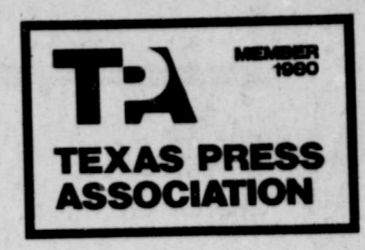

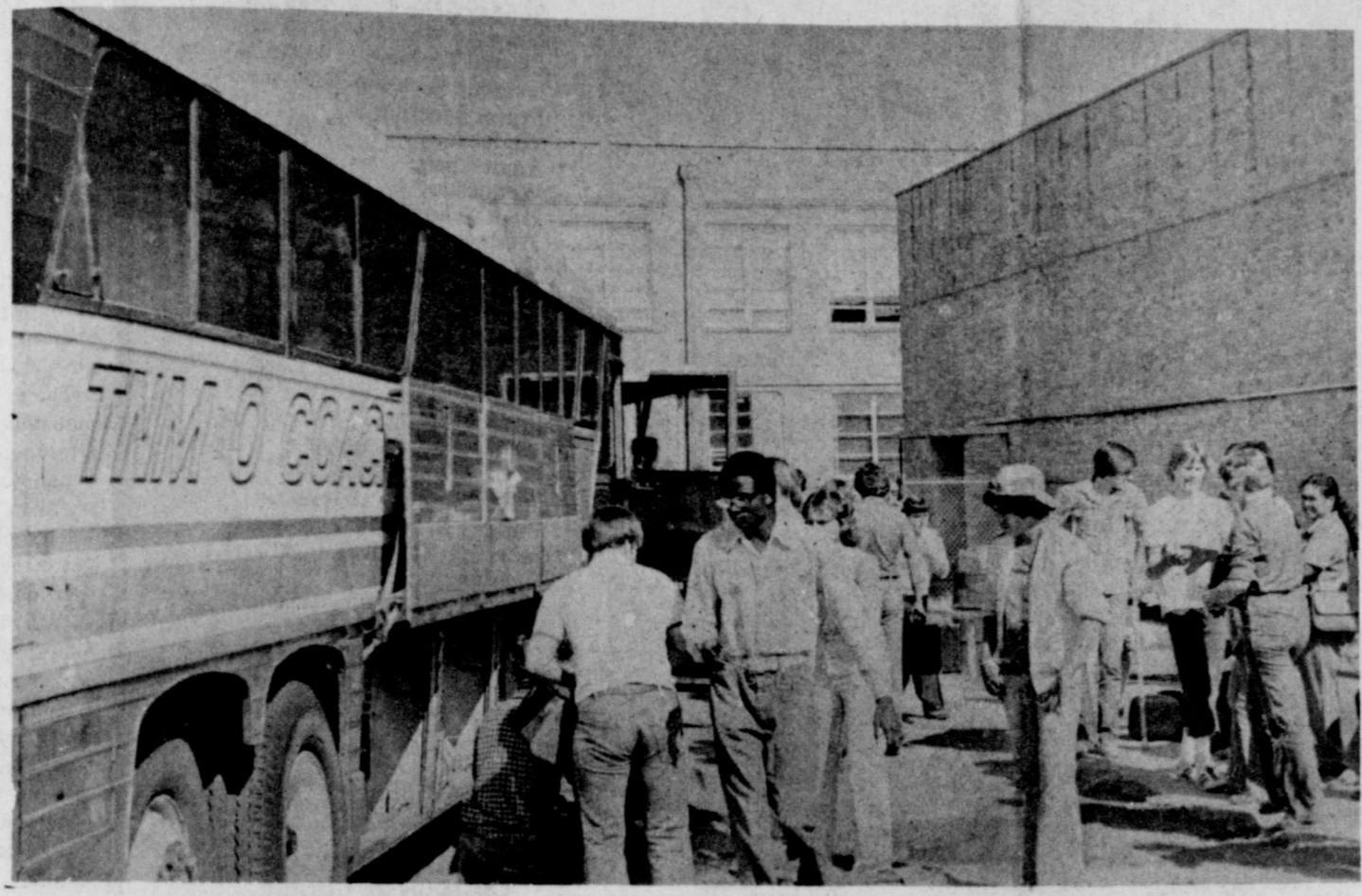

Research Confirms Nutritionists Views

New research findings back up nutritionists who say that individuals with a disorder called "carbohydrate sensitivity" should not eat high levels of sugar. This was reported here today at the annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies of Experimental Biology.

Scientists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Science and Education Administration and the University of Maryland did the research and reported the results. Sheldon Reiser, Ph.D., chief of the USDA carbohydrate laboratory at Beltsville, Md., coordinated the cooperative project.

Twenty-four volunteers took part in the study. All had been tested and identified as carbohydrate-sensitive. In the tests, each volunteer drank a solution composed of two grams of sucrose per kilogram of body weight (equivalent to about five ounces of sucrose for a 150-pound person). After that, blood samples were taken and analyzed for insulin levels. An exceptionally high insulin response, or a prolonged high insulin level, was regarded as an indicator of carbohydrate sensitivity.

