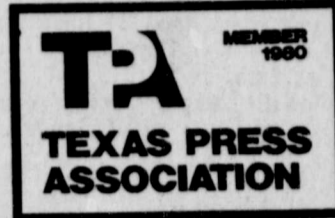

## Hospital Staff Honors Doctors

Bright red carnation boutonnettes sported by Doctors W.J. Mangold and Gary Mangold on Monday from the hospital staff in honor of Doctor's Day. For the four years, the staff has honored the annual observance of a special day to honor the American physician in 1933. The day chosen is the anniversary of the occasion when Dr.

Crawford W. Long became the first acclaimed physician to use ether as an anesthetic agent in a surgical technique, March 30, 1842. The red carnation is the designated official flower of Doctor's Day.

The hospital staff also joined together to treat the Doctors and their wives to dinner.

This is the first year that Doctor Gary has been so honored. He began his practice in Lockney in July of 1979, after serving his residency at John Peter Smith Hospital in Arlington.

## Glennon Restates Deadline

## SBA Declaration

William E. Glennon, District Manager of the Disaster Loan Office of the Small Business Administration in Lubbock, Texas, has announced that farmers, ranchers and other agricultural related businesses who might be eligible for disaster loans under SBA Disaster Declaration #1708, must file their applications for these loans by April 10, 1980, for physical losses on crops and by April 10, 1980, for economic injury losses on business.

The interest rates on these long term loans are 5 percent and 7.3/8 percent on physical loss loans and 8-1/4 percent on loans for business losses.

Disaster Declaration #1708 covers the following counties: Smith, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Cockran, Bailey, Yoakum, Gaines, Dawson, Martin, and Upton Counties and the counties adjacent to them.

## Scout Flag Has Flown Over National Capitol

In the early morning hours of October 18, 1979 an American Flag was unfurled for the first time over the Capitol Building in Washington D.C. That evening the flag was packaged and mailed to Boy Scout Troop 259 in Lockney.

Scout master, Clarence Ashley, was told by Scout officials that it was possible to obtain a flag that had flown over the U.S. Capitol. Boys from the troop wrote to Charles Stenholm, 17th District Congressman, and requested the flag.

Stenholm responded with this letter: "It is a pleasure to advise that I have today placed in the mail to you the 3' x 5' cotton flag which you requested recently, to be flown over the United States Capitol Building for Boy Scout Troop No. 259. A certificate will accompany the flag showing that this has been done."

Troop members unpacked the flag at their regular meeting at the fire station, Monday night. The troop of eighteen boys ages 11 to 16, is sponsored by the Lockney Rotary.

On April 19, the Scouts will sponsor a Bike-A-Thon. The proceeds will be given to St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital.

## Three Elections Scheduled Saturday

### Balloting For Schools, City, Hospital District

Three Lockney elections will be held this Saturday, April 5. Lockney Independent School District polls will be at the High School. City of Lockney polls will be at the Council Meeting Room in the City Hall. Lockney General Hospital District polls will be at the Fire Boys Meeting Hall in the Fire Station. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Results of the election at City Hall will be posted on the window after the polls are closed Saturday night. Following are details on each of the elections.

#### LOCKNEY ISD

Two incumbents will be on the ballot, Eddie Foster and Eugene Tannahill. Also seeking elections is J.T. "Buster"

Terrell Jr., and Bill Race. There are three places for trustees open with four running. All four are farmers.

Hold over school members are: Kelton Shaw, grain elevator owner; Tom Duvall, Eddie Teeter, and Kenneth Broseh, all farmers. Jerry Williams, a farmer, is retiring.

#### CITY OF LOCKNEY

Four men have filed for the three seats open on the City Council. The two incumbents are: Paul Reece, associated with a roofing company; and J.D. Copeland, tax service operator. Also seeking Council seats are: Roy Holly, funeral home operator; Jimmy Stennett, medical lab and clothing store owner (he previously served on the city council for 8 years.)

