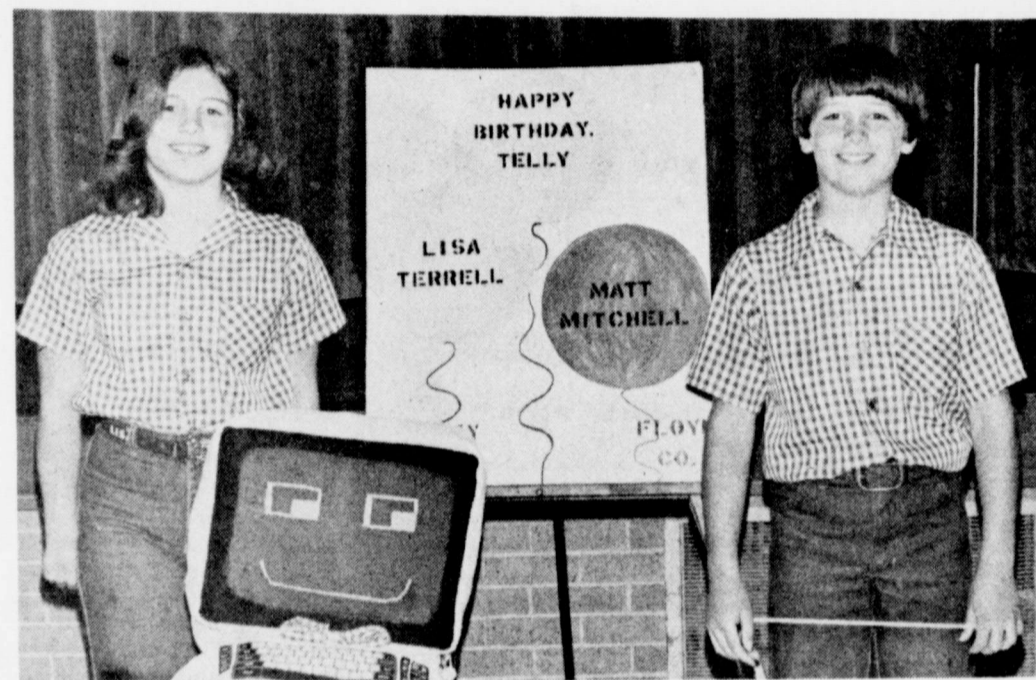
District Roundup At Texas Tech

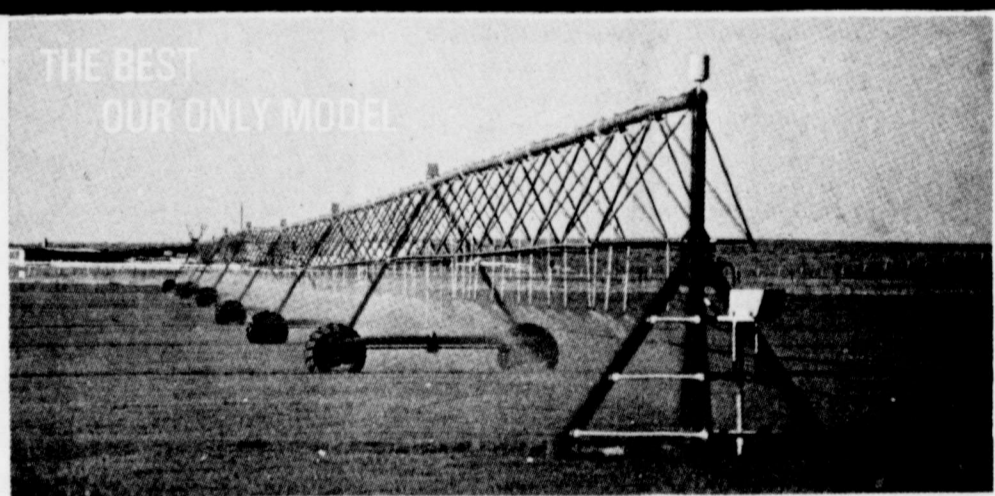

Today's Lifestyles

Think twice before giving a small appliance as a gift. Research about the appliance-use patterns of homemakers revealed that people are least likely to use appliances they receive as gifts and most likely to use appliances they purchase themselves.

