## Former Foreign Exchange Student Returns For A Visit

Editor's note: [Zanello] Poncelin d'Echevannes of Paris, France and her husband, Philippe, were in Lockney this week for a visit in the home of J.D. and Arla Copeland. Ann was a foreign exchange student and attended Lockney High School in the 1965-66 school year. Her last visit to Lockney was in

Ann and Philippe arrived in New York City June 16 on a flight from Paris. Ann has a friend that they stayed with for four days. They then flew to Amarillo where the daughter, Copeland's Celia met them and they returned with her to her home in Lubbock. They came to Lockney this past Saturday.

After attending Lockney High School, Ann returned to France and completed her high school studies and then attended Toulouse University in the south of France. She received her B.A. in English. It was there that she met Philippe who was a sergeant in the French Army Air Force. He returned to Paris and entered the printing industry. They were married in 1971 and they both work

in Paris. Philippe is an instructor in the copying machine business where he trains salesmen to run the machines and Ann is a payroll secretary for a low

income housing project. They live 10 miles east of Paris in a suburb of Chelles near the Marne River, a branch of the Seine. They commute back and forth by train, subway or bus.

Philippe, who speaks little English, is on his first visit here. With Ann acting as his interpretor, he expressed his feelings for Texas, "The life here is very different. I feel that the people know each other more and have more social life. I love the houses and the space. There is room for gardens. Everything is not

Ann explained that they did not know many people around them. Although they have many friends in Paris, the friends may live 50 miles from them. Philippe continued. We visited a farm this morning. Everything is spread out and there is such a diversity of crops. I also enjoyed seeing the feedlot. Here everything organized, everyone does his job.' Ann added that France is four-fifths the size of Texas and the farms are small.

"The lifestyle here is different. This is a total change. If we go to Italy, things are different but many things are the same. Here, everything is dif-ferent. I enjoy the hospi-tality of Texas people. They do not try to impress us, but rather to show us a good time." said Phil-

Ann and Philippe have two daughters Ann, age 8 and Stephanie, age 5. The girls remained in France with Ann's mother while they completed the school vear. After school is out at the end of June, the children and Ann's mother will travel to the south of France.

The school system there is similar to the schools in America. They attend 13 years and then a student can attend a university. The better jobs go to those with a degree.

Several years ago, a test was taken at the end the ninth grade to determine who qualified to attend the academic high school. The remainder attended a less difficult school. Now, everyone attends the same high

Unemployment is high in France. 1,500,000 are now out of work. There many immigrants from all over the world, especially from French colonies Africa and from Algeria and Vietnam. They come from Poland, Spain, Turkey, Lebanon, Yugoslavia, and even as far away as Chile. This has contributed to the

high unemployment. 'People know France is free and they go there seeking freedom. Sometimes they are disappointed because they are ex-ploited. They are forced to work in sweat shops for very low wages. Our television recently broadcasted some information con-

cerning the exploitation of these people and the conditions under which they live," Ann said. "Many were sold false papers and have lived hidden out in France for six or eight years. They work in their homes for little pay. There is an investigation going on now to try to stop this exploitation. Many of the Vietnam "boat people" have come to France. Usually the more affluent are the one who escaped the communist government. They are the doctors, dentists and lawyers. But in France, they are

## Ronee Thornton's Interest In Horses Has Paid Off For Her

By Felicia Applewhite If it is success stories

that are all about horses that you are after, you'll find them at the Thorntons-Ronee Thornton in the spotlight. Ronee's accomplishment have been the subject of newspaper and magazine articles from the time she first began dealing with horses at the age of 10. In reality it's been a

mother-daughter interest in horses all the way. Mother, Pat, at age of 10 or thereafter was riding horses, but not for the same reason as Ronee. Pat rode Shetlands and broke them for her father who put trained Shetlands on the market. The experience of having her father's Shetland stud clamp down on her leg with his powerful jaws and drag her off a pony she was breaking, helps her to remember. She had made up her mind she would probably never walk again, after that, until her father offered her a dollar for every step she would take using that leg. After she had earned 12 dollars for 12 steps, she was off walking and riding again.

The two of them, Pat and Ronee, have carried on in horse interest and have traveled untold miles together pulling a trailer, with a horse for Ronee to appear in quarter-horse and 4-H horse shows.

One thing they learned early in their venture together was that "you don't have to buy a winner to be a winner' in show horses. Ronee's first horse in the quarter horse world was Ruby's Brandy, a yearling filly purchased from a friend for \$175.00. The colt was wild and not halter broken when they bought her. By well-planned and careful training Brandy was being shown in Western Pleasure Classics and winning by the time she was three.

Another thing Pat learned was, "Even though I had loved horses all my life, I knew nothing of what was going on in the showing of horses," she remembers of their early efforts in shows.
Then she adds by way of
making sure that credit is
given where it belongs,
"Ronee has done it all by herself. She watched the people who did well, and everything they did, she

Pat and Ronee admit starting without knowing anything and in starting with a horse that didn't know anything but, "there is pride that goes with finishing a horse and making a champion."

Her first rewards were an American Quarter Horse Association Youth Championship, a Superior in Western Pleasure and Showmanship and forty-nine Halter points.

Her ambitions then aimed higher and this demanded a new horse. She now was interested in a horse that could "move good enough to win a Pleasure Class yet get down and turn around in running and in barrels." Even though an acceptable horse was found, Ronee finished the year

out on Brandy.

The new horse, Bix
Patrol, had only 16 points
when the Thorntons purchased her in 1975. After

finishing the year on Brandy, Ronee started in January 1976 on Bix. By the end of the year the rider had put 121 youth points on the mare which qualified in American Junior Quarter Horse Association finals in Tulsa, and also the Hi-Point Year-End Award in the Panhandle Quarter Horse Exhibitors Association. Youth Trail honor from All-American Quarter Horse Congress was

earned by Ronee and Bix. A new demand was placed on the Thorntons - Ronee was moving into a 14-18 age group that would perhaps need a tougher horse.

The search for a horse ended after the purchase of Afton Socks, a green 3 year old that stood almost 16 hands and was on his way to weighing 1500 pounds. That same year Ronee

and Afton won the Circuit Championship in Junior Trail at the Hall of Fame Benefit in Amarillo. Youth points were a side benefit to the award. The awards and honors

that came to Ronee only inspired her to further conquests. She especially, was fascinated with the idea of English horsemanship, so Afton was trained by LaRae Lovell beginning December 11. Ronee went by air on the 26th of December, had two days of English riding and left for Sweetwater to show, and won the first hunt Seat Class.

Two years ago, when the stock show was in progress Afton Socks and rider were on hand for quarter-horse show. Someone sneaked into Afton's stall when no one was looking and cut Afton's tail and mane. Of course, the possibility of showing 16.1 hand high 1500 pound horse with no tail was out of the question. Artificial tails were against the rules in quarter-horse association.

However, when the board of directors heard of the missing tail, they called a meeting and approved Afton's entry with a false tail. That entire year Afton showed with a false tail. No one knew who cut the tail off.

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


## Lockney Students Among 1980 WTSU Graduates







Avoid pearlized products such as lipstick, cheek color and highlighters. These tend to emphasize lines.

Also, avoid black mascara which is generally uncomplimentary to older skin tones. Use brown or midnight for lashes. Keep brows soft