Hold over city council members: Thurman Davis, lumberyard owner; Bobby McCormick, farmer, and Mayor Claude Brown, clothing store owner. Pat Frizzell, a former city councilman who had served since December when Jerry Perry moved to Floydada will also be retiring.

#### LOCKNEY GENERAL HOSPITAL DISTRICT

Two persons placed their names on the ballot for the two spots open on the hospital board. Les Ferguson is the incumbent, and Francis Montandon is seeking election. Both are farmers.

The hold over board members are: Chester Carthel, farmer; R.D. Baccus, car agency; Kenneth Tate, utility manager; Helmut Quebe, farmer, has served for three terms and is ineligible to run again.

## Rural Real Estate Tax Appraisal Begins In Floyd County

Rural real estate tax appraisal has begun in Floyd County.

Robert Hill will be working beginning in the northeast part of the county, and Jake Williams will begin work in the southwestern part of the county.

The appraisers will not be evaluating any personal property. They will be inspecting real property.

Property owners are asked to help in every way possible. Appraisers will

# Tye Invents And Manufactures For A World Market

A few years ago—34 to be exact—there was no Tye Company of Lockney. At that time, inventor J.M. Tye, who founded the company, was farming 700 acres of Floyd County dryland.

Today, the Tye Company, housed in a 115,000 square-foot manufacturing company is located on the highway just south of Lockney and is very much in evidence. Here the creative genius of

J.M. Tye is expressed in the latest and best of farm machinery to be shipped out to farmers all over the United States as well as Canada and South America. Nevertheless, Tye remembers his 10

years of dryland farming, when he rented land from H.P. Clements and lived in the old Clements home across the road from Cereal Elevator.

He says, "I liked farming. I started out with the advantage of having worked with the Oliver Implement Company, demonstrating farm machinery. I had worked for the company a year in Amarillo, a year in Dallas and had run their branch and had run their branch office in Houston 2 years and had ended up going to Shreveport for 5 years. While I was working for them I had seen all types of farming. "I had seen farming on the black lands all around, Sherman, Dallas, and Waco. I had seen it in the rice fields around Houston and Southern Louisiana. Too, I had learned what it was to farm in the hill country of East Texas and Arkansas. In 1952, he began irrigating his farm land. "That is when I found out that available farm equipment for irrigated land could be improved. My attention was first called to listers, planters, cultivators and rod weeders.

By 1955, he was in the implement business again. This time it was in the building which is now the office space for secretaries and for Tye and son John M. who has headed the operation of the company since 1972. This 50 by 100 foot building had its solid glass wall destroyed by hail in 1956. The hail was so severe that the roof was a total loss including skylights "the first ever to be hailed out." The insurance inspector took brick from the hail building back to his home office because they were the first brick he had ever seen to be chipped by hail.

This building with its latest decoration shows no sign of hail destruction. Once a week heads of such departments as computers, shipping, etc. meet in the boardroom comfortably seated at the long conference table. Most of the 140 people on the payroll are from Lockney, Floydada or Plainview. Managerial and professional-type personnel come through advertising for those who have specific skills. "There is so little manufacturing here that it is necessary to go to manufacturing places to find those who are skilled and who would like moving here. The logistic problem of bringing materials in and sending machinery out is more than one man can care for," John M. says.

The 8 separate buildings in the planthouse separate units of work. The clatter-clang from one of the light turns out steel of various designs. A worker at one machine makes short strips that have a bend at one end. Another worker works at making three holes at one end and one at the other of a strip of steel. Each machine in this building produces a special pattern.

Welding machines sending sparks like a Christmas firework are in one building. One of these machines is automatic and welds three separate pieces at the same time. One 30-ton giant machine in this room had to be brought in through the roof because it was too large for the door. A skylight is now where the opening was made to bring it in.

Brushes are not used to paint the Tye orange and green machinery. Huge vats of paint are in a house removed from the others. One worker places a small part of machinery on a conveyor. The conveyor carries the part through green paint. The small instrument is dry by the time it reaches its starting place.

