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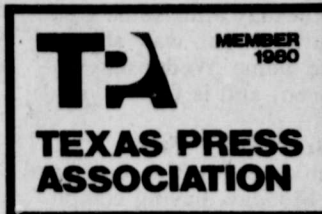

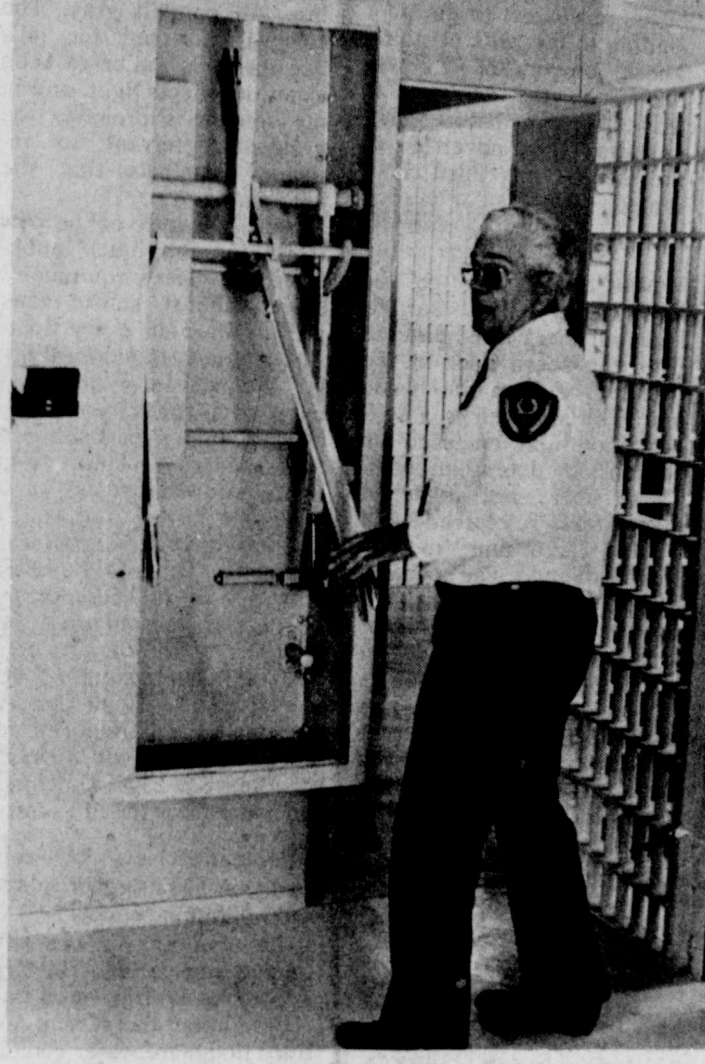

County Jail Open For Public View Saturday

Those of you who have never seen the inside of a jail will be able to indulge your curiosity Old Settlers day by attending the Open House at Floyd County's newest facility.

It's no Cell Block 8, and it's no Holiday Inn. It is a stripped-down, functional combination of concrete and steel built to the exacting standards of the Texas Commission of Jail Standards. It is that and no more.

A new jail was needed. The old one was unsafe and nonfunctional. In the old jail, with all the cells on the second floor, it sometimes took four men to hoist a 200-pound drunk up the narrow flight of stairs. If a fire had broken out, very likely lives would have been lost.

Cardinal said, "it would more likely be some form of drugs."

By the way, there were no prisoners in the building when I was there, but there were three healthy marijuana plants in the detoxification unit that had been confiscated and were being held as evidence. There is also a locked closet in the Sheriff's office that contains evidence. I was surprised to see that quite a bit of that evidence was Coors beer.

Other interesting things on the first floor are a telephone in a lockable recessed box for that "one call" the prisoner is allowed to make. The other innovation is four locked boxes inset next to the door leading to the cells upstairs. Those boxes are for the Sheriff or the deputies to leave their guns before going upstairs. They never go to the second or third floor armed.

