Commissioners Adopt Revised Plan For Jail

The commissioners court met in a special session Tuesday, May 1, to adopt a revised plan for the county jail.

The court voted to advance Stiles \$10,000 for architect services to date. Stiles and Stiles is to receive seven percent of the total contract price, to be paid on the following schedule: 35 percent of estimated cost at completion of design development, 40 percent at completion of working drawings and specifications, five percent after bidding phase, 20 percent as the contractor progresses, and final 10 percent upon completion and acceptance of the jail project.

The entire commissioners court was present Monday for the special meeting.

spending money saved on costly items such as out-of-season or exotic produce, gourmet spices, sauces or frozen items in rich sauces.

Determine costs of adding fresh, frozen or canned vegetables to stews.

Read labels of all foods for costs per serving. Store brands and unlabeled brands of canned goods may carry best prices.

Figure how to use more nonfat dry milk and pastas in the menu.

* Use only reliable recipes which require economical ingredients. Failures with expensive ingredients can be devastating to the budget.

Use less tender cuts of beef in tasty casseroles, hearty stews or chowders mixed with rice, beans or pastas to stretch the great beef flavor.

* Quick and easy recipes help save time and money.

Use ground beef — it's economical money- and time-wise. Double recipes preparing half for the freezer and make at-home convenience foods.

Save cooking time on pot roast by cutting it into serving sized pieces—smaller portions of meat cook faster.

Leftover beef and beef casseroles store in the refrigerator. Eat them later or use as an ingredient in casseroles or soups.

* Beef provides a high-quality complete protein, iron and all B vitamins.

Eating two and one-half to three ounce servings of meat group foods daily will provide the recommended amount of meat group nutrients.

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tender cuts from the rib and loin by dry heat.

Round, chuck, shanks, brisket, short plate and flank—less tender and more economical cuts—require the addition of liquid for simmering or braising.

If marinated with an acid mixture such as vinegar or lemon juice or mechanically tenderized by pounding, these cuts can be satisfactorily roasted, broiled, pan-broiled or panfried.

* Make better use of freezer space with advertised or unadvertised specials on beef for future use.

Store prepackaged beef in original wrapper from one to two weeks. Longer storage in the freezer requires overwrapping in moisture-vapor-proofed wrapping.

The freezer also provides a better way to save leftovers for later use.

* Protect valuable beef with proper home storage in the meat compartment or coldest part of the refrigerator.

The refrigerator should keep food 40 degrees F. or below. Store beef in its original wrapper one to two days in the refrigerator.

* Money-saving meat cookery depends on low to moderate heat whether roasting, braising, broiling or cooking in liquid. High heat causes meats to shrink and lose the natural juices.

* Cook the beef by the recommended method for the various cuts of meat. Cook

Floydada Man's Mother Celebrates

93th Birthday

Mrs. Lena Moore has done what is rather unusual in that she celebrated her 98th birthday on April 20, 1979. She was born to Asa Franklin and Mary Ann Eades on April 20, 1881 in a log cabin in Garland County, Arkansas.

She was the twelfth child in a family with thirteen children. She is the only

surviving member of her family. There were twelve girls and one boy in the family.

For family entertainment in her early years one of her sisters played the accordion while the other family members would gather around and sing. The family attended singing school in a group.

She was converted at the age of 17 and joined the Baptist church. She was baptized in a creek in Arkansas. She is presently a member of the First Baptist Church of Crosbyton.

Mrs. Moore has had the rare opportunity to do some things which few people today have ever done. She and her sisters used a loom and spun their own material. She has ridden in a covered wagon and she took her first airplane trip at the age of 97.

Mrs. Moore was attending school in her earlier years, the school terms were only three months during the year. She attended school until the day before she married at the age of 21.

She and Charles Henry Moore were married Nov. 12, 1902 in Garland County, Arkansas. To this union was born five boys and four girls. Two of her daughters and one son are deceased. Mr. Moore died March 30, 1955.

The Moores moved to Texas on Nov. 16, 1926. They farmed on the East Plains until they moved to Crosbyton on Dec. 14, 1946. She still maintains the same home since 1946 and continues to do her own housework even today.

Her daughters are: Gertie Ratheal and Bonnie Lee Flemms both of Crosbyton. Rosa died when a child and another daughter, Myrtle Gerlach of Littlefield, is also deceased.

Her sons include: Ola and Arvis both of Crosbyton, Doyle of Floydada and Reed L. of Ralls. Another son, Frank, is deceased.