Is it possible to imagine 32 planter-box lids painted in a moment's time? They are dunked in an enormous vat and raised right out to dry on racks. One of these vats has room for 8 planter boxes to be painted at one time.

The miracles, the skill, the ingenuity of the Tye Company has produced farm equipment that has revolutionized farm know how.

The first experimental drill and the first 12 row planter were built in 1962. Experimentation came before drills, etc. were produced. "All the time, I was manufacturing, I was getting things pretty well figured out for when John came back to take over."

Now 80 or 90% of Tye Machinery sales are not for irrigated ground. The Plains of Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, and California use Tye machinery. "Most of the things we make plant everything from soybeans to exotic grass seeds. We really cover everything from river bottoms to unbroken lands—different kinds of machinery for different kinds of seeds," Tye explains.

The Pasture Pleaser is a conveniently-sized tool for minimum tillage seeding legume grasses, small grains or soybeans in stubble sod or in permanent or improved pasture.

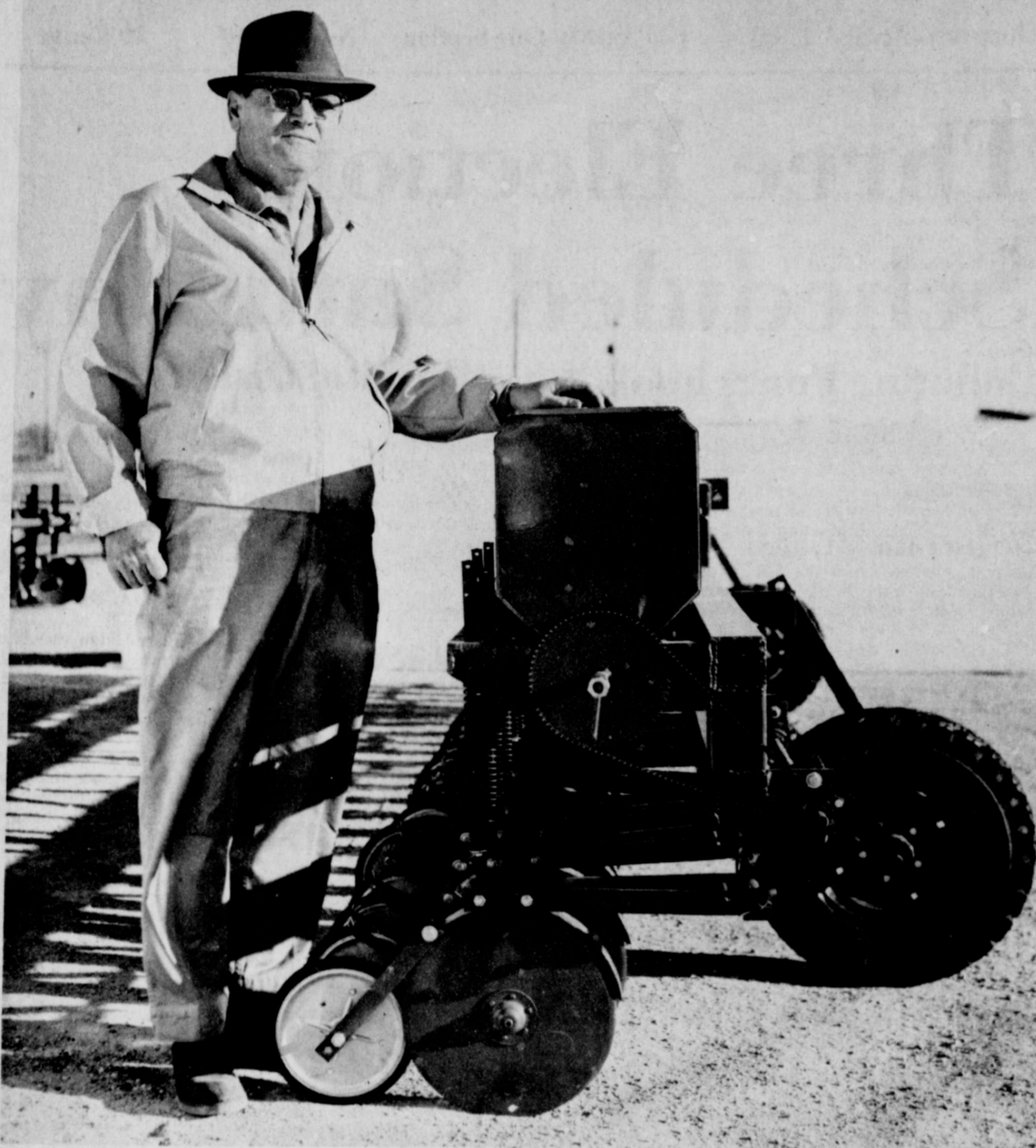
The orange Tye operator's manual gives specific instructions on assembly and care for their machinery.

