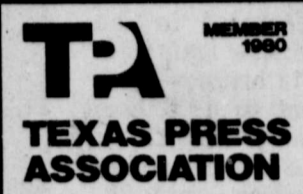

## Extension Service Change Explained To Commissioners

Dr. Crawford, Extension Service District Supervisor, met with the Commissioners Court to explain the change in the dual line of responsibility that has been shared by the two district supervisors for this area.

Two years ago the Extension Service did an original study to determine a more effective way to use personnel. As a result of that study the District Agents will be moving into a new area of responsibility. Instead of the two supervisors covering the entire area, each was given an individual area to cover.

Mrs. Crawford will be working in the 10 northern

counties of the District which includes Floyd County.

"When all three of the County Agents are responsible to one person, it will strengthen the program," she said. It will go into effect July 1.

As far as programming, Mrs. Crawford said that Bill Gunner, District Supervisor, will continue setting up the Agricultural activities and that she would still be doing the Home Economics work.

Under the new structure, they will be able to back up the Agents with more support. It will mean less travel and less paperwork.

She said that it would be a big adjustment and change but that in the long run "we feel it will strengthen the county programs."

She commended the Commissioners on the remodeled Ag Building, saying she knew it took long hours of negotiating and work to get the building completed. "It is a facility you can be proud of, and the Agents will try to keep it that way," she said.

She suggested modest changes in the coming county budget mostly in salary increases, to be considered by the Commissioners in January. It came to about a 9% over all increase. She told the court that their aim is to give "the most effective program for the dollars you are spending."

Commissioners Court met June 9, in their regular session. All four Commissioners; Jack Lackey, Bob Jarrett, Aaron Carthel and Grigsby (Doodle) Milton, were present. County Judge Choise Smith officiated.

Mr. James Winnat, District Supervisor of the Predator Control Program, met with the court and asked for a \$50 per month increase for the Trapper Fund. The increase will be considered by the Commissioners.

Motion was made by Bob Jarrett and seconded by Aaron Carthel that the Floyd County Canneries be officially opened July 1. Mrs. T.L. Hulsey will be hired as director of the Lockney Cannery and Mrs. Cora Hartline will be director of the Floydada Cannery.

Although not on the agenda, the subject of the Child Welfare Board was discussed for the benefit of Commissioner Milton who was absent from the last monthly meeting.

Commissioner Carthel stated that he had been looking into the matter, talking with various people and from the information that he has gathered it looked like the forming of the Board would save the county money.

Judge Choise Smith said that he looked on it as an insurance policy for the county.

The matter of forming the Board will be on the next regular court agenda, and will be brought to a vote.

## School Board Pleased With Basic Skills Test Results

Results of the first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills Tests taken by the Lockney fifth and ninth grade students last spring were presented to the Lockney School Board at their May meeting. Sheree Cannon, District Test Coordinator, presented the results of these tests to the board which included summary reports and detailed explanation of individual student results.

Individual scores were released to the students who took the tests and to school personnel who were directly involved earlier in May. Students were tested in the areas of reading, mathematics and writing. Some 500,000 Texas fifth and ninth grade students participated in this first statewide assessment now required under Senate Bill 350 passed by the Legislature during its 1979 session.

The board was pleased with the overall results of the test scores and released the following aggregate scores for grades 5 and 9.

In Grade 9 the TABS indicated that 82 per cent of the students mastered the basic skills objectives in mathematics, and 72 per cent mastered minimum competencies in reading. Results of the writing tests measured three areas, and results were similar to those of math and reading as 84 per cent of the students tested mastered technical writing procedures such as spelling, punctuation, and sentence structure while 70 per cent exhibited acceptable handwriting skills and 27 per cent had "hard to read" handwriting skills. The only area showing a strong need for improvement in the written performance area was organization of ideas, appropriate response and purpose.

Of the ninth grade students who did not master a particular skill area, they will be given an opportunity to retake the test in the spring of 1981. These tests will not be used as means of retention or promotion but only as an instructional guide to improve basic skills.

Grade 5 test results were slightly above the national average in comparison with norm referenced tests. On the math objectives, 68 per cent of

grade 5 students mastered the basic competencies and 64 per cent mastered the basic reading skills. Writing skills were well above average as 89 per cent had acceptable handwriting skills and 80 per cent mastered English usage and structure.

Plans are already under way to use the results of these tests. Specific plans include the addition of another level of high school math, careful placement of students at their appropriate instructional level and the addition of a developmental reading course for stu-

dents not mastering minimum reading competencies on the secondary level. Strong emphasis will be placed on reading for comprehension at all grade levels. Other plans will be discussed during the 1980-81 school year to aid students in these basic skill areas.

"Our purpose is to develop more effective ways to serve the children of our district," Superintendent Hallmark explained. "We believe the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills results have given us specific data we need to better meet student needs."

### D-Day

#### Memorial

(Editor's Note: Ben Galloway, Floydada, clipped this article from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Mr. Galloway served in the fourth infantry during World War II.)

