Between revivals he supplied here the 1st and 4th Sundays in November and returned to Dimmitt Saturday to supply here in December. He was accompanied by Mrs. Smith the last week in November and she will be here again on Sunday, December 19, when the Evangelist will preach his annual Christmas sermon at the morning service and the Bible School Christmas Program will replace the evening worship. Mrs. Smith, who taught one of the fifth grades in Dimmitt when they resided here is in her third year as a Language Arts teacher in Bridge City Junior High School. The Smith's will spend a few days at Knox City with her parents, the L. W. Grahams, before they go to Cushing, Oklahoma, for Christmas with their daughter and family, the Samuel R. Kobles. Mr. and Mrs. B. David Smith of Hays, Kansas, will be present also. David, the Smith's son, is working on his M.S. degree and is an assistant teacher at Kansas State College while his wife is a senior in Kansas State.

Evangelist Smith will return again to Dimmitt to preach the Sunday after Christmas at First Christian Church.

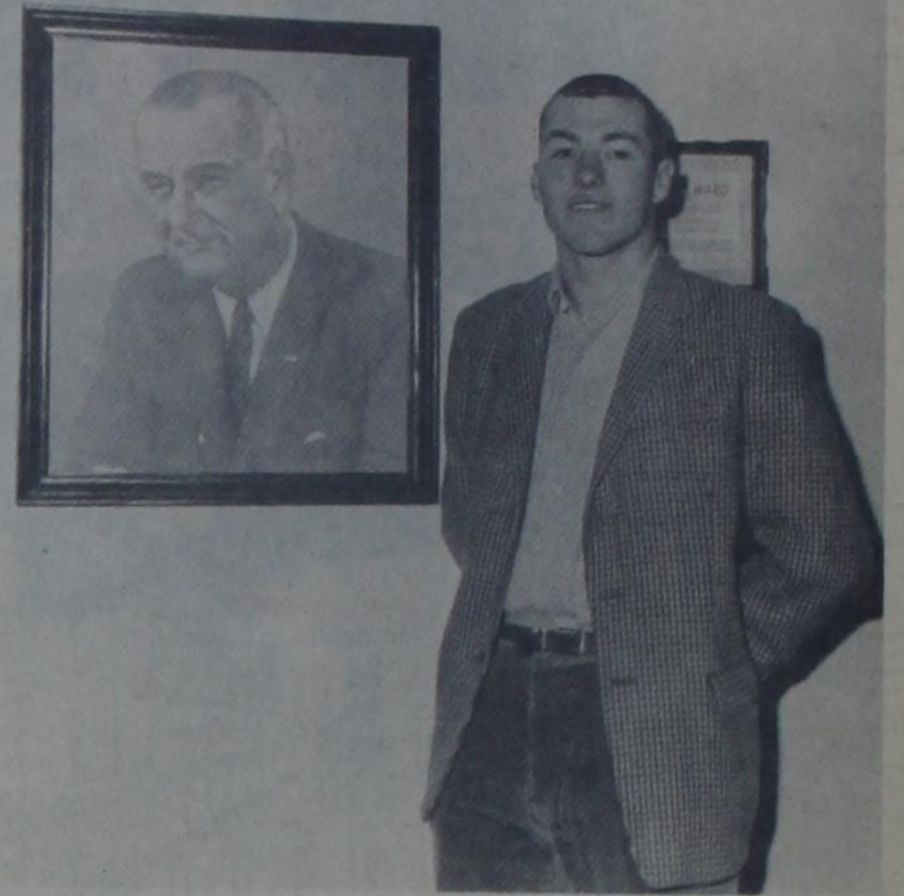
Freshman Bobbies Down Muleshoe Mulettes Monday

County Ginning Passes 25,000 Mark Wednesday

A complete ginning report from all of the county's fifteen gins Wednesday morning revealed that 25,287 bales had been ginned to date. The county is less than two weeks into the ginning season and a rough estimate is that approximately one-third of the cotton from the 1965 crop has already been ginned.

