Physical education classes adjust to today's students

COLLEGE STATION -The old-fashioned gym class led by a whistle-toting, military style PE teacher is disappearing from the schoolyards and gyms.

Physical education classes now are being designed for individual activity and structured to help youngsters learn lifelong skills, say physical education experts at Texas A&M University

With the rising incidence of heart disease and other ailments, schools are realizing they have a responsibility to help children maintain healthy bodies through adulthood by teaching a variety of physical skills, notes Dr. Charles Shea.

On the elementary level, there is less emphasis on competition, he adds. Instead teachers work on motor skills. encouraging children to learn the best way to do a movement or a series of movements. Dr. Milam received a Bachelor of Arts degree from WTSU in 1942 where she majored in Spanish and speech and studied English as a minor. Several years later she earned a Master of Arts degree in educational psychology at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

In 1968, she received a Ph.D. in counseling psychology from the University of Wyoming at Laramie and is certified as a psychologist by the Texas State Board of Examiners of Psychologists. Dr. Milam, who is the ninth president of Cottey College, went to Missouri frm Austin College at Sherman where she was professor of education and psychology.

She also was visiting professor at the Bank Street College of Education in New York City, a counselor with the Pampa Independent School District and a high school teacher in Hereford and Perryton before assuming her position at Cottey College.

CONSUMER CREDIT OUTLOOK

"I just don't see people afraid of debt or interest rates anymore. As long as there is a supply of credit, people will use it," is the prediction of one economist. Other economists think the already-large burden of consumer debt—a record \$303.9 billion-coupled with tougher credit restrictions will break the back of whatever consumer strength is left in the economy

Squeezed by soaring market interest rates and pressure from federal regulations to hold down unnecessary credit extensions, big banks, and other consumer finance lenders are tightening up on credit limits, weeding out new accounts, and jacking up and investment usually rates to ration borrowing.

For the first time in this economic cycle, banks are beginning to jack up already high rates charged on national credti cards from 18 yo 22 percent. Some are attempting to reinstate fees for credit card use. Others are rejecting new credit card applicants and are closing the loan window on new installment

Retailers are responding by raising the minimum monthly payments for revolving charge customers, and by enforcing previously ignored limits on charge accounts. One department store has raised the minimum monthly payment on revolving credit accounts from \$10 to \$15.

MAKE A WILL-FOR YOUR SURVIVORS' SAKE If parents make wills, estate-settling will be less painful for their children. A will ensures that a parent's wish-

es will be respected since it outlines how he or she wants property to be distributed. In addition a will allows the parent to name an executor to carry out the terms and provisions of the will. On the other hand, when an estate is left without a will, property is distributed according to the state laws of descent and distribution.

Why name an executor? There are several reasons in making a will, naming an executor is important, because an executor is the key figure in settling an estate. Ideally, the executor should live in the same state, be on good terms with the family and be familiar with the parent's finances. Executors have three main duties: to collect assets, pay bills and distribute the remaining assets among heirs. Many parents name an adult child as executor of the estate.



SBA Farm Disaster Program Gets Toll-Free Telephone Number

Texas farmers and ranchers who want information about the Small Business Administration disaster recovery loan program now have a toll-free number they may call, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced today.

"SBA has already assisted more than 10,000 agricultural producers in Texas." said Mercurio Maritnex, SBA Regional Administrator. "This toll-free number will make it easier for farmers receptionist and a loan officer familiar throughout the state to receive with his application will call him back at information about the SBA program."

Martinez explained how the telephone line will be operated by SBA. He said that persons having questions about the disaster loans may receive a brief explanation of the recovery program by calling, toll-free, 1-800-692-4296 from anywhere within the state. Research News Report



The trigger is about to be pulled on raw cotton imports under the "import trigger mechanism" written into 1977 farm law. Thus the sometimes heated controversy over possible effects on U.S. cotton prices should soon be settled.

The law provides for a U.S. raw cotton import quota of about 500,000 bales beginning whenever the average of U.S. spot prices for any month exceeds 130 percent of the previous 36-month average.

