COL. BOBBY R. BAGLEY Chamber Banquet Speaker

Banquet Speaker Was Now In Vietnam

Col. Bobby R. Bagley is the Deputy Commander for Support to Military Operations, Headquarters US Air Force, Kelly Air Force Base, Texas. He is directly responsible for USAFSS activities and as such, he is responsible for the support of combat forces. He is also responsible for the planning and execution of direct support actions. Bagley went to San Antonio as an assignment as Commander, Base Group, Reese Air Force Base.

Col. Bagley was born February 23 in Cumming, Georgia. He attended Piedmont College, Georgia.
 He entered the U.S. Air Force in 1953 as an aviation cadet at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas. He was assigned to Marana Air Base and then to Marana Air Base and then to Reese Air Force Base, Arizona, and then to pilot wings and commission in 1954.

Assigned to Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada; Clovis Air Force Base, New Mexico; Shaw Air Force Base, South Carolina; Phalsbourg Air Base, Louisiana; and RF-101 aircraft, 1964-66, Col. Bagley was assigned to Headquarters, 7th Air Force, Son Nhat Air Base, Saigon, Vietnam, where he served as a senior reconnaissance staff officer in the air-ground reconnaissance team. During May and June 1967, he was assigned to the 5th TRS at Tan Son Nhut Air Base, where he again flew the RF-101. Col. Bagley was reassigned to the 4th Udon Royal Thai Air Force Base, Thailand as a reconnaissance pilot on September 16, 1967. Col. Bagley was assigned to RF-101 in North Vietnam. He was shot down and held as a prisoner of war in North Vietnam. During his captivity he was incarcerated in several POW camps in and around the Hanoi area. Additionally, he was held in a camp in Northern Vietnam near the China border for eight months and returned to the United States. Col. Bagley was assigned to Shaw Air Force Base and then to the Common Defense Installation, before going to Reese Air Force Base, Texas, where he became

the Deputy Commander for Operations, 64th Flying Training Wing, responsible for the training of approximately 300 students annually in the Undergraduate Pilot Training Program. On March 3, 1978 he assumed the position of Commander, 64th Air Base Group.

Colonel Bagley is a command pilot with more than 3,000 flying hours. He flew 49 combat missions in Southeast Asia. His military awards and decorations include the Silver Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Legions of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Bronze Star Medal with Valor device and Oak Leaf Cluster, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster.

Colonel Bagley is married to the former Edna M. "Sandy" West of Canton, North Carolina. They have one daughter, Vicki Ann, who is a recent graduate of the University of Southern Mississippi, at Hattiesburg.

Clinic Expansion Planned

Made Possible By Gift From Cogdell Hospital Trust

H.E. Frizzell, chairman of the board of the Lockney General Hospital District, and D.M. Cogdell Jr., chairman of the board of the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust, recently announced the gift of \$150,000 by the Cogdell Trust to the Lockney General Hospital District. The funds are to be used for the purpose of expanding the clinic facilities at the Lockney General Hospital.

Members of the advisory board of the Cogdell Hospital Trust are Mr. and Mrs. D.M. Cogdell Jr. of Floyd County, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Cogdell and Mrs. E.A. Birdwell of Briscoe County.

Size of the planned clinic addition is 4118 square feet. Plans call for the new structure to be added to the north and west of the present clinic building.

According to Gayle Fortenberry, hospital administrator, an application for certificate of need is now in Austin for approval by the Texas Health Facilities

Commission. A copy of the plan is at South Plains Health Systems Agency in Lubbock. The state commission bases its approval on recommendations by the area health systems agency.

Approval is expected by April 27, and construction will begin as soon as possible. Estimated completion times is six months, Mrs. Fortenberry said.

If the plans are approved, the present clinic area will be converted to office

space, making room for offices now located in the hospital basement. The medical records, bookkeeping and regular insurance office will be moved "upstairs." The administrator's and business manager's offices will be relocated in the new portions. This will allow more waiting room space in the hospital lobby.

The clinic lab and X-ray department will be expanded 12 feet to the north.

New Doctor Here July 1

The new facilities will make it possible to bring two more doctors into the Lockney clinic, according to H.E. Frizzell, chairman of the board of directors of the hospital district.

One of the new doctors will be Dr. Gary Mangold, M.D. who is scheduled to begin his practice here even before

the new clinic is completed.

Dr. Mangold, a son of Lockney General Hospital Chief of Staff Dr. W.J. Mangold, M.D., will complete his three-year residency in Family Practice at John Petersmith Hospital on June 30, Frizzell told this newspaper. He will begin his practice here on July 1.