Ginners report that the grade average is running strict low middling, the mike test is not as good as might be desired and that the staple is averaging about fifteen-sixteenths of an inch. The average loan price is about 25 cents per pound and most of the crop so far is going into the government loan.

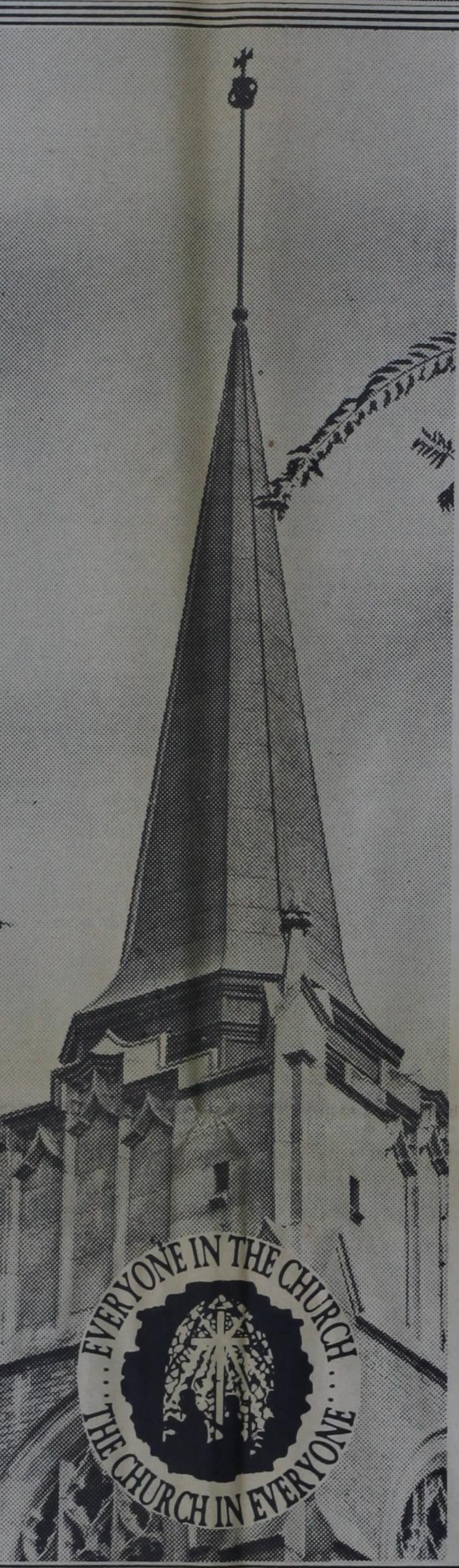

lect a simple one with as few seams as possible. Do not choose patterns requiring cutting on the bias, such as circular skirts.

In preparing your knitted fabric for sewing, first establish your guideline — or grain line — double knits parallel with the basted rib and then lay out your pattern, using pins placed closely together.

On all knit fabrics, you should stay-stitch the edges you do not want to become distorted, such as necklines and shoulder seams. Use a fine sewing machine needle, synthetic or cotton thread, and sew from 12 to 16 stitches per inch. Single knits require a medium tension. A looser tension — a size 11 or 14 needle and a straight or small zig-zag stitch for double knits — is recommended.

It's best to sew seam tape or ribbon into the shoulder seams and waistline of all knits. When hemming knit fabric, use bias seam binding on single knits bottom, and then catch-stitch the raw edge invisibly to the garment.

mind and then tightly wrapped and frozen.

Dark meat needs the flavor of vegetables and spices to enhance it, so it is best for stew, hash or pie.

Most chefs prefer to make these dishes as soon as possible and then freeze them for future use.

Use your favorite recipe for turkey stew, hash or pie. Cool the dish quickly. This helps keep the natural flavor, color and texture of the food. Also, it retards or prevents the growth of bacteria that could cause spoilage.

