

Today, the Tye Company, houses in a J.M. Tye is expressed in the lates and best of farm machinery to be shipped out to farmers all over the United States as well as Canada and South America.

Nevertheless, Tye remembers his 10

years of dryland farming, when he rented land from H.P. Clements and lived in the old Clements home across the road from Cereal Elevator.

He says, "I liked farming. I started out with the advantage of having worked with the Oliver Implement Company, demonstrating farm machinery. I had worked for the company a year in Amarillo, a year in Dallas and had run their branch and had run their branch office in Houston 2 years and had ended up going to Shreveport for 5 years. While I was working for them I had seen all types of farming. "I had seen farming on the black lands all around, Sherman, Dallas, and Waco. I had seen it in the rice fields around Houston and Southern Louisiana. Too, I had learned what it was to farm in the hill country of East Texas and Arkansas. In 1952, he began irrigating his farm land. "That is when I found out that available farm equipment for irrigated land could be improved. My attention was first called to listers, planters, cultivators and rod weeders.'

By 1955, he was in the implement business again. This time it was in the building which is now the office space for secretaries and for Tye and son John M. who has headed the operation of the company since 1972. This 50 by 100 foot building had its solid glass wall destroyed by hail in 1956. The hail was so severe that the roof was a total loss including skylights "the first ever to be hailed out." The insurance inspector took brick from the hail building back to his home office because they were the first brick he had ever seen to be chipped by hail.

This building with its latest decora-

tion shows no sign of hail destruction. Once a week heads of such departments as computers, shipping, etc. meet in the boardroom comfortably seated at the long conference table.

Most of the 140 people on the payroll are from Lockney, Floydada or Plainview. Managerial and professional-type personnel come through advertising for those who have specific skills. "There is so little manufacturing here that it is necessary to go to manufacturing places to find those who are skilled and who would like moving here. The logistic problem of bringing materials in and sending machinery out is more than one man can care for," John M. says.

The 8 separate buildings in the planthouse separate units of work. The clatter-clang from one of the light turns one machine makes short strips that have a bend at one end. Another worker works at making three holes at one end and one at the other of a strip of steel. Each machine in this building produces a special pattern.

Welding machines sending sparks like a Christmas firework are in one building. One of these machines is automatic and welds three separate pieces at the same time. One 30-ton giant machine in this room had to be brought in through the roof because it was too large for the door. A skylight is now where the opening was made to bring it in.

Brushes are not used to paint the Tye orange and green machinery. Huge vats of paint are in a house removed from the others. One worker places a small part of machinery on a conveyor. The conveyor carries the part through green paint. The small instrument is dry by the time it reaches its starting place.

Is it possible to imagine 32 planter-box lids painted in a moment's time?

They are dunked in an enormous vat and raised right out to dry on racks. One of these vats has room for 8 planter boxes to be painted at one time. The miracles, the skill, the ingenuity

of the Tye Company has produced farm equipment that has revolutionized farm know how.

The first experimental drill and the first 12 row planter were built in 1962. Experimentation came before drills, etc. were produced. "All the time, I was manufacturing, I was getting things pretty well figured out for when John came back to take over."

Now 80 or 90% of Tye Machinery sales are not for irrigated ground. The Plains of Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, and California use Tye machinery. "Most of the things we make plant everything from soybeans to exotic grass seeds. We really cover everything from river bottoms to unbroken lands-different kinds of machinery for different kinds of seeds," Tye

Tye Pasture Pleaser is a convenientlysized tool for minimum tillage seeding legume grasses, small grains or soybeans in stubble sod or in permanent or improved pasture.'

The orange Tye operator's manual gives specific instructions on assembly and care for their machinery.

The Flexible Unit Planter, the Seed Bed Roller, Subsoiling Bedder Cultivator equipment as well as everything that Tye makes are sent from the Lockney plant crated in wooden crates thoroughly sealed in clear plastic ready to be assembled at the destination.

Speed Up Tax **Refunds By Using**

Peeloff Label

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of their Federal income tax return and receive their refund much faster by using the preaddressed, peeloff label on their return, the Internal Revenue Service said. The

label, which is located on the cover of tax return package, lists the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number. If any of the information is incorrect, the taxpayer should make needed changes directly on the

Married taxpayers filing joint returns should be sure that both social security numbers appear on the label. If only one spouse's number is shown, the other number should be placed on the label, according to the IRS.

IRS encourages taxpayers to send their return in the coded envelope provided with the tax package and to make sure they have attached all required schedules and forms.





WALLPAPER WITH "PATTERN DESIGNS" -WHERE TO PUT IT

Pattern is an important

Some of the linens are subtle enough to lend texture rather than pattern to a scheme. One caution: remember to avoid

walls, trim, and ceiling. Otherwise, you might search in vain for a pattern which blends in well with a desired scheme and an established wall color.

COST-PER-WEARING -A KEY IN BUYING

"Cost-per-wearing" will stretch clothing dollars if you pay attention to it. It's like figuring cost-per-serving in food buying. To find the cost-per-wearing of a garment just divide the number of times you'll wear it into the purchase price. Here's an example: you've found a sweater on sale for \$20, you buy it, then don't like it, so you only wear it twice. Its cost-per-wearing is \$10 expensive for most people's budgets, even if it was on sale. On the other hand, say you buy a seemingly expensive all-weather coat for \$100 and wear it four times a week for six months. Its cost-perwearing is only \$1 - a very reasonable cost-per-wearing. Also, if the coat last two years, the cost-per-wearing would be 50 cents, or for three years, just 33 cents.





Door latches that stick are real source of irritation. This is easily eliminated with lubrication.


To lubricate, turn the handle until latch is all the way in. Put powdered graphite into the works of lock and latch. Next, put a very small amount of graphite between the stationary collar and shaft of the knob, on each side of the door. Lubricate lock with the thumb-pressure lever by putting graphite into crevice where ever enters the lock body.

Depress the lever until latch tongue is in. Never use oil on a cylinder lock . . . the kind with keyhole and mechanism in cylindrical case. Oil gums the tumblers. If lubrication does not solve the problem, replace the

Simply take off knobs, remove faceplates, and finally the latch. Be sure to take the old latch to the store to assure the proper

Special Benefits For Certain Widows, Widowers

A person whose spouse died in 1977 or 1978 may be entitled to a special tax benefit, the Internal Revenue Service said.

There are requirements for obtaining the lesser tax rates: the taxpayer must have been entitled to file a joint return for the year of death, even if one was not actually filed; the taxpayer

must not have remarried before the close of the current tax year; he or she must have a child or stepchild who qualified as dependent; and he or she must have furnished over half the cost of maintaining a home which was the principal residence for the dependent child or

stepchild for the entire year. Taxpayers who are elgible to take advantage of the

lower tax rates should file Form 1040, check Block 5 under Filing Status, "Qualifying Widow(er) with Dependent, Child," and figure the tax using the "Married Filing Jointly" column.

The last year a taxpayer may file jointly with, or claim an exemption for, a deceased spouse is the year of the death, the IRS said ...