USDA has reported that the special import quota will be opened up if spot prices for grade 41 staple 34 cotton in February average 78.45 cents per pound or higher. Officially USDA is expected to announce the February average on March 3. But since the average for the first three weeks of February was 81.02 and ily quotes since that time have h there's little room for doubt that the 78.45-cent level will be exceeded.

So, beginning some time in March, U.S. textile mills in the aggregate will have 90 days in which to import up to a 21-day supply of cotton, calculated to be around a half million bales.

Those who have argued against this provision of the law since 1977, primarily producers, have based their objections on the belief that, when triggered, the import provision would put a ceiling on prices for U.S.

Other producers and producer groups, including Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, have maintained that U.S. prices would never reach 130 percent of the previous three-year average until there was a tight supply of cotton worldwide. Therefore, they contend, U.S. interests will be unable to find any substantial volume of foreign cotton for sale at a price which, plus freight, is below the U.S. price.

Despite the possibility that a small volume of cotton in qualities unavailable from U.S. supplies may be imported, the consensus in the trade and among other observers at this point seems to side with the latter argument.

For example the respected Cotton Outlook magazine, published in Liverpool England, said in early February, "There is of course little likelihood that cotton would be imported into the U.S. in large volume since offers from elsewhere are by no means

However, as PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson observes, "All we can do at this point is speculate. The market, as always, will make the final decision."

A spring-tooth harrow or field cultivator is a better implement than a tandem disk to incorporate preplant herbicides for cotton on sandy soil. In two years of study, Dr. A.F. Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researcher, showed that incorporating preplant herbicides with a spring-tooth harrow decreased the hazard of erosion, gave equivalent weed control and equal or better yield of cotton than incorporating with a tandem disk. Wiese conducted the research on the Duane Scott farm near Wellington, Texas on fine

sandy loam soil. Using preplant herbicides that must be incorporated is a standard operation in cotton production in the Southern Great Plains. Incorporating with a tamdem disk gives good weed control but leaves the soil subject to severe wind and water erosion. Field cultivators do not destroy as many soil clods or cover as much crop residue as disks. Using cultivators to incorporate preherbicides would reduce the hazard of erosion. With this information at hand, Wiese conducted a two-year study to compare weed control and cotton yield when preplant herbicides were incorporated with the two imple-

Five different incorporation methods and no incorporation were tested on ten different preplant herbicide treatments. Incorporations were tandem disk once, tandem disk twice, field cultivate once, field cultivate twice and tandem disk

followed by one field cultivation. Herbicides used at one or more rates were Treflan, Planavin, Tolban, Amex, Basalin and Cobex. Herbicides were applied and incorporated in late April to land that was bedded in May. Cotton was planted in early June. Weed control and cotton vigor were evaluated about one month after planting. Plots were then cultivated and hoed.

According to Wiese, stand and vigor of small cotton were not affected by incorporation method. The first year, type of incorporation did not affect control except when herbicides were not incorporated. Control of carpetweed and pigweed with Treflan was reduced the most when incorporation was not used. Weed control a month after planting was the same for all herbicides when rates were appropriate for the sandy loam soil. Weed control at harvest was best with two incorporations with either implement. Apparently, thorough incorporation increased herbicide persistence in the soil. The first year, lint yields were about 450 pounds per acre for all methods of incorporation. Without incorporation, weed control was poor and lint yield dropped for 350 pounds per acre. Herbicides did not affect yield.

The second year, control of pigweed and crabgrass was the same with all incorporation methods. Yield of lint was reduced about 40 pounds per acre where a disk was ued for incorporation.



NCC comments on air proposal: The National Cotton Council has filed a statement opposing the Environmental Protection Agency's proposed policy for identifying, assessing, and regulating airborne substances posing risk of cancer. NCC maintains that the proposed rules: (1) are not needed since all hazardous air pollutants are already adequately regulated under the Clean Air Act, and (2) do not conform to the President's regulatory reform policy. Under the proposal, EPA would make and enforce history has shown a preponderance of decisions favoring positions taken by EPA or environmental groups.

Reclamation Bill Introduced: Rep.