To cool, set the uncovered dish of food on ice or in very cold water. As soon as the food is cool, pack promptly into moisture, vapor-proof freezer containers. Freeze immediately and keep at zero degrees F or below.

How easy it is to add variety to your meals with these "planned-over" turkey dishes to say nothing of the time they save on a busy day.

If you like cranberries, you'll be glad to know that the supply is six percent above average this season.

Cranberries vary in size and color according to the variety. A pink color usually indicates immaturity and poor flavor. Select

cranberries that have a fresh plump appearance combined with high luster and firmness. Poor quality is indicated by shriveling, dull appearance and softness.

Cranberries are usually served to add color, flavor and variety to the menu. They do contribute, however, small amounts of vitamins A, B, and C. Like any perishable fruit, cranberries need refrigeration to retain their flavor and freshness.

They can be stored satisfactorily for several days in the cellophane container in which they are purchased. If frozen, they will keep several months in the same container. Cranberries can be frozen without sugar or syrup.

Knits have become an important part of every girl's wardrobe — since they are both smart and comfortable. While knits are very much in the news, they do require special knowledge on the part of the buyer.

1966 VOLUNTARY FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

The Feed Grain Program will be essentially unchanged in form next year, but payment rates will be adjusted to encourage broader participation by farmers, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced November 18.

full use of the program, and to keep production in balance with consumption, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said. He noted that feed grain stocks have been reduced by more than a third since 1960, and emphasized that the program announced today will enable the nation to continue moving toward an adequate reserve supply while protecting farm income levels and reducing program costs.

Changes in the program are either those required by law or which reflect legislative history established this year when the new program was enacted, the Secretary said.

The 1966 Feed Grain Program follows the pattern of programs in recent years. Farmers will be asked to divert a minimum 20 percent of the feed grain base acreage to conserving uses. Those who participate will receive income-maintaining payments, and they will be eligible for price-support loans.

These changes in the payment provisions are being made: Yields for determining payments will be projected at higher levels to reflect current trends rather than historic yields as has been the practice.

No diversion payment will be made for minimum diversions, except for small acreages, but payments for additional diversion will be higher than in 1965.

Price support payments will be higher than in 1965, but will be limited to 50 percent of a farmer's base acreage.

The loan rate will be lowered but total support at maximum participation will be higher. The Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 provided for calculating yield trends on a current basis as a means of encouraging more farmers to participate in the program. This change will increase grain yields used to calculate payments up to a fourth. For corn, the national average projected yield will be 72 bushels per acre. This compares with a 58-bushel average yield used in determining payments for 1965.

The corn and grain sorghum loan rates are being lowered to further encourage the growing export market for U. S. feed grains. In fiscal 1965, for example, feed grain exports reached almost \$1 billion and this level is expected to be exceeded in the current fiscal year. The grain sorghum loan rate is being lowered proportionately more than corn to bring the loan value more in line with market prices of recent years.

Diversion payment rates are set to encourage maximum diversion. On all acreage diverted beyond the minimum 20 percent of his base acreage, up to a maximum of 50 percent, a producer will receive diversion payments. This will be equal to one-half of the total county price-support rate multiplied by the farm's projected yield.

Nationally, the per acre rate averages \$46.80 for corn. In 1965, a producer received payments

on all acres diverted to conserving uses, but at rates varying from 20 to 50 percent of the lower 1965 support and on smaller yields. The 50 percent payment rate for 1965 averaged \$36.25 per acre nationally.

Special small farm benefits are included in the program. A producer with a feed grain base of 25 acres or less may divert all of his acreage and receive diversion payments on all his acreage. Farmers who grow corn, grain sorghum and barley can qualify for the program by making their 20 percent diversion on any of the three acreages.

Farmers also will be able to substitute wheat and feed grain acreage and may produce wheat on oat-rye bases.

The USDA also announced that the national average support loan for 1966-crop oats will be 60 cents per bushel and for rye at \$1.02 per bushel, both unchanged from 1965 support prices. As in the past, these grains are not included in the feed grain program and all production is eligible for loan.

