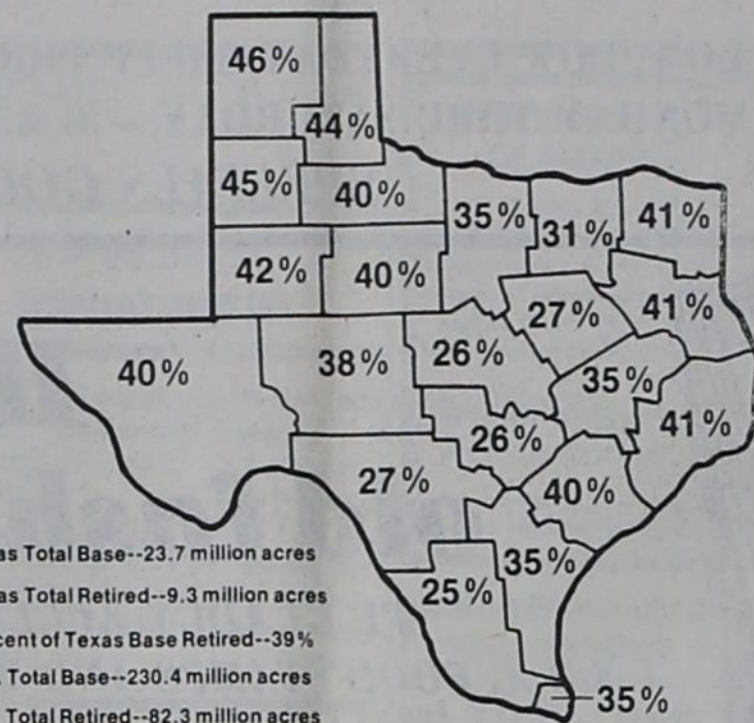
Use of pesticides and seed is expected to decline sharply since these are most closely tied to planted acreage. Total sales of both are expected to fall 14 to 20% because of PIK.

Fertilizer use is forecast to decline by 15 to 20% but sales may decline even more due to large inventories and already soft prices.

Machinery purchases are expected to decline only 3 to 5% as these sales are closely tied to net farm income which is forecast to improve. Machinery repair expenses should drop 12 to 15%.

Fuel use may drop 8 to 10%, says Stegelin.

Inputs needed for erosion and weed control on idled acres — seed, chemicals, fencing and other materials — are becoming more expensive as their demand increases.

PIK SIGNUP—Texas farmers decided to take 39% of the state's cropland out of production compared to 36% nationally in the Payment in Kind program. Castro County farmers are in the 45% area on the chart above which shows the percent of base acres retired in the state.

"To avoid losing sales of big-ticket purchases such as tractors and combines, implement and equipment dealers may soon offer credit for large dollar purchases in exchange for PIK certificates," says Stegelin. "The effect will be the same as using scale tickets at harvest for collateral."

While there are possible negative effects from PIK on farm supplies, USDA officials believe the long-term benefits to agriculture will outweigh the costs to individual agribusinessmen, says the economist.

Amstar cited for safety

The Dimmitt Corn Operation Division of Amstar Corporation has been recognized by the National Safety Council for its exemplary on-the-job safety performance for 1982.

The National Safety Council selected the Dimmitt plant for a first place award in its Grain Handling and Processing Division, Group 1, annual on-the-job safety contest, based on the lowest incident rates of 1.01 cases involving days away from work per 200,000 employee-hours worked. For comparison, the average rate for all competing units in this contest category is 4.62 cases involving days away from work per 200,000 employee hours.

The award was accepted on behalf of the Dimmitt plant's employees by Charles Doss, safety director.

This award is the fifth National Safety Council award earned by the Dimmitt plant's employees.

PCG names officers

Cotton producer and businessman Tommy Fondren of Lorenzo was elected to a second one-year term as president of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at the organization's board meeting in Lubbock April 22.

Incumbents Gerald Caswell of Brownfield, vice-president, and Bennie Claunch of Bula, secretary-treasurer, were also re-elected. Fondren's predecessor in the office of president, Gary Ivey of Ralls, under PCG by-laws automatically continues as chairman of the board. All elective PCG officers are limited to two consecutive one-year terms in a given office.