Stairwell

New construction on the building is a 636 sq. ft. stairwell that can be entered from the south door of the building or from the inside hall. The stairwell is a self-contained unit enclosed on all floors by detention doors. These doors are made of plate steel, reinforced, and welded according to the standards code. The stairwell is the life-line of the building and the first thing a prisoner sees when he is brought in through that south entrance.

A small table by the door is used for booking the prisoner. Finger prints are taken there. If the person's problem is intoxication, the drunk tank opens right off this anteroom.

Detention Cells

The cells are on the second floor. Capacity of the jail is thirteen, four in the detoxification unit, and nine in cells. There are two double cells, two single cells, and three separation cells. One of those solitary cells is on the second floor and will be used mostly for the trustees. The other two separation cells are the only cells on the third floor. These are used for women or juvenile prisoners.

Most of the third floor is a large open exercise area. Architect Edward Stein said "the beauty of this building is its flexibility, they can use it as it's needed."

The separation cells can also be used for prisoners with a contagious disease or one that is violent or presents a problem that makes it necessary for him to be kept from the other prisoners.

The cell doors are opened and shut from a lever system in a boxed unit outside the cells. That steel box has a

series of four different type locks.

The sinks and showers have a special timed faucet arrangement that only lets out so much water at a time, to prevent prisoners from flooding the cells. The lights are recessed in the wall behind unbreakable glass. The cots and tables are heavy steel and bolted to the floor or wall. Every precaution has been taken to insure the prisoners safety, and to protect the building itself.

The second and third floors are painted cameo gray. The walls are gray, the floor, the bars, the cots, the tables, the chairs, the ceiling. All painted gray. The color is selected for jails because it is easier to keep clean, it reflects light, and in my opinion is probably the greatest deterrent to returned criminals that the jail has.

Special feature of the new facility is the much publicized life safety equipment. Huge exhaust smoke fans are installed on every floor. The stairwell is self-sealing. No flammable material is exposed in the upper levels. The building gives a sense of solid security, both from within and without.

Total construction cost was \$225,531. The old building was 4636 sq. ft. The addition of the stairwell enlarged the building to 5272 sq. ft. at a cost of \$42 per square foot. Actual cost to Floyd County tax payers was reduced to \$37 per square foot because of the \$29,230 matching funds grant for the life safety equipment. New jail construction now costs about \$100 per square foot.

The building is centrally heated and cooled. The first floor has refrigerated air conditioning, the second and third floors are water cooled. Each floor has heating and

cooling that can be operated independently, so that unused floors may be closed off.

The County Agricultural Building will also be having Open House May 24. This building houses the County Extension Service and the Human Resources Department. That building was gutted and completely remodeled this year. The Human Resources paid all but \$10,000 of the \$80,000 renovation bill. The County owns the building.