Toasters, electric hand-mixers, electric skillets, blenders and electric can-openers were among the appliances most frequently used by the homemakers surveyed in the study. Electric corn poppers, electric knives, deep-fat fryers and electric slow cookers were reported as the appliances least often or never used.

Considering why some appliances were used frequently while others ended up on the shelf, storage space did not significantly affect frequency of use. But performance, design and quality of instructions were definite factors. Appliances that were difficult to clean, hard to use, and took up too much counter space were frequent complaints.

Before buying a small appliance for a gift or for personal use, make sure that it meets a real need, or it will likely end up on the shelf. A point-of-purchase check-list should include these questions: Will the appliance meet a real need or is it a fad item?

How often will the appliance be used? Will it serve more than one function? Is authorized service readily available? Have safety features been incorporated into the design of the product to protect hands and kitchen surfaces? Will the appliance clean easily? Is it immersible? Is the instruction manual concise, complete and easy to understand?

Small electric appliances have gained in popularity in recent years—the average household has 11 different small portable electric appliances. Many use less energy than conventional appliances. Others simplify difficult or tedious food-preparation tasks.

A recent marketing survey predicts that food processors, popcorn poppers, slow cookers and ice cream makers will become basics in most kitchens by 1983. But they predict that doughnut makers and crepe makers may disappear from retail shelves by 1983. Pizza makers and hamburger cookers are not expected to increase in popularity over the next five years.

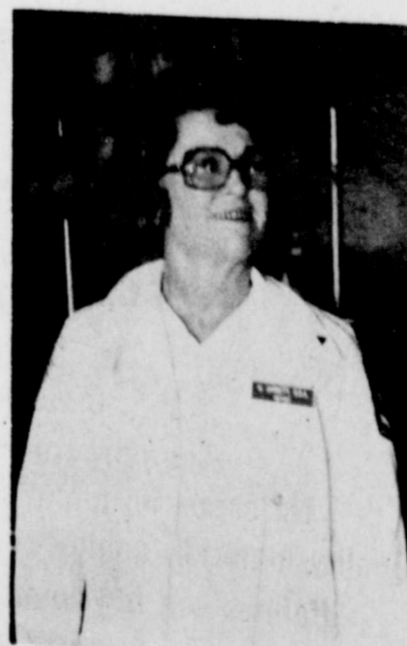

Proceeds will go to the National Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

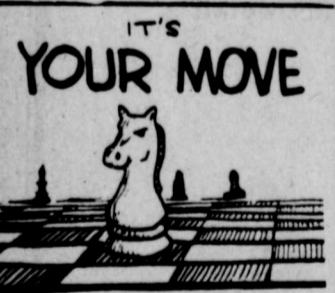

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES:

The ten-cent per gallon fee you intend to impose on gasoline on May 15 will result in disastrous economic repercussions for all Americans. The impact will be felt most severely in rural America, in the nation's farming communities and among small businesses—that segment of Americans who can least afford it.

We believe the negative impacts of the program on all Americans far outweigh any possible reduction in crude oil imports and energy conservation. Specifically, your ten-cent per gallon gasoline fee will:

- Result in supply shortages in rural America and in agricultural communities.
- Drastically affect 1980 farm crop output during the first year of the program and unnecessarily increase the price of all other petroleum products.
- Place a disproportionate economic burden on low income families, rural areas and small businesses.
- Increase nationwide inflation the first year by at least 1%.
- Make it impossible for small businesses to assimilate the overnight increase of 8% in gasoline product cost.
- Bring about disastrous effects on American farms, businesses and consumers; no economic impact analysis of these effects has been prepared.
- Constitute taxation without Congressional representation.

For these reasons we ask you withdraw the Petroleum Import Adjustment Program and the Gasoline Conservation Fee prior to its scheduled implementation on May 15, 1980. Absent Presidential action we further request that the U.S. Congress take appropriate and swift action to spare all Americans by halting this inflationary program.

TOO LATE STOP IT!

Floyd Philosopher Comes Up With A Suggestion



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm gets tangled up in some debt figures this week.