Mrs. Moore was honored with a 98th birthday celebration on Sunday, April 22 at the Senior Citizens Building with 74 members of her family present for lunch. Several friends called in the afternoon and enjoyed birthday cake.

She has seven children, 20 grandchildren, 31 great-grandchildren and seven great-great-grandchildren.

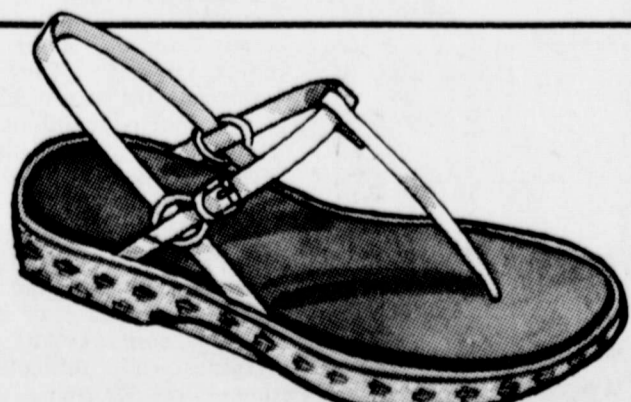

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So They Say

TEENAGE SMOKING

One million teenagers start smoking every year. To be one of the gang? To look like an adult? To seem adult? To defy parents and teachers? To take risks? To seek pleasure?

According to studies included in the new Surgeon General's report on smoking, children, usually between 4 and 10, take quite literally the dangers of smoking. They are especially worried if their own parents or older brothers or sisters smoke. But as many of these same children begin smoking themselves.

Smoking is forbidden to young children. It is adult behavior, and smoking announces to the world that the teenager has left childhood far behind. Younger adolescents, some investigators have found, live almost completely in the present and are not preoccupied with the future or its dangers. Since they see that people around them who smoke do not die instantly or may not show any apparent ill effects from smoking, that's enough evidence for them.

Everyone, including teenagers, is bombarded by cigarette ads, and teenagers are especially influenced by hip images projected by young adults in the ads. Peer pressure as well as the behavior of people older than themselves, including other family members, have an impact on teenagers. The percentage of teens who smoke is higher when one parent smokes — compared to teens with nonsmoking parents — and still higher when both parents smoke.

Despite the marathon debates in the House on the appropriations bill this week, the House has moved along on other legislation. We've dealt with production of alcohol as fuel (H.B. 1986 and H.B. 1803); limits on alien ownership of land (H.B. 431); mandatory automobile liability (H.B. 22); allowance of petitions for the consolidation of school districts (H.B. 1058); and school discipline bills such as H.B. 8, which spoke to the issue of more restrictions on abusive or disruptive students in public schools.

Extended day and night sessions on the floor of the House have kept me out of my office in the capitol much of the time in recent days. However, if you have questions or need immediate help with any department in state government, you can always get a message to me. Several constituents needed assistance this week in dealing with state agencies. I'm always glad to do what I can.

As a general rule, I've found the state agencies to be cooperative and helpful in answering questions and taking necessary action. Some agencies, of course, have outlived their usefulness or have failed to serve the public properly. They are subject to the Texas Sunset Act and, unless continued by legislation, will be abolished either this year or in following years.

The frustrating thing for private citizens is trying to find the way through the bureaucratic maze of state boards, commissions and agencies. It's difficult at times to determine who handles what. Here is a good toll-free number to record in your personal telephone directory: 1-800-252-9600. This is the Citizen Assistance office in the capitol.

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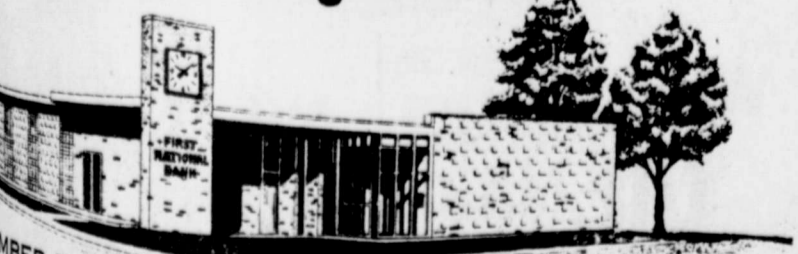

New Windmill Will Generate Electricity

The U.S. Department of Energy is developing a new windmill to convert wind-power to either electrical or mechanical energy — energy that could be used for deep well irrigation.

A prototype of the new windmill, called the Giromill (from "cyclogiro windmill"), is now under construction. The Giromill employs a new design concept — vertical blades rotating in merry-go-round fashion around a vertical central shaft. This design allows the Giromill to accommodate winds from any direction without major adjustments.