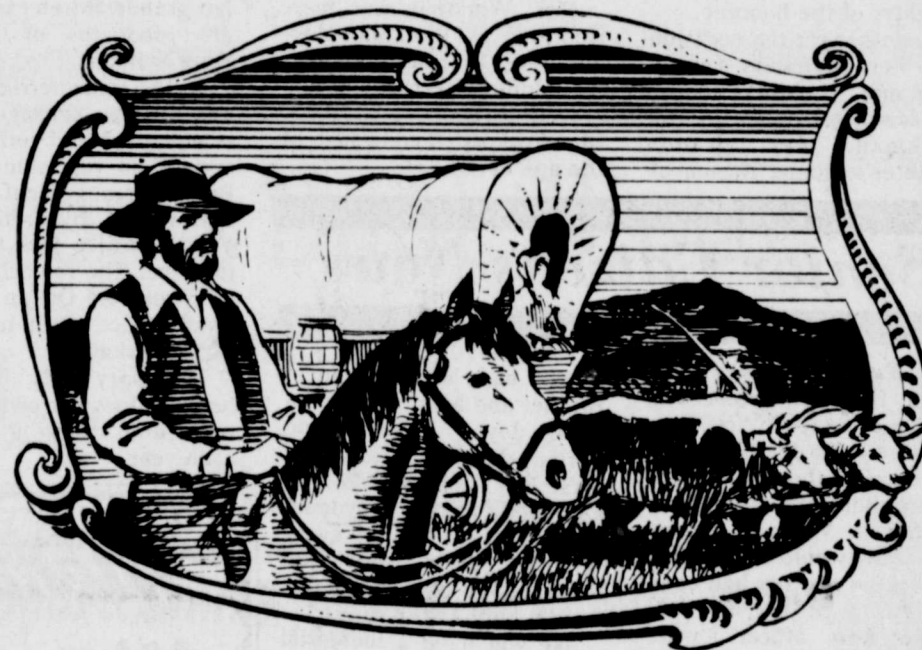

ENHANCE COMFORT
The warm-weather old standby-fan. Fans are scrambling to enhance higher cooling and reduced humidity. In homes refrigerated air, an F. thermostat seem warm or uncomfortable. Additional circulating fan to about will result same comfort as a 74 degrees F. setting. Circulation of air in the room will speed up evaporation of moisture from the skin and will result in an increased cooling sensation. Homes not cooled by refrigerated air may also benefit from the use of both circulating and ventilating fans. By placing a ventilating fan in or near a raised window, it is possible to "cool down" one or more rooms by exhausting indoor and sucking in cooler air from outside through another window or door. Ventilating is usually most effective at night or when outdoor air is cooler than air inside the home. The best type fan to buy depends on use. Several types of circulating fans are available, including the familiar oscillating fan and the old-time ceiling fan. Window-mounted fans are used for ventilation purposes. Box fans are somewhat unique in that they can be used both to ventilate and to circulate air. Next issue: Circulating fans.