An American delegation led by U.S. Embassy counselor Francis de Tarr attended low-key wreath-laying ceremonies Friday commemorating the 36th anniversary of the Allied landings in Normandy during World War II.

Ceremonies focused on Omaha Beach and St. Mere Eglise in the American theater of operations of the 1944 D-Day invasion.

Wreaths were laid at St. Laurent-sur-Mer, an American cemetery situated on a cliff overlooking Omaha Beach and the English channel containing the graves of 9,386 Americans.

A wreath also was placed at St. Mere Eglise where 23,000 paratroopers of the American 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions jumped into Normandy to kick off the invasion.

Omaha Beach, four miles long and about 200 yards wide, backed by 100-foot bluffs most of the way, was the bloodiest of the five invasion beaches.

Total American, British and Canadian casualties were about 10,000 in the first 24 hours of the invasion, including 1,456 Americans killed, 3,184 wounded, 1,928 missing and 26 captured. The British suffered 2,500 to 3,000 total casualties and the Canadians 946 in their sector on Gold, Juno and Sword beaches.

Across the English Channel, meanwhile, the British noted the 36th anniversary of the landings by unveiling a 10-foot bronze statue of "Monty," Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery of Alamein, one of Britain's

most inspirational military leaders, in London.

Queen Mother Elizabeth unveiled the statue in Whitehall, a broad thoroughfare of government office buildings leading from Trafalgar Square.

Montgomery helped U.S. General Dwight D. Eisenhower lead Allied forces into France in the D-Day landings on Normandy.

Monty's most famous victory was at El Alamein, Egypt, in 1942. He died in 1976.

The Queen Mother, whose daughter is Queen Elizabeth II, called Monty "a legend in his own lifetime."

The \$70,000 statue by sculptor Oscar Nemon was paid for by donations from more than 7,000 people around the world, led by Monty's friends, comrades and widows of

men who served with him. Donors' names will be recorded in a book at London's Imperial War Museum.

Monty once posed for sculptor Nemon, but more recently his brother, Col. Brian Montgomery, modeled for the statue because of a remarkable family resemblance.

Asked if Monty would have liked the result, he said in an interview: "He would be absolutely delighted by it and would have loved to talk about it."

"He was a remarkable leader. I heard only recently how he would often drive his jeep out to where a soldier would be digging a trench."

"He would stop and talk to him, give him cigarettes and leave him saying, 'Right, I'll send a telegram to your wife telling her I've met you.' That's leadership."

### Democratic Primary Run-Off

On Saturday, June 7, 119 dedicated Democrats voted in the Party run-off of three positions. The race held little local interest and the voter count came as no surprise to primary followers.

The election costs were approximately \$500. It, therefore, cost the Democratic Party about \$5.00 a vote to find out the Floyd County preference.

John C. Phillips edged James P. (Jim) Wallace by a narrow 61 to 58 votes for the Associate Justice Supreme Court Place 1 run-off.

The Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 2 race was more decisive with Mike McCormick

polling 78 votes to W.T. Phillips' 38.

Tom Davis pulled more votes than any other on the ballot. He had 88 votes for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 3 while his opponent, Edith Roberts, only pulled in 30 votes.

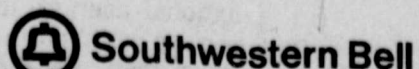

April 3 and 4, greatest tornado in the nation's

history occurred. In a 16-hour period, no fewer than 148 twisters gouged through 13 states east of the Mississippi River, covering 2,000 miles and killing about 300 people. The damage amounted to more than a half-billion dollars.

The worst tornado of last year struck the north Texas town of Wichita Falls on April 10, 1979—a day local citizens now call "Terrible Tuesday." For 20 minutes in the late afternoon the city of 100,000 people was struck by a violent tornado whose winds rotated at more than 200 miles per hour, killing 45 people and destroying about \$400 million worth of property. Wichita Falls is on the southern tip of tornado alley.

Meteorologists predict that in the heart of tornado alley, chances are that a specific location might be struck by a twister about once every 250 years. "But tornado patterns do not fit mathematical models," explains National Wildlife. Oklahoma City has been hit by twisters 32 times since 1892. And the community of Codell, Kansas, amazingly, was hit three years in a row—1916, 1917, and 1918—on the same day, May 20.

Researchers may never be able to prevent tornadoes, although Fujita has been able to break up scaled-down twisters in his laboratory. Fortunately, advances have been made in tornado detection. In Norman, Oklahoma, a 30-foot dome houses a radar system operated by the National Severe Storms Laboratory. A year ago, the system picked up almost every twister in the area, and enabled weathermen to locate some tornadoes a half an hour before they hit.

The tornado report is National Wildlife's fourth in a series on violent natural phenomena. The others covered tidal waves, earthquakes, lightning, and volcanoes.

If a tornado approaches your area, National Wildlife offers this advice: "Go to the basement or innermost room of the house or building, away from windows. Cover yourself with pillows and mattresses. If you are in a car, get out quickly and lie in a ditch, culvert or other low spot. In the Wichita Falls storm, 25 of the 45 people killed were in automobiles; 16 of them had gotten into their cars, hoping to escape."