The prototype will stand 125 feet high and will consist of a 60-foot steel tower structure, three 42-foot vertical blades, and an electric generator or gear box. The Giromill will generate

40-kilowatts or 53 horsepower — enough for 16 homes. It is believed that the Giromill could cost less to build than a conventional windmill of equal electrical capacity.

One possible application of the Giromill would be for deep well irrigation. Irrigation pumps are employed by farmers throughout the plains region of the United States. To power some of these pumps, farmers rely on locally available natural gas — supplies of which are costly and sometimes uncertain. The 40-kilowatt power could also provide power to smaller isolated communities in mountainous areas, islands or along coastal regions where adequate wind prevails.

Performance testing and verification of the Giromill



prototype will be in 1980 at the U.S. Department of Energy's Energy Conversion Center in Boulder, Colorado.

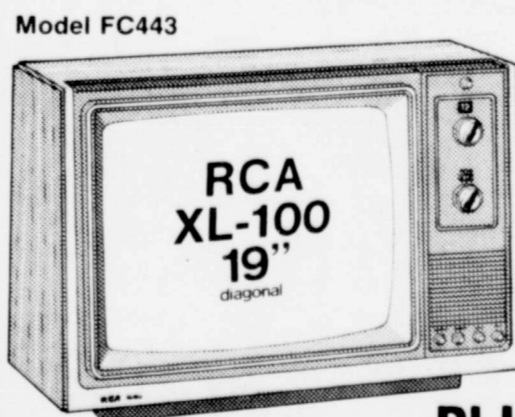

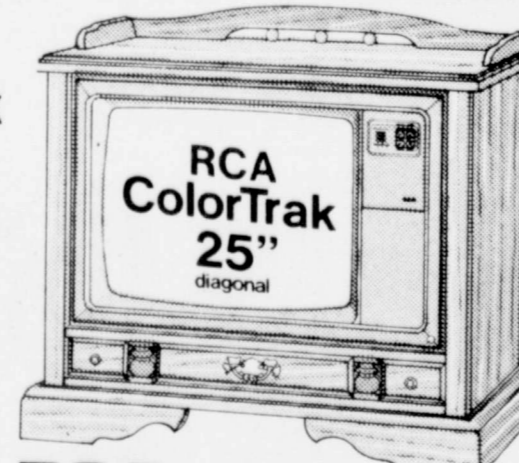

Nolen had been a Lubbock county resident 16 years, moving there from Roaring Springs, where he lived for 25 years.