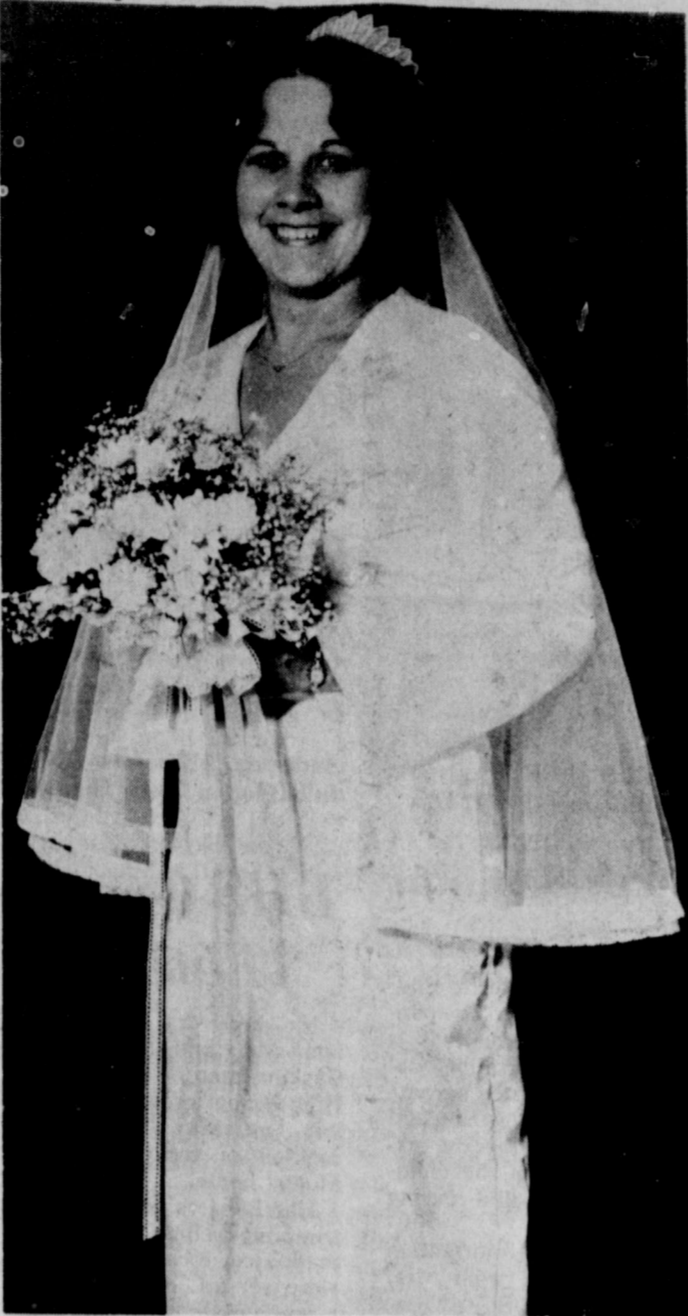

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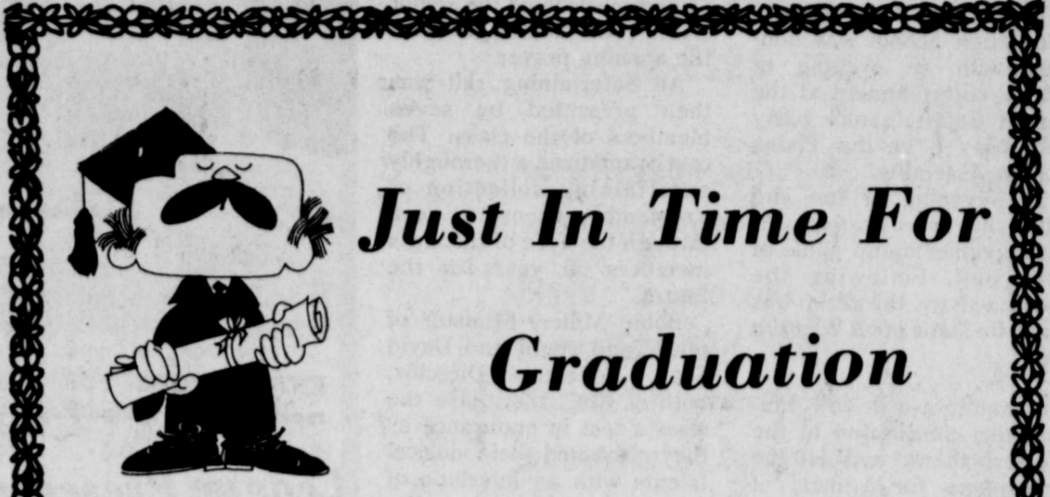

Agency Plans Tax Rule Change

State Comptroller Bob Bullock says he plans to change his agency's tax rules to allow beneficiaries to use a simpler, shorter return to report inheritance taxes.

The new rule, which is not expected to be formally adopted until mid-summer, will raise the dollar limit for taxpayers using the small estate return from \$60,000 to \$200,000.

"There will be less paperwork and, therefore, it will be easier and quicker to settle estates," Bullock said.

The two-page short form being suggested can be used instead of a longer and more complicated form that sometimes runs as much as 15 pages, he said.

The rule will have no effect on tax exemptions that beneficiaries are entitled under state law.

Bullock said that an additional 8,000 inheritance returns a year would be eligible to file the short form. The Comptroller's office processes about 40,000 inheritance tax returns annually and about half of those are already settled with the filing of a simple declaration that no tax is due.

A surviving spouse, children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, sons-in-law and daughters-in-law may inherit up to \$200,000 before state inheritance tax is due.

Taxes are due and a tax return must be filed on all estates within nine months of the date of death.

Family Poses Challenge

A four generation family "generates" excitement and confusion, as it pioneers its way through a "multi-role" world for each member.