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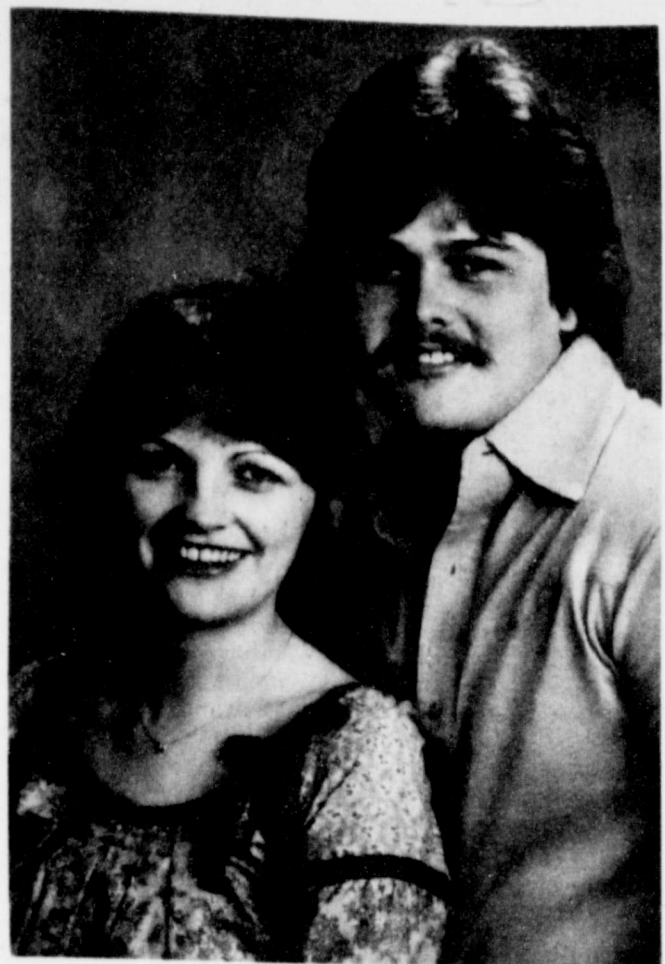

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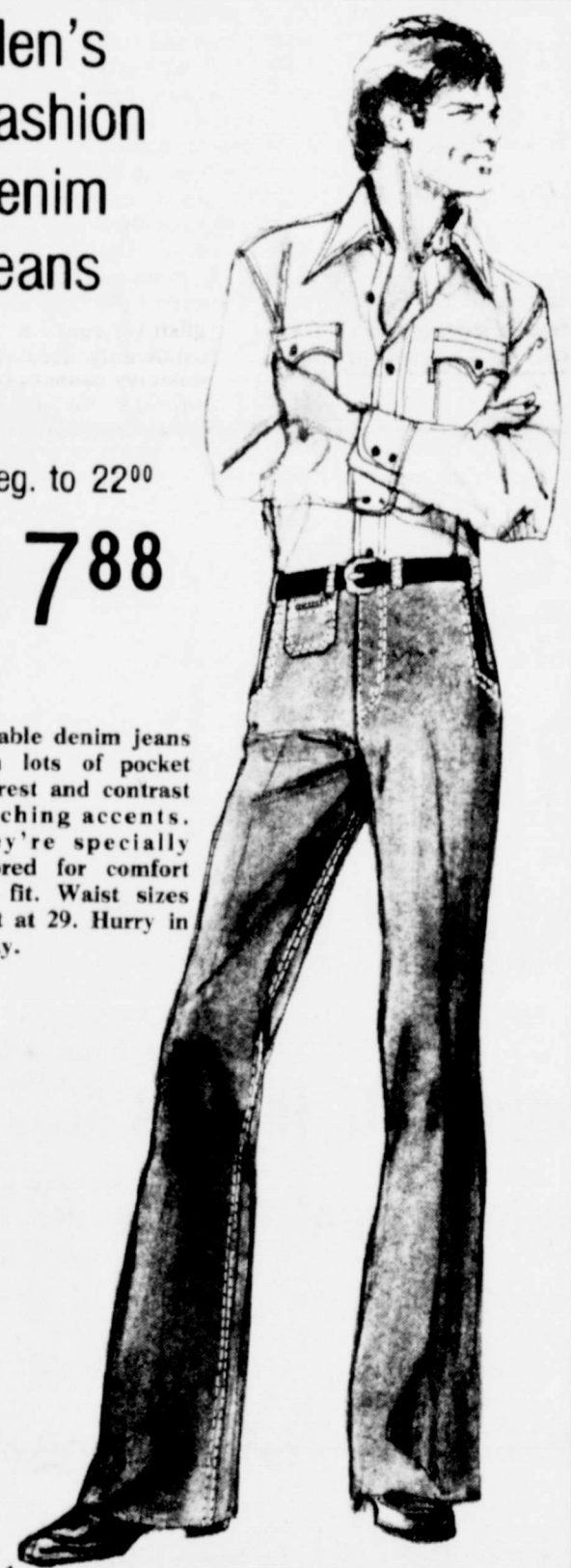

**Sheriff Wilson Had
No Second Chance!**

Jalmar [Jinks] Wilson received no second chance! His Judge, jury, and apparent executioner — one man, Larry Carnell Fortenberry — showed no mercy!