Some magazines can't leave well enough alone. I read in one last night that government debt in this country has now reached the overwhelming figure of 924 billion dollars.

NINE HUNDRED AND TWENTYFOUR BILLION! You can't think up strong enough language to rare back and denounce such wild and dangerous spending.

But the magazine didn't stop there. It reported that household debt (mortgages and installments) in this country is now 1279 billion dollars.

Publishing such a figure is an outrage. How are people going to lambast the government for wild and reckless spending when they're spending even more themselves? It wipes out every political speech beginning "A government head-over-heels in debt, etc." It puts a

dampener on the economic experts at mid-morning coffee gatherings from Floydada to Washington.

And the magazine didn't stop even there. It added that business debt in this country now stands at 1232 billion dollars. All told, the combined indebtedness is 3,435 billion dollars.

I don't want to pursue this matter any further. My head is swimming.

She died at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday in West Texas Hospital after a brief illness.

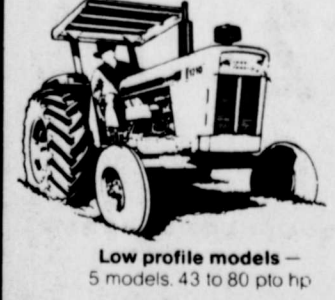

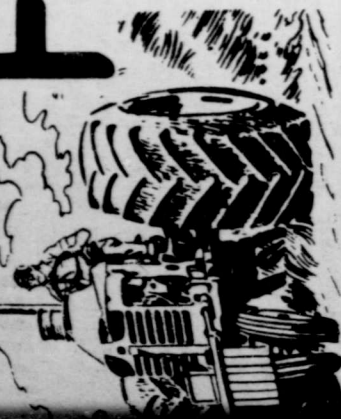

Farm Bureau Facts

We are developing details of a newly-disclosed federal grant of \$335,567 for the exclusive use of members of Cesar Chavez's United Farm Workers (UFW). In what is called "a pioneer agricultural apprenticeship program", California's Department of Industrial Relations has received the monies from the Department of Labor's Office of Special Programs under Title 1 of the CETA program. Funds are being used to develop apprenticeship training systems in tractor operation and tractor maintenance. Participation is limited to operations with UFW contracts; thus only UFW members are eligible for training. The program is presently restricted to California.

California Gov. Jerry Brown outlined general terms of the grant program last week at a Sacramento news conference, shared with Chavez and a participating farm employer. Brown hailed it as a model for expanded apprenticeship programs to come. He said that a \$25 million California Worksite Education and Training Act (CWETA)—a state program—might be a source for a new monies for the agricultural apprenticeship program in California.

Since funded apprenticeship programs involve on-the-job training, three California growers have been persuaded to be employer participants, and the division of Apprenticeship Training of the California Department of Industrial Relations is looking for more. Worker representatives to the program—exclusively UFW—include Cesar Chavez, his brother Richard, and UFW vice-president Frank Ortiz, who is presently in Chicago as the local director of UFW's current lettuce boycott.

In addition to public pronouncements we have learned that: -Chavez hopes to expand agricultural apprenticeship programs under UFW influence to Arizona, Texas, and New Mexico.

The grant, while revealed by Gov. Brown only last week, has actually been in force since November of 1977, and has been extended once. Research took a portion of that time, but very likely there was difficulty in getting the necessary grower participation. The grant expires July 1, of this year, but may be extended again.

Most monies have already been spent in research and program development. (Farm employers will pay apprentice tractor drivers and mechanics for on-the-job work/training). -Although Gov. Brown implied that 100 workers are enrolled in the apprenticeship program, the state division of Apprenticeship Training which administers the program says only nine or ten are presently enrolled; and that it will be towards the end of the year before as many as 100 are signed up.

The program is regarded as a "pilot project", thus criticism of expenditures of \$335,567 for a present participation of only nine or ten workers (33,500 per worker!) is discounted as premature. The Bureau expects a long-term program to be based on that initial expenditure but is looking for new extension monies. Even so, the grant will expire this July 1, with only a very few farm workers and only three

participating growers to show for an expenditure of \$335,567.