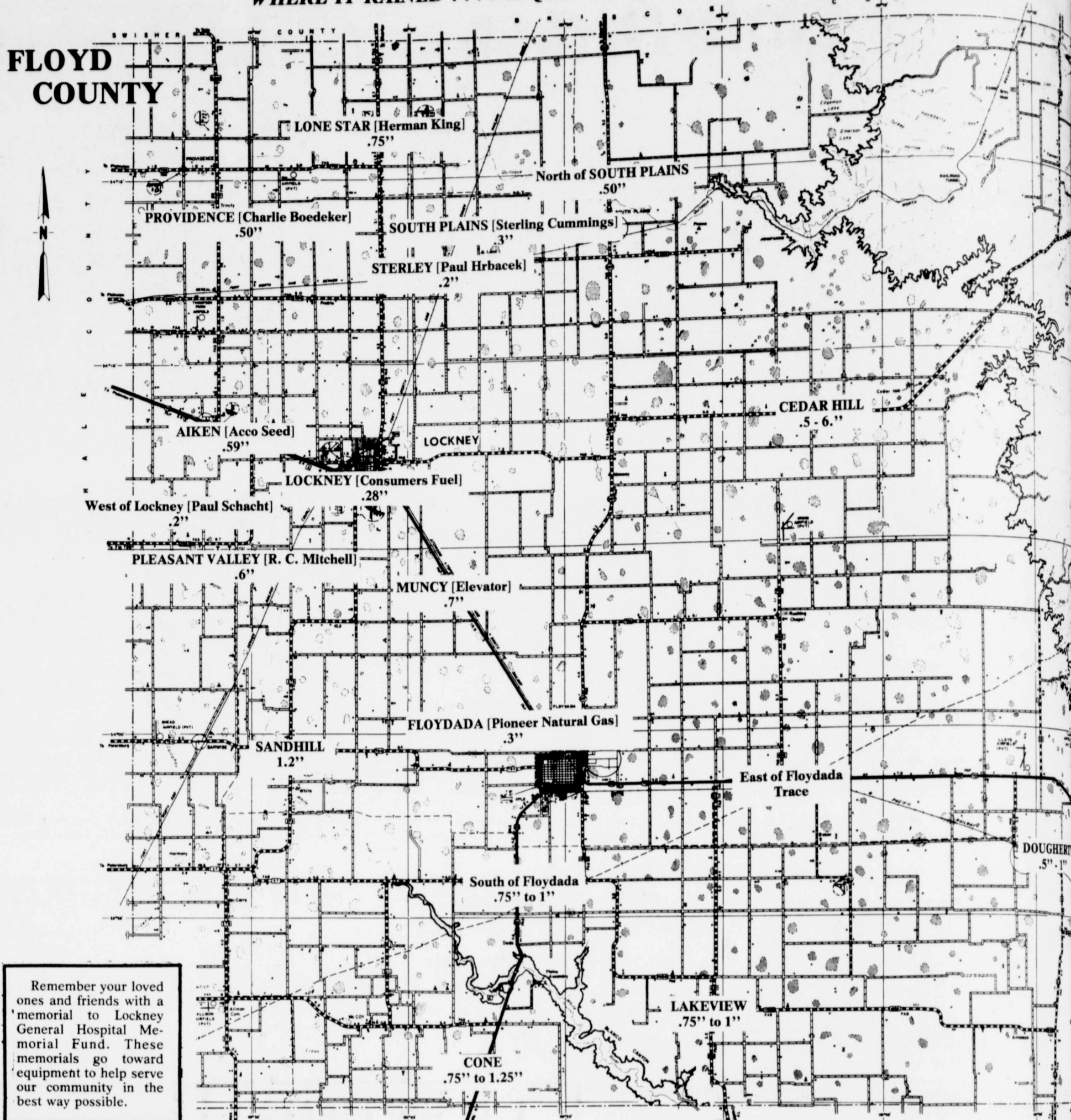
Nolen and Nadine Scott were married Jan. 22, 1933 in Midway.

Postal Service To Implement Mail Size Standards In July

Size standards for envelopes, cards and other pieces of mail become effective July 15, 1979. A seven-cent surcharge for oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail takes effect the same day.

Both the surcharge and the effective date for implementing size standards were adopted by the Postal Service's Board of Governors at its April 3 meeting. The new size standards were recommended to the Postal Rate Commission in April, 1976, and adopted shortly after that by the Service's governors. It was stipulated that they would not become effective until after the spring of 1978, giving customers at least two years to prepare for the change and exhaust their supplies of non-conforming envelopes and cards.

After July 15, pieces will be non-mailable if they are less than 3 1/2 inches high, 5 inches long, or seven thousandths (.007) of an inch thick.

The seven-cent surcharge will be applied to first-class mail weighing one ounce or less and single piece third-class mail or two ounces or less that exceed any of the following dimensions:

- * 1/8 inches high
- * 1 1/2 inches long, or
- * 1/4 inch thick.

ODD-SHAPED PIECES

Also subject to the surcharge are odd-shaped pieces within the weight units noted above. The acceptable size ratio for

such pieces is: length must be between 1.3 times and 2.5 times the height.

There are certain exceptions to the minimum size prohibition. If a piece is more than 1/4 of an inch thick, it does not have to measure at least 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long since thicker pieces, such as film mailers, can be mechanically culled. Also exempted — from all but the minimum thickness standard — are keys, identification cards and tags. This all sounds complicated but actually "the public has very little to worry about because manufacturers have known this since 1976 and have had time to get rid of odd size envelopes. Occasionally, we find 'thank you notes' that are under size, so

the mailing public is always in a hurry to mail and will cram anything in an envelope to get it off, when actually the envelope is too light to afford any protection and should be mailed in a small box. The surcharge is for something like this that takes special handling when it gets in the mail. "It can be avoided by the mailer, if he wants to."

Watch out for unscrupulous dealers who may try to trick consumers into a purchase or into making a contribution to a phony charity, she says.

Ms. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Remember these tips:

* Never agree to buy a product, let a salesperson come to your home or make a charitable contribution during the first phone call.

Tell the salesperson you'll call him back if you decide to buy or let someone come to your home.

* Call the Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce to check up on the company, then call them back if you really need what they're selling.

* If you are told that you've won a free prize or gift, find out what you have to do.

Often the prize is only given if you buy something, and you may be overcharged for the item you are required to buy.