Secretary Freeman noted that in response to a number of suggestions from producers, the following changes are being put into effect to increase the flexibility of the program:

1. When natural disaster prevents planting, price-support payments will be made to participants who comply with program provisions, provided no income-producing crop is grown on such acreages in the same crop year.

2. For purposes of price-support plants at least 45 percent of his feed grain base acreage for payment will be considered as having planted his entire acreage eligible for payment.

3. On that portion of the feed grain base between the minimum 20 percent diversion and the maximum 50 percent diversion, a farmer may divert all of it for payment, plant it to feed grains and obtain price support loans, or plant it to other crops without reduction in price support payments.

As in prior program years, eligibility for payments and price support is conditional upon maintenance of normal acreage (1959-60) in soil conserving crops or practices such as summerfallow and idle land. Conserving crops or uses will be required on the

additional acres diverted for payment as well as on the minimum diversion.

For 1966, flaxseed will not be eligible as an alternative crop on diverted acres, and the malting barley exemption will not be included.

Under the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965, specified alternate crops may be grown on acreage diverted from production of feed grains provided such crops are needed to assure an adequate supply. While flaxseed is specified as an alternate crop, it will not be included in the 1966 program because stocks are substantially in excess of utilization. Decision on other alternate crops which may be planted on diverted acres will be announced as soon as the 1965 supply and utilization statistics become available.

Present intentions on the basis of current estimates of soybean supplies are to not provide feed grain price-support payments on soybeans grown on feed grain acreage as permitted by law. However, a final decision will be announced later.

As in the 1965 program, a producer who signs up for both the 1966 wheat and feed grain program also announced that the USDA also announced that the program can substitute acreage. Diversion payment in this situation

will be based on the actual crop acreage reduced. If feed grain acreage is exceeded, for instance, all land diversion eligible for payment will be from acres paid for at the applicable wheat rate. Price support loans and purchases, but not price-support payments, will be available on feed grains produced on wheat acreage.

USDA also announced that the rate for acreage diversions of wheat is being set at 40 percent of the county price-support loan rate which averages nationally \$1.25 per bushel. This will apply to additional wheat diversions and not to the diversion of 15 percent of the wheat allotment required for participation. Individual producer payment rates will be the county rate times the farm's projected yield times the additional acreage diverted other details of the 1966 voluntary wheat program were announced October 25. As previously announced for the 1966 wheat program, producers of wheat can request establishment

of an oats-rye base in order to plant wheat on such base. If this is established, plantings of other feed grains cannot exceed the feed grain program permitted acreage.

New feed grain farms can be brought into the 1966 program and receive price support loans and price-support payments provided

they meet the normal conserving requirement. However, they will not receive any acreage diversion payments.

Producers will sign up to participate in the 1966 feed grain program during a period to be announced. Up to one-half the diversion payment will be made at signup time.

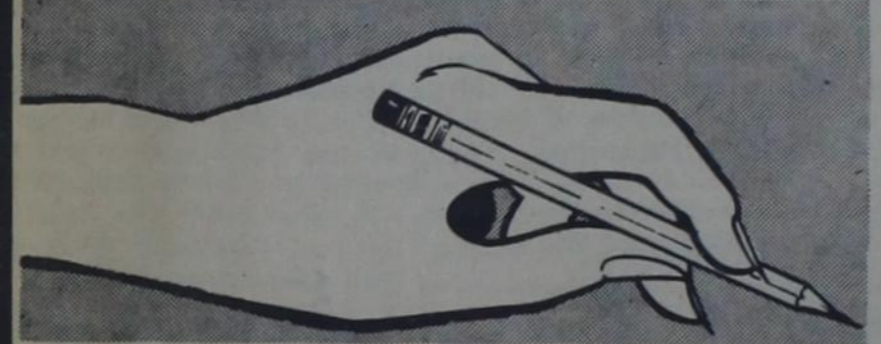

CANDIED FRUIT CAKE

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 lb. candied pineapple, coarsely cut
- 1 pound (2 cups) whole candied cherries
- 1 1/4 pounds pitted dates, coarsely cut
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 pounds (8 cups) pecan halves