Dr. Betty Jo Smith, a family life education specialist, says it's important to recognize the different roles each member plays in order to face the challenges they pose.

First, admit that all the different roles can become quite confusing, she advises.

Here are some examples: The youngest family member is simply "child" — but child to three different generations of "parents."

His parents, of course, are parents — but they also play the role of "child" to two other sets of "parents."

Next, understand the confusion, and face the challenges in that understanding frame of mind.

What's unusual for these families — especially for the eldest members — is that there are no role models for them to follow.

And, of course, life has changed considerably since they were children.

So they're left without a pattern to follow, along with the challenge of understanding the youngest generation's lifestyles, says Dr. Smith, on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

What about the middle-agers in this family?

Middle-aged parents, who had looked forward to extra free time of their own when their children would be independent, now find that there are elderly parents who need their care.

And these roles sometimes conflict when there are elderly parents, children or grandchildren who need attention all at the same time.

This unique situation has become commonplace only in the last few years, Dr. Smith says.

Currently half of the people in the United States over age 65 who have living children are members of four generation families.

Many of these great-grandparents never expected to live so long, nor to enjoy the delights — and the challenges — which four generations of a family can provide.

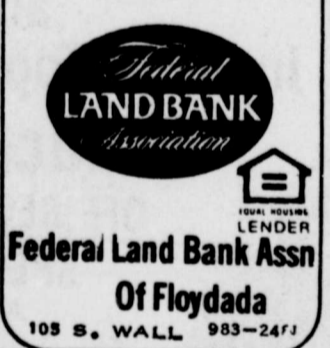
But even with role conflict, the family remains the haven for each generation, Dr. Smith stresses.

It is still within the family unit that support and care are most likely to be found — as four-generation families venture into these new areas of human relationships, she says.

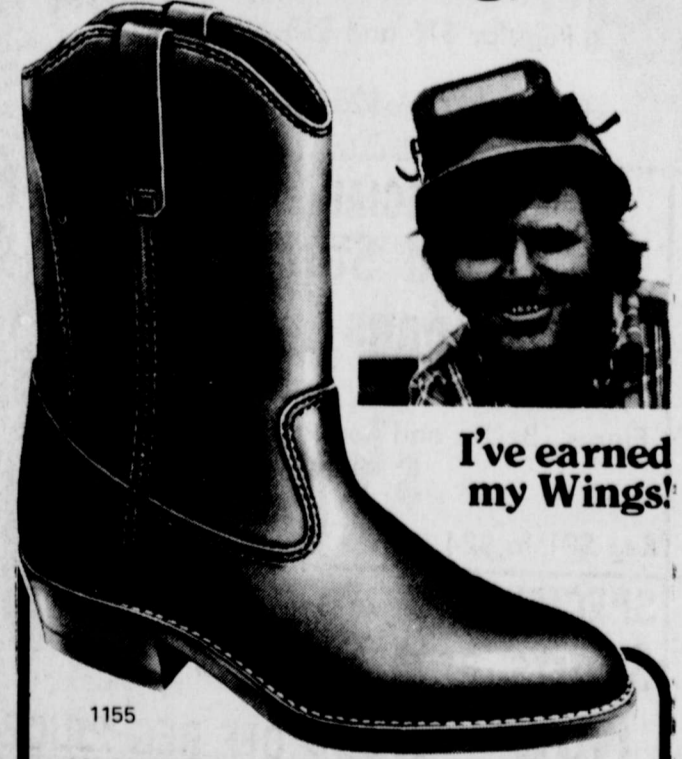

State Comptroller Bob Bullock says he plans to change his agency's tax rules to allow beneficiaries to use a simpler, shorter return to report inheritance taxes.

The new rule, which is not expected to be formally adopted until mid-summer, will raise the dollar limit for taxpayers using the small estate return from \$60,000 to \$200,000.

"There will be less paperwork and, therefore, it will be easier and quicker to settle estates," Bullock said.