PCG has 50 directors, two elected from each of 25 member counties surrounding Lubbock.

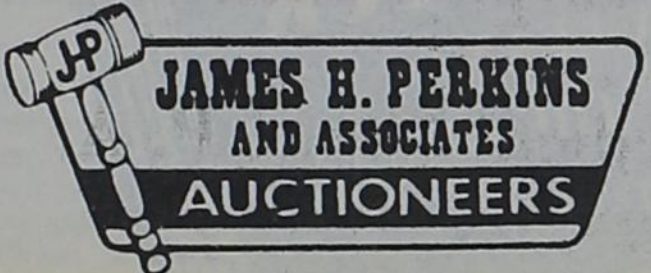

Amstar Corp. reports earnings

Amstar Corporation today reported that its net income for its third fiscal quarter, which ended March 31, 1983, was \$4,322,000, or \$4.45 per share of common stock after provision for dividends on the preferred stock; and net sales and operating revenues were \$278,540,000.

For the comparable quarter of last year, net income was \$1,146,000, or \$1.10 per common share after preferred stock dividends, and net sales and operating revenues were

\$277,748,000.

For the nine-month period ended March 31, 1983, Amstar's net income was \$12,171,000, or \$1.25 per common share after preferred dividends. Nonrecurring charges associated with the suspension of operations at the corporation's Philadelphia cane sugar refinery and Arizona beet sugar factory reduced net income per common share by about \$4.46 in the first quarter of the current fiscal year and are included in the results for the nine months.

Net sales and operating revenues for the nine month period were \$893,346,000. For the comparable period a year ago, Amstar reported net income of \$38,684,000, or \$4.19 per common share, and net sales and operating revenues of \$1,091,426,000.

"Amstar's performance in its third quarter this year reflects the results of the measures we have taken in an effort to improve our operating efficiencies and to reduce our costs. However, the low level of business activity continues to have an adverse effect upon our earnings."

"Operating income from our sweetener business during the quarter of \$4,490,000 compares with \$570,000 earned by that business segment in the comparable period a year ago. The major reason for the improvement was that losses at the Spreckels Sugar Division were substantially reduced in the 1983 quarter."

"For the nine months, operating income from our sweetener business is still well behind that of the comparable period last year, principally because of the absence of the heavy volume of refined cane sugar export business that was enjoyed by the American Sugar Division in the first half of last year. As we have previously noted, that business has largely not been available to U.S. refiners since December, 1981," said Howard B. Wentz, Jr., Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer.

"Because of programs we have implemented, both the American Sugar and Spreckels Sugar Divisions have achieved substantial reductions in operating costs, and we believe that the corporation will be able to generate a better return on assets employed in that business over the long-term. In the near term, there is reason to expect that pending U.S. government action with respect to the exportation of refined sugar made from imported raw sugar could again create export opportunities for our American Sugar Division, although on a more limited basis than was the case in 1981," Wentz concluded.