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt into large bowl. Add pineapple, cherries and dates; mix well with hands to coat each piece of fruit with flour. Beat eggs until frothy, gradually beat in sugar. Add to fruit and mix well. With hands mix in pecans. Grease and line with brown paper two 9 inch clampless spring-form pans with hole in center. Add mixture and press down firmly with fingers. Bake in slow oven, 275 F. about 1 1/4 hours. Let cakes stand in pans about 5 minutes. Remove and pull off brown paper. When cold wrap well, keep in cool place or freeze. Can be made several months ahead.

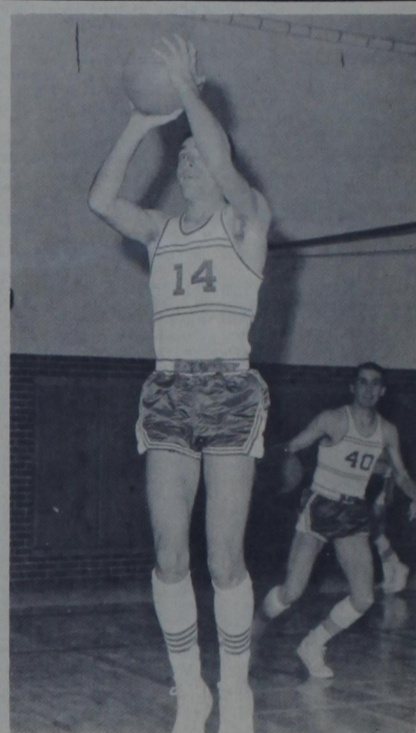

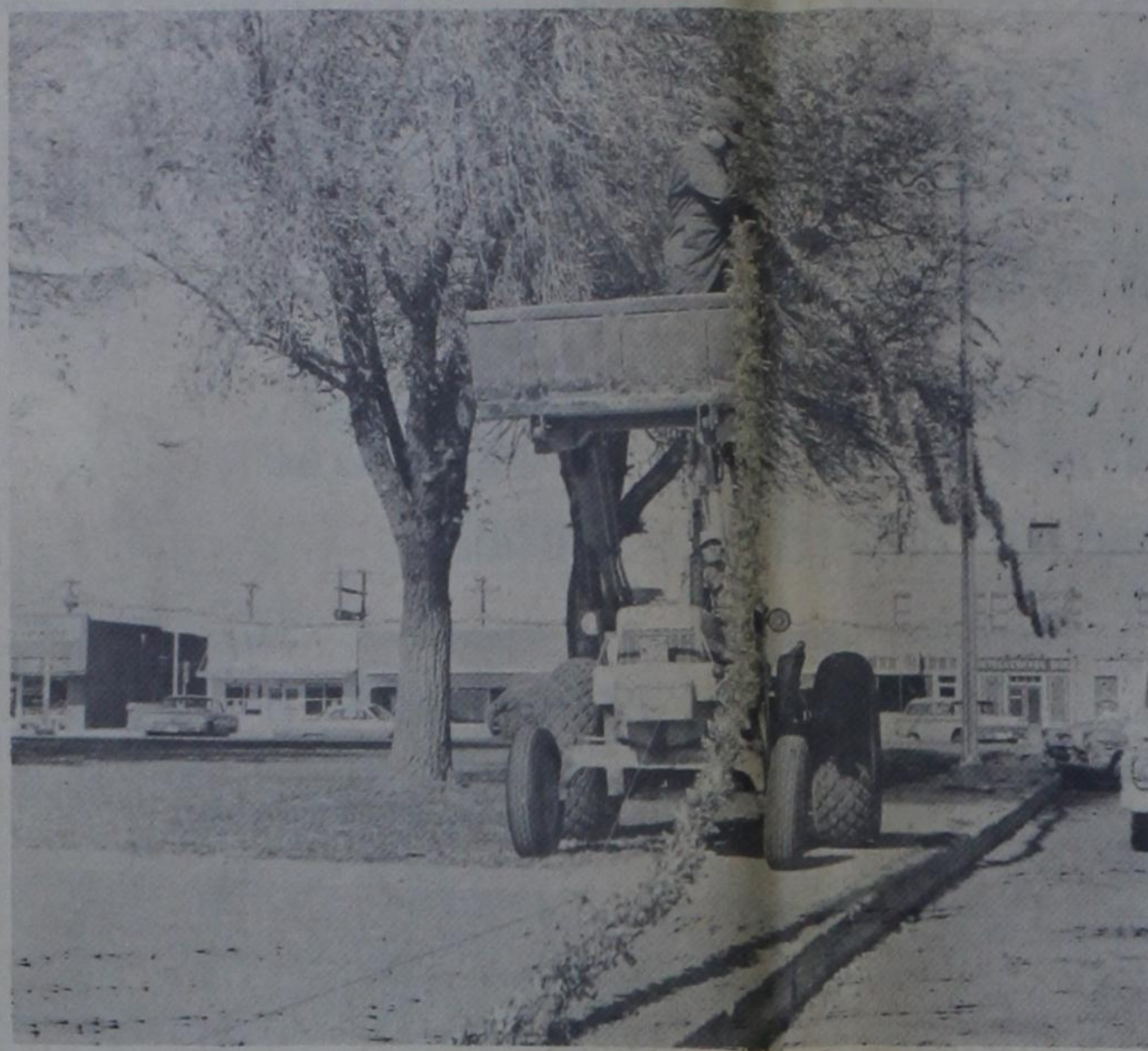

SPORTS AFIELD

Cold-weather boating can be a real pleasure, if you plan for it properly. Your outboard will prove a joy and delight in frigid temperatures. There should be no noticeable difference in starting or operating characteristics. Oil-gas mixtures remain the same. The battery on an electric model must be treated the same as your auto battery. Charged, it won't freeze; run down, it will.

About the only concession you have to make to the threat of freezing is to be sure water isn't trapped inside the motor. Lower units drain when tipped out of water. You may have to turn the engine over several times out of the water to drain the powerhead.

Inboards and inboard-outboards also must be drained to forestall freezing damage. (Unless they are fresh-water-cooled—in which case add antifreeze and drain only exposed portions of the heat exchanger.) Since these motors must be drained for winter storage anyway, your operating manual will tell you how to do this.