The two-page short form being suggested can be used instead of a longer and more complicated form that sometimes runs as much as 15 pages, he said.

The rule will have no effect on tax exemptions that beneficiaries are entitled under state law.

Bullock said that an additional 8,000 inheritance returns a year would be eligible to file the short form. The Comptroller's office processes tax returns annually and about half of those are already settled with the filing of a simple declaration that no tax is due.

BBB Files Complaint

Several weeks ago, your Better Business Bureau released an alert to the South Plains area concerning a company called Vegas International. This company, according to the BBB, was using unethical advertising practices in selling their Las Vegas trip plan. The unethical practices centered around two points: 1) the company was phoning South Plains residents and claiming they had "won" a vacation trip (this is entirely false, since it appears that everyone that signed up or registered for a "free" trip at the South Plains Fair, received a phone call); and 2) Several consumers complained that upon receiving a phone call, they were asked for a credit card number and although not authorizing its use, Vegas International used that number to charge their (customer) credit card for the vacation plan.

As a result of the BBB inquiries and consumer complaints, the local Attorney General's office filed an Assurance of Voluntary Compliance Order in the 72nd District Court, Lubbock, TX on May 1, 1980. Vegas International thereby agrees to cease their unethical practices and also are being assessed a \$1500 fine.

A surviving spouse, children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, sons-in-law and daughters-in-law may inherit up to \$200,000 before state inheritance tax is due. Taxes are due and a tax return must be filed on all estates within nine months of the date of death.

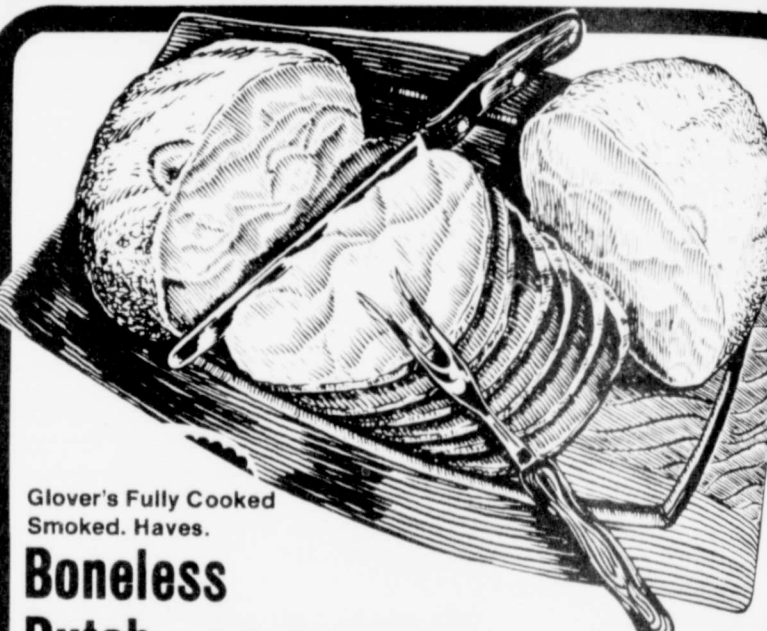

Sun Tanning Harmful To Skin, Says AMA

What does your doctor think of sun tanning? He's against it.

If you should ask your doctor whether there is any health value to sun tanning, he would have to answer "No." If you asked him whether sun tanning might hurt you, he would have to reply "Yes."

Sunning, overdone, can cause severe burn. Sunning, done modestly, can produce a golden tan that gives an illusion of health and well being. But that golden tan often leads to premature aging and wrinkling of the skin, to premature "age spots" on the hands and neck, and to skin cancer.

So, once again, the American Medical Association advises Americans everywhere against suntanning.

But, your doctor also is well aware that millions of Americans will ignore this advice this summer. They will flock to the swimming pools and beaches through the warm months to bask in the sun. They will stretch out on the grass in the back yard,

or on the roof terrace, or in the nearest park.

