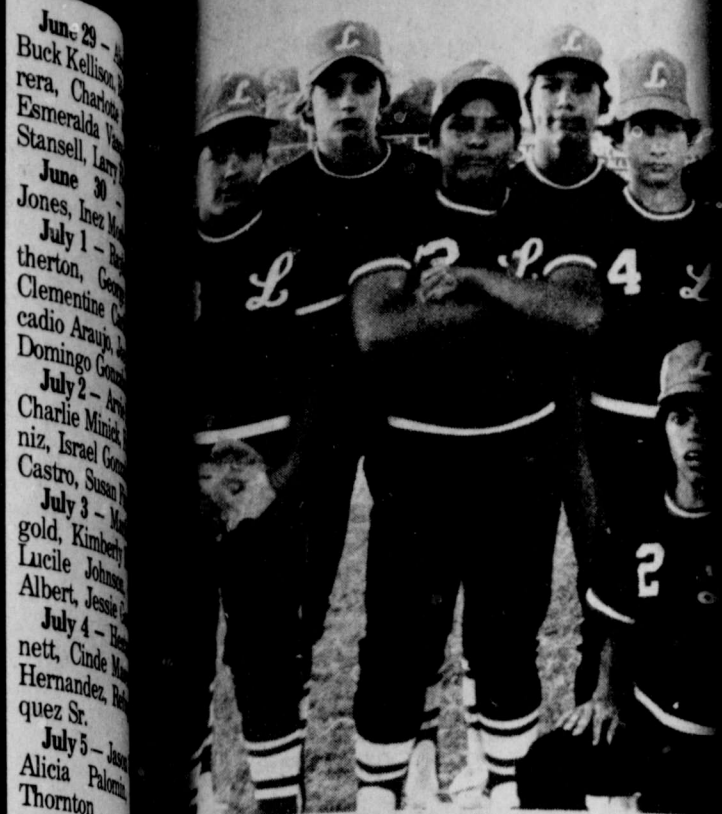

- Presentation of awards will take place at 5 p.m. July 5. Artists may pick up their entries from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

adverse weather, including one of the most severe hailstorms ever seen in August, cut 1979 harvested acres by 17 percent to 3,789,250. Yield per harvested acre for the 25 counties averaged 348.4 pounds, up from the 274.4 pound harvested in 1978 but far below the area high of 513.2 pounds set in 1965. The 10-year High Plains average yield per harvested acre, 1970 through 1979, now comes to 356.3 pounds.

Dawson County, with 243,800 bales, led the area in total 1979 production. In second, third and fourth places were Lubbock (240,600), Gaines (228,700) and Lynn (220,000).

Per-acre yield leaders on the Plains in 1979 were Martin (552 pounds), Howard (525), Midland (510) and Garza (505).

The chart below shows planted and harvested acres, yields per harvested acre and total production in 480-pound net weight bales for each of the 25 PCG counties.

Good Yields On Onions

Onion harvest begins this week in Floyd County with both packing sheds expected to be running.

"I've been growing onions here for 24 years," said Chuck Holmes, "and this is as good a crop as I've ever seen."

Holmes is with the DeBryan Produce Shed and expects to start shipping the end of the week.

The onion market is only fair with yellow pre-packs and large mediums selling at \$3.50. Jumbo yellows are bringing between \$6 and \$7.

The white market is \$4.50 for pre-packs, \$6.00 for mediums and \$9.00 for jumbos.

"This is the tail end of the Las Cruces deal," Holmes said. Las Cruces had a good crop this year and they were about two weeks later than usual, which has kept the market down.

Arizona has finished shipping, but California is still strong. Onions are coming from the Indio and Palm Springs area now.

Hereford will come off in another 2 weeks. "They had a little more adverse weather than we did," Holmes said.

Holmes estimated that there are around 1000 acres planted in Floyd County. The Hereford-Dimmit area planted about their normal 3500 acres this year.

The county cucumber crop also looks good and should be ready in about two weeks, possibly by the fourth of July.

Peppers are expected to start about August 25.

Wheat harvest is winding down and now onion harvest is beginning. There are about 1000 acres of onions in the county. Yields are running high this year and the prices are only fair but market generally falls off before the 4th of July and comes back afterwards.

Jon LaBaume, district conservationist for the soil conservation service stated that SCS would be involved in terracing some wheat ground and doing some other conservation practices on wheat ground, but at the present time, no cost share monies are available in the Great Plains Conservation Program or ACP program. Most of the funds are allotted in October of each year and usually used during the winter months for conservation practices.

This week we are adding the local cattle market report to our other markets. We are trying to improve