Dr. Reiser and his associates said that carbohydrate-sensitive people may have several exaggerated metabolic responses to sugar in the diet. One of the most common and noticeable responses is an exceptionally high level of blood triglycerides—if a diet high in sucrose (table sugar) is eaten. An estimated 20 million Americans have some degree of carbohydrate sensitivity.

The 24 people ate diets with 5, 18, or 33 percent of total calories in the form of sucrose. All ate diets at each sugar level for six weeks.

A five percent sugar diet, the nutritionists said, is far below the U.S. average, which is estimated at near 18 percent; 33 percent is above average but may be about the intake of many individuals who like sweet foods. Besides Dr. Reiser, members of the research team were Otho E. Michaelis IV, Ph.D., and biochemist Judith F. Hallfrisch and Mary C. Bickard of the USDA carbohydrate laboratory; Elizabeth S. Prather, Ph.D., chairman of the University of Maryland department of food, nutrition and university administration; and biochemists Mark Keeney, Ph.D., Karen D. Israel and Ellen L. Bohn of the university's biochemistry department.

They reported: --Six of the volunteers who consumed the highest level of sugar (33 percent calories) developed a "type IV hyperlipoproteinemia pattern". In this condition, blood carries amounts and kinds of fats that have been linked with heart disease.

--Blood triglyceride levels in both men and women increased as the amount of sugar in the diet increased, and the increases were much greater in men than in women. Triglyceride levels were normal in the men when they had the five percent sugar diets. Elevated triglyceride levels also have been associated with heart disease.

--When sugar provided 18 or 33 percent of the calories, compared with five percent, blood levels of total cholesterol were significantly higher. Higher sugar diets also caused an undesirable increase in the men's blood levels of low-density-lipoproteins, contrasted with high-density-lipoproteins. Recent evidence suggests that high levels of high-density-lipoproteins, relative to low-density-lipoproteins, reduces the risk of heart disease.

--Levels of blood insulin following a fast were related to the amount of sugar in the diet; insulin was significantly higher when sugar provided 33 percent of the calories as compared to 18 percent and was higher during the 18-

percent sugar diet than during the five percent sugar diet. Glucose levels followed a similar pattern during fasting. Insulin and glucose responses during times when individuals were eating the two highest levels of sugar indicated glucose intolerance—a warning that diabetes may develop.

--Uric acid levels in the blood were correlated with the amount of sugar in the diet. Men showed a greater response than women. The blood uric acid level in men was above normal when they were on the 33 percent sugar diet and close to abnormal when they were on the 18 percent sugar diet. Abnormally high levels of uric acid are considered a risk factor in heart disease.

Dr. Reiser suggested that health officials may wish to consider a screening program to identify carbohydrate-sensitive people, in view of the risk a high sugar intake might impose on these people. He said he bases this suggestion on an accumulation of data as well as the new data presented here. --Testing could help identify individuals at a higher than normal risk of developing diseases such as atherosclerosis and diabetes—those whose likelihood of disease is heightened if they eat a lot of sugar. Informed of the risk, these persons might modify their sugar intake and reduce the risk," said Dr. Reiser.

Tech Offers Sales Course For Women

A sales course designed especially for women will be presented by the Texas Tech University Continuing Education Division 7-9:30 p.m. Tuesday nights April 22 - May 27. Classes will meet in the Conference Room of the Continuing Education Building X-15 on campus. Purpose of the sales training program is to teach saleswomen to analyze the buyer-seller relationship and better understand the process involved. Dr. Robert D. Amason, professor of marketing at Texas Tech, is course instructor for "The OK Saleswoman: Transactional Analysis for Women in Business." He said sales transactions are communication based on models for human

personality. The salesperson spends most working hours in the midst of these transactions. The course "provides a powerful technique for the female salesperson to respond effectively to the needs of each customer," he said. An understanding and proper application of principles outlined in the course build self-confidence and tend to reduce turnover rates, improve the company's image and improve employee motivation and morale. The enrollment fee of \$50 per person includes the textbook and all educational materials. Registration will be limited to 40 persons. Participants successfully completing the course will receive 1.2 Continuing Education Units.