Ice inside and outside the boat is the second problem.

Water allowed to stand inside a boat that is itself out of water can expand when frozen and burst the boat's sides. Several inches of water, however, are needed to do this, and a lot of time or a lot of cold. If your boat has curving sides it probably won't happen anyway, as the ice will be forced upward. If it hasn't, "rock salt in the bilge will soften the ice and rob it of its power," recommends Zack Taylor, Boats Editor of Sports Afield Magazine.

Running a boat in ice also presents problems, but none that cannot be overcome. If you have a wood boat, running in skim ice can cause serious damage, as the film of ice cuts like a knife and can eventually slice right through the planking. Wood boats must therefore be sheathed along the waterline with fiber glass (the epoxy kind goes on right over sound paint), galvanized-iron sheets, aluminum sheets or wood-plank guards that can be replaced when chewed up. Aluminum boats may be scratched but not harmed. Fiber glass and steel will remain impervious to ice, although paint on them may be scratched.

* These velocities occurred during Hurricane Carla. Theoretically, much higher velocities are possible within the vortex of a tornado, but no measurement with an anemometer has ever been made. The U.S. Weather Bureau's experimental Dopplar radar equipment, a device which permits direct measurement of the high speeds in a spinning tornado funnel, received its first big test in the Wichita Falls, Texas tornado or April 2, 1958. This was the first tornado tracked by the Dopplar radar; and for the first time in history, rotating winds up to 280 mph were clocked.