The Flexible Unit Planter, the Seed Bed Roller, Subsoiling Bedder Cultivator equipment as well as everything that Tye makes are sent from the Lockney plant crated in wooden crates through-

ly sealed in clear plastic ready to be assembled at the destination.

It has been just a few years since J.M. Tye was a dryland farmer, but in that time he has made a great

### Refunds By Using

### Peeloff Label

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of their Federal income tax return and receive their refund much faster by using the preaddressed, peeloff label on their return, the Internal Revenue Service said. The

label, which is located on the cover of the tax return package, lists the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number. If any of the information is incorrect, the taxpayer should make needed changes directly on the label.

Married taxpayers filing joint returns should be sure that both social security numbers appear on the label. If only one spouse's number is shown, the other number should be placed on the label, according to the IRS.

IRS encourages taxpayers to send their return in the coded envelope provided with the tax package and to make sure they have attached all required schedules and forms.

Be careful with microwave popcorn — there's a slight danger of damage, and the popcorn may be dried out, a family resource management specialist cautions. If you're popping corn in your microwave, you could damage the oven itself — even if you have a special popper for the oven, Lillian Chenoweth says.

There are so many variables involved that at least one major microwave manufacturer recommends against the practice. Another manufacturer can recommend only their brand of popper for use — only in their oven with strict adherence to the precise times. If you still want to try microwave popcorn, first check the cookbook that came with your oven. Although many food-product packages offer information and directions, these may not apply to your oven.

2 cups sugar  
1 cup white corn syrup  
1/2 cup water

When mixture reaches 230 degrees pour in:  
3 cups raw peanuts quickly and stir constantly until mixture reaches 320 degrees. Do not rush this rise in temperature as there is danger of scorching. When this combi-

nation reaches the proper temperature remove from fire and very quickly add:

2 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. butter  
1 tsp. vanilla

(These three additions should be measured in advance.) Stir this in vigorously until it is thoroughly mixed and pour onto buttered foil or large buttered cookie pans while it is still foaming. Pour and scatter over the pan, but do not shake or smooth out because this has a tendency to make the candy too brittle and hard to eat.

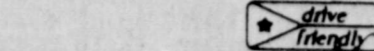

Otherwise, you might search in vain for a pattern which blends in well with a desired scheme and an established wall color.

#### COST-PER-WEARING — A KEY IN BUYING

"Cost-per-wearing" will stretch clothing dollars if you pay attention to it. It's like figuring cost-per-serving in food buying. To find the cost-per-wearing of a garment just divide the number of times you'll wear it into the purchase price. Here's an example: you've found a sweater on sale for \$20, you buy it, then don't like it, so you only wear it twice. Its cost-per-wearing is \$10 — expensive for most people's budgets, even if it was on sale. On the other hand, say you buy a seemingly expensive all-weather coat for \$100 and wear it four times a week for six months. Its cost-per-wearing is only \$1 — a very reasonable cost-per-wearing. Also, if the coat last two years, the cost-per-wearing would be 50 cents, or for three years, just 33 cents.