We will keep you advised of further developments. Initial reaction that the grant was simply a political payoff to Chavez who had been campaigning for Gov. Brown's presidential campaign is somewhat tempered by the disclosure that the grant has been in effect since 1977. Why, then, was it kept so under cover?

As a CETA Title 1 program, the grant was made at the "discretion" of the Secretary of Labor. No policy review board was involved. At UFW's Fresno convention in August of 1977, Labor Secretary Marshall promised farm workers a national apprenticeship training program. The California program may well be out the first step in a nationwide Marshall commitment. Certainly, wherever Chavez is invested with sole participation it becomes an important organizing tool for UFW—at taxpayers expense.

DES REGULATIONS

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has announced the finding of wide-spread use of diethylstilbestrol (DES) by cattlemen. FDA withdrew approval of the manufacture, use, and distribution of DES on June 29, 1979. A ban on the use became effective on November 1, 1979.

The United States Department of Agriculture has released final interim rules, effective on April 22, 1980, for dealing with the matter. Copies of the rules and regulations are available from this office. There seem to be no fines or penalties connected with the new regulations, so long as those involved cooperate.

It is unreal to impose on an American citizen, rules and regulations that seemingly have no scientific background whatsoever. Congressman Jamie Whitten from Mississippi, placed the following information in a congressional hearing report with regard to several useful products.

...the following are ingredients that have been banned as a result of the lack of proof of safety, and because they induced cancer in laboratory testing of animals. The equivalencies of required intake by man of affected products are, of course, just simple mathematical projections. They are intended only to provide a general perspective of required consumption based on the levels of carcinogens used in laboratory experiments.

Cyclamate--A 12-ounce bottle of soft drink may have contained from one-quarter to 1 gram of sodium cyclamate. An adult would have to drink from 138 to 552 12-ounce bottles of soft drink a day to get an amount comparable to that causing effects in mice and rats.

Oil of Calamus--In order to get an amount comparable to that which caused effects in rats, a person would have to drink 250 quarts of vermouth a day.

Safrole--A person would have to drink 613 12-ounce bottles of root beer flavored soft drink or eat 220 pounds of hard candy per day to get an amount comparable to that which caused effects in rats.

1,2 Dehydro-2,2,4-trimethylquinoline; polymerized--A plasticizer used in packaging material. If all foods in the diet were to be packaged in this material, a person would have to eat 300,000 times the average daily diet to get an amount comparable to that which caused effects in rats.

4,4-Methylenebis (2-chloroaniline)--A plastic curing agent used in food contact surfaces. If all foods in the diet were exposed to this material, a person would have to eat 100,000 times the average daily diet to get an amount comparable to that which caused effects in rats.

DES--Based on findings of 5 percent of liver samples containing 2 ppb of DES, and assuming that 2 percent of the average diet is beef liver, a person would have to consume 5 million pounds of liver per year for 50 years to equal the intake from one treatment of day-after oral contraceptives.

Saccharin--The dosages of saccharin which caused effects in rats in a Canadian study were in excess of the amount a person would receive from drinking 800 12-ounce diet sodas over a lifetime.

SPOT COTTON

The March 1980 monthly average price of middling white 1/16 inch staple cotton in the designated markets was 79.24 cents per pound, down 142 points from February average but up 2,054 points from March a year ago. The low for the month of March 1980 was 73.88 cents on March 13, and the high of 83.94 cents was reached on March 21.

With the premise that there's more in a name than a number, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, is "naming" each of its 14 districts. The names will relate to the various geographical areas of the state so that Texans will be able to more readily identify with Extension educational programs and activities. District names and numbers are as follows: Panhandle-1; South Plains-2; Rolling Plains-3; North Central-4; Northeast-5; Far West-6; West Central-7; Central-8; East-9; South Central-10; Upper Coast-11; South-12; Southwest-13; and Coastal Bend-14.

TEXAS IS BIG BUSINESS

Despite inflation, the Texas treasury retains a healthy balance, said State Treasurer Warren G. Harding at a recent County Treasurers Seminar at Texas A&M University sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The state's current surplus is about \$677 million, down from a billion dollar surplus at the end of fiscal year 1975. The state's budget for 1980 is more than \$10 billion, and the state treasurer currently holds more than \$13.5 billion in securities.