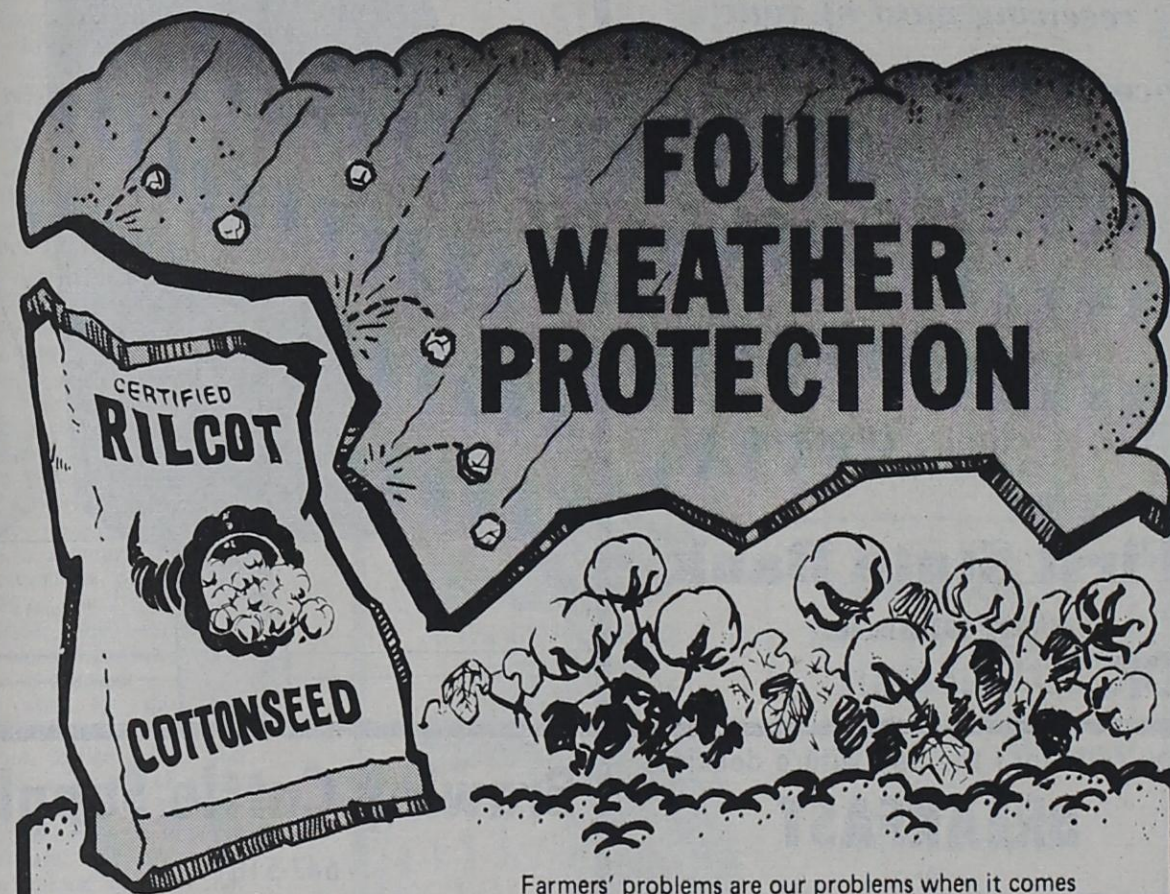

Tribute Geneva Garrison is remembered

EDITORS NOTE: This eulogy was submitted by Mrs. Garrison's mother, and brothers and sisters.

Geneva (Aven) Brooks Garrison was born in Castro County on Feb. 20, 1930, the daughter of A. L. (Leck) and Mabel Aven.

She died in Vallecito, Calif., on April 3. Her death is being investigated as a homicide.

Geneva lived at Hart for most of her life where she attended Hart public schools and was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

A lively person always, Geneva while in school, played on the basketball team, participated in University Interscholastic League events, and was busy with other activities. We recall with delight the many, many, times she and Patsy Smitherman entertained local audiences with their tap dance and jitterbug routines. Dancing and enjoying being with people carried over into her adult life. In later years, Geneva and her husband,

Ernest Lee Brooks, were enthusiastic members of the local square dance club.

Geneva Aven and Ernest Lee Brooks were married in April, 1947. During the first years of their marriage, they were associated with Ernest Lee's parents, Robert and Jewel Brooks, in business at Hart. It was in these years, their four children were born - Rene, David, and Robert and Rodger, twins - busy, happy days and years for the young family.

In 1954, Ernest Lee and Geneva moved to Lubbock. There Geneva did in-store and window decorating for Cobb Department Stores, did art work, fashion drawing for Godwin's Dress Shop, and for the Lubbock Avalanche Journal. She was a talented artist, and enjoyed these opportunities to exercise her talent.

After a few years, the Ernest Lee Brooks family moved back to Hart where they started farming. For several years, together with being a busy housewife and mother, Geneva was very active in community affairs. She served as president of Hart PTA, was a member of the Zealot Club, and as an artist, she and her talent were always in demand.