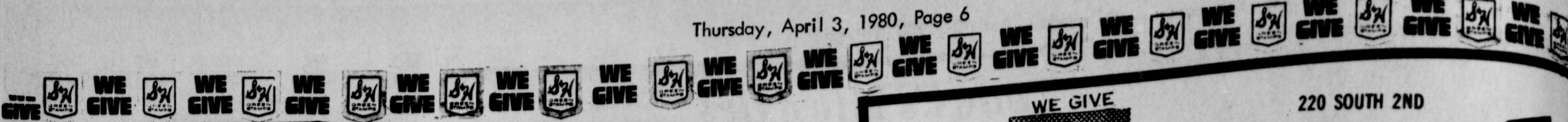

## Former Floydada Resident To Go To Shanghai

Houston rancher John Joyce's plea for someone to accompany his prize, 1,500-pound bull to Shanghai resulted in offers from a New York City nurse, a retired banker and a lot of people more interested in adventure than they were qualified to bullsit, he said Saturday.

But among the 500 people who responded during a telephone blitz of his Boling, Texas, ranch this week, Joyce also found a winner.

As a result, Mr. Sugarata, Joyce's gift to Vice Premier Deng Xiaoping and the People's Republic of China, will sail in the company of a Houston radio station employee who grew up on a farm.

"We had calls from every state in the nation, I bet," Joyce said in reference to a UPI story detailing his unusual needs. "We must have had 300, 400, 500 calls. We chose Wes Johnson. He's gonna document his trip and try to report to us every day from the ship. He's well-qualified and has an agricultural background."

"We had some callers that I believe would have paid me to go along with the bull. They were all real nice. Nobody called collect. We had a lot of qualified people and some, of course, who weren't."

Friday afternoon Joyce introduced Johnson to Chinese Consul General Wu Xiaoda and officials from Lykes Bros. steamship company who offered to ship the bull for free.

Lykes Bros. surprised Johnson, 34, by agreeing to take his wife, Cyd, 32, along as well.

Johnson confessed he was going "just for adventure," but said the trip was part of his approach to life.

"We've never felt like life was worth having work stand in your way," he said. "We're not going for big (career) money, we're going for the fun."

Johnson formerly lived with his family Warner and Evelyn Johnson, in the Lakeview community and graduated from Floydada High School in 1964. He worked at KFLD several years, and is presently assistant news director at KIKK in Houston.

**FIX IT FACTS**

Door latches that stick are a real source of irritation. This is easily eliminated with lubrication.  
To lubricate, turn the handle until latch is all the way in. Put powdered graphite into the works of lock and latch. Next, put a very small amount of graphite between the stationary collar and shaft of the knob, on each side of the door. Lubricate lock with the thumb-pressure latch lever by putting graphite into crevice where lever enters the lock body.  
Depress the lever until latch tongue is in. Never use oil on a cylinder lock... the kind with keyhole and mechanism in cylindrical case. Oil gums the tumblers. If lubrication does not solve the problem, replace the latch.  
Simply take off knobs, remove faceplates, and finally the latch. Be sure to take the old latch to the store to assure the proper size.

### VA QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q — Can closing costs be included in the amount of money the government guarantees for a GI home loan?  
A — No. All such costs must be paid in cash.

Q — I am a GI Bill student in need of some help from a tutor and I understand the Veterans Administration provides such help. Will these extra payments reduce the GI Bill time I have coming to me?  
A — No. VA will pay up to \$69 a month for tutoring, to a maximum amount of \$828, with no charge against your basic entitlement to training.

Q — A person whose spouse died in 1977 or 1978 may be entitled to a special tax benefit, the Internal Revenue Service said.

must not have remarried before the close of the current tax year; he or she must have a child or stepchild who qualified as dependent; and he or she must have furnished over half the cost of maintaining a home which was the principal residence for the dependent child or stepchild for the entire year. Taxpayers who are eligible to take advantage of the lower tax rates should file Form 1040, check Block 5 under Filing Status, "Qualifying Widow(er) with Dependent Child," and figure the tax using the "Married Filing Jointly" column.

The last year a taxpayer may file jointly with, or claim an exemption for, a deceased spouse is the year of the death, the IRS said.