If you insist on getting a tan this summer despite medical advice to the contrary,



here's how to do it without burning.

On the first day of sunning, allow 15 minutes on each side. The second day 20 minutes. The third day 25 to 30 minutes. By the third day the skin should begin to brown. Thereafter proceed at the best pace for your own skin to tan without burning. At the first sign of redness, get out of the sun.

It isn't easy to confine sun time to only half an hour on

the first day at the vacation resort. But you can't stretch it very much. If you try to double the exposure time to hurry the tan, you'll burn. And then return from vacation with a peeling skin instead of a tan.

Time of exposure also should be adjusted to time of day. The sun's rays are hottest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. After 5 p.m. you aren't likely to burn much.

There are creams and lotions that screen some of the rays and reduce danger of burning. But if the cream should screen all rays, there would be no tanning. You can still burn through creams if you stay out long enough. Also, water in the pool or perspiration washes away much of the cream in a short time.

Tanning removes most of the natural oils from the surface of the skin and many sunbathers find it helpful to use a cream or oil to relieve dryness.

Enjoy the outdoor life of the summer months. Don't overdo the suntanning.

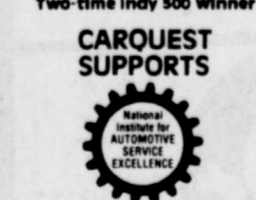

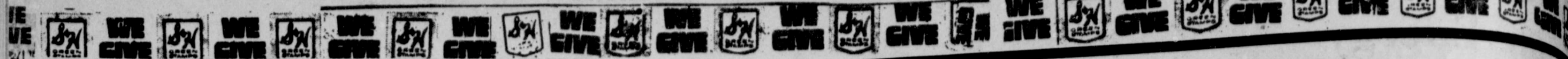

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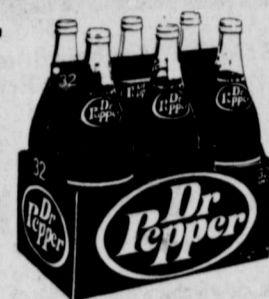

Historical Markers Preserve Heritage

More than 7,200 Texas Historical Markers dot the state's diverse terrain, forming a living and permanent narrative of the people, places, and events that comprise Texas heritage and tell Texas' story. From the age of the Indian hunter, through colonial and frontier settlement, into the eras of cattle barons and oil booms, these historical markers stimulate our imaginations to recreate and appreciate in the present those formative happenings of the past.

Since the early 1800s commemorative stones and plaques have been preserving incidents of Texas' past. Private individuals and organizations such as the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Daughters of the American Revolution, United Daughters of the Confederacy, and Daughters of the American Colonists have marked many historic sites. The state and its taxpayers have carried on strong public marking programs as well, beginning with the Eighth Texas Legislature in 1860.

From these beginnings evolved the current marker program, administered by the Texas Historical Commission, the official state agency for historic preservation. The THC is responsible for awarding Official Texas Historical Markers and designating Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks.

The familiar black and silver cast iron Texas Historical Medallion and interpretive plate add a touch of dignity and pride to buildings, landmarks, and historic sites, and identify and preserve the significant contributions of individuals, families, and groups who have helped shape modern Texas. Virtually all aspects of the state's past are eligible for

nomination for a marker. The official application and research procedures assure the final marker inscription will be an accurate reflection of the events commemorated.

Under the current program the financing and research for a marker is provided at the county level, usually by members of the county historical commission, the official arm of the state agency. Applications are then approved by a state marker committee composed of members of the Texas Historical Commission. A marker on Medallion cannot be placed on historic properties without the consent of the owner. The current marking program has been in existence since 1962, and is carried out with the aid of the Texas Historical Foundation, a nonprofit organization actively supporting heritage preservation activities.