Patterson (D-Calif.) has introduced a reclamation reform bill that would establish a subsidy scale based on the amount of water used rather than limiting the amount of land a farmer can own or lease. Farming operations purchasing 2200-acre-feet of water or less per year would pay a base cost for water on a per-acre-foot basis. Those purchasing more than 3600-acre-feet of water per year would pay the full cost of water. The bill also would encourage better waste management and conservation. Patterson said economics and not the federal government should dictate farm size

Exports Reported: New sales of upland cotton were reported at 21,600 running bales for the week ended February 17, bringing the season's total to 8,566,500. The major buyers were Canada, 11,400 bales, and Korea, 6,000. The week's exports were reported at 262,700 running bales (114,400 to China), compared with 313,300 a week ago. This brought the total to 4,243,800

D.C. CONSTITUTIONAL SEMINAR The Freemen Institute, a national

non-profit educational foundation is conducting a constitutinal seminar in Washington, D.C. on the 7th, 8th, 14th and 15th of March. The Friday sessions begin at 7:00 p.m. and the Saturday sessions begin at 9:00 a.m. and conclude at 4:00 p.m.

Farm Bureau members attending the annual convention in McAllen in December 1979 expressed a desire to know these dates in order that they might encourage their congressmen and other interested persons in their acquaintance to attend.

AGRICULTURAL ENERGY CENTERS USDA has announced the establishment of two agricultural energy centers, one in Tifton, Georgia and another in Peoria, Illinois at a cost of \$62 million. The center at Tifton, Georgia will seek new and better ways to generate energy on the farm and better ways for farmers and ranchers to put the energy to work. The Peoria center will concentrate on converting farm- or forest-produced 'biomass' into fuel alcohol or petrochemical substitutes.

METRIC CONVERSION?

The conversion to a metric system within the United States is not a U.S. national policy. Federal agencies have been instructed by Congress not to favor the metric system over the traditional American system in any government activity.

The International Metric System has been authorized for use in the United States since the act of 1866. The International Metric System and the U.S. customary system is optional in the United States.

The U.S. Congress did pass, in 1968, Public Law 90-472, which authorized the Secretary of Commerce to institute a study "to determine advantages and disadvantages of increased use of the metric system in the United States." The study has been completed and reported to Congress.

The U.S. Metric Board has requested \$3.8 million for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 1981. The U.S. metric board plans on annual budget of \$7 million to \$8 million in the future in order to continue its pro metric conversion propaganda activities. Legislation has been introduced in the U.S. Congress designed to eliminate the Metric Board.

SOIL AND WATER RESOURCES The National Soil and Water Resources and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (Public Law 95-192) and Forest and Rangelands Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-378) set in motion a series of programs directed by USDA's Soil Conservation Service. (See FACTS FOR YOU, February 15, 1980, p. 38) the federal government is now spending more than \$500 million annually in implementing some 34 programs relating to Soil and Water Conservation. In addition to the national expenditures, states are spending in the vicinity of \$200 million annually

The net result of the federal involvement in soil and water conservation under the authority of the two laws mentioned above will be a report to the president and the U.S. Congress. The draft of this report is now being reviewed (page 38, FACTS FOR YOU, 1980). 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

Collins Opposes \$75 Million Foreign Aid To Nicaragua

(WASHINGTON) — The State Department's confused American foreign policy has lost us friends international-Congressman Jim Collins said. Collins cited the recent House vote in which a \$75 million aid plan to Nicaragua passed 202 to 197. The passage of the bill came after four days of debates and a secret session of the House.

'The Administration and State Department pushed hard for this foreign aid to Nicaragua. They are against aid to many anti-Communist countries on the grounds of human rights violations but still supported this aid even though it was stated that there have been 617 reported voilations by the Sandinistas.

"I questioned these abuses as the U.S. is worried about any part Nicaragua might be playing in assisting the Marxists in a revolution in El Salvador," Collins said.

According to Collins, there are now 1200 Cuban teachers in Nicaragua to develop a Cuban-style education program. "The Sandinistas, who control the government, were founded in Cuba in

1962. Castro has a strong hand in shaping the government policies in Nicaragua today.

The Sandinista government has already nationalized the banks, insurance companies, and the mining, fishing and forestry industries. "Proponents of this bill claim that 60% of the funds would go toward helping the private sector in Nicaragua. However, our aid will be routed through the Sandinista government Central Bank,"Collins said.