Wilson was the Motley County sheriff until he was gunned down Nov. 12, 1976 — not greatly unlike a dangerous animal being destroyed. He was less than two months away from retirement.

But, Fortenberry, the man charged with Wilson's murder, is being given a second chance. The Texas Criminal Justice Council points to a trivial trial error in overturning his death sentence. This undoubtedly will mean another trial.

Has the pendulum of justice swung too far? Certainly none of us would be calloused enough to desire that any citizen should not receive a fair trial. Our constitution guarantees this right and freedom. But....

It seems improbable — if not impossible — for our court system to conduct a proper trial without the verdict being questioned because of some minute technicality.

We desire that Larry Carnell Fortenberry receive an equitable trial — more than he allowed Jinks Wilson. But, we believe that something is seriously wrong with our justice system when a convicted murderer must be tried two or more times — after being found guilty — because of a technicality.

The answer, we believe, lies somewhere between the vigilante, mob rule, no trial theory of yesteryear and today's overly tolerant approach.

Are You Ready To Invest In Real Estate?

[Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of five articles on real estate investments.]

"Before investing in any asset, an individual should determine his emotional and financial readiness to invest," advises Dr. Richard Floyd, real estate economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"This willingness and ability will be determined by the individual's values, emotions and financial status."

People invest because they seek alternative forms of money storage, points out Floyd. Over time, people's wants and needs change. Therefore, additional resources may be required to meet these desires. Investment is a method of generat-

ing additional income.

The economist poses a number of questions that an individual should be able to answer before investing in an asset such as real estate:

—Do you have adequate insurance? Insurance needs vary according to family size, age distribution, financial goals and exposure to risk.

—Do you have sufficient emergency funds? An untimely cash outlay can force liquidation of assets, resulting in substantial losses.

—Can you accept risk, and how much? Risk-taking is a part of everyday life, but each person accepts different degrees of risk.

—Do you have time to research and manage your investment? In most cases, professional management

may not be financially feasible for investors owning a small number of properties.

—Do you anticipate any unusual expenses? Large cash outlays to meet anticipated temporary expenditures require flexible investment strategies.

—Finally, how much capital do you plan to invest initially, and how much are you willing to set aside for future investments? Available funds often limit the nature of the assets which an investor can obtain as well as income opportunities he can explore.

"If you are emotionally and financially prepared to invest, real estate offers an excellent opportunity for the small investor to hedge against inflation and provide for some additional income," believes Floyd.

Nationally, the largest group of living veterans served in World War II, now numbering 12,866,000, with 717,000 in Texas, and whose average age is now 58 years of age. The second largest group served during the Viet-nam era and totaled 8,779,000 nationally, with 441,000 in Texas.

These are followed by the Korean Conflict with 5,893,000 nationally and 247,000 in Texas; 653,000 from World War I, with 39,000 living in Texas, with an average age of 83 years; 278 veterans of the Spanish-American War in 1898, with only about 8 living in Texas, all of whom are close to 100 years of age.

Presently residing in Texas are also some 168,000 veterans who served between the end of the Korean Conflict in 1955 and the beginning of the Vietnam Era on August 5, 1964, and 10,000 who have served since the end of the Vietnam Era (1975).

These veterans, along with their immediate families, comprise almost one-half of the total population in Texas.

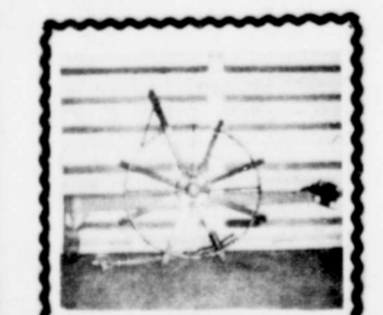

STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHT

By Lyndell Williams

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—After a tedious and mind-boggling week of work, the Texas House of Representatives this week gave final approval to legislation implementing the voter-mentoring program.

Passage of the bill (1060)—came after three days of debate over the Texas major provisions of the voter-mentoring program.

Texas voters approved the Tax Relief Amendment November and automatically got a \$5,000 exemption from school district property taxes.

The legislation would exempt more than \$400 million in state payments to local districts to replace the money lost because of exemptions created by the bill.

The legislation would add another homebased exemption for disabled and would freeze taxes for the elderly the rest of their lives.

—exempt two can trucks for each family property taxes, would would reimburse \$17 million to school districts because tax dollars lost in 1978 to the exemption.

—exempt intangible stocks, bonds, and accounts—from measure of a school district wealth.

—keep state special levels equal to the age of growth of personal income each year.

—set up methods of valuing farm, timber and land on the basis of productivity rather than market value.

The omnibus tax heads for the Senate committee hearings House members will begin soon.

Initiative & Referendum

Late last week, after hours of testimony before the Senate Initiative and Referendum Committee, a constitutional amendment voters initiative and referendum powers got one vote—one from a conservative and one from a liberal.