The traveler in Texas will find six different types of historical markers. The familiar Medallion and Interpretive plate indicates structures which have received Recorded Texas Historic Landmark status. Number-

state law. Changes in the property may be made, but plans for alteration must be reviewed by the Texas Historical Commission in order to preserve the historical or architectural quality for which the Medallion was awarded.

Texas historical subject markers are metal plates of various sizes relating a brief

ing more than 1,600, the official landmarks are deemed worthy of preservation because of their historical, cultural, and/or architectural value. Texas Landmarks are afforded a measure of protection from demolition or alteration under history of a site, event, or famous person or institution, among other topics significant in Texas history and culture.

Granite historical markers most commonly record events related to the Texas War for Independence and the Civil War, though some touch on other eras of Texas history.

Granite markers with brass plates were erected primarily during the 1936 Texas Centennial. Many of

these markers give a brief history of the county in which they are located, telling the origin of the county name and the first elected officials.

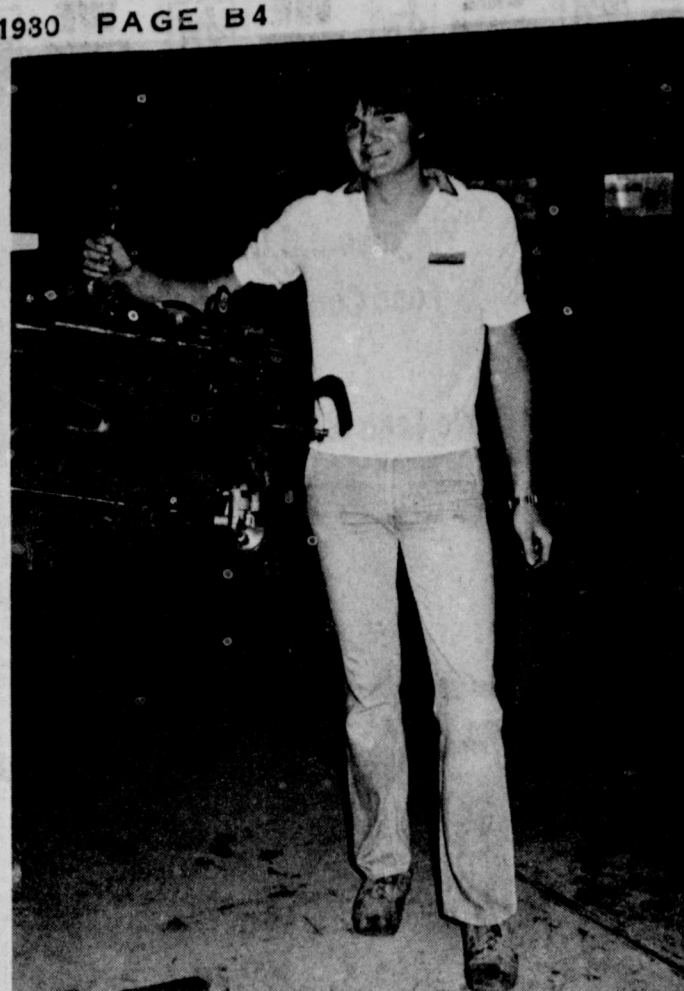
Historical grave markers are smaller Medallions and interpretive plates at graves of individuals who made lasting contributions to Texas history, locally or statewide.

Granite markers are also found every five miles along the route of the former El Camino Real. These markers were placed between 1916 and 1919 by the state with the help of the Daughters of the American Revolution to commemorate the first long highway on the American continent. State Highway 21 often coincides or parallels this historic route.

Historical markers are placed as near as possible to the historic site or event they honor. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has cooperated extensively in the placement of markers along highways and has designed other roadway signs indicating location of markers.

If you are interested in commemorating a person, event, or historic site with a Texas Historical Marker, contact your county historical commission chairman. Every marker application submitted to the Texas Historical Commission must bear the signature of the county chairman or designated marker committee chairman. The county chairman can help you understand the procedures in applying for a marker and often can assist in gathering research, photographs and other materials.
