"In 1952, I taught fifth grade math, sixth grade reading and eighth grade civics. I had Kay Williams and those of her class that worked so well all in the sixth grade. I had to study harder than the kids did.

From Montana to Colorado to Washington D.C. the Brotherton family moved. Now there were three children

Finally, the years "just sort of ran together." Sometimes it was homemaking, then it was health, then it was typing and so on.


At last Supt. John Peck asked Merle to certify for librarian and she did in the following summer.

As a librarian, she notes the trend that has brought about criticism of schools in the basic skills. "Libraries are bombarded with high interest-low reading level literature. Many best sellers are fourth grade reading level. You'll find while visiting with Merle that retirement plans include travel and entertainment - a full and active life. To begin with she and Mike have six children and have grandchildren. Their children are all graduates from high school and college.

When I came back to Lockney from Washington, D.C., I could never have made it on my own. Then it was that I became impressed by the closeness of the people of Lockney.

Byssinosis Study Released

Byssinosis, an occupational respiratory disease which affects some cotton mill workers, is thought to be caused by inhalation of dust present in cotton mills. The major constituent of these dusts, aside from the cotton fibers themselves, is broken parts of the modified leaves (bracts) below the cotton boll.

Scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station did a study.

Extracts were prepared at the end of the growing season with field-dried bracts of glanded and glandless varieties. When tested on sheep lungs, both extracts inhibited the lungs' normal response to foreign material.

(The lung has a variety of defenses against invading microorganisms and non-living material. This is evident since vast quantities of air-borne particles enter the lung each day, yet the alveolar spaces of a healthy individual are normally sterile. The alvealar macrophages (part of the

lining of the bronchial tubes in the lungs), when contacted by invading particles, can rapidly produce a variety of powerful oxidizing agents. These chemicals can react with most invading particles to render them harmless.