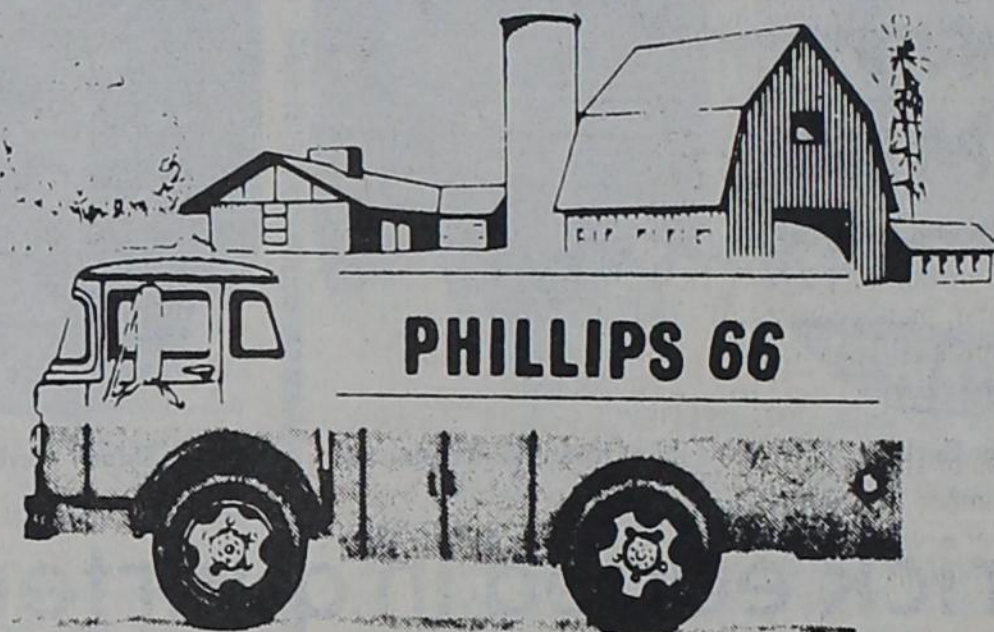
Art work for the Hart School annuals for many years was her responsibility, and she did a mural of cattle brands in the school building. One could not begin to count the posters, billboards, and flyers "turned out" by her artistic hands. Whatever the need might be, one need only ask. 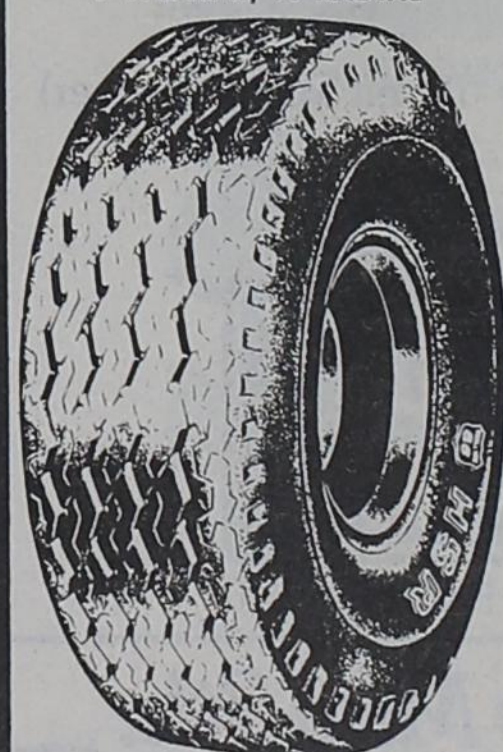

Kim King was the last Nazareth netter to win the state singles championship in 1973 and 74. This is the first time ever that Nazareth has qualified two singles players

for state meet competition. Gerber beat Heiman in the district and regional finals, but the two are pretty evenly matched, as Heiman took one match off her sophomore teammate in a tournament this season.

"If Leona plays like she is capable of playing I think she has a pretty good chance to make the finals," said Nazareth coach Sandy Oliver. "She will have to play more aggressively than she did at region."

"If Ramona plays well, it's very possible that she will do real well too."

Schilling's best time in the 800 meter race this year is 2:27. She ran that for a second place finish in the Region I-A track meet at Levelland.

"I think she will have to

run in the low 2:20's to place at state," said Nazareth coach Joe Lombard. "I think she has the potential to get her time down. She's been getting in better and better shape. I anticipate her running maybe four to six seconds faster."

Gerber ran a 5:40 in the Region I-A 1600 meter finals. That was good for a second place finish behind defending state champion Darla Graham of Iraan.

"Being in two sports, it will be tough for Leona to improve her time more than she already has," Lombard said.

"She would probably have to run 20 seconds faster to place high, but being the competitor she is she may be able to place."