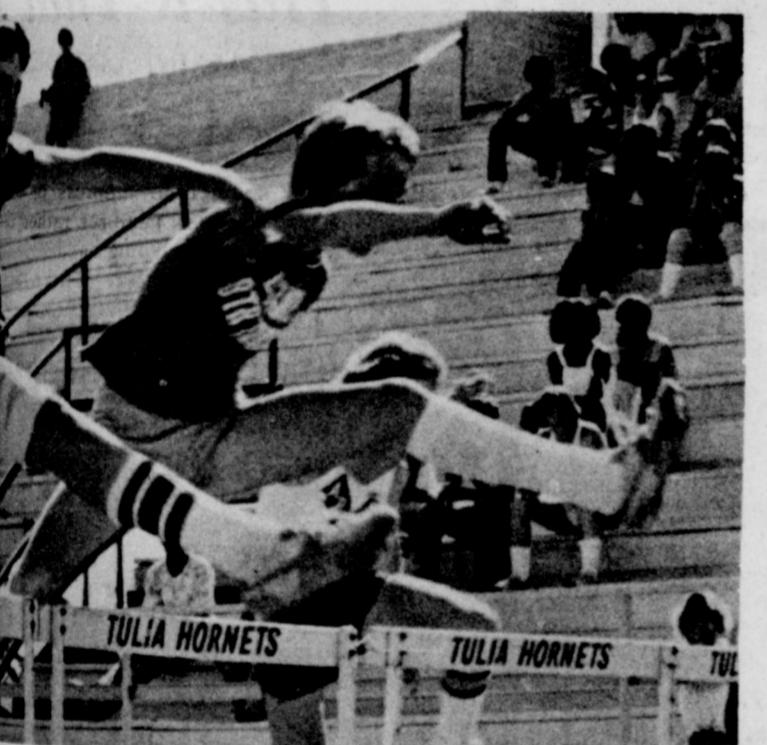

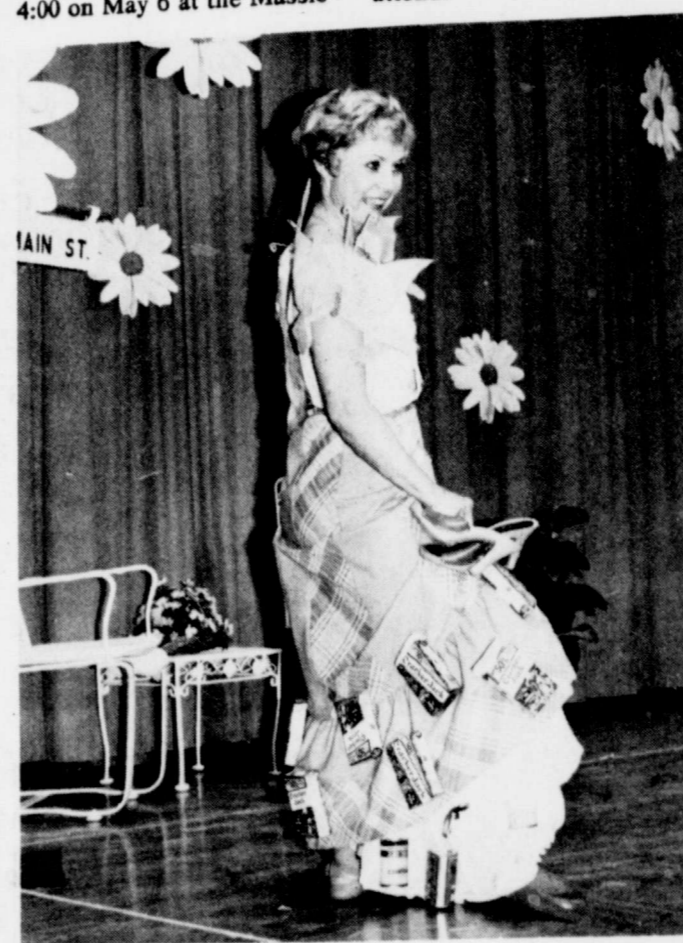

increase in credit-fund spending. Constant-dollar prices for food and clothing have been in the red for two years. Retail prices for many necessities are constant dollars—increases until real prices begin to rise.

Retail food prices, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, rose 0.5 percent from February—an annual rate of 1.5 percent. This was less than a 1 percent annual rate in nonfood prices. On a seasonal basis, the food price index rose 0.2 percent from January to February. The annual rate of increase in food prices is 1.5 percent.

Grain harvest in the U.S. is now in full swing. Production appears about 10 percent above last year's output. However, a sharp rise in interest rates has put downward pressure on soybeans and products.

Company Notifies FDA

Friona Industries, Inc. announced Tuesday, April 22, that it has notified the Food and Drug Administration that approximately 10,800 head of cattle at its feedyards were implanted with the drug diethylstilbestrol (DES) after November 1, 1979.

The FDA contends that such use of the drug constitutes a violation of its regulations. The company has elected to participate in the FDA's reconditioning program which involves removing the DES implants from the cattle and withholding the cattle from market for prescribed periods of time. Under FDA regulations cattle must be withheld from market a minimum of 61 days following implant removal if the entire animal is processed, or a minimum of 41 days if the liver and kidney are discarded.

The Company estimates that it will be necessary to feed approximately 3,000 head of cattle for longer periods than normal, depending upon the weight of the cattle and the number of days on feed.

The Company is unable to estimate the amount of losses, if any, it may incur due to the reconditioning program, but believes that any loss that occurs will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the Company.

The cattle implanted with DES comprise about 14 percent of the total 75,247 head the Company currently has in its three feedyards.

Friona Common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI. The Company is engaged in the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds, retail marketing of animal health supplies, custom cattle feeding, the sale of Company owned cattle, operation of grain facilities, and the processing, packaging and distribution of ground beef.
